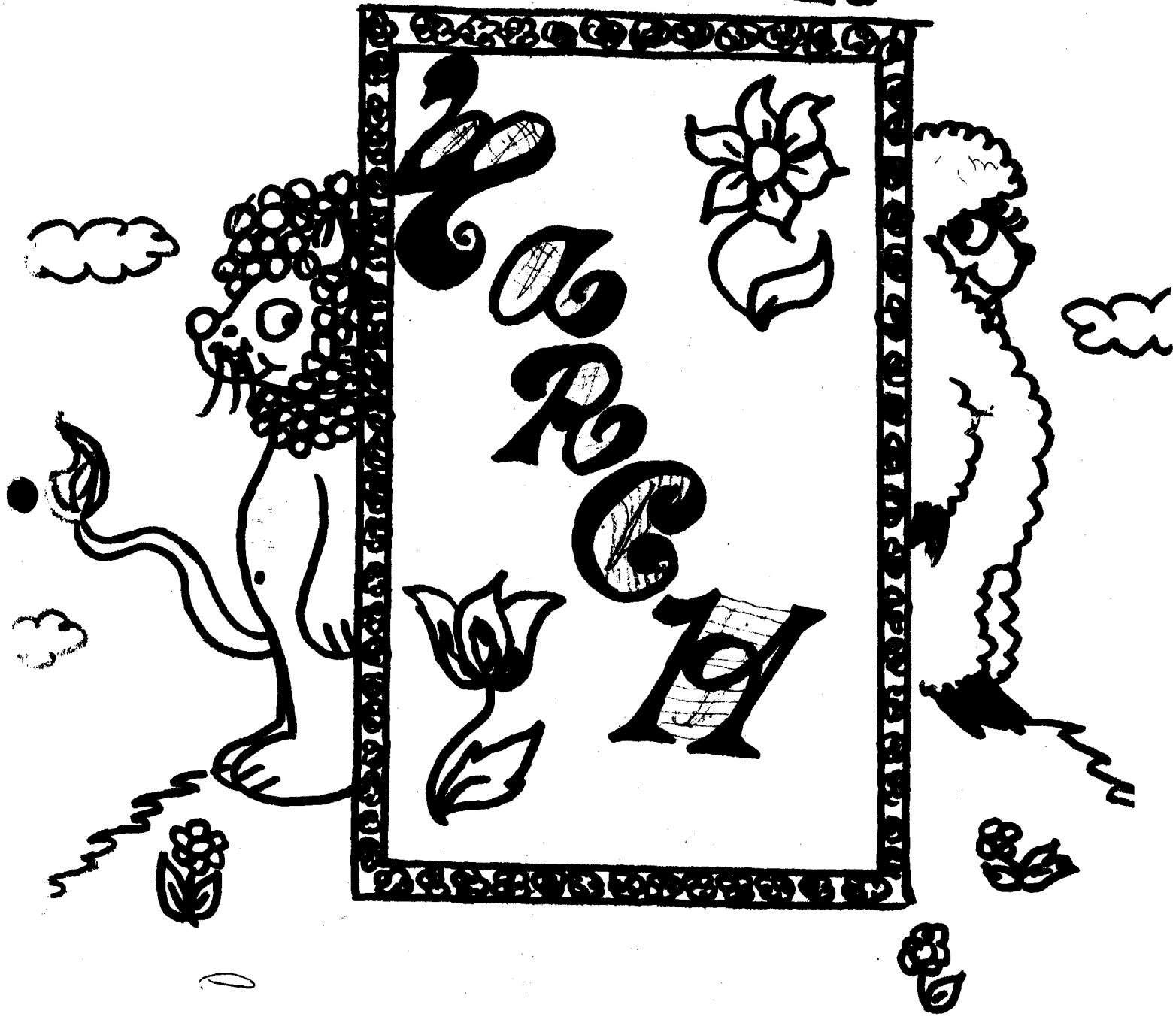

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF GLOUCESTER

By-law No. 16 of 1972

Entitled, "A By-law of the Corporation of the Township of Gloucester regulating the use and care of streets and Municipal property".

