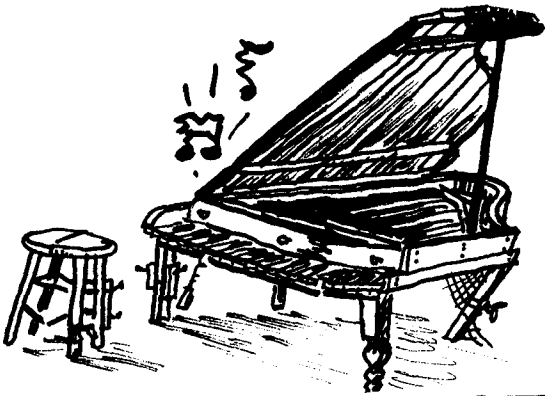

SENIOR CITIZEN HOUSING IN GLOUCESTER

A public meeting to discuss the question of SENIOR CITIZENS' HOUSING in Gloucester Township, has been tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, October 9 at 7:30 p.m. in the small auditorium of Gloucester High School. (Watch for confirmation through local media or call INFORMATION GLOUCESTER). Representatives from governmental agencies will be in attendance to provide more information and to answer any questions you may have on senior citizens' housing.

Many communities in Ontario have been involved in the provision of housing for senior citizens. Ottawa has an extensive programme, and houses 4,000 senior citizens in attractive, provincially assisted housing. Gloucester's senior residents, however, are not eligible for these units and some citizens are expressing concern that a need for this type of housing exists within the Township.

The Community Development Bureau will be mailing out approximately 2,000 questionnaires to Gloucester senior citizens in the middle of September, requesting housing information. The mailing list is based on the 1973 assessment rolls; however, if you are a recent arrival to Gloucester and wish to co-operate in the survey, you may pick up forms at INFORMATION GLOUCESTER or the Gloucester Township Community Development Bureau (located on the second floor of the Gloucester Fire Hall, corner of Blair and Innes Roads).

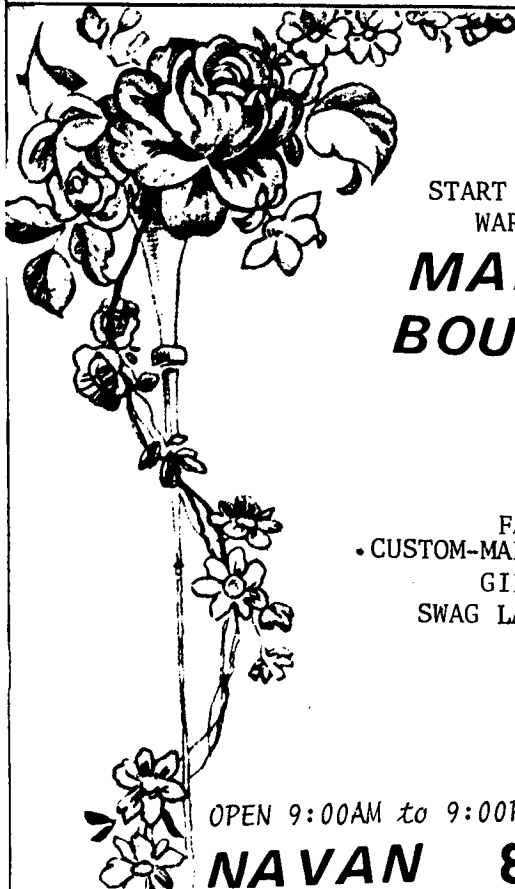

CHILDREN---10 COMMANDMENTS FOR PARENTS

Childhood is still a carefree, happy time. In a book, The Needs of Children, which was commissioned by the British Government as a base document for its health and social security department, Dr. Mia Kellmar Pringle, educational psychologist and director of the National Children's Bureau, suggests the following ten commandments for good child care:

- Give continuous, consistent, loving care-- it's as essential for the mind's health as food is for the body;
 - Give generously of your time and understanding--playing and reading to your child matters more than a tidy, smooth-running home.
 - Provide new experiences and bathe your child in language from birth onwards--they enrich his growing mind;
 - Encourage him to play in every way both by himself and with other children--exploring, imitating, constructing, pretending and creating;
 - Give him more praise for effort rather than achievement;
 - Give him ever-increasing responsibility--like all his skills, it needs to be practiced;
 - Remember that every child is unique--so suitable handling for one may not be suitable for another;
 - Make the way you show disapproval fit your child's temperament, age and understanding;
 - Never threaten that you will stop loving him or give him away: you may reject his behaviour but never suggest that you might reject him;
 - Do not expect gratitude. Your child did not ask to be born--the choice was yours.
- What is certain is that action is needed now to protect the growing legions of children at risk of becoming maladjusted or worse, purely because of environmental factors. The five most vulnerable groups are: children in large, low-income families, physically or mentally handicapped children, those in one-parent families, children who have to live apart from their parents and those belonging to minority groups.

In this, the 2nd year of my tenure as Sports Director, I feel reasonably proud of our sports program in the Hamlet, much of which is described in the following pages. I'm always looking for ideas on how to broaden the base of our program. And of course, I need volunteers to organize any new activity.

From my viewpoint the various sporting activities appear to be running well in general. There have been problems, but it is my experience that almost invariably it's uninvolved parents that are at fault for creating hassles. The boys and girls have fun. We try to provide a well rounded program which, I believe, will occupy our children, allowing them to enjoy themselves, hopefully become more fit, and prepare them to become better citizens. But, the antics of some of the parents at the different sporting events is sometimes distressing to me and the others of us who try to organize a meaningful program. Sometimes I think the motto should be changed to "Don't bring your child, send him".

