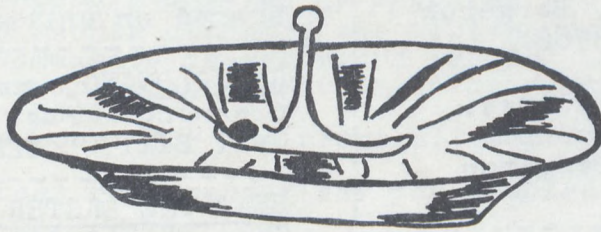


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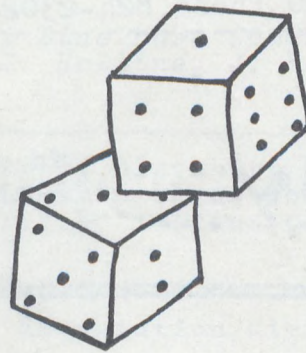
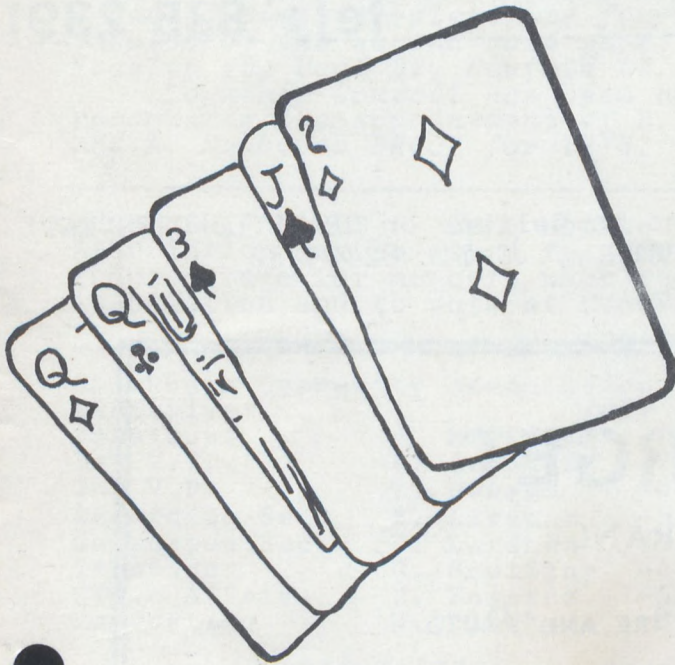

### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE GENERAL MEETING OF FEBRUARY 27

More than 250 people attended the meeting to discuss the proposal of Blackburn Hamlet Community Centre Board (BHCCB) for Bearbrook Park and to select four members of the Association to be recommended to Township Council for appointment to BHCCB for 1973.

A motion of support for the proposal received 146 votes in favour and 100 against.

Voting to select recommendations for members of BHCCB was:

The meeting had to select four members because it is the policy of the Association to recommend that its President and four other members be appointed to the Board. Two members of Township Council are also appointed to the Board.

Because the votes for the fourth, fifth, and sixth candidates were so close, the meeting decided to vote a second time to select its fourth recommendation. The results of the second vote were:

Township Council has been advised that Blackburn Community Association recommends the appointment of B. Darling, J. Hollins, J. Pagé, J. Stronach, and A. Szabo to BHCCB for 1973.

## PRIVATE HOME DAY CARE

Private Home Day Care is an agency supervised program providing individual care for babies and young children of working parents, or of parents, who for other reasons, cannot give full time care to their children. Each morning, five days a week, children are brought to the day care home and are picked up prior to 6:00 PM. The day care home provides morning and afternoon snacks and a hot lunch.

The private day care home is selected by a homefinder. The home is usually within convenient distance of the child's own neighbourhood. No license is necessary; however, it must conform to the regulations set out in The Day Nurseries Act.

In private home day care the child's parents share responsibility with the day care mother for the child's daily care. Parents and the day care mother exchange information about the child and jointly plan a program so that the care of the child will have consistency and continuity. A social worker from the agency helps the family day care mother understand and meet the needs of the individual child.

Day care mothers are expected to attend group meetings for informal discussions related to child development, parent-child relationships, techniques for stimulating learning and providing the nutritional needs of children. The child's parents are also expected to attend similar meetings.

