BLACKBURN COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION TRAFFIC STUDY, FEBRUARY 1975 PART I: INNES ROAD

BACKGROUND

By previous motions the BCA is opposed to the development of Innes Road as a four-lane arterial road, or the construction of an east-west arterial bypass road close to the southern boundary of the Hamlet (March 28, 1972).

When traffic so warrants, an east-west arterial bypass road should be developed in accordance with either proposed 4 or 5 of "A Plan For The Future Development Of Blackburn Hamlet", adopted by the general meeting, June 27, 1972.

The development of Innes Rd. as a safe community street is proceeding very slowly; street lighting has been provided and there are traffic signals at Bearbrook Rd. The speed limit reduction to 30 mph awaits approval by the Provincial Ministry. Otherwise, most of the recommendations of the 1972 meetings have not been implemented.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. The township of Gloucester, and the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton should carry out the recommendations contained in this report.
2. A sidewalk should be constructed on the north side of Innes Rd. from Tauvette St., to Navan Road.

3. A sidewalk should be constructed on the south side of Innes Rd. for the full length of Blackburn Hamlet.
4. To provide safe pedestrian access to the Blackburn Public School and its associated playing field, traffic signals should be installed at the Junction of Innes and Navan Roads.
5. To provide safe pedestrian access to the playing field located at Innes Road and Glen Park drive, a pedestrian crosswalk should be installed across Innes Road at Glen Park Drive and Tauvette Street.
6. To provide the minimum adequate pedestrian connections within the community, it is recommended that additional pedestrian crossings be located at intervals of approximately one-quarter mile or less. As a minimum, crosswalks should be at Beddoe Lane-Gravelle Cr, and at Orient Park Drive opposite the Innes Park Appartments. Crosswalks should also be considered at Southpark Drive, and at both branches of Eastpark Drive.
7. Signs indicating playground areas should be erected on Innes Rd. near both the Glen Park and Navan Road playground areas.
8. The entrance to the Township of Gloucester Blackburn Arena should be re-located opposite Bearbrook Rd on Innes Road.
9. As a matter of good faith, Costain Estates Limited should dedicate immediately to the Township of Gloucester, those lands necessary to properly re-locate the Arena entrance.
10. Innes Road, at the junction of Bearbrook Road, should be provided with left-turn lanes to facilitate the flow of through traffic. Except for provision of bus-stop lanes, or other intersection turning lanes, no other widening should be permitted on Innes Road in Blackburn Hamlet.
11. Due to the large number of entrances onto Innes Road, passing should be prohibited on Innes Road throughout Blackburn Hamlet.

