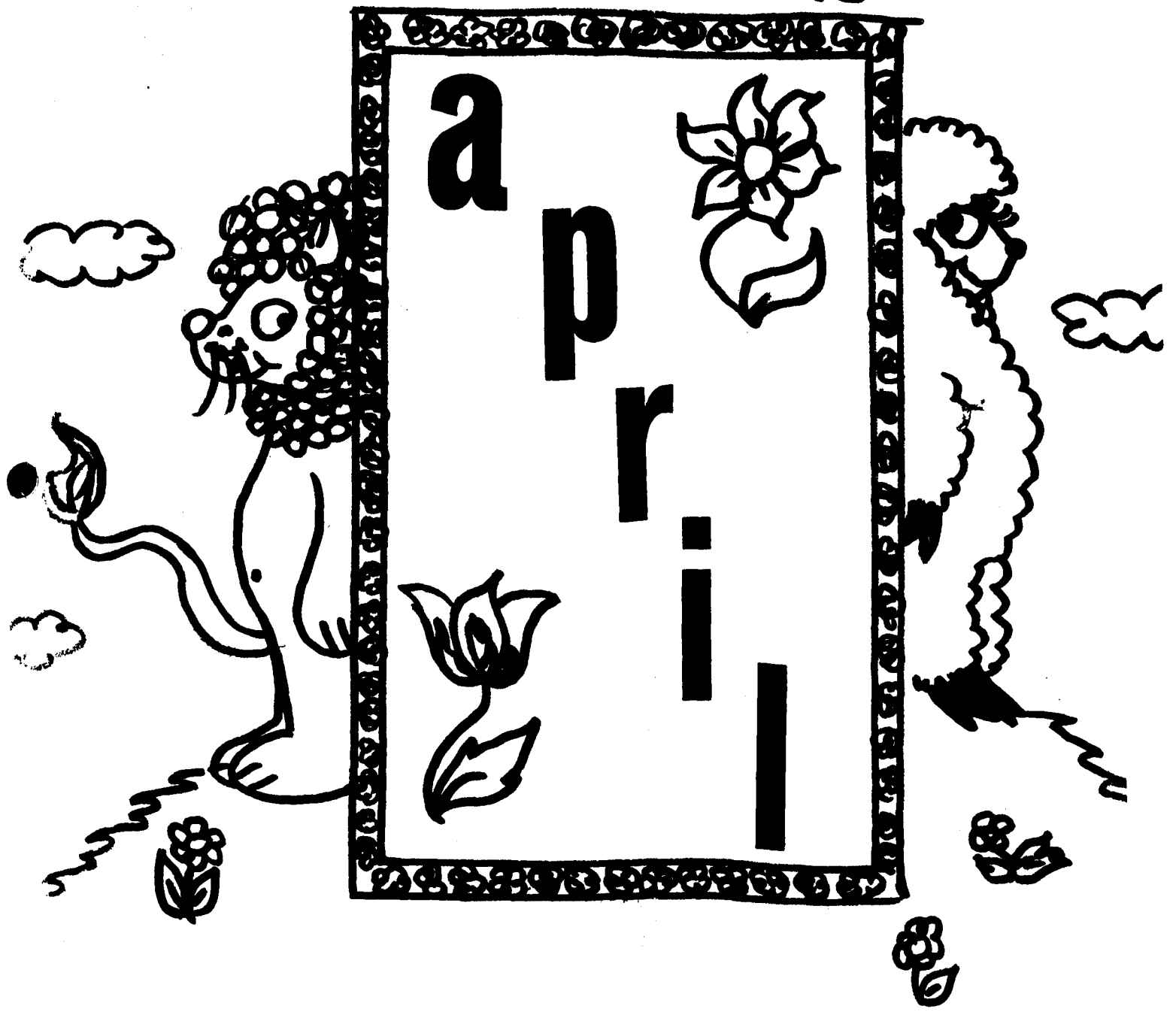


On Thursday evening I attended the Community Association meeting and heard Mr. Kilpatrick present the options for the development of Blackburn Hamlet.