It is important for any private home day care agency to operate in conjunction with a group care center. This type of service provides flexible arrangements for day care, which can meet the needs of many family situations. For example, a family may have a pre-school child who is in need of a group care experience in addition to a toddler and a school-age child. The needs of the family can be met when group care and private home care are both available.

A child daily attending a group care center who becomes ill can be transferred to a private home day care family under the care of a mother until recovery, thus permitting the parent to continue working.

A subsidy of 20% paid by the municipality, is available for families in need from the province of Ontario under the same regulations that govern subsidy for children in group day care.

A private home day care mother is not to care for more than five children other than her own. This may include, counting her own, not more than two children who are two years of age and younger or three children who are three years of age and younger.

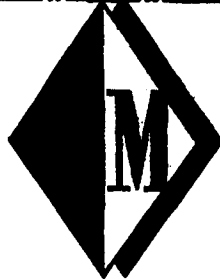
# WORLD

Congratulations are being extended to Cameron Barber (Highpark Cres.) for his fine showing at the Ontario "Operation Olympic" finals held in Burlington on March 3. Cameron gained number one ranking in the province in his specialty the 100 backstroke. Fourteen members of the Gloucester Swim Club made the finals - the highest number of any club in the Eastern Ontario region.

The Gloucester Swim Club recently wrapped up the fourth in a series of Development Meets held at the Univ. of Ottawa pool. Scoring 886 points, this made it four straight wins in a row for GSC followed by Ottawa Kingfish with 823. Swimmers from the Blackburn Hamlet area scored a number of points for their team. In the "A" Division, Cameron Barber had two firsts in 100 backstroke and 200 freestyle, a second in 100 freestyle and three third place finishes in 100 breaststroke, 200 breaststroke and 200 individual medley. Gill Lever (Silver Aspen Cres.) took a second in 100 breaststroke and third in 200 breaststroke. Senior Brian Parkin (Highpark Cres.) won a fourth in 200 butterfly and a sixth in 200 breaststroke and scored well in six other events. Greg Barber placed fourth in 100 backstroke.

In the "B" Division of this meet, Nancy Laatunen (Woodhill Cres.) in the 13 - 14 age group, came second in 100 backstroke, fourth in 200 freestyle and sixth in 400 freestyle. David Swann (Highpark Cres.) gained two third place ribbons in 100 freestyle and 50 butterfly and a sixth in 100 individual medley. Darrell Peterson (Westpark Drive) won a fourth in 100 backstroke.

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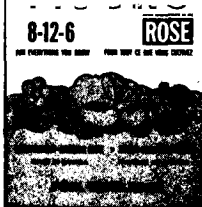

Among the oft quoted reasons behind many people's ambition to have "a home of our own," meaning a house with its own back yard, is so they can keep a dog. Having a dog around the house is often regarded as a symbol of domestic solidarity in the context that a dog is "good for the children" and gives them a sense of responsibility.

But too often the feeling of responsibility is short lived both with children and with parents. The fading responsibility is particularly evident in allowing for the animal's calls of nature.

"It's unfair to keep an animal penned up" is a poor excuse for the unfairness of extending its bathroom privileges to the whole neighborhood. Most of us are dog lovers, even if only in a passive way, but not at the expense of a vulnerable rhododendron or perpetual barefoot caution.

In a few weeks it will be spring. Unfortunately some of the appreciation of watching one's garden grow may be inhibited by a neighbor's "best friend."

**Best buying tips**

- 1) Consider the area in which you plan to use a carpet or rug, make preliminary measurements on size, and let your retailer help you in making the choice best suited to your needs and preferences.
- 2) Beware of fantastic "bargains" and don't buy a carpet that isn't properly identified. Reputable Canadian Carpet Institute manufacturer members and stores will stand behind products; so look for brand names.
- 3) Take a look at the many new colours and textures now on the market—don't limit your thinking. Pick a colour family you like, and look for variations within the range.
- 4) If possible, take a carpet sample home and see it in relation to your room. Or take advantage of in-home shopping services, so that you can tell just how a particular carpet will look in your home.
- 5) Once you've found the colour and texture you like, consider performance in relation to your own needs. Don't hesitate to feel and examine closely the carpets you are considering. Look for density—the closeness of construction, the "heftiness" of surface pile. It's the best single guide to quality.
- 6) Don't choose on the basis of fibre content alone, but do identify the fibre content and consider it in relation to quality of construction and the appearance that pleases you.
- 7) Much carpet is today produced specifically for outdoor use and care should be taken that the construction and materials used are such that they will stand up to the rigours of temperature, sunlight and moisture.
- 8) Don't skimp on quality for carpets and rugs which will see constant duty underfoot. Remember that poor-quality carpeting is not a wise investment, but carpets and rugs of good quality will pay off in years of service and comfort.

