INVOLVEMENT

Blackburn Hamlet is at a critical time in its growth. When a community is small the people get involved in community affairs whether they want to or not. They know most of their neighbours and problems get passed along and discussed by word of mouth. There is great social pressure in this environment against conduct which might offend other members of the community. As the population increases, people become insular tending to leave the conduct of community affairs to "them" - either elected officials or groups of volunteers. This leads to the loss of the rights of individuals in the running of the community and to the loss or diminishing of the social pressure against misconduct.

The emergency meeting held at the beginning of July, whether the method was appropriate or not, was an attempt to get the community as a whole involved in a situation which if left unchecked would have left Bearbrook Park unsafe and unfit for our children to play in. To some extent this end has been accomplished. There have been no further serious incidents in the park and vandalism has been relatively low this summer. Increased police surveillance and the excellent job done by the daily park supervisor were contributing factors of course, but would we have this increased surveillance if we had not expressed our concern in July?

Continuing involvement is necessary! We must not let situations deteriorate to the point of emergency meetings and confrontations with the police. The executive members of the Blackburn Community Association have planned and organized programs of youth activities, adult activities, sports, fund raising, and community support. They will be presenting their programs and their views at the general meeting on Tuesday, September 28th. Come and find out what we can do for YOU!

# 4 BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING

Summary of Executive Meeting Held August 31, 1976

The meeting was held to discuss the fall program and the financial operation of the community association.

The preliminary report of the ad-hoc committee on Finance was discussed at great length. It was decided that the committee would submit final recommendations to the next executive meeting.

Mrs. Lois Kemp informed the executive that the Citizen was starting a Neighbourhood News section on page 4. It was decided that each committee head would submit items they wished publicized directly to the reporter for this feature.

Expenditures totalling \$99,560.03 were tabled and approved.

It was decided that the Candy Floss machine be under the control and discretion of the Ways and Means convenor with the proviso that the machine would not be loaned or rented without a clear expression of the liability of the user including health regulations, personal liability, maintenance and damage to the equipment, fair wear and tear expected.

## Committee Reports:

**SPORTS:** Baseball had a very successful season, thanks to the energy and dedication of the volunteers. The baseball diamonds need work, filling, levelling, etc, to prevent further degradation.

**WAYS AND MEANS:** A vote of thanks was recorded to Joan Trusdale for so ably looking after the tuck shop at the Detention Centre during the summer.

**YOUTH ACTIVITIES:** The Day Camp this year was a resounding success. Much credit to Terry Goldberger and the Camp councillors. The youth group held two discos at Earl Armstrong arena during the summer.

**MAINTENANCE:** Eldon Kemp reported that damage was extremely light this year.

During the discussion of the fall program it came to light that there was a critical shortage of ice time in Gloucester. This was causing all organizations considerable difficulty in scheduling and providing ice time for all needs. It was moved and unanimously approved that:

"The executive of the Blackburn Community Association strongly supports the construction of the planned new arena in Orleans. This construction should be undertaken as promptly as possible, due to the critical shortage of ice time in the township".

The next executive meeting will be held Oct. 5. and three people will be invited to address the executive - Mr. G. Keesling, Parole Officer, someone from the YWCA-YMCA and Mrs. Swanson, Girl Guides.

TREASURER'S MESSAGE

My report to you covers a number of areas; changes to the budget, current fiscal situation and the 1975 audit report.

Changes to the Budget:

On the 31st of August the executive met, reviewed our current budget and wish to recommend to you the following amendments:

**Administration:** An increase in expenditures of \$2,800. This increase is required for: insurance, audit of the B.C.A.'s books of account and other incidental expenses. The cost of the audit is however recovered by applying the cost against the recreational grant provided by the Township. Approval of this change alters the administration budget from \$4,600 to \$7,400 in expenses.

**Youth Activities:** An increase of \$1,000 in expenses is recommended to cover the cost of busing and swimming pools for the Day Camp program. This increase in expenditure is offset by a \$1,200 increase in revenues. Approval of this change will amend the Youth Activities budget to: revenue - \$5,400 and expenses - \$6,100.