I would like to go on record as supporting the recommendation submitted by the association for the construction of a bypass to the south of the community.

I further support any plan which in addition to the bypass will discourage other than local traffic using the streets of the community. To this end I recommend that Bearbrook road not be connected directly to the bypass and hence not be an attractive direct route from the proposed bypass to Montreal road and the Queensway. This thought is enhanced by the proposal for the community center with its schools, playgrounds and shopping center which border Bearbrook road.

Another suggestion made at the meeting which I support concerns the question of Innes road being broken at the community center. In keeping with my desire for local traffic only to be accommodated within the community and in the hope that that traffic will be able to flow reasonably freely, I support the proposal for Innes road to be a broken road to discourage through traffic but for it not to be broken at the community center and thereby effectively isolating the eastern part of the community from the rest.

In closing I would like to congratulate and thank the Association executive for their excellent work on this and numerous other community projects.

The president of the Blackburn Community Association has drawn to my attention that at the General Meeting there were several complaints about frequent interruptions of hydro service in Blackburn Hamlet area.

I would like to take this opportunity to point out that Gloucester Hydro has been only too aware of the problem, and to explain the causes of the power failures.

Over the past year, our records show 14 power failures in this area, some affecting only 1 or 2 homes and others blacking out the whole Hamlet. The causes fall into the following categories:

- 2 - major failures of Ontario Hydro's power supply. These are considered unusual, and unlikely to occur again. Unfortunately, these are the failures affecting everyone.
- 7 - interruptions due to construction activities. These outages affect fairly large areas (50 - 100 homes) and continue to crop up in spite of a free line-finding service offered by Gloucester Hydro, and in spite of the charges assessed to the responsible parties concerned. The only consolation, I suppose, is in the fact that this type of failure will go away when the area is built up.
- 2 - tardy upgrading of fuse capacity as load grows. Fifty to 100 homes are affected, but repeat occurrences are very unlikely.
- 3 - small equipment failures. These are the normal breakdowns to be expected in any Hydro system. Usually only 1 or 2 homes are inconvenienced and repairs are simple and readily made quickly.

As this tabulation shows, your Hydro utility has no control over most of these failures and can only look forward to the day when the growth problems are no longer with us and only the normal small equipment failures are left. In the meantime, we will do our best to get repairs done quickly and minimize the inconvenience to our customers.

THE FOLLOWING PAGES CONTAIN INFORMATION PERTAINING TO THE BLACKBURN HOME AND SCHOOL WHICH WE THE ASSOCIATION FEELS IS AN INTEREST TO BOTH MEMBERS AND NON-MEMBERS.

THE ASSOCIATION WAS INTERESTED IN THE PROGRESS OF THE NEW BLACKBURN MIDDLE SCHOOL WE WROTE MRS. MACINTOSH CHAIRMAN OF THE CARLETON BOARD, HER REPLY FOLLOWS.

AT OUR GENERAL MEETING WE HAD A DISCUSSION PERTAINING TO SEX EDUCATION, AS A RESULT THE STAFF OF GLEN OGILVIE SCHOOL WAS TO SUBMIT A PROGRAM TO BE STARTED IN GRADE 7 AND 8 THIS YEAR. THE RESULTS OF THIS ENDEAVOUR FOLLOWS. IT MUST BE REMEMBERED THAT THE POLICIES OUTLINED ARE THOSE OF THE ONTARIO DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION NOT THOSE OF THE CARLETON BOARD.

WE WILL BE WELCOMING A NEW PRINCIPAL TO THE MIDDLE SCHOOL NEXT YEAR AND HAVE REQUESTED THE BOARD FOR AN OUTLINE OF HIS BACKGROUND WHICH WE HAVE HAD PRINTED FOR THE BANNER.