9) For your protection have your salesman specify the fibre or blend of fibres and the name of the carpet you are purchasing. A detailed breakdown of the square yardage or square footage at each carpet price; the pad price and installation price should be provided.

10) Plan to give your new carpet good care—it deserves it! An easy care routine will help your carpet to look better and wear longer.

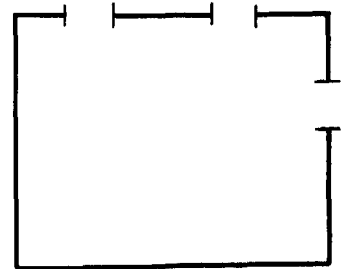

**Estimate costs in advance**

To estimate the cost of carpeting, first measure your room or area. Multiply length by width, in feet—then divide by *nine* to get square yards, the way most carpet is sold. That figure, multiplied by price per square yard, will give you an approximate cost.

Area rugs and room-size rugs in standard sizes are often priced as a unit, rather than by the square yard. Carpet is often sold at a "package price", including installation and padding.

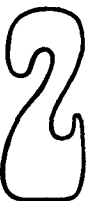

Un nettoyage à fond chaque semaine de préférence avec un aspirateur qui possède un agitateur à brosse ou à barre rotative. Les aspirateurs à bidon donnent satisfaction si on prend le temps de faire un bon nettoyage.

**TAPIS À FIBRES VERTICALES**



Il est à conseiller de nettoyer votre tapis légèrement tous les jours à l'aide d'un aspirateur ou d'un balai mécanique afin de ramasser la saleté en surface.

Les tapis pour l'extérieur devraient être nettoyés à l'aide d'un balai ou d'une brosse selon le besoin.

Cette catégorie de tapis nécessite un nettoyage à fond à l'aide d'un aspirateur qui possède un agitateur à brosse ou à barre rotative. Une action turbulente permet de faire vibrer les fibres et faire ainsi relâcher la saleté incrustée pour être aspirée par la succion. Si votre aspirateur possède l'ajustement qui permet de compenser pour les différentes longueurs de fibres, réglez-le jusqu'à ce que les poils résistent légèrement aux mouvements vers l'avant et l'arrière.

**TAPIS À FIBRES ULTRA-LONGUES**



Le râtelage est habituellement le seul soin requis pour les tapis à poils longs. Le râteau fait tomber les particules qui reposent en surface à la base du tapis où elles seront ramassées au cours du balayage hebdomadaire. Cette méthode empêche de passer continuellement l'aspirateur et démêle aussi les fibres.

Un appareil à aspirateur simple est recommandé pour ce genre de tapis. On peut aussi utiliser un aspirateur vertical à barre rotative si on débranche la courroie de la barre (on peut aussi se servir du boyau au lieu de la tête de l'aspirateur). Un battage trop grand des fibres pourrait les détordre et éliminer l'effet d'un tapis à poils longs.

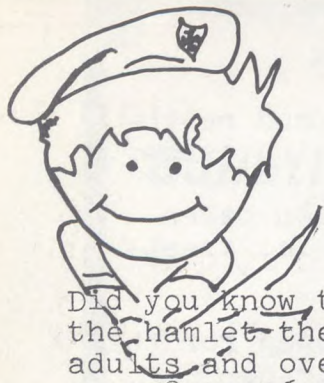

### LES GARDERIES PRIVEES A DOMICILE

Les services de garderies privées à domicile sont bien moins connus dans la municipalité de Gloucester que les services émanant d'un centre de garderie de jour.