**Ways & Means:** An increase of \$20,000 in expenses is recommended for current and projected operating costs of the Regional Detention Centre Tuck Shop operated by the B.C.A. This increase in expenses is offset by a \$19,400 projected increase in revenues. Approval of this change alters the Ways & Means budget to: revenue - \$34,150 and expenses - \$31,000.

**Tennis:** An increase of \$4,100 is recommended for past and current operating expenses. This increase in expenditure is offset by a \$5,000 increase in revenues. Approval of this change alters the budget to: revenues - \$11,500 and expenses - \$7,000.

Current Fiscal Situation:

Our current fiscal situation is encouraging as we head into the last quarter with a \$7,500 surplus. This surplus will assist us in regaining our previous financial position of two years ago. The following is a revenue and expense summary for the period of January 1st to August 31st of this year.

AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Members of the  
Blackburn Community Association:

We have examined the combined balance sheet of the Blackburn Community Association as at December 31, 1975 and the statement of general fund revenue and expenditure and accumulated net revenue, Bearbrook Park revenue and expenditure and accumulated net revenue and tennis courts revenue and expenditure and accumulated net deficit for the year then ended. Our examination included a general review of accounting procedures and such tests of accounting records and other supporting evidence as we considered necessary in the circumstances except as explained in the following paragraph.

Membership fees, committee revenues, fun fair revenues and tennis courts revenues, as set out in the accompanying combined financial statements are as shown by the books of the Association. Because of their nature, these revenues are not susceptible of complete audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of revenue from these sources was limited to a test comparison of recorded receipts against bank deposits.

In our opinion, except for any adjustments to revenues that might have been required had revenues been susceptible of complete audit verification, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Association as at December 31, 1975, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted for Ontario municipal organizations, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, after giving retroactive effect to the change in accounting for standing committees explained in note 2 to the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE COMBINED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

DECEMBER 31, 1975

1. Basis of Combination

The combined balance sheet reflects the assets and liabilities of the general fund and the Bearbrook Park Fund, and the Tennis Courts Fund of the Blackburn Community Association.

2. Accounting Policies

During the year, the Association changed the basis for accounting for the financial activities of its standing committees. All excess revenues or expenditures of the committees are now transferred to the general fund at the end of each fiscal year. An amount of \$2,080 representing the accumulated net revenue of the Committees at December 31, 1974 has been transferred to general accumulated net revenue. The 1974 comparative figures have been restated to reflect this change in accounting principles.

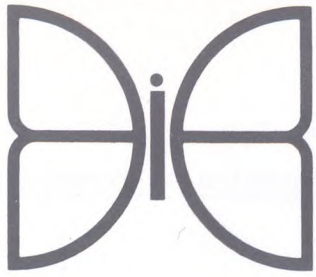

Lynn Snell, recreation director for Innes Park in the summer of '76 reports a record smooth season, administratively. On many, many days the pool surface was smooth too; smooth and cold.

"In fact," says Lynn, "I would have welcomed a few problems. Problems mean action and some days it was pretty dead at the rec centre."

Despite our Arctic summer and the eerie calm it brought to the face of the Innes Park waters, Lynn and her capable staff accomplished much.

#### SWIMMING

In the children's program, 134 registrants earned over 80 badges in the five sets of lessons that ran continuously through July and August. Some badges are still unclaimed. Has anyone in your family forgotten to pick his up? As in past years the response for adult swimming lessons was disappointing. Of three respondents, two could not make the schedule, and the third withdrew to go on vacation.

"The early adult swim period from five to six o'clock was well attended." notes Lynn. "The late evening session, however, drew few people after eight."

The pool closed on Labour Day. Considering the unusually cold summer, it was a good season.

#### DAY CAMP:

Thirty families sent about forty children to the Innes Park day camp between July 5 and August 27. The camp's third season benefited from the two previous. The '76 camp included more outings away from the rec centre and proved popular with the participants.