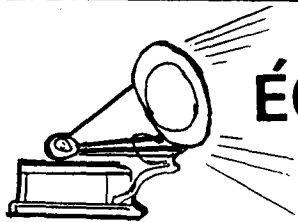

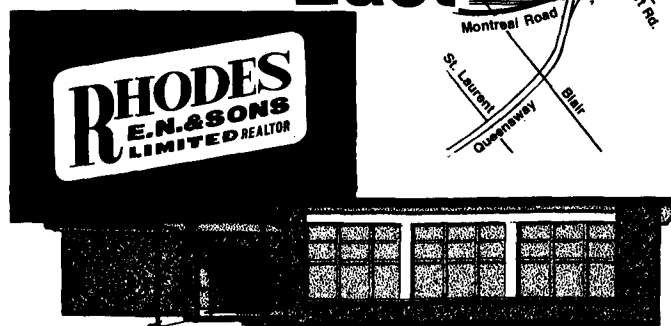

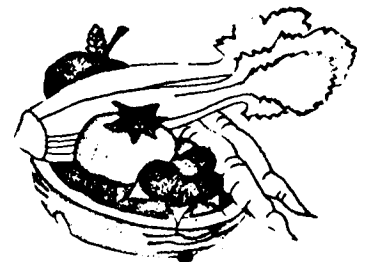

SWIM CLUB NEWS

Liza Zbitnew Paces Fast Orange ---Several Blackburn Hamlet swimmers continue to turn in impressive performances that are a key to the Gloucester Swim Club's phenomenal success this season in dominating the Eastern Ontario swim meets. Of these youngsters, zesty little Lisa Zbitnew continues her assault on previously recorded times with, at the last meet, 6 first place finishes including a new Eastern Ontario record in the 11-12 year-old 200 metre butterfly event with a time of 2:59.4. She added a 2nd place ribbon to those 6 firsts and as well paced the relay team that tied the Eastern Ontario mark of 2:24.7 in the 200m. Medley relay. Another member of that team was Fanet Costar who continues to improve her times and who took the 100m. Backstroke event in 1:17.9.

Cameron Barber led the 13-14 age group in the 200m. Freestyle (2:17.5) and the 200m. Backstroke (2:26.1) as well as helping the relay team to first-place finishes in the 200m. Freestyle Relay and the 200m. Medley Relays. In the boys' 11--12 age group, Brian Johnson who has been a valuable asset to the club this year set an Eastern Ontario record by covering the 200m. Butterfly distance in a time of 2:52.8. He also helped his relay teammates to 2 new Eastern Ont. records in the 200m. Freestyle(2:04.7) and 200m. Medley(2:24.5) relays.

Other Hamlet swimmers helping the Gloucester cause were Elizabeth Parkin and Bobby Johnson (10 and under); David Swann and Gerald Weizenback (11-12); Jill Leaver and Maggie Fulford (13--14); and Ann Zbitnew (Senior).

This meet held at the University of Ottawa on Jan. 11 and 12, was the latest of the major meets in which these youngsters have demonstrated poise and competitive prowess. At earlier meets which included the Pointe Claire International Invitational these swimmers along with several others on the Gloucester Club made strong impressions on the Canadian aquatic scene which is beginning to acknowledge the presence of the club and it's potential as a national contender. We urge area residents to continue to support and encourage these youngsters who offer one of Canada's brightest hopes in future Olympics.

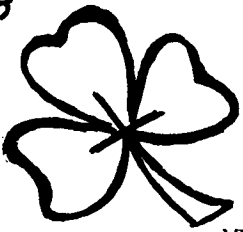

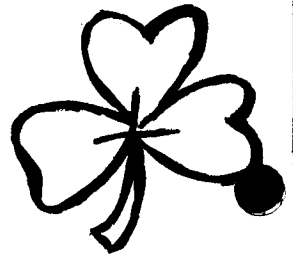

LENT Jesus went into the wilderness for a time. The early church life in Asia, around the Holy Land, and later Europe, sensed the truth that we who follow the life of Jesus Christ would learn of Him through many forms of teaching- one of these forms being something very much in vogue today in our work with the handicapped person-"patterning". Lent is a kind of dramatic patterning where we all have opportunity to follow Christ in the wilderness; to get away spiritually, to refresh our own journeys. All of us experience the aspects of our own interior wilderness, that is the very stuff that Christ, we believe, will help us work through. Characteristics of the season are extra prayer time, self-denial, special alms--giving, retreats, fasting, sharing study, reflection, and others that we are encouraged to see as positive acts in our growth in the Life with Christ. The charge that all this is merely another signal to many persons as waffling self-righteousness, or bad pseudo-pietism, is valid when Christians act out Lent in a noisy "see-what--we're-doing

way. Our Lord is the model, and His time in the wilderness was not a showcase, it was simply part of Christ's work among us. May God grant to His people a blessed Lent and may our time be one of expectation of the Great Easter Event.

From Preferred Not to Be Known:

I have lived in the Hamlet for sometime. I like it here and know lots of people that I am proud to call my friends. I think I can easily say that I have participated and hepled to promote activities (mainly sports) within a structured community frame work like the Blackburn Community Association. I am still active in several sports and therefore am appreciative of the meaning of competition. Since I have not played tennis for some years, university days to be exact, I am really delighted to know that after the snow clears there will be some courts available to renew an old love.