The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Gloucester, in the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton, enacts as follows:

DEFINITIONS:

1. In this by-law,
 - (a) "boulevard" means that part of a street which lies between the travelled portion of the street and the street property line save and except any municipal sidewalk;
 - (b) "Corporation" means the Corporation of the Township of Gloucester;
 - (c) "Director" means the Director of Planning and Works of the Corporation;
 - (d) "street" means a road allowance or a lane which is open for traffic, and includes the surface, grassed area, boulevard, ditch, curb, gutter, sidewalk, and any other structure constructed thereon by the Corporation or with the approval of the Corporation.

GENERAL PROHIBITIONS:

2. (1) No person shall, unless otherwise authorized by the provisions of this or any other by-law of the Corporation,
 - (a) throw or deposit snow or ice on a street;
 - (b) deposit, drop, scatter, spill or throw any filth, earth, ashes, manure, garbage, paper, hand bill, dodger, advertisement, or any vegetable matter, stone, lime, sand, tin, wood, the carcass of any dead animal, fish or fowl, in or upon a street or upon property of the Corporation;
 - (c) encumber or damage a street by animals, vehicles or other means;
 - (d) permit or allow any paper, hand bill, dodger, advertisement or any container, whether made of plastic, cardboard or paper, to be blown from private property or from any other location onto a street or onto any property of the Corporation;

- (e) obstruct a drain, gutter or water course along or upon a street;
- (f) place a plank or other material in or over any gutter or ditch for the purpose of making a crossing except for a period of not more than 24 hours without the written approval of the Director of Planning and Works;
- (g) walk upon, or move, drive, run or propel a vehicle upon, over or across a newly constructed sidewalk before it has been opened for use by the public;
- (h) being the operator of a parking station, parking lot, used car lot, automobile service station, or mechanical car wash, permit or allow water used for washing or cleaning a motor vehicle, to escape upon, overflow, or run across or upon or be carried onto a street;
- (i) set fire to any shavings, papers, straw, leaves or any combustible matter on a street, or within 100' of any building;
- (j) sell, without approval of the Council, by auction, any real or personal property on a street or on property of the Corporation;
- (k) being the owner or occupier of land, allow any part of a tree, shrub, or sapling to extend over or upon any street, so as to interfere with, impede or endanger persons using the street;
- (l) move, or cause to be moved a vehicle equipped with cleats, flanges, or tracks on its wheels, or rollers, or any of them, on or along the travelled portion of the roadway or the sidewalk, except by means of a float, trailer, or other similar device, providing that a vehicle if so equipped including a vehicle for the digging and backfilling of trenches, may be moved directly across the travelled portion of the roadway or the sidewalk, if a preventative mat has first been laid on the surface of the portion of the roadway or sidewalk to be crossed, provided however that this subsection shall not apply when a vehicle is operating with the written permission of the Director;
- (m) remove a barricade or notice or enter upon or use a street temporarily closed under the provisions of this by-law;
- (n) remove or move a barricade, sign or light placed around any excavation in a street;

- (o) move or cause any building or structure to be moved into, along, or across a street without having first obtained a permit from the Director.
- (2) It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to obstruct pedestrians or traffic by standing, loitering, walking or marching in a group or near to each other upon the streets, highway, lanes, sidewalks, pavements or public places of the Township of Gloucester, and by refusing without sufficient excuse to move on when required so to do by any constable or police officer.

