The Blackburn Hamlet Community Centre Board have prepared and distributed to the ratepayers of Blackburn Hamlet, as defined in By-law #53 of the Corporation of The Township of Gloucester, a proposal for the recreational development of Bearbrooke Park.

The RATEPAYERS MEETING TO CONSIDER THESE PROPOSALS WILL BE HELD ON TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 28, AT 8.00 P.M. IN GLEN OGILVIE SCHOOL.

Your Blackburn Hamlet Community Centre Board recommends these proposals for your approval at this meeting. It is very important that as many rate-payers as possible attend this meeting. A majority of those present and voting at a ratepayers meeting is required to approve this proposal. Our subsequent presentation to Council will be considerably enhanced by a large turnout at this meeting. It cannot be emphasized enough how important your attendance at this meeting will be.

The Blackburn Hamlet Community Centre Board judged that this proposal is consistent with the desires of the majority of the ratepayers.

Dear Madam,

There are excellent reasons why every citizen of Blackburn Hamlet should support and encourage construction of community facilities, especially a community swimming pool. Apart from being pleasant on a hot day, and a place to keep in shape the availability of a community pool lessens the need for private pools, saving individuals a lot of money and maintenance (not to mention water, which some think of as an infinite resource.) A considerable advantage is to protect yourselves from potentially thoughtless neighbours.

For example, your neighbours may use their pool at 2.30 a.m. awakening you in the middle of the night, or just as you are settling in to sleep at 11.00 p.m. the neighbours' swimming party begins. The noise, the shouting, the laughing and the splashing can be heard for several houses and for a couple of hours. Think of the beautiful summer days when all you want to do is sit in your garden with a cool drink and chat with friends. The noise from the kids in the nearby pool shatters your peace.

During the winter you may look out at snow-covered houses and attractive trees. Suddenly one day the neighbour with the pool intrudes upon your view with a billowing, wobbly plastic covering in an attempt to winterize his pool, and another eyesore is created.

ARE FAST SKATERS BORN-OR CAN THEY BE MADE?

Most hockey coaches and players, even in the National Hockey League, apparently believe that skating speed and power are primarily innate or natural abilities. This is one factor which accounts for the general lack of special drills designed to develop these attributes. Most coaches use skating drills only to improve physical condition and, in some rare cases, agility and mobility.

But the Soviets have exposed this philosophy as one of the weaknesses in the North American hockey scheme. Speed and power can be developed, and drills to do this are cornerstones of their hockey program, since increased speed and power mean quicker stopping and starting, greater speed and perhaps most important - the ability to sustain a very high speed level throughout a game.

No matter what the level of hockey - pee wee, amateur or pro - the coaches and players who use organized skating power drills cannot help but achieve good results.

The use of special "power drills" by athletes requiring speed of movement has been one of the significant developments on the world scene during the past few years. This applies to almost any sport where an attempt has been made to increase propulsive power.

Valery Borsowv, the Russian sprinter who won the 100 and 200 meter Olympic sprints, is one example of a "developed" athlete. He was given a great deal of power training. The increase in the number of high jumpers clearing seven feet is also largely a result of methods used to produce leg power specific to the jumping action.



It should be remembered that strength alone does not produce power. The secret is strength plus speed. One without the other is like a Ferrari without gears.

There are many approaches to the production of skating power, including specific weight exercises, box stepping, hill running and special leg drive machines.. These are all effective when properly utilized since they develop both strength and power which are transferable to the skating action. But, unfortunately they often require equipment or space which is either simply not available or is too costly.


Box stepping done with weights at a progressive level of effort and tempo is probably the simplest supplementary approach to off-ice power conditioning. But my favorite is an on-ice procedure called the "Tandem Drill," and tests at the Fitness Institute in Toronto have proved its effectiveness.

