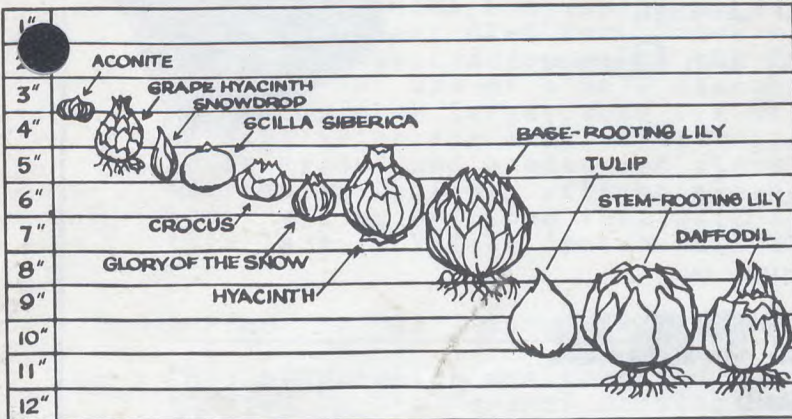

If you plan to leave plantings in place for a number of years, and plant summer annuals over bulbs, plant 4-6 inches deeper than the basic measure.

"My heart with sudden laughter fills and dances with the daffodils". It's that time of the year again, when we'll have to choose and plant our bulbs. We thought that you might like sharing a few secrets for best results....

Plan to plant early first-flowering little bulbs like crocuses, aconite, snowdrops, and all the daffodils in early fall; hyacinths in mid-fall, tulips any time till freeze-up. (Tulips are usually top quality for three years only).

Know that bulbs, even out of the ground, are living plants and for best results must be planted as soon as possible after delivery. If planting is delayed, open the bags and spread out the bulbs in an airy, cool (65 degrees) dark place till you can get them into the ground.

From a design point of view, you'll be happiest if you plant small early bulbs in colonies of dozens or more; larger bulbs in clumps of not fewer than eight...twelve is better, and always plant all of one kind and one color to a clump.

Extra fertilizing for first year growth is usually unnecessary, but as you prepare the planting holes, it's a good practice to mix into soil BELOW where bulbs will sit; a slow acting, high phosphorus fertilizer such as 5-12-5 (3-18-18 for daffodils and narcissus) to supply food for the next year's bloom. Be sure that there is no newly mixed in fertilizer in direct contact with the bulb.

Planting can begin by digging out a large hole for each clump or individual holes for each bulb, but be careful to make the bottom of the hole wide enough for the bulb to sit firmly down on the soil with no air space beneath it.

Water all bulbs after planting, even if at the time the ground seems moist enough. This encourages strong early root formation. If there are not ample rains through the fall, water deeply once a week.

Wishing you lots of luck, and remember: even the Wizard of Oz has tiptoed through the buoyant brilliance of tulips.

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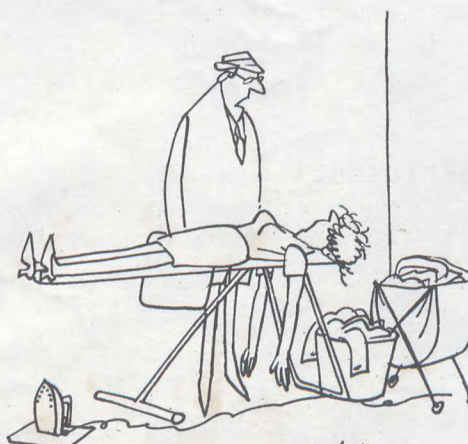

## Another 12 acres of recreational land for the use of Blackburn

### Community Association

The Corporation of the Township of Gloucester has leased from the National Capital Commission an area of land on the south side of Innes Road near Glen Park Drive measuring 650 x 800'. The Community Association asked the Township to lease some land in this location for use as a ball diamond. The amount of land actually leased is much larger than our original request and offers possibilities for many other recreational uses. The land needs to be graded and seeded and plans for its use decided. ### A Plan for the future development of Blackburn Hamlet

This plan, which was prepared by the Civic Affairs Committee and adopted by the General Meeting held on June 27, was printed and distributed to the Township, the Regional Government, the National Capital Commission, the residents of Blackburn Hamlet, and many other interested parties at the end of August.