BOULEVARDS:

- 3. (1) The owner or occupier of land fronting or abutting on a street may improve the boulevard in front of his land by sodding or seeding it with grass seed at his own expense, provided that the improvement of the boulevard does not confine or impede traffic or does not bury, unduly expose or damage any hydrant, valve box, service post, manhole, or other utility plant; provided further that if the width of the boulevard is not sufficient to be maintained in grass, it may be paved if approved by the Director.
- (2) Every boulevard may be re-occupied by the Corporation at anytime without the consent of the owner or occupier of the property abutting thereon.
- (3) The owner or occupier of land abutting on a street may make such walk or roadway across a boulevard as may be necessary to provide a means of access.
- (4) No person shall break, dig up, destroy or damage the sod or grass of a boulevard, or a fence or railing erected and maintained for the protection of the boulevard without having first obtained a permit or other written permission so to do.
- (5) No person, other than the Corporation, shall erect a fence, construct a wall, or plant a hedge in, over, or upon a street.

POSTERS AND SIGNS:

- 4. (1) No person shall pull down, destroy, deface or, in any way interfere with any post, surveyor's mark, bench mark, traffic sign, street name sign, sign board, traffic signal, traffic cone, or any other traffic control device, affixed, or placed in a street.
- (2) Names of streets shall be displayed at the intersections thereof by a sign of a type and material acceptable to the Director, attached either to a building or to posts or standards as specified by the Director.

STREET CLEANING AND REPAIR:

5. (1) The cleaning and repair of all streets shall be performed under the direction of the Director.
- (2) Every person in charge of a vehicle hauling earth, sand, stone or other substances in a street shall load his vehicle or drive the same in such a manner so as not to permit or cause the contents thereof to fall, spill or be deposited on a street.
- (3) Every person in charge of a vehicle shall not bring the vehicle, or permit it to be brought upon a street without having first removed from the wheels thereof as completely as is reasonably practicable, all mud, clay, lime, and similar material, or any fertilizer or manure which is likely, if not removed, to cause an obstruction or dangerous condition or nuisance in a street or cause injury to the surface of the street.
- (4) The Director may have removed any mud, clay or other material deposited on a street contrary to the provisions of this section at the expense of the person causing or permitting the same and such persons shall forthwith pay the cost of such removal to the Corporation in addition to any other penalties herein provided.

TEMPORARY CLOSING OF STREETS:

6. The Director may temporarily close to traffic any street whenever the same may become necessary by reason of any work or improvement being carried out thereon or by reason of the condition thereof and the Director may cause to be erected or kept thereon, any barricade or notice warning the public that the street is closed to traffic and no person shall enter upon or use a street so temporarily closed.

PENALTY:

7. Every person convicted of a breach of any of the provisions of this by-law shall, for each offence, be liable to a fine not exceeding \$300.00, exclusive of costs.

During a crisp, clear afternoon in late February a beautiful Evening Grosbeak was killed within 10 feet of the birdfeeder in my back yard. Upon examination it appeared that the bird had been shot by a BB or pellet gun of some description. Beyond the senselessness of this destructive act, however, the law concerning the use of firearms in this community should be considered.

Firearms are defined in Section 82 of the Criminal Code, 1971, as "any barrelled weapon from which any shot, bullet or other missile can be discharged and that is capable of causing serious bodily injury or death to the person, and includes anything that can be adapted for use as a firearm". By this definition BB guns and pellet guns are considered to be firearms.

By-law No. 46 of 1963 of the Township of Gloucester declares, in part, that "the discharge of guns or other firearms, air-guns and spring-guns or any class or type thereof in the following defined areas of the Township of Gloucester is prohibited: . . .

(4) all lands in the Blackburn Hamlet area"

Assuming that no adult would choose to shoot this colorful visitor to the neighborhood, the law with respect to the possession of firearms by minors should also be noted. Section 87 of the Criminal Code, 1971, states that "Every one who sells, barter, gives, lends, transfers or delivers any firearm or ammunition to a person under the age of sixteen years who is not the holder of a permit under which he may lawfully possess it is guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction".

