



CIVIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE - L. Labonte - Chairman

In May of 1969 the Civic Affairs Committee was asked by the Executive to undertake a study of lands available for recreation and take a look at all aspects of community development in the Blackburn Hamlet area.

The Civic Affairs Committee held many meetings with various agencies and governments. Meetings, discussions and negotiations were held with the Gloucester Township Council, Costain Estates Ltd., School Boards, the National Capital Commission, Township Departments and many other persons and interested citizens.

In September, Costain Estates offered to hire a firm of consultants to look into the whole question of recreation and park land and community development the firm of Procton, Redfern, Bowsfield and Bacon of Toronto were retained for the job. In the meantime talks and surveys continued between Costain Estates, Township and the Association.

In October, Costain decided to give an advance dedication of land, on future development, of 5 acres on the north side of Cyrville Rd. at Bearbrooke Rd. The Township agreed to purchase a second 5 acre site on the South side of Cyrville Rd. behind the proposed shopping centre at a cost of \$12,500 from Costain Estates.

In January, the consultants reported their findings and recommendations to Costain Estates Ltd., Township Council, the Association, Township Planning Board and Township Community Centres Board.

Subsequently he Civic Affairs committee and the Recreation committee met with Costain and Township Council representatives and studied the proposals of the consultants and proposals from our numerous meetings and surveys. The two committees have now recommended to the Executive that the Association accept our proposals regarding parkland. Costain Estates will present to you the membership on Monday. Feb. 23, 1970, at the Glen Ogilvie School the consultant's plans and report. We hope you will be there and that you will take an active part in the meeting. We hope you will be there to voice your opinion and vote for the two committee's recommendations. We thinkthese recommendations are for the good of Blackburn Hamlet and will make Blackburn Hamlet a well integrated community with a good system of parkland and active recreation land. All of us, property owners, should be interested in the development of the community. Come out to the

GARBAGE COLLECTION - J. Swann

In October 1969 a questionnaire on garbage collection in Blackburn Hamlet was circulated to the homes in the Oct. BANAR. The final results were tabulated after close to 200 questionnaires were returned. The residents of Blackburn (56%) have requested that Saturday remain as the day of regular garbage collection. On the question of two garbage collection a week (66%) have expressed a desire for twice a week garbage collection during the summer months and Tuesday was the most popular day of the week for the second collection. Council has now been informed of the results of this survey.

- 1. YOU MUST WEAR RUNNING SHOES NO BARE FEET OR STOCKINGS
- 2. WE WILL SET UP TIME SCHEDULES FOR EACH FUTURE SATURDAY, EXPANDING IT TO BOTH MORNING AND AFTERNOON IF REQUIRED.

THE CATCH

The above plans will not be possible without your participation. We are not worried about the response from the players, but we must have an organization to operate this venture. We must have you volunteer between now and February 28th if you are willing to help us and/or will help on February 28, Registration and Basketball Clinic Day. This session will run 3 months only to May 30/70.

Specifically, we are envisioning the requirement for:

- 1. Director of Boys
 - He will oversee activities of the boys 9 to 17 years, dealing with coaches and referees and will work with the Chairman, the League Organizer, Chief Referee, and other Committee Members. In particular he will allot the players to the various groups or teams
- 2. Director of Girls)
 3. Director of Adults) will carry out the duties similar to the above.

- 4. Coaches and Assistant Coaches (Male and Female)
 - We have no idea of how many we will require, but each will be responsible for organizing his group or team, seeing that they are notified of times managing the group or team (together with his or her assistant or co-coach) and ensuring that equal playing time given each player regardless of playing ability.
- 5. Referees (Male and female)
 - These volunteers will work under the overall direction of the Chief Referee, the latter being responsible for any general training and instructions required and the assignment of referees to groups as requested.
- 6. Timekeepers
- 7. Scorers.

GLOUCESTER HYDRO R. Bisaillon

The building - HYDRO in Leitrim - is not ours. We rent - \$10,000 per year. (Purchase price \$78,000, we have 6 months to decide.)

Presently two agreements are on the table to purchase 5.4 acres around our building at \$8,000 an acre. It is an exceptionally high price when it might be possible to buy land at \$850 to \$1,000 an acre in Orleans from War Assets. The School Board in Orleans purchased 25 acres at \$850 an acre, a year ago.

COMPETETIVE SWIMMING Brian Parkin

Gloucester Swim Club hosted an invitational swim meet at the Centennial Pool, Feb. 1st, with participating clubs from Brockville, Rockcliffe AFB and Pointe Claire. In a very exciting and closely contested affair, Pointe Claire Windmills, under the guidance of Canadian Olympic coach George Gate, took the meet honours scoring 256 points to Gloucester's 242, followed by Rockcliffe (125 points) and Brockville 115.

Three new Ottawa City records were established by Julian Feldman, of Gloucester, Norma Bryant and Louise Nadorozny, both from Rockcliffe. Eight other City records were tied, of local interest, Steven Parkin of Blackburn Hamlet won the 10 and under 50 meters breaststroke event with a time of 49.2 secs. Other Blackburn swimmers who placed in the scoring were Nancy Laatunen, Brian Parkin, Diane Skoberg, Dana Skoberg and Peter Smith. The Gloucester boys 10 and under relay team tied the record in the 200 meters medlay relay event. Members of the team were Geoff Hall and Steven Parkin of Blackburn and Andrew Marshall and A. Mierins of Rothwell Hgts.

The Gloucester Club travels to Pointe Claire Feb. 21st and 22nd to take part in an invitational meet which will include teams from Gardner, Massachusetts, Toronto EMAC, North York and the Montreal and Ottawa areas.

The Gloucester Swim Club would like to thank everyone who sponsored children in the SWIM-A-THON held on Sunday, Feb. 15th. Your generous support will not only benefit our club but will help train and send Canadian Swimmers to the Commonwealth Games, to be held in Scotland this summer, and the 1972 Olympic Games in Munich. Remember--swimming is one of the few sports in which Canada is consistently winning medals in Olympic and World competition.