Campers shared movies at Glen Ogilvie School with the Blackburn Hamlet day camp, visited the Science and Technology Museum and the Museum of Man and made a tour of MacDonalds that included free hamburgers and a chance to make their own milkshakes. Outdoor adventures like nature hikes in Greenbelt land, a swim-



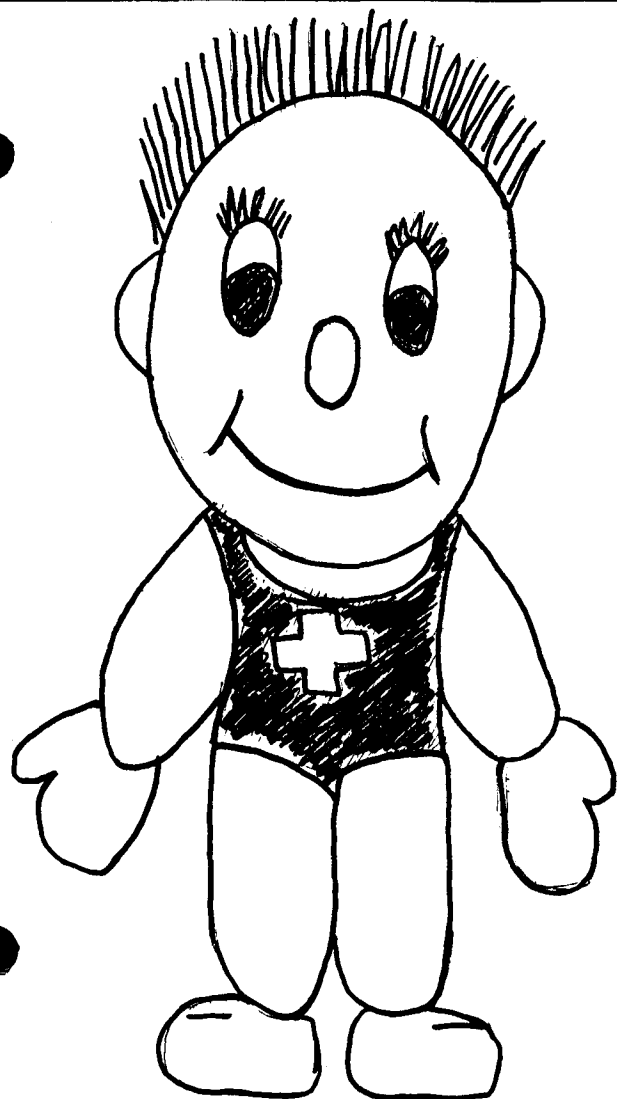
Lynn Snell records Chlorine level

ming trip to Mooney's Bay, a day trip to Vincent Massey Park kept the children active. They created walnut ships and mice, paper masks, puppets, paintings and pet rocks in the arts and crafts periods.

Campers were between four and twelve years old. Most were between five and eight. Counsellors Geof Beaumont, Sara Stymiest and Paula Stunden are congratulated for steering their crew through some wet and chilly weather.

#### OTHER ACTIVITIES:

Innes Park resident, Suzanne Larache led her adult fitness group for its first session on August 9, 1976. More about this activity will appear later in the column. Some interest surfaced for the children's ballet lessons offered by Judy Best. However, irregular summer schedules postponed this activity until fall.



#### EVENTS:

Although Lynn was prepared to organize special events throughout the summer, more interest was shown in ongoing activities like swimming lessons and the general pool program. Nevertheless the June 12 open house attracted many children to baseball, soccer and tag games, while inside the rec centre registration proceeded briskly.

Summarizing her summer experience, Lynn notes that pool activities remained the most popular despite the chill. "The weather and holidays combined to give us a slack period in the middle of the summer, near the end of July and the start of August. I guess that made it easier to administer the property and for the rental office too."

Lynn and her staff used the slack spells to learn how to fill out time sheets. They also learned how to organize, how to reach and deal with people and the importance of continuous promotion to any program. They learned how to listen, and within reason, to give people what they wanted.