Since neither the law nor common sense was apparently followed in the incident described, household heads may wish to reassess the wisdom of allowing family members to have and/or use firearms. The proper and lawful use of firearms can be an enjoyable recreational activity. To fully realize this, however, one must be well trained in firearm handling and safety, and he must have a healthy respect for his fellow man and his surroundings.

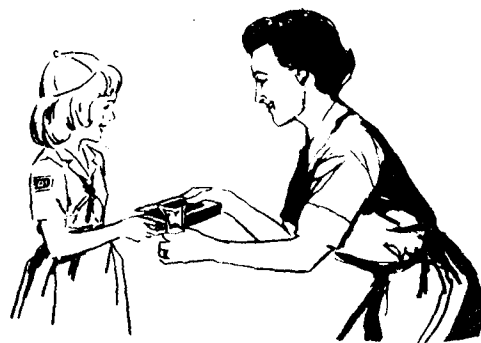

A First-Aid course, for the three Guide companies has been started under the able direction of Mrs. Roseanne Hart and Mrs. Lesley Mills.

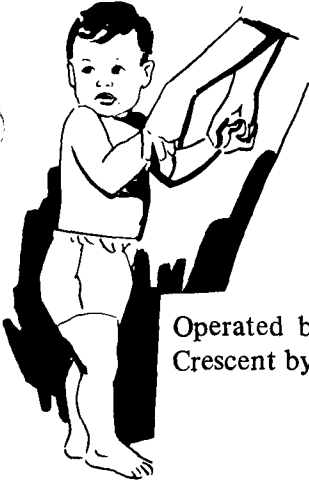
On March 13th, the following Guides were enrolled in the 23rd Company:

SWIM

CLUB



Gloucester swimmers spent February and early March hauling in local and provincial honors. For a finale, they readied themselves for a heavy March-end schedule which should not only bring in additional honors but some vitally needed financial support for the team.

February-March laurels included an overwhelming GSC team victory in the Operation Olympics Preliminary on February 13 – a triumph by 13-14 age swimmers in a seven-team zone meet – qualification of more finalists for Operation Olympics than any other Ottawa team – the capture of four more records by GSC swimmers – and the selection of one swimmer for the Ontario team sent to Manitoba.

At the first February meet, 13 of Gloucester's 9-14 year swimmers hit high enough in provincial rankings to take part in the Operation Olympics finals in Oakville. These top listed swimmers were: *Pam Skene, Jocelyn White, Cameron Barber, Ann Eubanks, Peter Kornelsen, Kirsten Feldman, Arnie Mierins, Terry Wheatley, Darcy Gaskell, Julien Feldman, Louise Desrocher, Patty Wheatley and Greg Pottie*. Slots were awarded on the basis of individual times clocked during a series of preliminary meets held across Ontario. At this area's meet on February 13, Gloucester not only piled up a 553-point total (138 points above the nearest contender), individual GSC swimmers set three new Eastern Ontario records. They were: *Arnie Mierins (100-metre butterfly), Ann Eubanks (200-metre individual medly) and Jocelyn White and Pam Skene (200-metre breaststroke)*.

March 5 was a high-flying day for Gloucester with the 13-14 swimmers winning an Eastern Ontario age-group meet held at the township pool – and other swimmers carrying away laurels from the Operation Olympics finals in the Toronto area. Boosting Gloucester to the win in the local meet was *Brian Parkin*, who won the 400-metre freestyle and took an additional second and third. Gloucester's *Holly Ashcroft* snatched a first in the 200-metre butterfly, while *Vickey Wood* took a second and *Andree Tremblay* a third.

The swimmers in Oakville were led by *Ann Eubanks* who set a new Ontario record in the 100-metre backstroke and was selected as a member of the provincial team sent to inter-provincial competition in Winnipeg on March 11-12. In addition to her gold performance in the backstroke, Ann collected two silvers and a fifth. Also putting Gloucester in the point column at this contest were *Julien Feldman (a fourth, Peter Kornelsen (two sixths), Jocelyn White (two sixths) and Louise Desrocher (a sixth)*.