Bob Mortimer and Pete Edwards have already met with Township Council and Gloucester Planning Board and discussed the recommendations with them. The Association has been complimented on the high quality of this report and Township officials have acknowledged its usefulness as a foundation for their work in this field. Gloucester Council discussed the recommendations of the plan on August 28, at which time it passed the following resolution:

"BE IT RESOLVED that the Plan for the future development of Blackburn Hamlet be received and referred to staff for study and recommendations and that priority be given to matters dealing with the By-passes."

## CIVIC AFFAIRS

During the last few months two by-laws have been passed by council of this Municipality which are of interest to the residents:

1. There is to be no through truck traffic on any street in the Hamlet. This means that trucks may enter the Hamlet to pick up or deliver only. The only street to which this does not apply is Innes Road.
2. All streets in the Hamlet are now limited to 25 miles per hour with the exception of Bearbrooke Road and Innes Road. We have requested a speed reduction on these roads where schools are located. Both these by-laws have had provincial approval.

I have been asked over the months to give some information on our Municipality in general and will try to do so here in a brief way. Gloucester, as we all know, is a township, as opposed to a city or town; its government is formed by a Reeve, Deputy Reeve and three Councillors who are elected at large. The present incumbents are:

Deputy Reeve	Robert Macquarrie
Councillors	Fred Barrett

	Eugene Bellemare

Elections have been held on a three year basis; but as of this year, they will be held every two years and will occur on the first Sunday in December.

The senior executive position in the township is that of executive assistant to Council and is presently held by Mr. Robert Picard. This gentleman's duties are to co-ordinate the work of the Township staff and in effect fill the

position of General Manager. It should be noted that this is a new position in this municipality and has only been operative since the first of August of this year. Mr. Robert J. Boxwell fills the position of Director of Planning and Works and is responsible for the direction of those activities to do with planning and public works. In this community which has seen such a rapid growth in the past five years, Bob has had his hands full and, we believe, has done a god job despite many problems. Mr. Norman Piper is the Roads Superintendent and the man we must look to to see that streets are in proper condition at all times.

Mr. Carl Hansen is Director of Finance and the man who can tell you all about your Taxes.

All the above are headquartered at the township hall on Highway 31, at Leitrim.

Our Chief of Police is Ken Duncan, who, with his well trained staff is doing a good job of looking after our interests. Their headquarters are also in Leitrim.

The Fire Department is now located in its new headquarters on Blair Road at Innes Road. With the new equipment which it has obtained recently it is in a position to defend our property very well. It is to be noted that in a recent fire in the Hamlet, the trucks were on the scene in less than five minutes after the call was received. The Chief is Mr. Ed. Gravelle, who is a resident of the Hamlet.

There is another part of the municipal organisation which must not be overlooked and that is the Planning Board, of whom two members are Hamlet residents: Mrs. S. Ziegler and Mr. H. Diceman. The Chairman of this Board is Mr. Ritchie. This Board is charged with planning the development of the Community. This includes overall planning through the official plans for the area and seeing that developments as they come along meet the requirements of these plans.

Development Procedures

There is no way I can get into all the details pertaining to this subject without taking up about ten pages of this issue. However, our editor has asked me to try to give some idea of how this works in the community. As mentioned before, the Planning Board sets official plans for the Township. When a developer is ready to build in an area, he must submit a site plan to Planning Board for approval. This means seeing that it agrees with all zoning by-laws, Municipal by-laws, recreation requirements, etc. If it is in agreement with these, the Board will then recommend it to Council for approval and construction. However, there is one other hurdle for the developer and that is obtaining approvals for 35 other agencies including the Provincial Dept. of Municipal

Affairs, The Ontario Water Resource Commission, and the Regional Government. Should the residents of the Township wish to object to a development in their area they may do so at both the Planning Board and Council level; if the development should be deemed proper by the municipality in many cases there is a further court of appeal and this is the Ontario Municipal Board which has, as one of its functions, the arbitration of disputes concerning developments. This has been a very rough outline of development procedures, but I will be pleased to answer any question the readers may have if they wish to call me.