Costain proved to be a reasonable employer giving the summer staff considerable freedom and approving of most of their suggestions. Lynn wishes to thank Costain for the life-guard T-shirts and Young Chow for the steady stream of hot snacks on cold evenings.

## BASEBALL REPORT

Little League enjoyed a successful year of play with over 200 boys enrolled in four divisions. T-Ball had six teams playing a 14-game schedule in May and June with surprisingly few games rained out in spite of the wet weather.

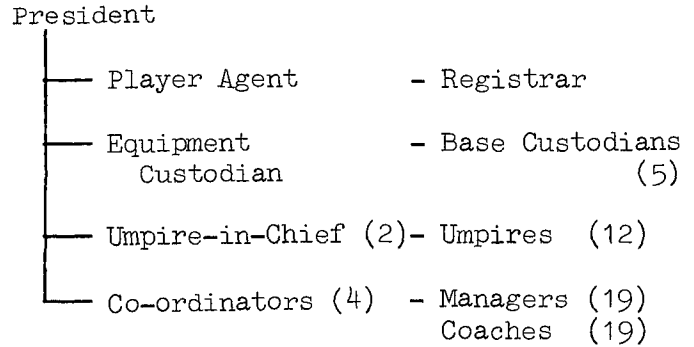
The Minor Division had five teams. The regular schedule was won by the Reds managed by Jim Marlow while the Pirates, under the guidance of Dale Frost won the playoffs. During July and August, these two men combined efforts to arrange occasional games with teams from other areas in the city including Rideau Park, the Glebe and Pinecrest.

This year we had only four teams playing in the Major Division but for the first time we had a team from each - Queenswood Village, Queenswood Heights and Sarsfield. The Reds, managed by Ken McClatchie, won both the regular schedule and the playoffs. As usual, a representative team was entered in the District Little League tournament and under the direction of Barry Mehr progressed farther than in any previous year. By beating us 3-2 in the final game, Pinecrest entered the Provincial tournament and were runners-up at that level.

Enough Senior Division players (ages 13-15) for three teams registered and, here again, we combined with a team from Queenswood Village and one from Sarsfield. Queenswood easily won both the league schedule and playoffs. The representative team was knocked out of the tournament after two games. We look forward to stronger representation next year as very few of Blackburn players were fifteen so hopefully most of them will be back again.

In addition to the Little League teams, Blackburn is represented in the Outaouais Midget AA Baseball League. Pete Abels manages the team of 16-18 year olds competing against six teams from Quebec plus Nepean, Alta Vista and Ottawa Canadians on this side of the river. At time of writing, Blackburn is one of three teams left in the playoffs.

An important element in the overall success of baseball generally, is the positive response we get when the call goes out for help in running the program. To succeed with a Little League program involving 19 teams like we had this year, requires participation by at least 65 people other than the players. An area where we could have used more help this year was at the coaching positions. The organization chart for baseball looks like this:



Planning for next year's activity is already under way. Because of mobility for many families in the Hamlet, changing interest emphasis and other reasons, there is always a need for more people willing to help. Anyone who has an interest for next year is welcome to call John Wiebe 4054, or John Fargey 8102, to make that interest known or to inquire as to what specific help is needed.

Practically all of the 65 jobs were filled this year by different people so rather than identify them all by name let it just be recorded here that the community acknowledges and appreciates their contribution to the development and well being of our children.

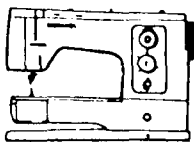

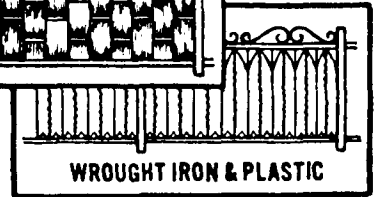
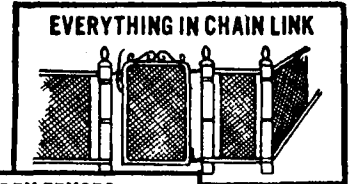