FOR THOSE OF YOU WHO MAY HAVE MISSED IT THE CARLETON BOARD ANNOUNCED THE CHANGE IN SCHOOL BOUNDARIES FOR 1972, SOME AFFECT OUR AREA. THEREFORE QUOTING FROM THE OTTAWA CITIZEN OF 21 MARCH THE FOLLOWING CHANGES ARE EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 1972.

- \* THE NEW BLACKBURN MIDDLE SCHOOL WILL SERVE GRADES 6,7 AND 8 FROM THE ATTENDANCE AREAS OF GLEN OGILVIE AND BLACKBURN PUBLIC SCHOOLS, AS WELL AS GRADES 6 AND 7 PUPILS FROM QUEENSWOOD SCHOOL AREA WHO NOW ATTEND HENRY MUNRO MIDDLE SCHOOL.
- \* THE GLEN PARK DEVELOPMENT SOUTH OF INNES ROAD WILL BE RE-LOCATED FROM BLACKBURN SCHOOL TO GLEN OGILVIE. BOARD CHAIRMAN LOUISE MACINTOSH URGED THAT PUPILS BE BUSED TO GLEN OGILVIE BECAUSE OF THE HAZARDOUS TRAFFIC CONDITIONS ON INNES ROAD.

2. New and Experimental Course Approvals, 1972-73

All principals should have received Departmental memorandum number 11, dated November 25 (copy enclosed). Note that requests for approval must reach the Region 10 office no later than March 31 for courses planned for 1972-73.

In order to provide time to review requests in this office and prepare supporting letters for the signature of the Director, all proposals should be received by the Superintendent of Program Development no later than March 1. (Principals in Western Area please follow instructions in Minutes of Western Area Council, December 1, 1971.)

## Note:

- (a) Please submit three copies of each proposal. (Two for Region 10, one for this office.)
- (b) Experimental courses are defined as those "not considered to be within existing Department of Education guidelines"
- (c) See list of Departmental guidelines on pages 6 and 7 of Circular 14, 1971.
- (d) Some Carleton secondary schools have approvals for experimental courses offered in 1971-72. If approval was for a one year period, please submit a revised request, or the original request, for 1972-73.

Thank you for the outline of the "Guidance Program" from Glen Ogilvie Public School and the copy of "Education for Sexuality" which is one of the reference books being used. I believe that Principal Linnen is requesting approval for the units marked with an asterisk - those dealing with human anatomy and human reproduction.

It seems that this course is not within the guidelines for Grades 7 and 8 as detailed in Curriculum I - 29: Physical and Health Education - Intermediate Division (1966). Approval of the Department of Education is required. See Departmental memo #11, November 25, 1971 or my memo to Carleton principals dated April 5, 1971. Or see Section 5(e) page 3 of Circular 14, 1971.

If Mr. Linnen and his staff will develop their proposal (including a rationale and a list of texts and other reference materials) I will be pleased to review it with you and prepare a letter for the signature of the Director.

May I make the following suggestion for consideration by the Glen Ogilvie staff:

- (a) Consult the Physical Education Department at Gloucester High School re coordination of program. They may wish to revise their Health courses in consultation with the Glen Ogilvie staff.
- (b) I believe that Audrey Bayles, Consultant in Health and Physical Education, at the local office of the Department of Education should be asked to act as a resource person unless this has already been done. She is very willing to assist school staffs.
- (c) I can supply a limited number of reference books on loan if this would assist the Glen Ogilvie staff.

Memo To: Mr. L. F. Labrosse - 2

It is unfortunate that this proposal was not directed to my office before now. I do not see how approval can be obtained in time for the offering of this course in 1971-72. I believe that Mr. Linnen and his staff should be encouraged to plan for the fall. This curricular area is important and revision is probably overdue. Support from the community is important and I note that Mr. Linnen has some support in the form of a letter from Mr. Dow. Does this represent the feelings of most of the Glen Ogilvie parents? I suggest that some plan to involve parents - e.g., an evening meeting including the showing of films, should be considered.

