For the past 7 years the Central Volunteer Bureau of the Social Planning Council has been instrumental in placing hundreds of teenagers in hospitals, clinics, day camps, where they spend the summer doing worthwhile community work. This is a rewarding experience for any teenager who, perhaps for the first time is given recognition as a responsible, intelligent person, ready to accept responsibility in the adult world.

There are five basic categories in which the volunteer has an opportunity to work within the community. Some of the agency and job descriptions are as follows:

Children's Programs - YM/YWCA, Nursery Schools, Day Camps, and in hospital wards

Elderly - volunteers provide assistance to the elderly and act as companions

Handicapped - volunteers assist the Co-ordinators and counsellors in sheltered workshops, day camps and pre-school programs.

Hospitals and Clinics - Volunteers assist the staff in some wards, befriend patients and do some clerical work

Clerical - Red Cross (registering donors), United Appeal (typing), Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association (assembling kits)

In all, the Central Volunteer Bureau has 30 agencies registered this year, requesting approximately 500 volunteers for the duration of July and August. Ages of applicants range from 12-24 years but for the most part 14-17 is the average age.

The Volunteer Bureau sends information to the guidance departments at the schools. This helps the guidance teachers to convey the variety of opportunities available to the student volunteer.

Summer volunteers are one of the essential components to the functioning of programs in the community. Summertime brings forth many capable volunteers enabling the agencies to expand existing programs or perhaps create new programs.

SUMMER '72 STUDENT VOLUNTEER PROGRAM This organisation is looking for at least four hundred students (13 years and up) to fill requests for volunteers from thirty health, welfare and recreational organizations. Some organizations, like the YM-YWCA are United Appeal members and others such as nursing homes and day care and day camp programs are directly or indirectly government-funded programs.

Last summer, the Volunteer Bureau placed more than 350 volunteers with these agencies. The students gained experience by working with children; with mentally and physically handicapped; with senior citizens and in office settings. Many students who want to learn about careers in people-oriented professions find that the volunteer experience is the best way to learn. At this time we have 150 students registered and will need the remainder by the end of June.

Students may obtain applications through the High School Guidance Departments or by telephoning the Volunteer Bureau between 9 & 5.

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Ottawa Senior Citizens Council

Senior Citizens' Week June 18 - 24 Senior Citizens' expo will be the biggest one-day event for older people in Ottawa. It is on Thursday June 22nd from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Lakeside Gardens, Britannia Park. For anyone who wants to know what is available in services for senior citizens, it is a must! There will be displays from senior citizens clubs, health, welfare and housing services, homes for the aged. There will be a bake sale, prizes, films and information on everything that concerns older people in Ottawa-Carleton. Lunch and refreshments will be available. Free transportation on O.T.C. buses between 9.30 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. for everyone with a senior citizens pass. (For those who do not have one, they are available at the City Clerk's office, main floor, City Hall.)

Neither is it too early to start planning for next year and the following paragraphs will give some idea of where we stand at the moment.

Indoor hockey is organized and run on a township basis by the Gloucester Minor Hockey Association and Blackburn Hamlet is entitled to 4 representatives. Win's address is 13 Westpark Dr., Phone 824-3469 and he hopes to hear from many of you when you've read this report. Looking after registration and the committee's financial affairs for the second year will be Denny Young, Phone 824-2730 and John Bak (824-2212) will again be organizing the outdoor league. To complete the local committee, we need someone to arrange sponsors, an equipment manager, a publicity coordinator and, of course, coaches and managers. A note on each of these "jobs" will follow and it is requested that anyone willing to take on a post make his or her interest known to Win as soon as possible. If we can get our help lined up during June, we can forget about hockey during July and August but be ready to swing into gear in September.

Present indications are that we will be limited to the same number of players next year as we had this year and this could mean that only those who register on the above dates and, where necessary, present their birth certificates will receive consideration.

