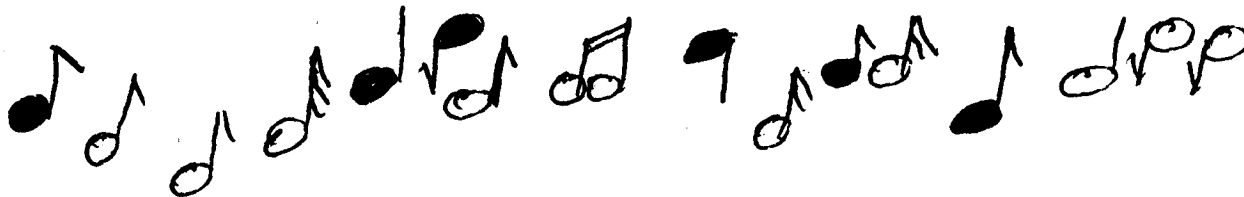

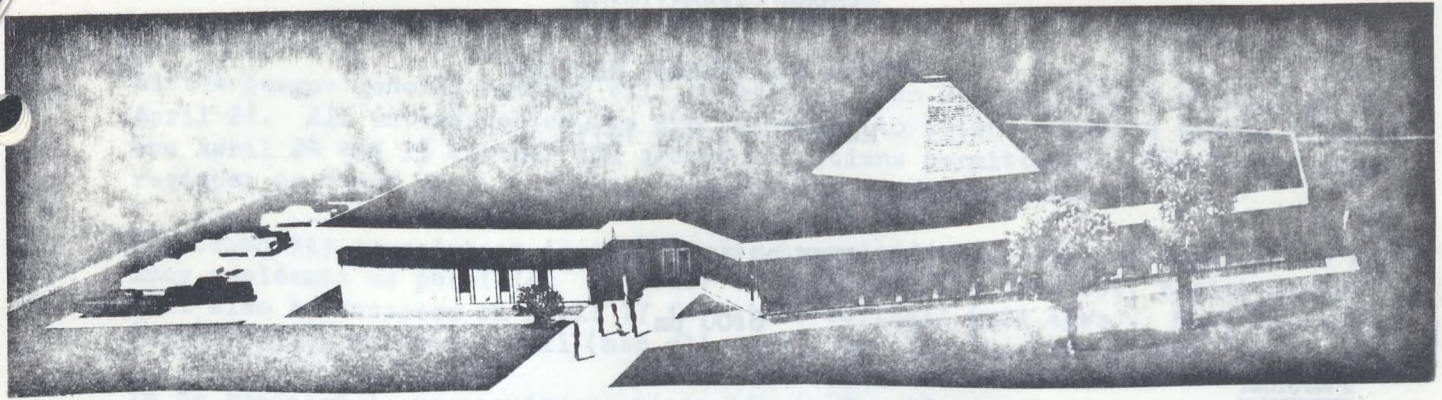
P.T.A. GENERAL MEETING - MAY 11th

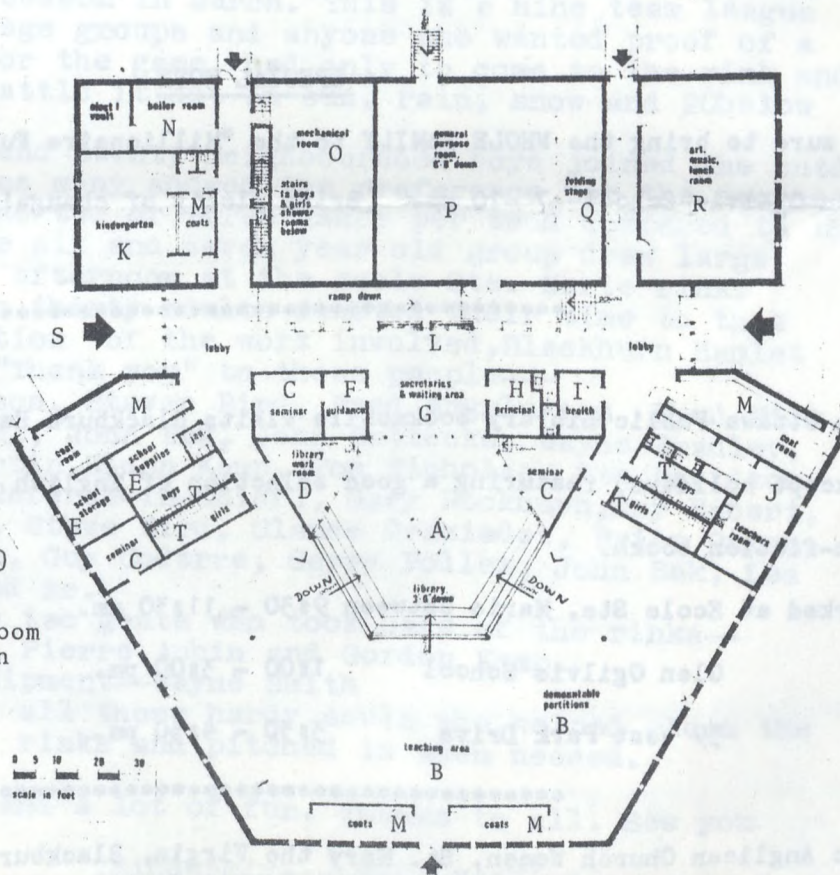

DESIGN OF NEW SCHOOL FOR BLACKBURN HAMLET

Above is a picture of the architect's model of the new 13-room Catholic elementary school (K to 8) to be built on a 5½-acre site on the east side of Bearbrook Rd. just north of Innes Rd. A "resource centre" or library will be located to the right, under the dome, surrounded by classrooms. On the left will be a combination art, music and lunch room, a gymnasium, changing rooms, and maintenance and heating areas. Construction is expected to begin shortly for completion by September of this year.

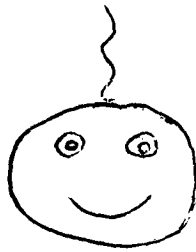
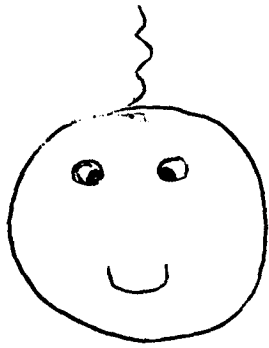