La garderie privée à domicile est un programme surveillé d'une agence qui donne des soins particuliers aux bébés et aux enfants dont les parents travaillent ou qui pour une raison ou une autre, ne peuvent pas leurs accorder l'attention voulue en tout temps. Chaque matin, cinq jours par semaine, l'enfant est conduit à la demeure de la gardienne par un des parents, pour ensuite être repris l'après-midi, avant dix-huit heures. La gardienne donne à l'enfant un goûter le matin et l'après-midi en plus d'un déjeuner chaud.

La sélection du domicile privé qui sert de garderie est faite par un travailleur social. De préférence, il doit être situé dans le voisinage de celui de l'enfant. Aucun permis d'opération n'est nécessaire. Cependant, le domicile doit satisfaire aux normes de l'acte des garderies de jour de l'Ontario.

Dans le programme de garderies privées à la maison, les parents partagent la responsabilité du bien-être de l'enfant avec la gardienne. Ils échangent avec celle-ci les informations sur l'enfant et organisent avec elle un plan assurant une continuité aux soins donnés à l'enfant. Un travailleur social de l'agence aide la mère remplaçante à comprendre et à satisfaire les besoins de chaque particulier.

Les mères gardiennes doivent assister à des rencontres de groupe pour discuter du développement de l'enfant, des relations parents - enfant, et des techniques pour stimuler son érudition et sa nutrition. Les parents de l'enfant sont aussi priés d'assister à ce genre de rencontre.

Il est aussi important qu'une agence de garderies privées opère en conjonction avec un centre de garderies de jour. Ce genre de service permet des arrangements assez flexibles pour accommoder les situations créés par une grande variété de besoins familiaux. Par exemple, une famille peut avoir un enfant d'âge pré-scolaire qui a un besoin particulier d'expérience de groupe, tout en ayant un frère trottineur et une soeur d'âge scolaire. Par leur existence, la garderie privée à domicile, la garderie de jour et de groupe remplissent effectivement les besoins de la famille.

Un enfant qui se présente chaque jour à la garderie centrale et qui tombe malade, peut être facilement déplacé à une garderie privée à domicile où la gardienne lui donne les soins nécessaires jusqu'à son rétablissement. Ceci permet aux parents de continuer à travailler.

Une subvention, dont 20% est payé par la municipalité, est allouée par la province de l'Ontario aux familles qui en ont besoin, tout comme la subvention pour l'enfant en centre de garderie de jour.

Les règlements ne permettent pas à la gardienne à domicile de surveiller, en incluant les siens, plus de deux enfants de deux ans et moins, ou plus de trois enfants de trois ans et moins.

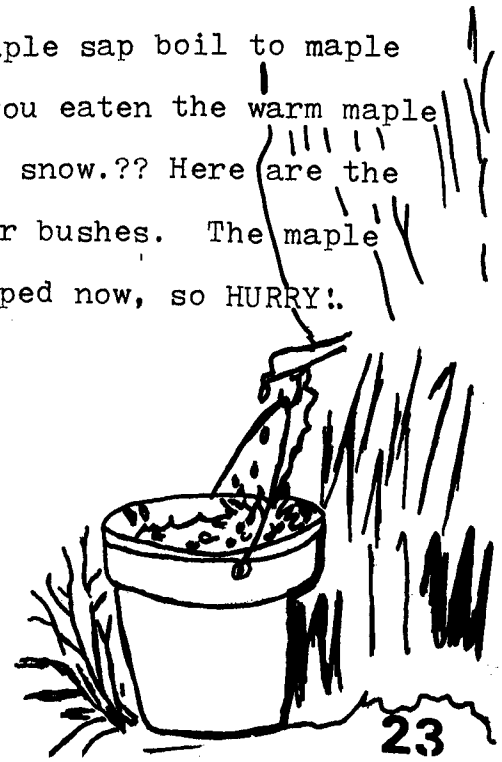

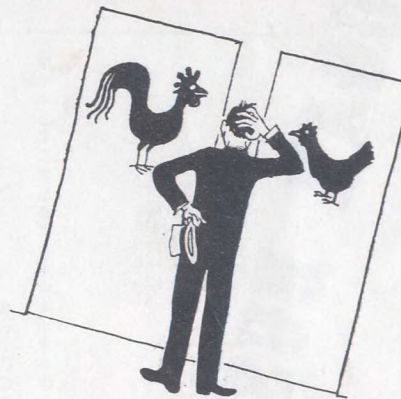