To do this drill, players line up in pairs, one in front of the other. The man behind places his hands on his partner's hips and pushes him forward, using a normal skating action but emphasizing the hard thrust of the back foot into the ice and the leading action of the forward leg. This throws the load on the specific skating muscles. It can be done on an interval basis for endurance, and at tempo (full speed) for leg strength and general muscle conditioning. As a fundamental conditioning procedure at the end of practices or training sessions this will not only develop power and the all-important habit of driving the back foot against the ice, but will be a very effective general conditioning aid.

On this page, Lloyd Percival examines various aspects of speed and power in hockey. Percival is an acknowledged authority on the subject and has for nearly 40 years studied the art and science of coaching. Anatoli Tarasov, the great Soviet hockey coach who has used Lloyd's Hockey Handbook since the early 1950s to develop the sport in the USSR, refers in one of his books to his Canadian colleague as "the world's greatest hockey theoretician."

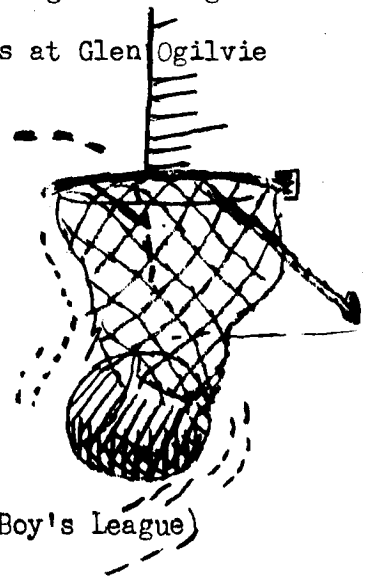

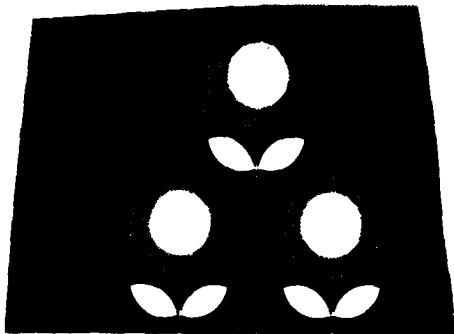

The Gloucester Swim Club collected more honors in the past few weeks, winning two meets in very convincing ways. On Oct. 22 a meet was held at the Gloucester Pool against the Watertown "Y" Swim Club, Watertown, New York, with Gloucester coming out on top with a score of 276 to 218 for Watertown.

Gloucester's Darcy Gaskell bettered the Eastern Ontario 100 metres butterfly standard with a record time of 1:18.8.

Brian Parkin, a 13-14 swimmer, had an outstanding day winning three first place ribbons in 100 butterfly, 100 breaststroke and 200 individual medley. Kirsten Feldman matched this performance for the 11-12 girls winning the 100 butterfly, 100 backstroke and 100 freestyle.

Taking top honours in two events each were: Pam Skene, 100 backstroke and 200 individual medley; Kathy Kornelsen, 100 butterfly and 100 backstroke; Patty Wheatley, 100 backstroke and 100 individual medley.

Other swimmers who earned first place ribbons were: Open Class, Hugh MacIsaac, 100 breaststroke; David Delaney, 200 individual medley. 11-12 Cameron Barber 100 backstroke; Terry Wheatley, 200 individual medley; Carla Pepler 100 breaststroke, Arnie Mierins 100 breaststroke. 10 and under Nancy Banerd 100 breaststroke; Scott Barber 100 breaststroke.

The first in a series of Development meets for all ten clubs in the Eastern Ontario Region was held at the new University of Ottawa 50 metre pool on November 4 and 5. These meets are set up in three divisions "A", "B", "C" with qualifying times set for each division. Gloucester showed the fine quality of its swimmers by sweeping the "A" Division with a surplus of 200 points over their nearest rivals and by having two Gloucester swimmers break Eastern Ontario Records.

Brian Purkin set a new Eastern Ontario record in 200 butterfly with a time of 2:47.1. He captured two other firsts in 200 individual medley and 100 butterfly.

