RECREENTEERING— AN OUTDOOR EDUCATION PROGRAMME

This is a new project conceived by the Recreation and Parks Department in answer to needs expressed by parents and community groups, to provide opportunities for the children of the Township of Gloucester to be exposed to new experiences which could broaden their outlook and attitude towards outdoor type of activities.

As an introduction, suffice to say for now that the program will provide a period of eight weeks between July 2 to August 23, for the pick-up of a different group of children every week-day, from different and predetermined locations. It is anticipated that each pick-up point would be visited three to four times during the period. These children will then be bussed to and from pre-selected sites where they will spend the day participating in activities oriented towards nature study; quality and protection of the natural environment; animal protection; benefit of outdoor activities; physical fitness through outdoor activity; historical tours; etc.

The program is aimed at the boys and girls from 10 to 13 years old, and will be supported by registration fees, township contribution and hopefully in part by a provincial grant which was requested from the Ontario Youth in Action Program of grants. It is designed to fill the gap between children served by the various day-camp organizations and the High School age group.

Further information regarding this program will be made available to the schools and public media by the beginning of June.

LETTER

TO MR. S.R. GODFREY, Commissioner, Social Welfare Department, Regional Municipality of Ottawa Carleton.

The Committee on Young Children for Gloucester feels that the time has come for Welfare agencies to take a closer look at certain aspects of the problems of needy parents which affect home care programmes and the family since in a few months Private Home Day Care (PHDC) for very young children and infants will be introduced in Gloucester Township.

We know that PHDC Programme requires a vibrant community involvement in the way of providing regular babysitting service and weekly entertainment of the child; also that enrichment courses should be easily available to the parent to provide the child with positive guidance by harnessing his natural curiosity and inclination, thus helping both parent and child to lead a better family life and community life.

Without this attraction the PHDC Program results in little more than custodial care since the continuous turnover of day care mothers does not allow for development of sustained genuine interest in the child. Apparently, day care mothers do not stay on their job more than 5 or 6 months if no active follow-up child-oriented courses and community involvement complement the program.

It is often said that the need for Welfare perpetuates itself because Welfare parents either do not know the inherent potential for good or for excellence in their child, or when they know, they receive very little encouragement to bring it out of them.

We propose a programme which shows concern for needy parents and interest in the child. By it, we hope the parent -single or otherwise- who is in a rut of problems or follow generations of Welfare tradition, will lift himself out of this pattern.

The PHDC Programme should make it possible for a parent who needs to supplement his or her welfare income to become a Day Care Worker. Thys, rather than only be a user of PHDC, the working mother would be a day care mother to other children while being a real mother to her own. We suggest that she should receive payments for all children under her care and that she should be encouraged, if not forced, to enroll in courses supporting the programme. This suggestion gives her the opportunity to understand her child and learn more about the possibilities for change in - so erosive and so negative - a life style.

Obviously, the proposal involves a choice by the Welfare parent to remain at work rather than to become a Day Care Worker.

This concept can be expanded to take in children in foster homes since it is a fact that increasing number of working parents - on Welfare or not - has affected the constantly dwindling supply of foster homes.

Perhaps some form of payment should also go to mothers for keeping their own children as well as others.

This matter of choice is patently in the best interest of the family and the community and the time has come to make use of this wonderful opportunity.