We need parental involvement in the organizing, coaching, officiating and bussing etc., of our sporting activities. Therefore, it has to be a team effort between the adults and the youth for any sport to be successful. However, the parental fans are often the worst offenders in their objectionable conduct. It is human nature to see ourselves in the shoes of our boy or girl and almost to the exclusion of all else that is going on. Therefore, we often put too much pressure on our children, the coaches and the officials to ensure that our kids are right done by. Some of our organizations, such as hockey and baseball, are quite large and we depend on volunteers. Therefore, we can hardly expect faultless, objective, perfect judgements from all those involved in organizing coaching and officiating. Try and remember that the next time you feel your child is being hard done by. There are legitimate gripes and our sports organizations are prepared to handle them. But excessive strife can only detract from the enjoyment of our youth and their respect for us.

Here's to a good winter. I pledge that I will continue to strive towards an enjoyable, well--rounded sports program available to all in the Hamlet.

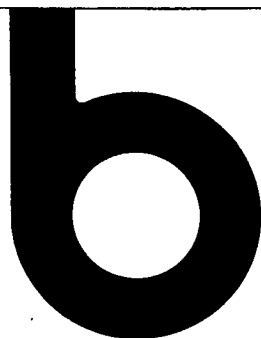

The extended season, from all indications was enjoyed by all the ball players. It allowed us to schedule 20 games per team in each league. Final selections of coaches appointed to date have been made by this committee along with advice from last years hockey convenor Mr. Win Smith.

Mrs. Doreen Taylor has also helped with the registration and will act in the capacity of assistant to Mr. Bob Taylor.

Coaches selected to date are: Phil Lafontaine, Midget Greenbelt; Dennis Ruffley, Bantam; Bob Searle, Pee wee A; Bob Head, Atom Greenbelt; Mike Morris, Atom A; Wilt Stefureak, Novice Greenbelt.

Registration A pre-registration was held on two separate Saturdays in April and a further attempt by phone and flier, was made to contact all boys who had not re-registered because it was important to know at an early date the number of prospective players in order to notify GHA as to ice requirements for this season. 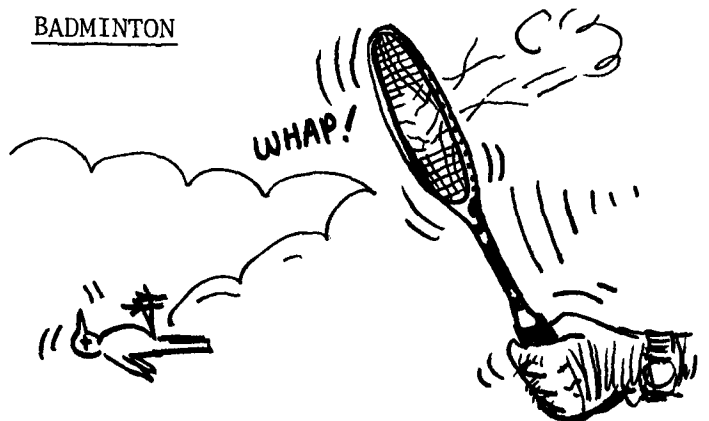

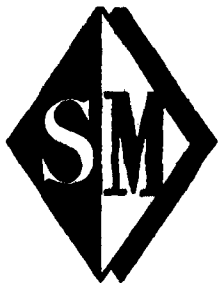

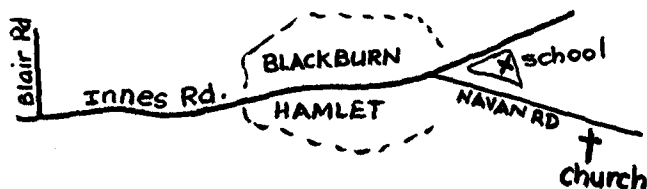

Some new things are happening in the life and the witness of members of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin in Blackburn. This rural church's history, situated along the Navan Road, includes a long association within the three-point parish of Navan, and in that Parish participated in the Diocesan Life.

As of August 15, with Bishop Robinson's appointment of the Rev. Fr. Kent Doe to the Blackburn Hamlet area, St. Mary the Virgin church members begin a new stage in their church life. The Bishop places Fr. Doe as priest -in-charge of the Blackburn Hamlet area, Queenswood Heights, Queenswood Village and the new developments above Orleans.

The present situation finds St. Mary the Virgin parishioners continuing to hold legal and diocesan rights as a recognized congregation, with a Lay member

of Synod and Church wardens. The Bishop has declared it to be no longer part of the Parish of Navan. The tremendous growth of new housing in the whole area demands that the Diocese examine the desires and needs of the Anglican population in the developments of residential housing, as well as the rural population of the farms. So, we are in a time of change, study and growth. It remains to be seen what the course of action will be.

Our task in the area is a simple task-it is both biblical and traditional. Christians who practice their allegiance to the Way of Christ within the Anglican family will respond and we will know whether new parishes or a new parish will be started. It is well known by adherents to the Christian faith that there exists an intimate relationship between Anglicans and Roman Catholics, that the Anglican/United churches continue to work with plans of union, that Anglicans and Pentecostal churches are working more closely together-all of this and more because we are growing in a spirit of understanding and respecting differences of Tradition.

The Church of St. Mary the Virgin will sponsor a church school programme in the Fall at Blackburn Public School, beginning September 15th at 9.30 in the morning. The local church has an active Anglican Church Women's group and there will be planning for a church choir. For information on the work and activity of the church please contact Fr.
