TRANSPORTATION

Effective March 15, the following changes will be made to bus service in the Hamlet. These are as noted below and are illustrated in the route maps.

REGULAR SERVICE: New routes, with 30 minute service, 6:30 am to 6:30 pm, Monday to Saturday.

Route 36: from Queenswood Heights, along St. Joseph Blvd. to Grey Nuns, Hiawatha, & South on Bearbrooke Rd. to Innes, then west to Cyrville Rd. and along it to St. Laurent and ending at the RCMP Hq. (Alta Vista & Queensway). Return service is simple reverse pattern.

Route 85: from Queenswood Village, along St. Joseph Blvd. south on Belcourt, then west on Innes Rd. then north on Bearbrook Rd. to Montreal Rd. and on to Shoppers City Plaza via Ogilvie Rd.; then north on Blair Rd. to Montreal Rd. and NRC. The bus continues along Montreal Rd. to Cummings Ave. south to Ogilvie Rd. and follows this west onto St. Laurent Shopping Centre. Return service on reversed pattern.

EXPRESS SERVICE: existing routes remain as is.

Route 25: increased frequency from 10 minutes to 8 minutes.

Route 26: no change

TELE TRANSPO SERVICE: no changes

Note: route 34 goes from Shoppers City through Carson Grove and into St. Laurent. Route 85 also goes to St. Laurent. These may be additional ways of getting to St. Laurent and transferring to the 36 which goes to RCMP HQ.

These bus service changes were brought to my attention just prior to the BANAR deadline. As a result the information at hand is not complete. These changes will be discussed at the upcoming BCA General Meeting at which time more complete information should be available from Ottawa Transit Commission.

From the information on these new routes, it appears that this service will be of limited usefulness to a major portion of the residents not residing within easy walking distance of Innes and Bearbrook Roads. Some immediate questions come to mind:

- how do people in the east end of the Hamlet catch the 36 to RCMP HQ? Transfer from 25 or 26 express routes, with possible slowing of this service? Transfer from 85 if 85 & 36 meet at Innes and Bearbrook Rds at convenient times?

Summary of Minutes of General Meeting - Tuesday, January 27, 1976

Approximately sixty persons attended the general meeting, A By-law amendment which makes the Fun Fair Chairman(person) a member of the BCA executive was approved. The executive will recommend the ratification of Mrs. J. Cottingham at the next general meeting.

Discussion of the budget of the Community Association for 1976 occupied the greatest part of the rest of the meeting. Mr. Paul Lardner, the treasurer presented the budget and gave a detailed breakdown of the individual amounts. The criteria used for recommending the amount of the subsidy for each sports programme was discussed. It was explained that the subsidy was determined by the seasonal length of each programme, the number of participants and the costs of the programme. Considerable discussion followed on the budgets of the Little League Baseball and Girls Softball. A motion to increase the Girls Softball expenditures by \$500 and their subsidy to \$1700 was defeated. A motion was approved which amended the budget by postponing approval of the Little League Budget until another general meeting and requiring spokesmen from the Little League to present their budget at that meeting. The amended budget totalling \$115,725 in expenses and \$139,700 in revenues was then passed. These latter two figures included the revenues and expenses of the Fun Fair.

Mr. Jack McGuinty has been appointed to the Gloucester Planning Board and has submitted his resignation from the executive as Civic Affairs Chairman. The B.C.A. thanked him for his many contributions and efforts on behalf of the BCA.

The selection of three persons to be recommended for appointment to the Blackburn Hamlet Community Recreation Centre Committee by Gloucester Council followed. Mr. B. Darling, Mr. R. Dow, Mr. R. Dudding, Mr. E. Hayek, and Mrs. L. Mace were nominated. Mr. Dow, Mr. Dudding, and Mr. Hayek were selected. Their names together with the names of the Sports Chairman and the President of the BCA will be recommended for appointment by Gloucester Council.

Meeting adjourned at 10 p.m.

Summary of Minutes of Executive Meeting-Tuesday, February 3, 1976

The minutes of the January 6th meeting were amended and approved. Several items of correspondence were circulated. These included a request from Information Gloucester of a grant to support their activities; a request from the Greenbelt Riding Association for the Disabled for a grant to support participation by Gloucester Residents; a letter from Hon. J. Turner, indicating he has forwarded our request for CN & CP express delivery and pick up service to the president of CN railways. A grant of \$200 was approved to Information Gloucester and the request from the Greenbelt Riding Association for the Disabled will be referred to the Gloucester Community Recreation Committee.