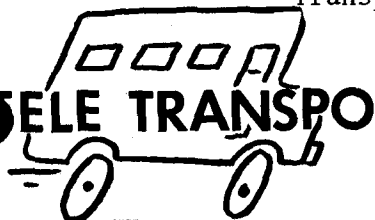

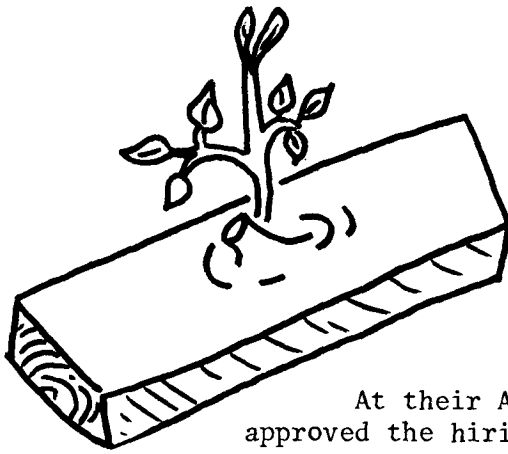

FROM THE CENTRE BOARD

At their April 29/74 meeting, the Township of Gloucester Council approved the hiring of D.W. Graham and Associates (landscape architects) to supervise the completion of basic standards on Bearbrook Park, the construction of a baseball diamond and tennis courts, preparation of concept plan for Bearbrook Park playground and examination of other open spaces in the Hamlet, and to coordinate the construction of the walk and pool. Your Board is pleased to have this firm working on our behalf and are confident that they will do a fine job for us.

SWIMMING POOL COMMITTEE - On May 2/74 the pool consultant hired by the Centre Board presented his concept plans for the Bearbrook swimming pool. The plans were generally acceptable and the committee made a number of suggestions. There were mainly requests for expanded information and specifications.

Our consultant warned us about some critical supply situations that puts the full operation of our pool this summer somewhat in doubt. We are ever hopeful that we will get some swimming in this year but the opening date keeps sliding as the tendering stage gets closer.

TENNIS COURTS & BASEBALL COMMITTEE - A proposal for the operation of tennis courts was presented at the April 30/74 Centre Board meeting. The Tennis Court Committee presented a proposal for the operation and maintenance of the courts which in effect said that they would form a club to be responsible for these items in return for preferential treatment in the use of the courts. Not all members agreed with this concept but the Board accepted it in principle.

PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE - The Playground Committee sponsored a public information meeting May 2/74. Miss Jane Knight, a playground consultant with the Ontario Sports and Recreation Branch, gave a slide show and talk on playground types and development. Our recently hired landscape architect Jerr Corsh of D.W. Graham & Assoc. also attended the meeting. There was some lively discussion on playground philosophy, development and when are we going to get some playgrounds in the Hamlet. -- Good questions all.

GENERAL - Sometime soon something is going to happen in Bearbrook Park. The first person to spot a suspicious looking bulldozer or man with shovel will get the Blackburn Hamlet first robin award.

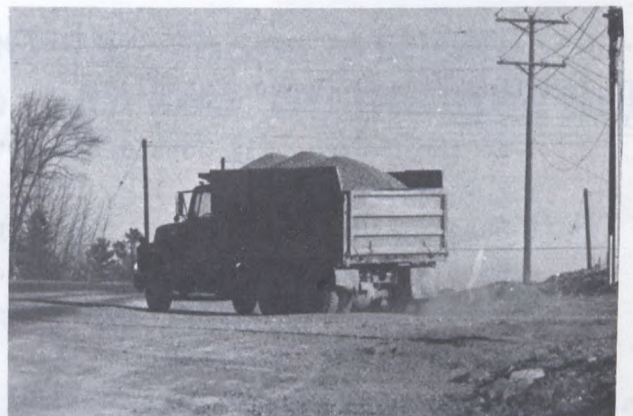

The month of April was one of furious activity for the members of the Gloucester Swim Club. While still working on Swim-A-Thon, the swimmers were preparing for the Eastern Ontario Championships held in Peterborough. Here Gloucester placed second in a field of 12 teams representing the region. GSC's Judy Mulrooney won the trophy for the top performer in her 13-14 age group. She took a total of seven gold medals and set five new zone records in the process.

Liza Zbitnew won three medals in all. She took a silver in 200 backstroke and bronze in both 200 backstroke and freestyle. She placed 4th in 100 freestyle and 5th in 100 butterfly. In the 13-14 age category, Cameron Barber placed fourth in both 100 and 200 backstroke events while Ann Zbitnew claimed 4th in 200 breaststroke and 6th in 200 individual medley. Brian Johnson took two 6th place ribbons in 200 backstroke and freestyle in the 11-12 age group and Janet Costar matched this in 100 backstroke. In the ten and under class, David Swann claimed 6th spot in both 100 freestyle and backstroke.

