Presidents Report 1976

This being the last general meeting of the BCA and the last of which I will be chairman I am taking this opportunity to present my report on the achiewements of this past year and possible future areas of interest and concerns for the association.

We held the most successful Fun Fair ever on June 6, 1975 raising over \$10,000 in profits which will be used to reduce our taxes to pay for Bearbrook Park. We are aiming for an even bigger and more successful Fair this year and I am confident that the emphasis will continue to be on having a community day of FUN.

Our sports programmes continued to be well organized with very little shortage of volunteer assistance. One dya someone should tabulate the very large number of volunteers who make these programmes the success they are. I am sure that it would be quite an impressive list. Blackburn residents truly are very sports and recreation minded as demonstrated by the greater than average increase in participants. The BCA now organizes 14 sport programmes and contributes to the operation of Gloucester lacrosse, swimming, soccer and skating. This high interest shown by the community has resulted in a high level of achievement of Blackburn Teams and participants but most important it has resulted in an enjoyable experience for the participants themselves.

The new education committee began its first year of operation by becoming very involved in the French Immersion Policies of the Carleton Board of Education. The communities' views were clearly expressed at a general meeting held in March.

Youth activities has enjoyed a most successful year with the extablishment of an active, community minded youth council. The weekly Discos at Emily Carr school have filled a long standing need in the community. There is still a great need for parent volunteers to act as chaperons at these discos so that they will continue to be a success.

The budget of the BCA passed the \$100,000 mark and through conscientious management the association has been able to keep within its budget. The canteen operation at the arena was a particular success, netting over \$6000 in profits in this first full year of operation. It was manned entirely by volunteer assistance of several sport groups in Blackburn.

The BCA also presented a brief to the Mayo Commission on Regional Government.

BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING

Summary of minutes of executive meeting held on Tuesday, May 3, 1976.

The last meeting of the 1975-76 executive was held on Tuesday, May 3, 1976 and it was attended by members of the new executive as well. Correspondence included a letter from the Alliance for Bilingual Children Committee which included their response to another committee being formed called the Committee for Responsible Education. The latter Committee were supporting the replacement of the Early French Immersion programme by some other unspecified programme.

The ratification of Me. Chuch Mindach at the next general meeting as Membership chairman was proposed by the executive .

Committee Reports:

Sports: Mr. Heaslip reported that a grant of \$1000 was given to the Gloucester Skating Club in support of their learn to skate programme. The GSC wish to meet with the executive at some time in the future date to discuss their grant. The need for additional football playing fields was presented and will be considered in any concept plan for the Township park to be constructed south of the arena. Hockey registration will be on May 15, at Glen Ogilvie School and on May 29 at the Fun Fair.

Youth Activities: Mrs. Goldberger reported that there have been several applications received for Day Camp Councillors, none for Director. Additional advertising will be held and Algonquin College will be contacted in an attempt to find a director.

Education: Mr. Sheehan presented a brief summary of the returns of the questionaire which had been circulated. The questionaire has provided much useful information on the attitudes of residents of the community on our educational system and is summarized elsewhere in this Banar.

Special Projects: Mrs. Saville reported that the operation of the Tuck Shop at the detention center has yielded a profit of \$1000 so far in six months operation. She requires an adult valunteer who is willing to stock the tuck shop during the summer months. This volunteer does not get involved in the selling of the materials only in stock taking and stock ordering. It only takes one or two hours per week. Fertilizer sales produced a profit of approximately \$3500. The venturers did an excellent job of distributing it. Tippett-Richardson are to be thanked for the loan of two trucks.

Fun Fairt Mrs. Cottingham reported that many people are working hard but more help ach always be accommodated. There was concern expressed that other groups not associated with the BCA have decided to hold garage sales or street sales in Blackburn just prior to the Fun Fair. The white elephant table and nearly new booth at the fun fair could be detrimentally affected by these other x sales. .