MEMORANDUM TO: REGIONAL DIRECTORS OF EDUCATION  
DIRECTORS OF EDUCATION  
SUPERINTENDENTS OF SEPARATE SCHOOLS  
PRINCIPALS OF SCHOOLS

RE: NEW AND EXPERIMENTAL COURSE APPROVALS, 1972-73

Careful and comprehensive planning is important in the development of new and experimental courses. It is understood that local and provincial policies must be considered as well as the relevance of a course to the needs of the age groups concerned. The matter of approval also requires sufficient time to allow proper attention to all aspects of a proposed course.

These courses are developed by a school and are presented to the Director of Education or Superintendent of Separate Schools of the jurisdiction to which the school belongs. If the chief supervisory officer supports the school's proposal and, when required, the proposed course has the approval of the board, the supervisory officer sends a letter to the appropriate Regional Director of Education requesting Department of Education approval. This request should include a statement by the school explaining why the proposed course is not considered to be within existing Department of Education guidelines, an outline of the course, a list of the resource materials to be used, including textbooks, and the level at which the course is to be offered. Since permission is required for the use of textbooks not listed in Circular 14, the request to use such a textbook in support of new and experimental courses should include a delineation of its specific supportive role.

This policy applies to all courses which are considered by local supervisory officers to be outside existing guidelines, at the kindergarten level and in the primary, junior, intermediate and senior divisions. The list of Departmental guidelines is given on pages 6 and 7 of Circular 14, textbooks, 1971.

Requests for approval of new and experimental courses planned to begin in September, 1972, should reach the Regional Offices by a date arranged within the Region concerned, but in any event no later than March 31, 1972.

It is recognized that this date is not appropriate for schools operating semester or trimester programs. Requests from these schools should reach the Regional Office at least two months before the time the students are informed by the school that the course is being offered.

Dear Dr. Hollins:

Thank you for your letter of February 18th which was written on behalf of the Blackburn Community Association. I appreciate being informed of the Association's interest in the methods of financing the construction of roads and sidewalks.

As you have indicated, the province does finance 50 per cent of approved expenditures in connection with the construction of local roads. The availability of these subsidies is in part a recognition of the fact that the construction of new roads is a very expensive undertaking. It is, however, a basic belief of the government that municipalities should have general responsibility for matters which are essentially local in nature. In this regard, The Local Improvement Act specifies the methods by which municipal councils may raise funds to finance construction of local works. Many of these works are for the benefit of persons in a particular area, and I hope you will understand that it would therefore be difficult to justify a subsidy from general tax revenues.

I have brought your letter to the attention of both the Minister of Municipal Affairs, the Honourable W. Darcy McKeough, and the Minister of Transportation and Communications, the Honourable Gordon Carton, Q.C. I am sure they will wish to be aware of the Association's interest in this matter.

Dear Sir,

As very new members of the Blackburn Community Association, we have been reading in the 'BANAR' about your laudable efforts in community planning. Each reference to your work reiterates your active concern that Blackburn develop as a cohesive social and geographic unit -- an aim we, too, regard as worthwhile. There is however, one element in your proposals to which we must object in the strongest possible manner. We refer to the four-lane bypass skirting the southern limit of the Hamlet.

Our as yet brief residence on Glen Park Drive has been a thoroughly satisfying one owing primarily to the enclosure of Green Belt. We must view a proposal to bulldoze four lanes of asphalt at the bottom of our back garden as most unacceptable and unnecessary. It is unacceptable in terms of prohibitive cost to Regional Government in funds and to us residing south of Innes Road in the inevitable erosion of the quality of life we enjoy now. It is unacceptable in terms of a more closely united community, for the building of a four lane bypass will serve to erect a solid wall of inter-community antagonism far beyond any detriment caused by a widened existing highway.

We are confident that our expression reflects the views and feelings of many homeowners south of Innes Road. As newcomers to Blackburn Hamlet who look forward to many tranquil years of family life here, we urge you to accept our objection and consider it in your proposal.