In the Consolation round of the EOSA Championships held at the University of Ottawa pool, three ten and under swimmers from the Hamlet placed well up in the standings. Elizabeth Parkin won the 50 butterfly event, Bobby Johnson placed 2nd in 100 freestyle and James Smith fourth. Donna Acheson took her 3rd place ribbon for the girls' 13-14 100 backstroke.

The club will now move into a period of limited swim meets. However, the Eagle/Beaver meet is scheduled for mid-June at the Sportsplex pool. This meet attracts swimmers from all parts of Ontario, Quebec and northern United States. Last year 6 national and 24 Ont. long course records were shattered during this meet, so if you want to see some great swimming, keep this one in mind.

The last General Meeting of the Nursery School approved the new constitution and by-laws for the School, including a change in name to BLACKBURN HAMLET PRE-SCHOOL. The name change is intended to facilitate incorporation procedures and we are now awaiting approval of the name by the Department of Consumer and Corporate Affairs before we officially become a pre-school instead of a nursery school.

Don't be alarmed when you see the Nursery School buildings disappearing from Bearbrook Park at the end of May. Registration Day showed us that the school will be needed again next year so at least one and probably two buildings will be re-appearing somewhere in the Hamlet.

In spite of the slow start of the maple sugar season, the school was able to make a successful trip to a sugar bush in mid-April. Plans are now underway for the final event of the year - a family picnic at the Valley Game Farm at the end of May.

By the time this BANAR reaches you, J. Carey and myself (M. Darling) will have retired from the nursery school scene. Future enquiries should be directed to Julia's successor (B. COLONEL BY HIGH SCHOOL

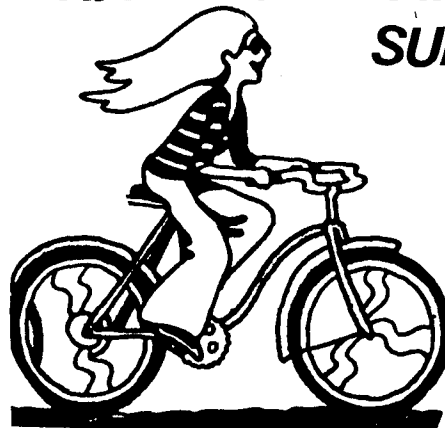

LETTERS FROM AVID HAMLET GARDENERS.....

Dear Thumb,

We moved into one of the new Garden Homes recently and would like some advise on our soil which is solid clay and our sod which is due to laid soon. Is there anything we can do to ensure a good, weed - free lawn?

Thanks,
"Muddy"

Dear Muddy,

There are a few of us fortunate enough to beat the sod layer to the punch. Last fall I dug up a 300 lb. piece of asphalt. they don't do too good a job.

A good lawn is free of weeds and will stay greener during the dry summer periods. The key is to establish a deep, healthy root system. The only way to do this reliably is through soil preparation. It's not difficult or expensive.

In the spring, after your builder has applied top soil (probably a sand-clay mixture, low in organics) and levelled the ground, apply 25 pounds of 5-20-10 fertilizer per thousand square feet (this fertilizer is especially formulated for soils such as ours). Cover this with about two inches of peat moss (one cubic yard to 1000 square feet). Also rake in five pounds of limestone per 1000 square feet. This neutralizes the acid in the peat moss. Rake it in deeply and smooth it well. Water it thoroughly but gently - don't wash it away. This will pack it down and prevent washing away when it rains. The fertilizer will be held in the peat moss.

You are now set for the greenest lawn on the block. Don't forget to support your communities spring fertilizer sale around the first week in April - we'll have everything you need for lawn and garden.

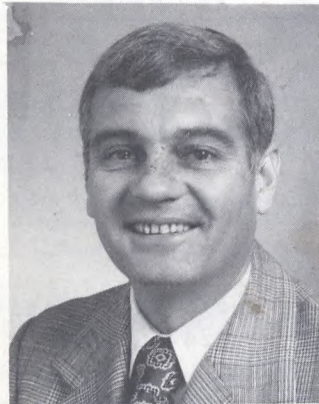