Mr. Lardner reported on progress in acquiring a new insurance agent, incorporation and proposed discussing a purchase order system for the Sports Groups of the BCA. The latter will be discussed at the next executive meeting. He reported receiving a letter allowing Federal Sales Tax exemption for the Banar printing costs which will mean a saving of \$1500. Bills totalling \$26,470.30 were circulated and their payment approved.

Mrs. J. Cottingham was recommended for ratification as Fun Fair Chairman at the next General Meeting.

Dr. J. Hollins has agreed to review the constitution of the BCA and bring it up to date by including the various recent amendments.

A nominating committee will be appointed at the next general meeting. The executive members who have agreed to serve on this committee are L. Scherlowski and A. Szabo.

Committee Reports. Fun Fair: The Fun Fair committee held their first meeting in January and many activities are getting organized. The Fun Fair Banner which

was stolen last year has miraculously reappeared.

Publicity Mr. Comeau reported that advertising in the Banar will be increasing to reduce the net deficit on its operation. The Banar will be including a newsletter from the Innes Park Apartments.

Special Projects: The executive approved the holding of a Monte Carlo night on February 28. Mrs. V. Dawson is organizing it. The Tuck Shop at the Detention Centre has shown a profit of \$300 in its first month of operation.

Transportation; Several new bus routes will be announced in the Banar. Some problems with the routes will be discussed with OC Transpo at the next meeting with the transportation committee.

Education: The Carleton Board Trustees held a special public meeting at Glen Ogilvie School in January to discuss the policies relating to the French Immersion Schools. Mr Sheehan the education chairman reported that while some of the policies were clarified several questions remained unanswered about the future of the english and french programme in Glen Ogilvie School. A letter will be written to the Board indicating that the BCA would like to be informed fo the proposed policy of the Board prior to its approval amd also would like to have the enrollment projectinns for Glen Ogilvie School for 1976-77 and the actual enrollment statistics when they become available. The BCA would then reserve the opportunity to present its viewpoint to the Board on these policy matters.

A questionnaire will be included in the Banar on the acquisition of a high school in Blackburn. The method of collection of the questionnaires was left to Mr. Sheehan to organize. He will inquire into a return envelope system.

He reported that the Parent Teacher Association at Blackburn Catholic School has folded.

Membership: Over 1200 families have bought memberships.

Sports: The little league committee failed to arrange to send a representative to the executive meeting as requested, to discuss their proposed budget. The present status is that the programme cannot operate until their budget has been approved.

Due to the power failure on Monday Feb. 2, the tennis registration scheduled for that night was cancelled and will be rescheduled for the end of Feb. or the first week of March.

Other Business: Mr. Neufeld will ask Gloucester Hydro why Blackburn Hamlet appears to be so susceptible to power failures when compared to other communities.

Meeting adjourned at 10.30 p.m.

Nominations For The Executive of the Blackburn Community Association

Nominations for positions on the executive of the Blackburn Community Association will now be received. A nominating committee will be selected at the next general meeting of the BCA to be held on THURSDAY, February 26, 1976 at 7.30 p.m. at Glen Ogilvie School. This committee has the responsibility of ensuring that there is at least one person nominated for each position of the BCA executive. They present their report at the March general meeting of the BCA at which time other nominations are accepted from the floor. If there is more than one person nominated for a position then an election is held in April.

Several of the present executive members, having served for the past two to three years and having given considerable effort and time to the BCA over this period will be retiring. Other newer members of the executive will hopefully agree to serve again. We have been very fortunate over the years to be able to find sufficient numbers of new people to have a turnover of ca. 50% each year. However, it was more difficult to find willing volunteers to fill these positions last year.

## Nominations (cont'd)

The duties of the various positions require different amounts of time and may only have short periods of high activity during the year. On average a position on the executive requires one evening a week of your time in attending a meeting or working on the position's responsibilities. The positions on the executive are:

**President:** the chief executive officer of the association who presides at all meetings and is chairman of the executive. He co-ordinates the activities of the various committees and sees that they function. He is the chief spokesman for the association. He is also recommended for appointment to the Blackburn Hamlet Community Recreation Centre Committee.

**1st Vice-president:** he assists the president in carrying out his duties and substitute or succeeds the president in the event of the latter's absence. He assists in the functioning of such committees as are required.

**2nd. Vice-president:** assists the president in carrying out his duties and assists in the functioning of such committees as required. He is also responsible for the booking of the schools for community activities and co-ordinating the community use of schools.

**Treasurer:** is responsible for the financial operations of the Association carrying out the normal banking operations of the association and keeping the financial books of the association. He prepares monthly financial reports for the executive and quarterly reports for the association.