Dear Mrs. Dawson:

The Blackburn Community Association meeting of March 16, held to discuss the question of an Innes Road bypass to the south of the Hamlet, skirted the central issue: whether to have a bypass or a four lane Innes Road. The assembly instead concentrated on several of the sub-options associated with the bypass plan.

Aside from a passionate showing of hands in favour of the bypass by the majority in attendance, only two plausible reasons were given in its support. These are

- 1) a bypass does not split the community, and
- 2) a bypass permits a coherent "community core" on land which now straddles Innes Road.

It was obvious at the meeting that those who live south of Innes Road do not object to being split from those to the north; indeed, this issue "splits" the community more than Innes Road ever will. In addition, a coherent community core may be achieved more economically through the construction of pedestrian underpasses across Innes Road.

The true problem was not verbalized at the meeting - that a majority of residents north of Innes Road will profit through a more tranquil community, and therefore eventual appreciation in property values, by moving traffic south at the direct expense of the following groups:

a) residents of Glen Park Drive who will suffer the bypass abutting their back yards, thereby causing noise, ugliness, and depreciated property values,

b) property owners on Innes Road, the commercial value of whose land will also depreciate,

c) operators of current commercial enterprises on Innes Road, who will not see the increased traffic and business volume they anticipate, and

d) the taxpayers of the Ottawa-Carleton Regional Municipality who will pay the extra cost of the bypass.

At one point during the evening, in response to an irate Glen Park resident who stands to lose her scenic back yard, someone reminded us of "CAVEAT EMPTOR" ... beware of what? Of our friendly neighbours to the north who want to do us in ?


Election of 2nd Vice-President of Blackburn Community Association

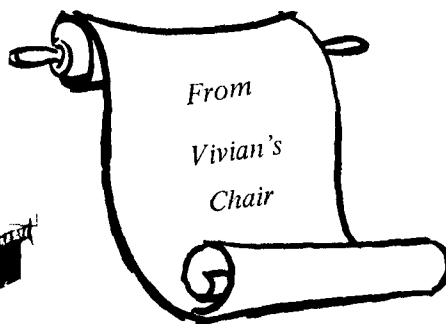
- Mrs. Dawson has spent two years in one of the toughest jobs in the Association - editor of the BANAR - and done it well!

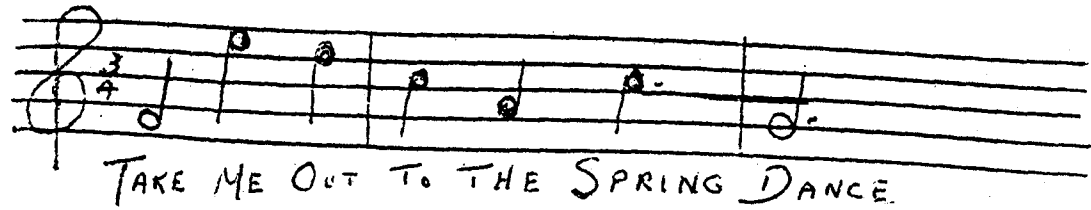

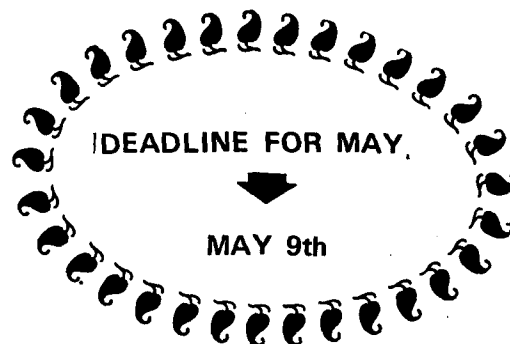

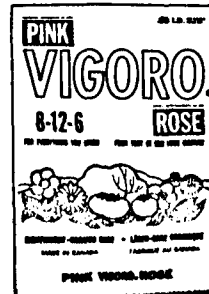