Coaches and Managers

If you are interested in coaching or managing an indoor team, we would like to know now. Please indicate the age groups for which you would be available and state your preference. If you have not coached a Blackburn team before, it would be appreciated if you would say whether you have coached elsewhere and, if so, what age and level of team.

Sponsors

As usual, we will require team sponsors and we also need a person to recruit sponsors, collect their donations, arrange with the equipment manager for the sponsors' names to appear on sweaters, etc. Bob Riggs has done an excellent job on this for several years and would now like someone else to take it on with his assistance. With the help Bob will give, this should not be a difficult task for one who is willing to give it a try.

Equipment Manager

This entails looking after the equipment we now have, purchasing necessary new equipment, issuing it to the various teams this fall and arranging its return next spring. Win Smith has done this for the last 2 years and will be glad to help someone else get started. One big improvement in this area is that we now have ample storage space in the Armstrong Arena so it will not be necessary for the new manager to even take the equipment home unless he so wishes.

Publicity - ATTENTION MOTHERS!

Several people have mentioned with justification that we did not have much about hockey in the Banar last season. For next year, we would therefore like to have someone prepare a hockey report for each issue, i.e. a Publicity Coordinator. To ensure that the Coordinator has ample material, we hope to also have one parent from each team assume responsibility for keeping the Coordinator advised of the team's progress, etc. This is an area where we feel some of the many interested mothers could help.

SPECIAL EVENTS AT
BLACKBURN HAMLET CATHOLIC SCHOOL

June was a busy month for children at the Blackburn Hamlet Catholic School. The following is a list of the special events that took place during the month:

- Pantomime presentation of the musical, Jesus Christ Superstar, by Grade 6 pupils with assistance from pupils in Grades 5 and 7, directed by Grade 6 teacher, Mr. R.A. Lapointe;
- Tale Theatre, consisting of stories based on folk tales and West Coast Indian legends, presented by Company 1, a visiting theatre group from Victoria, B.C.;
- Visit to the school by the Heron Road Intermediate School Band;
- Field trip to Mill of Kintail at Arnprior by Grade 5 pupils;
- Discussion and demonstration of rare minerals and fossils by guest speaker, Dr. James Withey, Ph.D., of Blackburn Hamlet;
- Field trip by Grades 4 and 5 to RCMP stables at Rockcliffe;
- Nature study by Grade 5 of surrounding locality to study ecology;
- Visit to National Arts Centre by Grade 7 pupils as follow-up to class lessons;
- Field trip by Grades 1, 3, 4 and 8 to Valley Game Farm Zoo, Grades 1 and 2 having made the same trip in May;
- Noon-time turkey dinner at school organized by Grade 7 pupils in honour of Grade 8 graduates (the turkey was cooked at the home of a parent volunteer and served in banquet style by the children as an exercise in the social graces);
- Tabloid Meet, a Spring sports day involving the whole school;
- Visit to Granby Zoo in Quebec by Grades 2 and 3 in company with the pupils of Queenswood Catholic School;
- Kindergarten play "Cinderella" followed by kindergarten graduation ceremony at which "graduates" received "Bachelor of Readiness Degrees";
- Grade 8 graduation ceremony and dance.

The activities during June were typical of the many extra-curricular and special events that were organized during the school year under the energetic leadership of the new principal, Mr. Peter Johnston, and his teaching staff.

Among some of the other activities that took place since the school moved into its new building last December was a folk mass organized almost in its entirety by the children. They wrote the homily and prayers of the faithful and chose and sang the songs, accompanied on the guitar by Father Adrian Lee. Two other children's masses took place during the year and the whole school witnessed the baptism of the Acheson baby in the school library last April.


There were skating parties and hockey games in January, a bake sale in February by Grade 8 pupils to raise funds for the purchase of floor hockey and broomball sticks, a highly successful one-day Winter Carnival, and class visits at various times to the National Gallery, the National Arts Centre, the National Museum of Science and Technology, the Experimental Farm, the Cumberland Sugar Bush, as well as a week-end trip by a group of Grade 6, 7 and 8 pupils to Toronto where they visited the Science Centre and the Royal Ontario Museum.