X Civic Affairs: Mr. McGuinty, the former civic affairs chairman and Mr. Cottingham the civic affairs chairman for the 1976-77 reported on several items. OC Transpo have requested that Gloucester Council pass a by-law restricting parking on all streets ending in the word 'park'. This request was made in preparation of putting continual bus service into Blackburn cancelling the dial-a-bus service. The executive considered the effect continual heavy bus traffic would have on the streets (which were not built to take this type of traffic) and the noise and vibrational effects on the neighbouring houses. It passed a motion advising Council that we were opposed to the passing of this By-Law until smaller buses were available and it could be shown that the negative effects would be minimized.

The matter of a southerly by-pass was raised again at Council and The Reeve assured us that it has not been dropped from the road development proposals of the region. Theincreasingly heavy traffic on Innes Rd. makes this By-pass construction even more important.


The proposed development of a Township dump on a 100 acre we site adjacent to Potters Island in the Mer Bleu was noted and this association would be making representations on the advisability of such a project if it ever gets beyond the initial consulting stage.

The matter of a leash by-law for pets was brought up at the request of one of the residents and it was indicated that such a by-law exists presently in the Township.



The president then thanked the executive for assisting him in during the past year and wished the new executive all the best in the coming year.





President's Report (cont'd)

All in all it has been a very active and successful year but not one that hasn't been without its share of problems and difficulties. The executive in fulfilling its responsibilities attempts to lead and make things happen rather than react to events and circumstances. It does so to the best of its ability. Criticism is certainly at itmes warranted and is certainly welcome when responsibly offered. The community must present its ideas and concerns to the executive at every opportunity. The regular general meetings are one way and every executive member is willing to discuss community concerns and ideas over the phone or on personal basis. The danger we face in this association is that the great measure of success we have had solving problems or providing programmes, or proposing improvements in our community, may lull us into a dangerous sense of apathy. Support of or disagreement with the policies and/ or actions of the association cannot be demonstrated by staying at home or by not getting involved.

In the next year the BCA will be involved in the planning of the Blackburn Shopping centre — yes it will soon be built.— in the discussions leading to the planning and development of Blackburn Park (south of the Arena) by the Township.

The traffic density on Innes road will have to be remedied soon and the Township must be pressed to expedite the construction of the proposed southerly by-pass.

IN recreational programming there will be an even greater demand for adult programmes.

The vandalism problem which is inflicted on both public and private properties will have to be tackled. This problem demands a greater respect on the part of the vouth of the community for the property of other persons and a greater sense of responsibility on the part of parents. Unfortunately it only takes a few irresponsible individuals to cause this broblem. The vandalism to the community pool which was incurred this winter could cause the community \$2000 to \$3000 to correct.

In closing I welcome the new executive to their responsibilities. I am sure that they will continue to maintain the high standard of civic and community achievement in the programmes and interests of the community that has been characteristic of this and previous executives.

On a more personal note I would like to thank the members of this year's executive who made the job of President an enjoyable one. Our accomplishments of the past year could not have been achieved without this fine group of people and the many other persons who gave their time in some way to the many activities of the association. One of the most enjoyable aspects of this postion is to have had the opportunity to meet and become acquainted with so many members of our community.



BLACKBURN HAMLET COMMUNITY RECREATION CENTRE COMMITTEE


The BHCRCC has met several times now to oversee the development and operation of our local recreation facilities. You may be interested to note that:

- I. The Bearbrook Park construction, as well as the two play structures in the strip parks, will have started by the time you are reading this. They are expected to be completed by June 30.
- 2. The swimming pool will open on Saturday, June 5, with a pre-season schedule of operation between 4.00 p.m. and 8.15 p.m. Monday to Friday, and I.00 p.m. and 8.00 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. The regular season will start on Saturday, June 26. The pool will then open at 9.00 a.m. on Monday to Friday, I0.00 a.m. on Saturdays and I.00 p.m. on Sundays. The detailed schedule will appear soon. The Township has been instructed to include in the schedule daily family swimming hours, as well as some adult hours.

PROPOSED BUDGET CUTS OF CARLETON BOARD OF EDUCATION

The following is a prepared statement by Mary Lou Wyatt, President of OSSTF, District 43, Carleton County:

The proposed cuts from the 1976 budget of the Carleton Board of Education (CBE) will severely curtail the quality of education in Carleton's secondary schools. (Reference: News Release from CBE on April 6, 1976).

If adopted, the budget cuts will substantially influence those programs directly affecting students.

