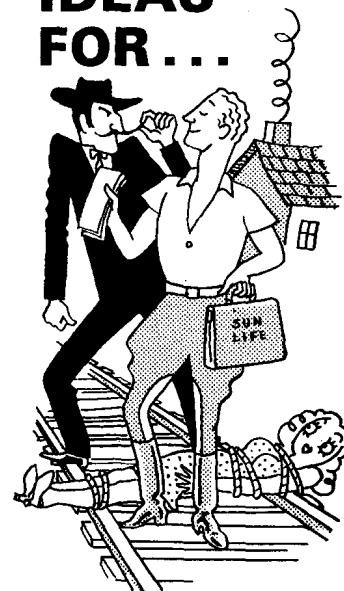

CLEAN - UP WEEK

A special Trash Pick-Up will be carried out by Township Forces within the designated areas on certain days herein specified.


<u>Designated Area</u>	<u>Date of Pick-Up</u>
Portion of Gloucester Township west of Highway No. 31	May 6 to 10, 1974 inclusive
East of Highway No. 31 to the Cumberland Boundary and North to Innes Road	May 13 to 17, 1974 inclusive
From Innes Road, northerly to the limits of Gloucester Township	May 21 to 24, 1974 inclusive and May 27th, 1974

The Township collection crew will pick up any trash which is not normally picked up by the regular garbage collection, with the exception of any materials which are not accepted at the garbage dump. Car bodies, animal carcasses, boulders in excess of one (1) cubic foot, trees and tree stumps are not acceptable. Debris, etc. accumulated from construction projects will not be acceptable.

Items to be picked up are to be left at the property owner's driveway at the street line, so as to be easily recognizable as trash. The collection crews will not enter garages, verandahs, or yards to pick up trash, any loose trash is to be placed in disposable containers.

The trash should be placed out the previous evening so as to assure pick-up on the dates mentioned above.

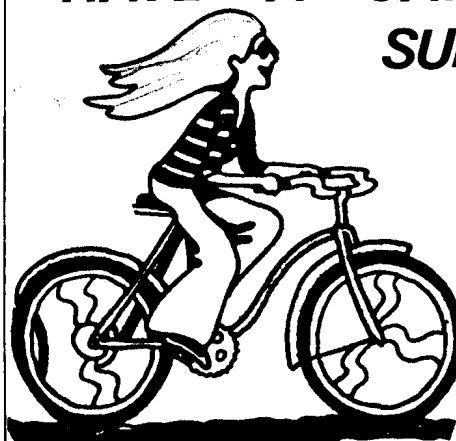

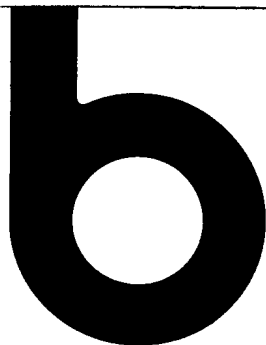

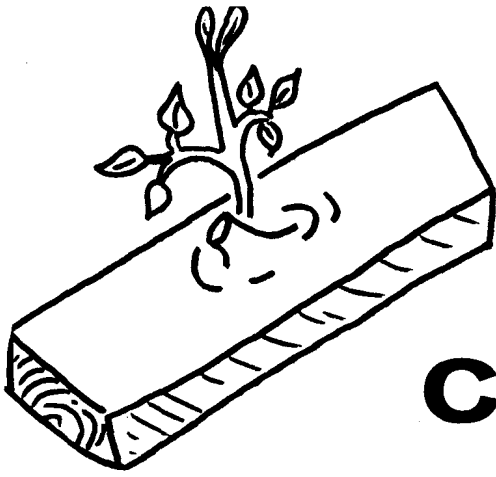

OMB HEARING

The Ontario Municipal (OMB) held its hearing on the by-laws for building the Blackburn swimming pool, tennis courts and baseball diamond on March 21st, 1974. The few objectors were heard but their objections were over-ruled by the Board, and the by-laws for building the above facilities were approved.

This came none to soon as our various committees are busy trying to get things done for this summer.

SWIMMING POOL COMMITTEE

The committee through the Centre Board has hired a swimming pool consultant and has over the last month been refining the needs and criteria so we can stay within our budget. At the time of writing the consultant is back at his office drawing up some plans. We should have these for reviewing late in April.

TENNIS COURT AND BASEBALL COMMITTEE

This committee has been doing a lot of preliminary work and have pretty well finished their specifications. These have to be checked with our landscape architect. The tennis courts may have the distinction of being the first facility finished this summer.

THE PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE

The playground committee has talked to a very enthusiastic landscape architect who looks like he will do a good job for us. At the time of writing his appointment has not been confirmed by the Board, but hopefully this will be done shortly.

During the last part of April, the playground committee will be presenting an evening of slides and discussion of various playgrounds and their advantages and disadvantages. A separate announcement will set the date - watch for it!

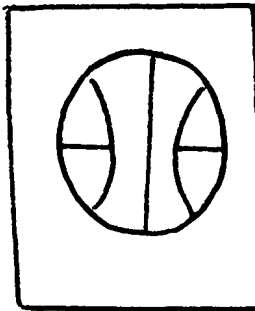

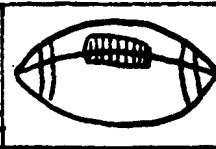
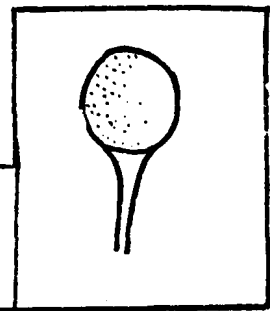

Once again, the Gloucester Swim Club would like to thank the residents of the Hamlet for the outstanding support they gave our swimmers in our recent SWIM A THON. Early reports suggest that we are well over last year's contributions. Mrs. Marnie Barber, the Area Captain for Blackburn reports that the campaign was an outstanding success. Many thanks!

A look into the trophy cabinet at the Gloucester Pool will reveal that three beautiful trophies have been added to the GSC collection. These trophies were won at the '74 Metro Championships when Gloucester won the ten and under, 11-12 and 13-14 divisions of the meet.

Leading the way for Hamlet swimmers was Lisa Zbitnew who had an outstanding meet in the 11--12 age group. She won a gold medal in 100 backstroke, a silver in 100 freestyle and bronze medals in 100 butterfly and 200 individual medley. David Swann took two bronze medals in 100 freestyle and backstroke. He placed 6th in 100 individual medley. Ann Zbitnew swam to a bronze award in 100 breaststroke and placed fourth in 200 individual medley. Brian Johnson's showing in 200 individual medley earned him a bronze award and he took a 4th in 100 freestyle and 5th in 100 backstroke. Greg Barber placed 4th in 50 butterfly, 5th in 100 breaststroke and 6th in backstroke. Cameron Barber was 4th in the 13-14 100 breaststroke and 5th in 200 individual medley while Jill Lever came 6th in 100 breaststroke for the girls. Elizabeth Parkin gain a 6th place ribbon in 50 butterfly in the ten and under class.

David Swann and Greg Barber were members of the boy's ten and under relay team that won gold medals in a thrilling race. Elizabeth Parkin was a member of the girl's ten and under relay team that also won gold medals. A wonderful swimming meet and we congratulate all the swimmers. You deserve those trophies!