During Education Week, March 6 to 10, there were many special events, such as educational gymnastics, plays, sing songs, folk dancing and

displays, including a display of an exact replica of Canada's satellite, Allouette II. Also, during March and April, all children 7 years old and up were tested for Canada Fitness Awards, as sponsored by the Department of National Health and Welfare. The testing was conducted by the Grade 6 class, under the supervision of their teacher, Mr. Lapointe. The results of the testing have not yet been received. Children in Grades 5 and 6 also participated in six weeks of swimming lessons for Red Cross badges at the Gloucester pool.

An experimental class on movement education involving Grades 1 and 3 was conducted by Mr. B. Booth and Mr. Lionel Spector, both from the University of Ottawa Physical Education Department. It was held each Friday from February to June.

During the year, the kindergarten class was visited by a postman, a policeman, a school nurse and a doctor who explained their roles in the life of a community. Also, Dr. T.P. Lim from Djakarta, Java, a resident of Blackburn Hamlet, spoke to the Grade 7 class on the geographical features and customs of his country, and Mr. P. Woodward, spoke to the Grade 6 class on the role of recreation in the community.

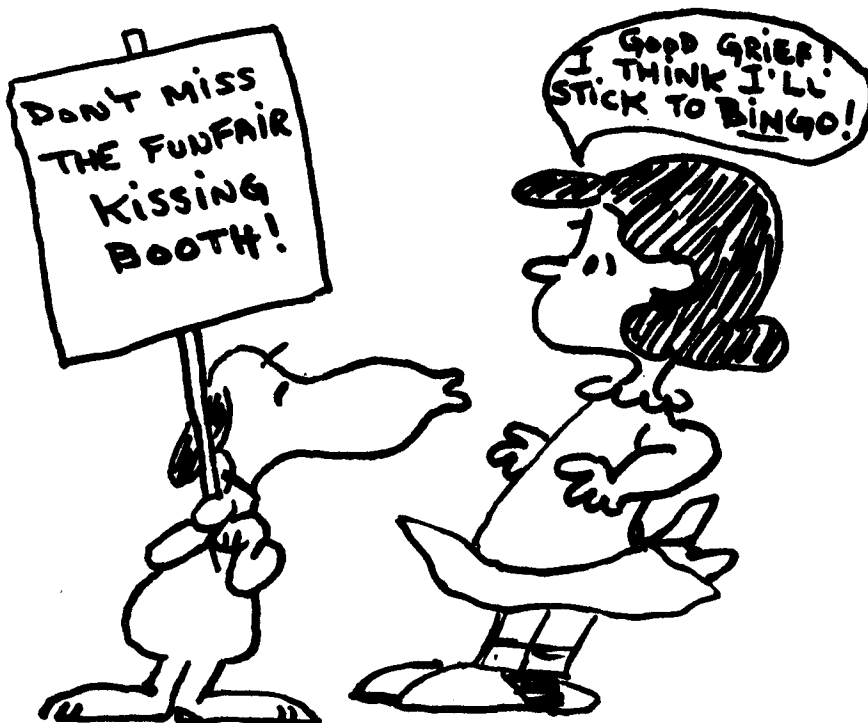

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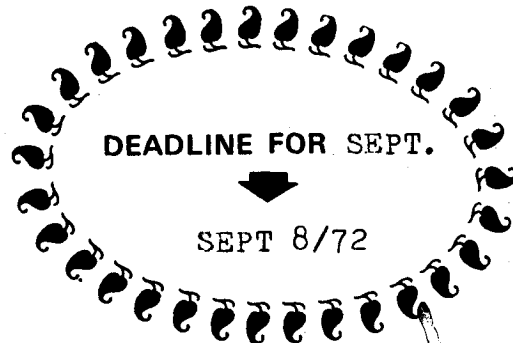