What bothers me is the impressions that I got from the last general meeting of the community association in January concerning the usurpation--or monopoly-- of the tennis courts by association players. Grant it that nearly all the association members are rate payers; but, not all rate payers are association members in Blackburn. I would like to know from the BANAR or from any executive member who will publish his/her report on just how many people belong to the association. Is it 50% or more of the total number of rate payers in Blackburn? It doesn't look like it from the handful that show up at the meetings. If silence is the majority do they condone the rather, very structured programs hoped to be implimented by the BCA's tennis committee? I think it's bad enough that we can hardly use the arena because of h.ockey programs. Have you seen the public skating hours? I would like to be assured that when I and others, who are also paying for these facilities, want to play tennis that we don't find the prime time going to the association members, or that their tournaments, competitions, take up the bulk of the practical playing time of these courts. I know one arguement for selling memberships, that is to help pay for the up keep of the courts. Are there no funds available from the grants entrusted in the BCA for this? On whose authority does the matter of who (and when) can use these courts rest? May be we can get some answers in the next BANAR. I don't mean to sound harsh about this problem but a lot of other people's rights are at stake in this issue.

In December, there were some complaints of confusion between the formal notice of the annual meeting of the ratepayers for the Blackburn Hamlet Community Centre Board and a letter respecting the Board's proposals which appeared in the Banar.

Council has reviewed the matter and determined the official notice was in full compliance with the Municipality's by-law establishing the Blackburn Hamlet Community Centre Board.

The Board is proceeding with plans for further development of Bearbrook Park; there will be opportunity for objectors to register their objections prior to application for Ontario Municipal Board approval of financing of the project.

Council, too, will be willing to hear from objectors.

Dear Sirs,

Several residents of our community have expressed a strong concern and criticism over the time allotted for public skating in the Township arenas particularly the Blackburn Arena. At the present time only 3 ½ hours of ice time are allocated for public skating during the weekend period and one hour during the week for pre--schoolers at the Blackburn Arena. The ice programmes such as ringett, hockey, figure and power skating certainly meet the recreational ice requirements of a significant segment of the township residents. However, as you are no doubt already aware there is probably an equally significant segment of the population who do not wish to participate in these active organized ice programmes but do enjoy skating as a recreational pleasure. This latter segment includes all age groups and particularly adults for whom there is very little organized programme. The small amount of time allocated for this large group results in crowded conditions and a subsequent loss of interest and/or irritation in being turned away when the maximum capacity is reached.

Unfortunately because these people are not part of an organized programme they have no collective voice to represent their interests and requirements when the ice time is distributed. Therefore I am writing at this time to request that more public skating ice time be made available.

At a minimum at least a total of 8 to 9 hours a week should be allocated in each arena for public skating with the greatest increase in time being on the weekends. I am well aware that modifications to the present ice schedule would be disruptive to some of the organized programmes. However, an increase would be more than welcome by a majority of the population. One might argue that the recreational skating requirements of this population segment are being met by the facilities on the canal and other outdoor ice. Remember, however, that these latter facilities are unavailable in October, November, half of December, March and April. In fact this year the unreliability of the outdoor facilities has been accentuated by the mild weather.

The community reasonably expected that the construction of a third arena in Gloucester and the townships policy of constructing community arenas should have made more public ice time available. In addition the convenience of having an arena located in their community would have allowed them to take a greater advantage of the anticipated increased time. As the Shefford Rd. arena nears completion and the ice time allocation is reviewed I urge on behalf of a large number of residents of Gloucester Township, that their interests be given greater consideration that has occurred in the past.

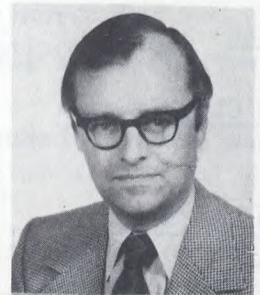