We are not going to relax our efforts to make YOUR community a pleasant, safe and enjoyable place to live.

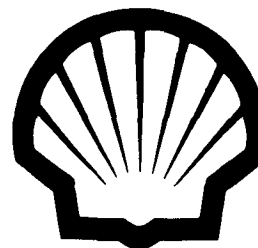

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"THE "NEW ADDITION TO BLACKBURN?"

Correctional Services Minister C.J.S. Apps has announced that the Ottawa-Carleton Regional Detention Centre in Ottawa was officially opened on August 24th, 1972. The new Centre has replaced the outdated Ottawa Jail, built in 1862.

Mr. Apps said the new Centre implements a number of innovations in the treatment of those individuals in our care. One of these innovations is the Citizens Committee, appointed last year, to act in an advisory capacity to the Superintendent of the Centre.

The committee, chaired by Mr. Alex Curran, is the first of its kind to be established in the Ontario correctional system. The committee will act as a liaison between the institution and the community and in this capacity will be concerned with recruiting other citizens who may have a contribution to make, as well as with developing to the fullest extent, the resources of the Centre.

The new Centre provides accommodation for 187 persons. The minimum security section contains six dormitories, each with accommodation for 12 male prisoners. The medium and maximum security facilities include a maximum security wing containing 24 cells and three 24 cell wings for medium security prisoners. Ten rooms and a 9 bed dormitory are provided for adult female prisoners in a separate section of the institution. Other facilities include dayrooms, an infirmary, a chapel, a library, interview rooms, visiting areas, exercise yards and recreational areas.

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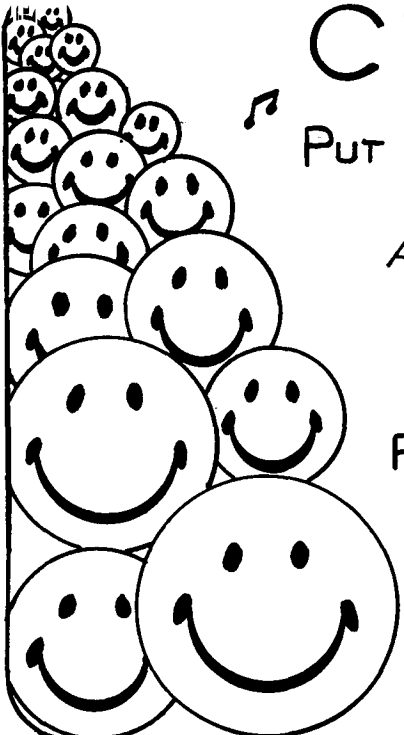

BLACKBURN COOPERATIVE NURSERY SCHOOL will begin classes on Monday, October 2nd in a new prefabricated school building which is to be erected in Bearbrook Park just north of Blackburn Hamlet Catholic School. The 960 sq. ft. building, which comprises a large classroom, 2 washrooms, and entrance hall, and an office/storeroom, will be used by the cooperative nursery school between October and May. It will be available for other activities of the community between June and September.

Members of this year's school executive committee have been busy planning an attractively landscaped, fenced-in tot yard which will be constructed alongside the new building. Children attending the school may be enrolled under one of the following schedules:

- five half-days a week . . . \$27/month
- three half-days a week . . . \$18/month
- two half-days a week . . . \$13/month.

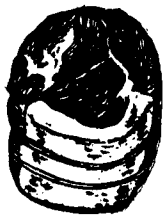

BLACKBURN HAMLET COMMUNITY ASSOC. is the dist. for: BESTLINE OF CANADA - CLEANING PRODUCTS

Since February 1972 the Hamlet has been selling cleaning products to build up a continuing source of income for the Association funds. These products are:

CHILD SAFE - NON-POLLUTANT - ECONOMICAL (16 oz. Spray-on Wipe Off Cleaner  
(Parents Mag. Guarantee) Multi-purpose cleaner 14 ¢)  
SUPER CONCENTRATES (you provide your own tap water)  
CARRY A FACTORY BACKED 100% money back guarantee)

An initial \$42 investment purchased catalogues and made advertising possible (individual flyers inviting everyone to a demonstration at Glen Ogilvie - out of 1,400 homes, 13 people showed-up). Following this poor response a succession of demonstrations were held in the homes of interested people. Nineteen home demonstrations were held between Feb. and June and approx. 400 homes began to use the products. From the repeat orders received we have a satisfied group of customers. (\$300 profit 30th April from scratch re-purchased products at 42% discount for continuous supply).