Because of the tremendous impact upon the quality of education available to students, OSSTF, District 43, Carleton County, has grave reservations about the planned cutbacks.

Our main concern has to do with the following facts which have serious implications for the students attending Carleton secondary schools.


- Class sizes will increase significantly.
 - a) Teachers will find it increasingly difficult to provide individual attention and personal assistance to their students.
 - b) In certain areas, class sizes will increase beyond normal safety limits. In large technical, science, and physical education classes, student safety will become a critical issue.
- 2. In Carleton secondary schools the number of courses offered has been reduced. Students are faced with the dilema of greater restrictions in the selection of their courses.
- 3. In most Carleton secondary schools the cutbacks have caused the elimination of many enriched courses which have been offered to students with special aptitudes and talents.

Remedial programs have also been severely affected and students who require special attention and extra help may find these programs no longer available.

OSSTF is especially concerned that these students requiring special programs are the ones most severely hurt.

- 4. The French immersion program designed to increase students' fluency in the French language has had to be curtailed at the secondary level.
- 5. Drastic reductions in guidance services to students have already occurred and teachers will be faced with the task of counselling as many as 350 students.
- 6. Extra-curricular activities, including school athletic programs, will be confronted by imposing limitations due to a serious reducation in transportation services.

The above amply illustrates the concern of OSSTF, District 43, and why the implications of the planned budget cuts must be seriously examined. The responsibilities of the trustees to both students and taxpayers is clearly recognized. However, it is the opinion of OSSTF that the proposed cutbacks represent a serious imbalance between the two. If implemented, the most significant items curtailed will not be in administration nor support services. The greatest effects will be in the classroom where education actively takes place! In the Federation's view, this will critically damage the system of education in Carleton secondary schools.

SUMMER PROGRAM PREVIEW

Summer program director Lynn Snell reports that the pool staff has been hired and the pool schedule roughed out for the 1976 summer season at Innes Park. Swimming lessons for children and adults are planned as offered in previous seasons.

Lynn also expects to introduce adult fitness, field days, aquatic meets, family picnics, barbeques, summer BYOB parties and personalized activity programs. Fees have not been set for the programs although the Costain subsidy will guarantee that they will be modest. Of course, what is not guaranteed is the participation and volunteer support of committed tenants.

Running, Jogging, swimming, calisthenics, and cycling are among the components which Lynn would like to see in the adult fitness program. Probable starting time would be daily after work and duration perhaps 45 minutes. To highlight the program and give participants a target, field days and special events in the pool will be featured.

Lynn would like to see the successful BYOB party format revived on a couple of nights this summer. Although guests from outside Innes Park will always be welcome, the summer programs will probably provide the social focus for these evenings.

An open house is planned for Saturday, June 12, to register program participants and gage general tenant interest in specific program details. At that time your support will be crucial.

POOL OPENING

If the weather and the Board of Health do not interfere, the Innes Park pool will open on Saturday June 19, 1976, for the summer. Organized activities will begin the following week. New regulations and passes, and the pool schedule will be issued in early June

and printed in the June issue of the BANAR.

DAY CAMP NEEDS

You may have noticed, particularly if you are a parent that a day camp was not included in the current summer program plans. For two years Innes Park has maintained and staffed a summer day camp despite our relatively small child population. The fluctuating attendance at the height of the family holiday season makes a small group of mixed ages even harder to plan for.

Although no definite arrangements have been made as of this writing, we hope that Innes Park children will be able to participate in a larger area day camp. This plan allows the children to engage in activities suited to their appropriate age groups. If we cannot do this, we will meed Innes Park's Day Camp needs some other way.

Broken Beer Bottle Brings Near Tragedy to Playground.

At about four thirty P.M. on April 15th, five year old Nathalie was carried, still bleeding from a gash on her forehead to her home at Innes Park.

Nathalie was rushed to the Children's Hospital and her wound was dressed. No noticeable scar will remain. She had been busy in the playground when a minor disagreement erupted between her and another preschooler. The nearest agent to settle the fight was the jagged edge of a broken beer bottle.

The Innes Park grounds are regularly cleaned but they are too extensive to be constantly inspected. Parents are vigilant but children need a safe play area to learn independence.