Some of Gloucester's older swimmers will carry the club standard to Ontario's Senior Championships in Waterloo the weekend of March 17-19. In addition, Gloucester swimmers will be competing in three other competitions during the remainder of the month.

SWIM-A-THON – March 26 – at Gloucester Pool

Preparing themselves for these meets (swimming an average of a mile a day – and often hitting the water at 6.30 a.m.) is not all these energetic athletes have on their agenda. They will be visiting families in this area asking for pledges on their Swim-A-Thom project. Only *one* swimmer will visit each door this year – and will present a background sheet on the team's history, achievements and needs.

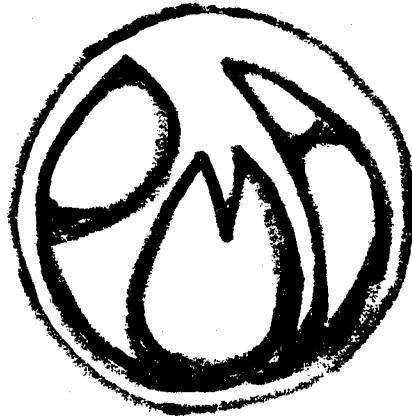

Now that we are well into the new year, may I suggest you take a look at the new wallpaper catalogues which are in your local shops, and give a thought to the effects which can be achieved by the use of this wonderful decorating aid. Even the selection of a paper in one color gives you texture and warmth which cannot be achieved by a painted wall. Consider for a minute the burlap, grasscloth and other woven textures that can be obtained in solid colors, or the warmth of panelling and wood textures, as well as metallics in silver and colors. Many people think of wallpaper only in terms of overall patterns, but many types are available which do not fit this description. And even when you go to a pattern, some of them are so subdued, for example white on white, or pale mottled patterns, or so conservative, for example tiny overall prints, as barely to quality as patterned. Of course, at the other extreme are the big, bold, brassy patterns that stop you dead. And all of these have their place in the home.

There are extras you might consider in your papering too, like the matching fabric which allows you to finish your windows to match the walls, or perhaps make a bedspread or accessory items. Also, there are the complementary papers featuring a bold floral pattern with an accompanying stripe. These are frequently placed side-by-side in the catalogues for your convenience. There are overall trellis patterns with flowers intertwined and the matching trellis paper without the flowers. Alternating walls or sections of walls in these prints achieves some extremely interesting and unusual results.

The paper need not be put all over the room, or all over the wall either. You can use your imagination to devise interesting alternatives – framing a section of floral paper on one wall and surrounding the section with the complementary stripe, extend the flowers from one papered wall up over the ceiling or along the adjacent walls, paper a ceiling in a trellis type of paper for a bower effect.

When it comes to picking your patterns, the same rules that apply for light and dark colors apply for light and dark, or bold and plain, patterns. It is generally wise to put the large or dark pattern in the large room, and vice versa. If you find a particularly attractive but bold pattern you really would like in a small room, paper one wall with it, not all four. In small bathrooms and kitchens papering the cupboards as well as the walls in a small print frequently helps to make the room appear larger.

You can find wallpaper a useful tool for tying your room together. If you have a miscellany of items that don't seem to go together, you can frequently find a wallpaper which contains the colors of the items, or colors complementary to the items, which will put the finishing touches on the room

When you visit the store I think you will be surprised at the variety and quantity of patterns and catalogues available. Take a leisurely stroll through the catalogues, picturing rooms in your home done with various applications. Keep an open mind until you find something that really grabs you, then work with it for a while. The salesman will be only too happy to help you estimate the quantities you will need, and to give you some good advice on applying the paper (very easy with the marvellous pre-pasted papers), for the novices in the crowd. And if you are "just looking" I think you will come away with a greater appreciation of this avenue of decorating which is available for you when you are ready.