**Secretary:** records the minutes of the executive and general meetings of the association.

### Committee Chairmen:

**Adult Activities:** organizes and co-ordinates entertainment and social functions for the association. This usually involves co-ordinating three to four social functions a year. the bulk of the work for these functions is usually delegated to the various sport groups in the community.

**Civic Affairs:** represents the Blackburn area at all levels of government and before any agent or board of government in such matters involving inter-community activities and concerns himself with those matters affecting the general well being of the Blackburn Area which would not fall within the terms of reference of any other standing committee of the association.

**Maintenance:** maintains the facilities of the association. This involves the maintenance of the outdoor ice rink and ball diamonds that are the responsibility of the association. It involves the hiring of persons to perform these tasks and co-ordinating their activities.

**Membership:** organizes the annual membership canvass and keep the membership list of the association up to date.

**Publicity:** is the editor and publisher of the Banar.

**Sports:** organizes and administers such sports and athletic activities as required by the association. This involves securing the necessary leadership for the various activities and chairing meetings of this sports committee. He also is recommended for appointment to the BHCRC.

**Special Projects:** promotes and carries out programmes for the raising of funds for the association.

**Transportation:** deals with all matters relating to public transportation affecting the residents of the Blackburn area.

**Youth Activities:** co-ordinates activities which are of need and of interest to the Youth of the Blackburn Area and acts as a liason with the executive for the following: Cubs, Scouts, Venturers (Group committee), Brownies and Guides and rangers; co-ordinates the summer day camp.

Nominations (cont'd)

Education: acts as a liason between the community and the school boards reporting on items of concern and interest in education.

Fun Fair: organizes and coordinates the annual Fun Fair.

Essentially the responsibilities of these positions are to act as a coordinator in carrying out the various programmes and activities of the association. The executive member coordinates groups of volunteers who organize the programmes.