It has become obvious that a large group of homes (1,000) are still unaware that the profits from the 'soap-selling' go into the general fund for:

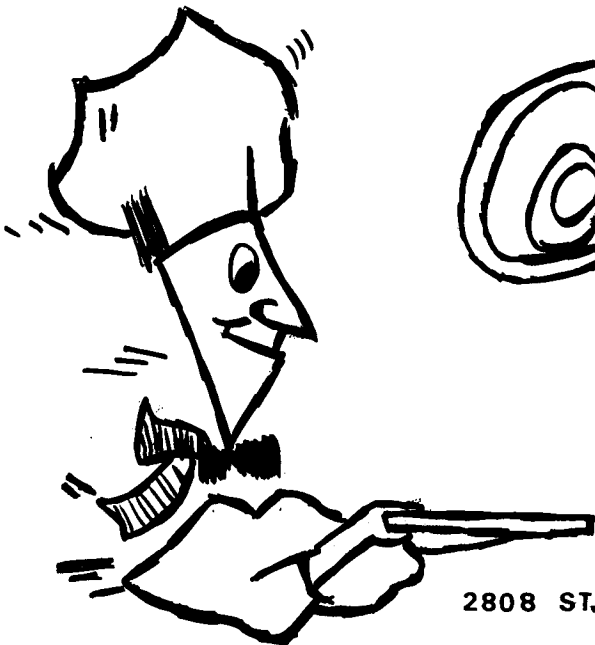

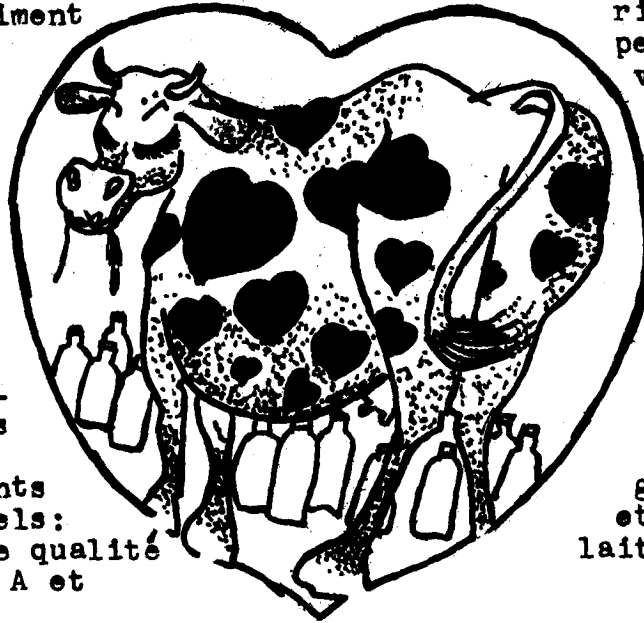

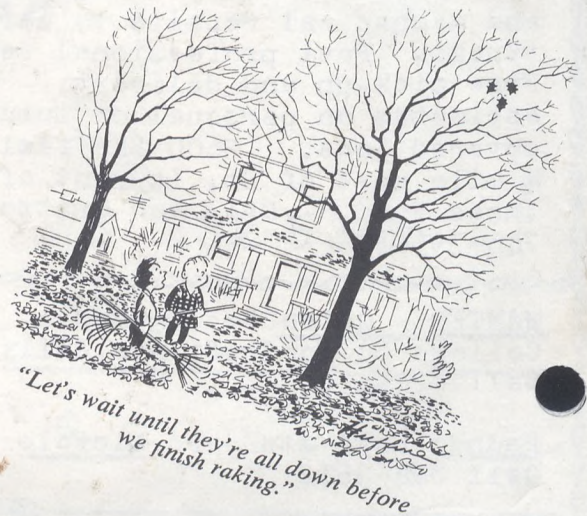