Another 13-14 swimmer, Pam Skene set the other record in 200 individual medley (2:44.3) and came first in 200 breaststroke, 100 breaststroke and finished off with two second place ribbons in 100 backstroke and 200 backstroke.

Senior swimmer Dave Delaney walked away with four first place ribbons in 200 individual medley, 100 backstroke, 200 freestyle and 100 freestyle.

Holly Ashcroft was another three first place finisher for her age group, capturing the 100 butterfly, 200 freestyle and 200 butterfly. Peter Kornelsen won the 400 freestyle and placed in the 200 freestyle and 200 backstroke.


Another age group that had themselves a fine weekend of swimming was the 11 and 12 boys and girls. Kirsten Feldman took first place honours in 200 freestyle, 100 freestyle and 100 backstroke, and Darcy Gaskell matched this in 200 freestyle, 100 butterfly and 200 individual medley. Judy Mulrooney placed first in 200 individual medley and second in three other events. Cameron Barber came up the winner in 100 backstroke and placed second in 100 freestyle and 200 freestyle.

Other first place finishers in the "B" Division were: Tina Sanford 100 backstroke; Michelle Bernier 100 butterfly, 200 backstroke; Pam Cargill 100 backstroke; Jane Gardiner 50 butterfly and Nancy Banerd 50 freestyle.

The "C" Division had three first place finishers: Rich Dart 50 breaststroke; David Swann 50 butterfly and Brad Banerd 100 freestyle.

The Gloucester Club will be well represented at the Annual EMAC Invitational Meet in Toronto on the weekend of November 11 and 12 with eighteen Gloucester swimmers having met the stiff qualifying times.

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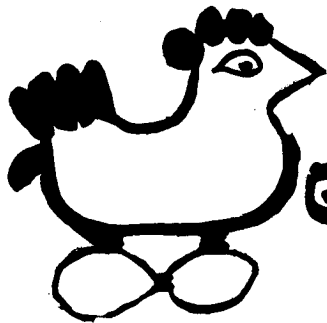
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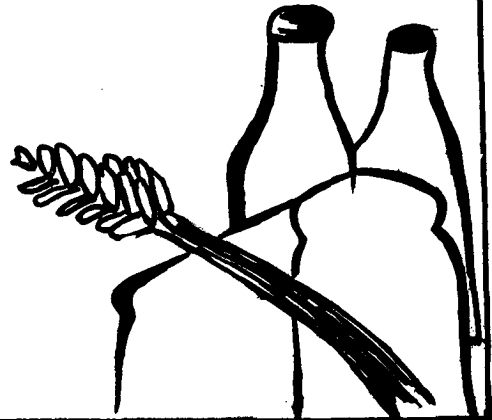

"Projet de Télévision Communautaire dans notre Région!" **CTVO**

CTVO, la Coopérative de Télévision de l'Outaouais, est une entreprise de télévision communautaire qui a l'intention de soumettre au Conseil de la Radio-Télévision du Canada, au plus tard le 1er décembre 1972, une demande pour l'obtention du permis d'exploitation de la deuxième station de télévision de langue française que le CRTC a décidé d'accorder à la région de l'Outaouais.

Cette entreprise a vu le jour à la suite de la journée Action-Information qui eut lieu à Hull le 16 avril dernier; lors de ce colloque, un groupe de personnes intéressées virent la nécessité de doter notre région d'un nouveau médium d'information; pour ces personnes, ce médium d'information, qui devrait se constituer selon la formule coopérative, verrait à assurer à la population des services adaptés à ses besoins dans les domaines de l'information, de la culture, de l'éducation et du divertissement. Compte tenu des possibilités de financement et de disponibilité de permis auprès du CRTC, on en vint vite à la conclusion que seule une entreprise de télévision communautaire permettrait d'atteindre ces objectifs. CTVO, venait de naître.