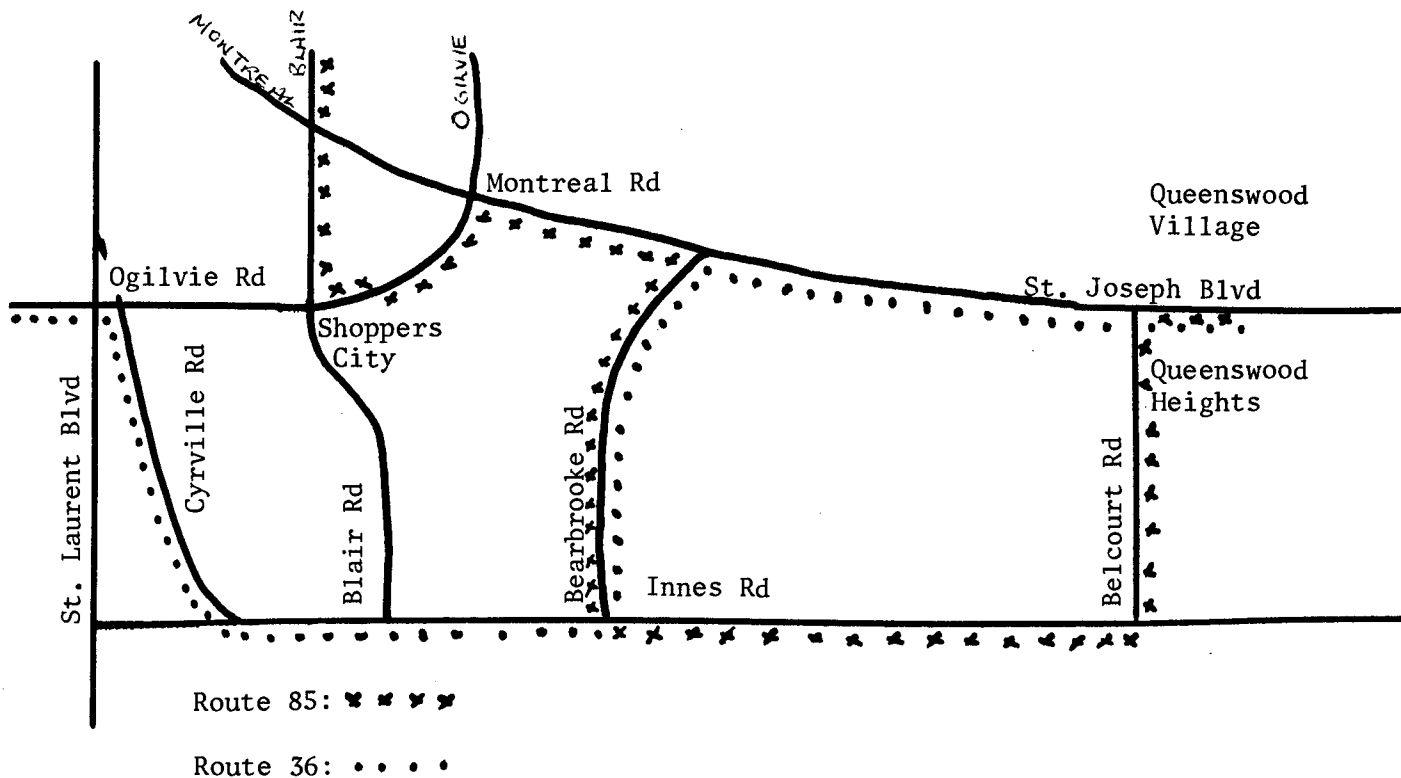

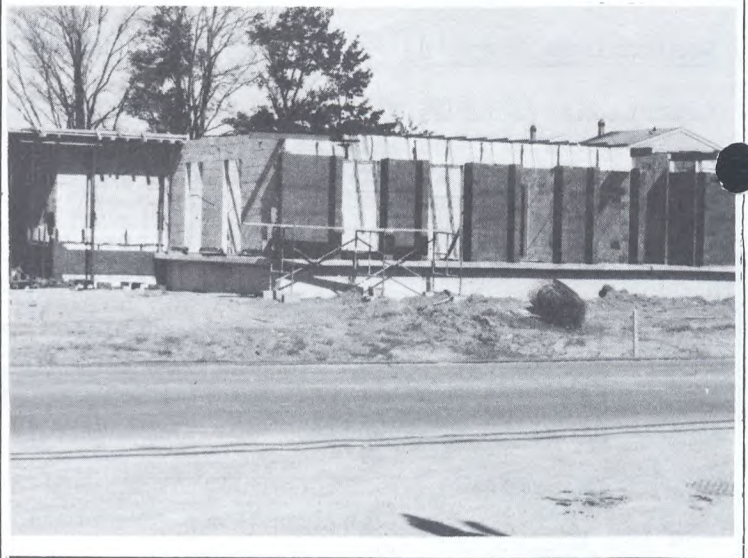


# COVER STORY

## BLACKBURN HAMLET MEDICAL-DENTAL CENTRE

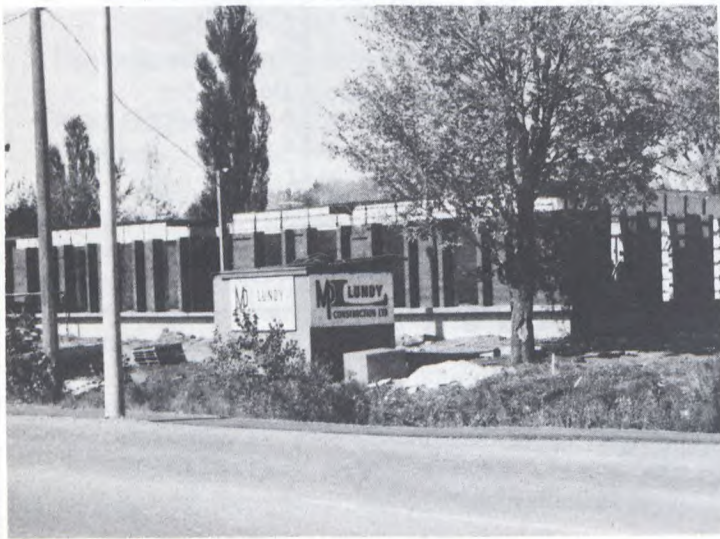
This centre just recently opened its doors to the general public. While many of you knew that this centre was in the planning stages for several years, and others questioned what that new building was that was being constructed, few knew of the complexities. Dr. A. Sati and Dr. B. Larouche purchased the land at the corner of Southpark Drive and Innes Road about 5 years ago. In the interim, the Hamlet and area grew to a sufficient size to support the services of a Medical-Dental Centre. More recent, Dr. R.J. Taite and Dr. Scandiffio formed a partnership with Drs Sati and Larouche. Through the joint effort of these four doctors and the support of the community, we now have this quarter million dollar centre.

The Medical-Dental Centre offers the service of one dentist (children specialty) and three family practitioners. There is yet space for an additional dentist for adults. Those who require a specialists attention are referred to the Beacon Hill Medical Centre. A physiotherapist was planned for initially, but provincial law prevented this. As well, a pharmacy was not included because of the planned drug store to be in the Blackburn Hamlet Shopping Centre. However, the centre does include Douglass Laboratory Services as a convenience to patients requiring clinical tests.