The incident indicates two needs: Tenants have to assume responsibility for the litter they leave or see scattered about, it may be dangerous as well as unsightly. Parents should warn their children regularly, to avoid the various dangerous objects which

careless people have discarded.

FROZEN MYSTERY PIE

1 C. quick cooking oatmeal

1/3 C. sifted pastry flour

1/3 C. brown sugar firmly packed

 $\frac{1}{2}$ Tsp. salt

1/3 C. melted shortening

Filling - 32 large white marshmallows

1 C. milk

2 Tbsp. instant coffee or cocoa

2 egg yolks

2 cups whipped cream

Vanilla, rum, or brandy flavoring

Combine first 4 ingredients and stir in melted shortening. Press into bottom and sides of 9" pie plate. Bake at 375° for 15 min. or until golden brown. Chill before adding filling.

Filling:

Heat and stir marshmallows, milk, coffee, together over low heat until melted. Beat egg yolks slightly and stir in a little of the hot mixture, then add all. Stir constantly 2 or 3 minutes until mixture thickens. Beat smooth - cool - fold in whipped cream and flavoring. Cool before serving or freeze. If frozen, allow about 45 minutes to thaw before serving.



CVERVIEW OF CANADIAN MANPOWER CENTRES FOR STUDENTS (CMC-S)

The Department of Manpower and Immigration will operate 300 CMCs for students employing a staff of approximately 1,070 across Canada. In Ontario, there will be 120 centres staffed by over 355 people this year. A budget of \$1.6 million has been alloted by the Federal government for operation of this program within the Ontario Region. This is 38% of the program total for all of Canada.

The CMCs for Students are just one of the components of the Federal government's Student Summer Employment and Activities Program (SSEAP). There are a total of eighteen programs for 1976 with a budget of \$24 million for Canada, providing direct employment for 12,160 and activity for 109,700. Students will be referred to these jobs through their local CMC-S.

The primary objective of the CMC for Students program is to encourage and aid the private sector of the economy to hire students during the summer months. It is anticipated that another 200,000 student jobs will be a direct result of the operation of this program in the summer of 1976, on a national scale.

This summer we anticipate over 1.5 million students will be on the job market; in Ontario the expected number is 600,000. Both the Provincial and Federal governments have programs, to provide employment for a number of these young people, but a majority of them must look to the private sector for jobs.

Employers who have utilized student workers in the past soon recognize their benefits. They are available on short notices for an hour, a week, the summer, and are able to handle a wide variety of jobs from domestic chores to career-oriented duties in professional areas. They can add to productivity or maintain work flows during vacation periods. money and they want to work.

Canada Manpower Centres for Students have an up-to-date file of registrations, thus they are able to pre-screen and match clients with jobs very quickly and efficiently. They can provide any number of workers for any length of time. Students with special skills can be located through the service and students can be found for any type of work. There is no charge for any service provided to employers or students.

One need not register with us to use our services. Registration is primarily useful for those who have certain marketable skills, such as actual commercial driving experience, or a chauffeur's licence if one is 18 years of age or older; at least a bronze medallion in swimming; or typing and/or stenography. However, if a student wishes to work in the Federal Civil Service, he or she must be registered with us.

Live-file searches are done often for the above and the student could be contacted with regards to employment requiring such skills.

Being registered does not mean that a student will be contacted necessarily by the Centre for Students. It is advised that all students make use of the Job Information Centre (J.I.C.).

Provided that the student meets the basic job requirements, which are laid down by the employer himself, the student can be immediately referred to the employer.

It is important to note that all J.I.C.'s have the same job vacancies and these are posted concurrently.

"That the owner, possessor, or harbourer of any and all dogs within the Township of Gloucester shall confine, or cause to be confined to he premises any and all dogs so owned, possessed, or harboured by him and shall not allow said dog or dogs to be running at large for and during the currency of his By-law.

The penalty for a breach of this By-law shall be a fine of not less than Five Dollars (\$5) nor exceeding Fifty Dollars (\$50) together with casts for a first offence and a fine of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10) nor exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100) for a second offence together with costs."

We request the cooperation of all residents in observing this By-law and in helping to keep Blackburn Hamlet an enjoyable place to live.