Au cours des semaines et des mois qui ont suivi, le rêve a pris forme. Des études de marché sérieuses, basées sur des données connues ayant trait à la croissance rapide du marché de la télévision et au bassin de population que le nouveau poste de télévision est appelé à desservir, permettent d'affirmer que l'entreprise sera rentable et même très rentable. Elle sera d'autant plus rentable que les initiateurs du projet ont déjà reconnu l'obligation pour le nouveau poste de télévision d'être compétitif et même à l'avant-garde en ce qui a trait au personnel et aux techniques; pour cette raison, il a déjà été décidé que CTVO, dès ses débuts en ondes, utilisera les services de 54 employés compétents et expérimentés. Pour ce qui est des aspects techniques, il est important de remarquer que CTVO émettra sur la bande d'ondes à ultra-hautes fréquences; CTVO offre ainsi la garantie d'une qualité technique supérieure.

La programmation a particulièrement retenu l'attention des organisateurs du projet, car c'est surtout à ce chapitre que se réalisera l'aspect communautaire de l'entreprise. Cette optique communautaire, on la retrouve dans l'énoncé de principe suivant qui est l'un des passages les plus intéressants d'un document intitulé "Etudes Préliminaires" et qui résume bien la philosophie de l'entreprise: "Les choix faits par le personnel et les administrateurs de CTVO seront sujets à révision de façon régulière et systématique, d'abord par les membres de la coopérative et ensuite par la population desservie par le poste."

Une entreprise de cette envergure, requiert des investissements importants; dans le cas présent, cet investissement devra être de l'ordre de 1,500,000 dollars. Ces fonds proviendront de diverses sources; 1) de la vente de parts sociales ordinaires à \$10; on espère en vendre 20,000, en nombre à peu près égal au Québec et en Ontario; ces parts sont des parts votantes et assurent à la personne qui en détient une, un droit de regard sur l'administration de l'entreprise. 2) de la vente de parts privilégiées à \$100; ces parts ne confèrent aucun droit de vote mais comportent d'autre part, des garanties intéressantes: tant que CTVO n'aura pas obtenu le permis d'exploitation du nouveau poste de télévision, elles seront gardées en fiducie par la Société de Fiducie du Québec et elles seront remboursées à leur pleine valeur, advenant le cas où le CRTC n'accorderait pas le permis d'exploitation à CTVO; de plus, lorsque les dividendes seront distribués, ces parts auront la priorité sur les parts sociales ordinaires, et elles seront susceptibles de fournir un rendement annuel non cumulatif pouvant aller jusqu'à 9%; enfin, après les deux premières années d'opération du poste, elles pourront être converties en 12 parts ordinaires. Aux sommes recueillies par la vente de parts sociales, viendront probablement s'ajouter des subventions du Ministère de l'Expansion régionale. Si le public francophone de la région de l'Outaouais accueille favorablement l'idée de ce poste communautaire de télévision et souscrit le nombre espéré de parts sociales, les initiateurs du projet sont confiants que la balance de l'investissement nécessaire à la mise en marche de l'entreprise pourrait être obtenue facilement par l'émission d'obligations ou par des emprunts à long terme.

CTVO offre donc à celui qui se porte acquéreur d'une part sociale ordinaire, la possibilité de participer à l'administration d'un médium dynamique et influent d'information qui sera, selon toute probabilité, un élément important de développement social et culturel dans notre région. A ceux que l'achat d'une part sociale privilégiée pourrait intéresser, CTVO offre une grande sécurité d'investissement ainsi que la possibilité de gains intéressants. A tous, CTVO offre la promesse d'une programmation régionale diversifiée dont bénéficiera toute la population francophone de notre région.

Toute personne intéressée à souscrire une ou des parts sociales ordinaires ou privilégiées, est priée de communiquer avec le soussigné, en téléphonant à 749-1818. Je suis particulièrement intéressé à rencontrer des personnes acceptant de travailler bénévolement au succès de la campagne de recrutement qui a été lancée officiellement le 22 septembre dernier.