This centre was built with a foundation of sufficient strength that should the needs of this community progress to the point that additional medical or dental services are required a second floor may be built on top of the existing structure.

While Dr. Sati's practise is restricted to families in the Hamlet, Dr. Taite and Dr. Scandiffio will receive patients from any of the surrounding areas.

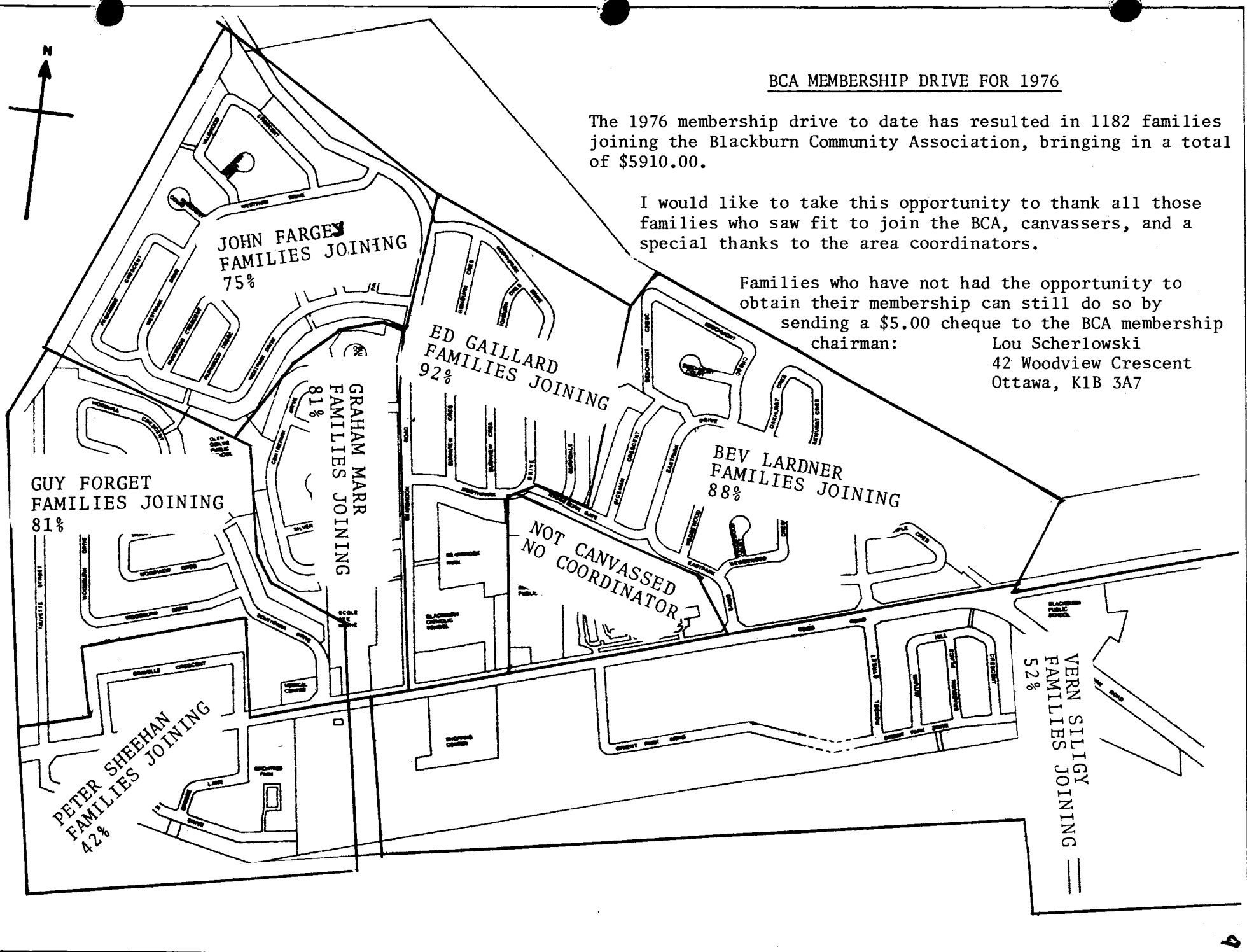
BCA MEMBERSHIP DRIVE FOR 1976

### NEW BOOKS

One Canada: Memoirs of the Right Honourable John G. Diefenbaker, Vol. 1, The Crusading Years 1895-1956. "Intriguing anomalies, captivating anecdotes, interesting pictures abound" in this first volume of the former prime minister's autobiography.

Diefenbaker: Leadership Gained 1956-62, by Peter Stursberg. Consists of interviews taped with members of Diefenbaker's cabinet, and other knowledgeable people. (Eugene Forsey, Tommy Douglas) giving their recollections and comments on the Diefenbaker era.

Macdonald: His Life and World, by P.B. Waite. A portrait of Sir John A. Macdonald's political life, and of Canadian society in his time.

Robert Laird Borden: a Biography, Vol. 1, 1854-1914, by Robert C. Brown. Borden was leader of the national Conservative Party from 1901, and Prime Minister of Canada 1911-1920.

The Life of Louis Riel, by Peter Charlebois, is intended to present to Canadians the reasons why an oppressed people were forced to take up arms to save themselves from annihilation.

Morgentaler: the Doctor Who Couldn't Turn Away, by E. W. Pelrine. Henry Morgentaler is the leading figure in the controversy over Canada's abortion law.

Auld Acquaintance, by Guy Lombardo. Autobiography of the most successful band leader in American show business.

Toller, by Elva Oglanby. A collection of photos, interviews, and sketches of the Canadian figure-skating artist, Toller Cranston.

Kurelek's Canada, by William Kurelek. Based on his series of paintings entitled, "The Happy Canadian".

The Canadian Establishment: The Great Dynasties, by Peter C. Newman. Individual and collective portraits of the powerful elite who control Canada's business and industry.

Council is expected to add the BCA President and Sports Committee chairman and two councillors to this list to form the full committee of seven. Expect to have the committee chairman, treasurer, and secretary announced at this month's meeting of the Community Association.

Six very competitive bids were received in mid-January for the final items of work required to complete Bearbrook Park. These were analysed by our consultants, township staff, and the 1975 committee. I am pleased to report to you that the bids allow contracts to be arranged which will complete the work within the \$141,700. budget estimates and spending authorities approved in previous years. The timing suggested by our consultants would see most of the work accomplished by 1 July, 1976.

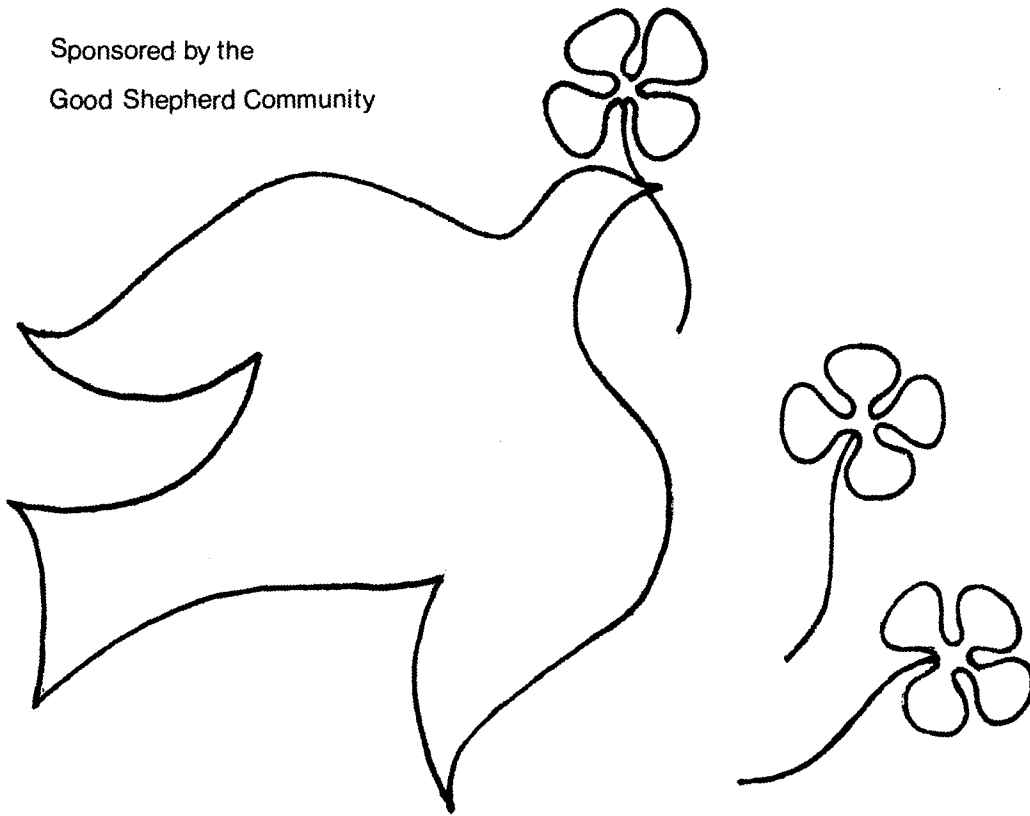

### PRIVATE HOME DAY CARE

Gloucester Family Day Care is a private agency that began offering service to residents of Gloucester Township in fall, 1974. Through this agency, families may find supervised day care for their children from 3 months to 10 years. in an approved private home, usually in their own neighbourhood. There are now approximately 100 children receiving care in 60 homes; because of budget restrictions, expansion will not be possible for this year at least, but new children can still be added to the program as others leave.

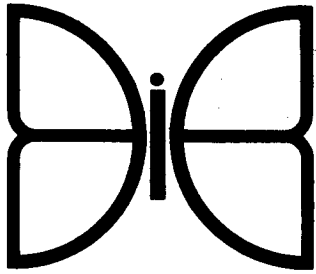

We are looking forward to seeing your response. This column marks the beginning of a fuller dialogue between Innes Park and the surrounding community.

## INTERCOM - A BRIEF HISTORY AND HIGHLIGHTS

Intercom was the brain child of former Innes Park social director, Scott Campbell and of Costain Estates, property manager, John De Groot. Mr. Campbell, whose career included a stint as a professional journalist, recognized the practical need for basic news and the importance of building a sense of community at Innes Park. From the start the management of Costain Estates agreed.

The first issue of Intercom appeared in Oct. 1974, and featured items on the plans of the Bring Your Own Bottle (BYOB) Club, the teen Council, the Tot Town and other activities focussed around the recreation centre.

The Newsletter continued under Scott Campbell's editorship until he left Innes Park in December when the publication passed into the hands of the current editor of this column. The January, 1975 issue included stories on: The New Year's Eve Party, a proposed sleigh ride, a January teen dance, a bake sale, and a dart tournament.

We published an editorial in that issue which accompanied new rules and hours for the recreation centre. Here is an excerpt: "We believe tenants of all age and interest groups who are prepared to act responsibly according to rules established for the common good should have access to the facilities. But to establish the rules is not easy. Acceptable rules must be both fair and reasonable."

The February, 1975 issue featured more news on clubs and dances and enclosed a separate insert in the form of a tenant interest survey. Its purpose was described as follows: "The special supplement that doubles the size of this issue of Intercom is the first full scale attempt to measure reader interest on the subject of a tenant recreation association."

Our aim was not to compete with the full range of activities offered by the BCA but simply to provide a social focus for Innes Park.

Ultimately, that focus was not provided by organized or large scale activity. Small group activities seemed best suited to the club house atmosphere of the recreation centre. One of the most interesting by products of Intercom was the Photography club. Its program was published in the February issue.

March brought in an image change for Intercom. We went to a bright, blue, stylish, masthead. To herald in the new look was an editorial on spring cleaning.

An Intercom feature which has remained consistently popular was the recipe from Innes Park kitchens. My personal favorite appeared in March, 1975.

### "Russian Potatoes"

This is a good dish for bachelors. It is impossible to spoil, tasty, and can be a meal in itself.

One potatoe  
one pot of water  
one tsp. salt  
40 oz. bottle of vodka

Peel the potato. Boil the potato for 20 minutes in pot of salted water. Remove the potato. Hollow out the entire inside and discard. Divide what is left into equal portions and place in highball glasses. Add four ounces of vodka per serving. Serves 10.



IPCA... IS THAT A CARLING BREW?

The April issue found the rec centre programs in full swing. The BYOB Club, the teen council, the newly formed photography club and the results of the tenant survey indicated modest but viable support for all programs. Some survey respondents even showed an interest in bridge and chess.

The key problem which Innes Park activities faced then as they do now was clear from the interview given by former social director Scott Campbell for that issue.

"Unfortunately, many of these plans failed because there was nobody to play a leadership role. We lacked spark plugs."

In May at the invitation of Costain Estates the YM-YWCA took on the task of managing the Innes Park summer program. Intercom gave the Y full support and publicized its pool, fitness and social plans.

In the May issue we discussed the factors which culminated in this column.

"Blackburn Hamlet has an active family orientated program for its Association members. Innes Park has similar but distinct needs. If the needs of the smaller community are to be met, they must be expressed to the larger community."

The May issue was the last monthly Intercom. The Summer and Fall 1975 issues dealt with details and achievements of the Summer program, a landscape architect's flattering critique of the Innes Park site and a crossword puzzle.

Intercom's year and a bit taught us some interesting and enjoyable lessons..We are sure that the Innes Park Intercom column will teach us even more.

### BYOB REVIVED FOR NEW YEAR'S EVE FLING

For the second consecutive year, the sounds of tape jockey Jim Virgin played in the New Year on the dance floor of the Monarch Room.

The wide variety of popular light music kept the forty-six couples who attended entertained from nine in the evening to three hours into the New Year. Branchaud Catering provided an appetizing buffet of about half a dozen cold meats, three salads, rolls, French pastries and coffee. Each couple enjoyed a small bottle of champagne.

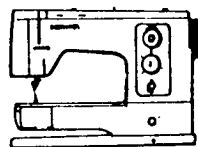

### REGISTRATION FOR 1976-77 SCHOOL YEAR

The school year includes 1st week of October to the last week of May. Those who wish to register their child (or children) for October 1976 must first observe the program. In order to make an appointment to do this, please call Maria Bennet at 824-6747, between 9 am and 7 pm. This is an ample time range and should not be abused. When you go in to observe, please do so without your child, there will be ample opportunity at a later date for him or her to become orientated. At the end of observation, you will be given a registration Form signed by one of the teachers. These completed, signed forms must be presented at the Pre-School on REGISTRATION DAY, APRIL 3, 1976 from 9 am to 1 pm. This will be done on a first come, first served

basis. A registration fee of \$10.00 is required at that time, and all school fee cheques must be sent to the Treasurer prior to the beginning of school.

For those of you returning for another consecutive year with a child presently enrolled, or another child of proper age (see below) you may pick up your registration forms after March 1st, 1976 at the school and pre-register from March 15 to 29, 1976. After this date, you will only be able to register on April 3, 1976.

Please watch the BANAR for the name of the new Registrar, and in the meantime, you may direct your inquiries to me. Children must be 3 yrs. old by Sept. 30, 1976, in order to qualify for entry Oct. 1, 1976. Those children who will be 3 after Sept. 30 but prior to Jan. 1, 1977, will go onto a waiting list for possible entry at a later date.

I take this opportunity as outgoing Registrar to say how much I have enjoyed our 3 years with the school, the staff, and most especially the children, how extremely fortunate we and our children are, to have such a facility available. And to the tremendous staff of teachers, I sometimes marvel at how positive you remain while coping with 30 little people. Before talking about this year's operations, a few words are in order about what took place in '75. Over 450 youngsters participated in an active programme in '75 and they were spread over 24 house league, and 8 representative teams. Two of the Gloucester teams, with Blackburn Hamlet well represented won Ottawa and District championships. In the house League, Blackburn had 8 teams and one of its junior teams won in the cup final. All in all, over 150 Blackburn boys played soccer last year.

Problems - Yes, we had a few. Some of the major ones included inadequate playing fields a lack of cooperation with local school boards insofar as the use of school playing fields were concerned, an imbalance (at times) with the age distribution in the house league and in the continuity of coaching/coaches with one or two teams. Nevertheless, there is little doubt that the vast majority of the boys who participated, not only learned something about the game of soccer, but they thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

Operation 1976 - While we haven't solved all of the problems encountered in '75, we believe we have made and will continue to make good progress.

Registration - The March 6 registration will be the third one held in preparation for '76. Approximately 100 boys from the Hamlet have already registered.

Over 225 are registered in the Gloucester area. This means that only a limited number of additional registrations can be accepted on a 'first come first served' basis. If the March 6 registration is missed, it just might be too late. Teams will be formed prior to the end of March with coaches contacting the boys in early April.

- Playing Fields - We should be in better shape this year with one additional field available at NRC. We are also expecting greater cooperation from the school boards. The township has also recognized the popularity of soccer and the way it has been growing throughout the Ottawa area. While it won't help much this year, they have, at the request of the Gloucester Soccer Association, and with the cooperation of NCC, agreed to level the ground for four more soccer fields on the NCC property by Bearbrooke Road opposite the Francon Gravel Company. Indeed a start on these fields was made in the Fall of '75, however, they are unlikely to be available for use until very late Fall, or the Summer of '77.

- Age Distribution - Last year the house league operated in three divisions as follows Junior 7 - 9, Intermediate 10 - 12, and Senior 13 - 15. Frankly, we have found this arrangement to have too great an age spread. Registration permitting, it is planned to reduce this spread so that leagues will be formed in 7 - 8, 9 - 10, 11 - 12, 13 - 15 age categories.

- Representative Team Try-outs - In past years we relied on the coaches from the previous year to recommend a number of boys for tryouts for the representative teams. While the system worked well, it wasn't entirely satisfactory. This year, every boy who wants to try out for a representative team will be given the opportunity.

- Coaches/Referees Clinic - For the parents who would like to help out but who feel they are not knowledgeable enough about the game, a solution is at hand.
