BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING

Minutes of the Executive Meeting held Oct. 5, 1976 at the Orient Park Recreation Centre.

Mr. Jerry Keesling, Senior Probation and Parole Officer in charge of the Volunteer Probation Program outlined a proposal for a program in the Hamlet involving young people working with the youth in our community who are on probation by giving them a peer group member to confide in rather than an adult supervisor. Arrangements will be made to have Mr. Keesling present details of the program to a general meeting.

Miss. E. Pearson, Director of Educational Programs for the YM/YWCA presented a program of community programs which are run by the Y. She asked for support in establishing some of these programs in Blackburn, starting with "Human Sexuality in Adolescence". Arrangements will be made to have Miss Pearson address a general meeting.

Mrs. S. Swanson, Blackburn District Commissioner and Mrs. Sally Chapman, Gloucester Township/Girl Guides of Canada liason officer addressed the executive briefly on the budgetary needs of the Girl Guides. Some misunderstandings were cleared up after a general discussion.

A sub-committee will be formed from the officers of the association and several people from the community to study suggested changes to the constitutions.

Committee Reports:

Membership: Membership drive organization is well underway.

Sports: Registrations very succesful.

Transportation: First meeting of Regional Transportation Committee to take place shortly.

Maintenance: Stone dust on the ball diamonds will be spread very shortly.

Fun Fair: The work of obtaining volunteers is still continuing.

Education: The Education committee held a meeting with the principals of the area schools. The schools and the committee are willing to set up workshop programs with interested parents. The children from Autumn Hill are still not being bussed to the seperate school. Heather Umelas will contact the chairman of the Seperate School Board. Heather Umelas and Claude Goldberger will look

into the possibility of having adult crossing guards on Innes Road.

Civic Affairs: Claude Goldberger will form a special committee to investigate the improvement of Innes Road to the standards of other roads in the Hamlet.

Finances: The finance meeting was postponed until Oct 20.

BCA GENERAL MEETING

Minutes of the General Meeting held September 28th, 1976 at Glen Ogilvie School.

Peter Sheehan opened the meeting and welcomed everyone in attendance.

Minutes of the previous general meeting were read.

It was moved by Paul Lardner, seconded by Terry Goldberger that the minutes be approved as read. Carried.

Ratification of new members of the executive.

The following people had been nominated for the following positions, as printed in the Banar.

Civic Affairs - Claude Goldberger, Adult Activities - Dick Cottingham, Fun Fair - Joan Trusdale, Membership - Chuck Mindach. Nominations were invited from the floor. None were received, so the above mentioned people are ratified by acclamation.

Peter Sheehan asked the people to be very supportive to these new members of the executive and others when necessary.

Chuck Mindach advised that the first two weeks in November would be when the membership drive would be held. He explained his plans regarding his membership drive and design of new card. Benefits of membership card were outlined - reduction in registration fees for various sports activities, copy of monthly Banar.

Barry Mehr gave a run down of all the sports available in the Hamlet.

Heather Umelas gave a brief rundown on the Education Committee. Eight members on committee. They have been very busy the past few weeks with a few busing problems. The names of people associated with various schools will be publicized in the next Banar.

Terry Goldberger advised her job is co-ordinator of programs for children from 5 to 18. Advised that the average attendance was 70 per week at day camp during the summer. The teenagers were starting a sports nite on Monday nights. Biggest problem is getting chaperones. Commented on two possible programs to be offered. They are first to be presented to the executive at next executive meeting.

Carol Ann Jorgensen was there from the Youth Council and was asked of any one problem. She mentioned that the main problem was the size of facilities. Not sufficiently large enough.

Lorrie Saville advised her job is to make money. Explained the Fertilizer Sale, held in March, Tuck Shop at Detention Centre. The plays held for children, one of which will be held November 20th at Emily Carr. Monte Carlo Nite - which is now going to Adult Activities.

Claude Goldberger advised his job was to look after the interests of the community regarding politics within the community and the building of roads, shopping centres, etc. He advised that there should be an All Candidates Nite October 6th at Glen Ogilvie School.

George Bushell advised that at present he has mainly been involved with O.C. Transpo. He will be working closely with Civic Affairs Chairman. He may possibly do a survey this fall regarding needs of area regarding busing and will need help to do this. He is joining a region wide transportation committee to plan long range needs.

Joan Trusdale advised that the Fun Fair was held to raise money for Blackburn Community.

Dick Cottingham commented briefly on some plans for the coming season.

Peter Sheehan advised Felix Comeau was absent, but in all, his absence advised that his job was producing the Banar; a job well done for the past year by Felix Comeau. We would appreciate any comments regarding what people would like in the Banar.

Paul Lardner advised that B.C.A. has grown tremendously from \$25,000. or \$30,000. to \$150,000.

New Business

It was moved by Paul Lardner, seconded by Pete Edwards that the four amendments to the budget as outlined in the Banar be approved. All in favour. Carried.

Paul Lardner apologized for the lack of Fun Fair report. He hopes to have it in next Banar.

It was moved by Pete Edwards, seconded by Paul Lardner that the meeting be adjourned. Carried.

We wish to thank the principals who recently met with the Education Committee; Mr. Beach of Blackburn Middle School, Mr. Imeson of Glen Ogilvie School, and Mr. Marshall of Blackburn Seperate School. Mr. Vachon of Ecole Sainte Marie was unable to attend due to a prior commitment.

The meeting was very useful and informative. We hope that we can arrange this type of meeting at least once per school term and perhaps, next time, hold it in a school with all interested members of the community in attendance. Some of the items that came out at this meeting follow:

All the schools in Blackburn Hamlet have an "Open Door" policy. Parents are welcome to sit in on classes and observe the proceedings. Appointments are not necessary. However, every parent must identify themselves to the principal of the school when they enter, to make the principal aware of who is on the premises. Parents must realize that this time is not to be used for discussions with the teachers. A separte and specific appointment is necessary for interviews with a teacher.

The possibility of setting up "Work Shops" for parents was discussed with the principals. These would be held to familiarize the parents with the methods of teaching certain subjects such as, math, reading, or any others which would be of interest to the parents. These would be done on an individual school basis and only if there is sufficient interest to attend them. Please contact your school representative on this matter to enable us to plan along with the principals.

We have the full co-operation of the schools and it is time to put an end to the lack of understanding. Let us take advantage of what is being offered!!!

He asks only that you check in first at the office so they will be aware of your presents in the school.

In the interest of safety for our children attending Glen Ogilvie School we would like to ask the following:

1. When picking children up at the school, please park your car away from the entrance laneway and parking lot where the school buses must load and unload children.
2. Children living near the school should be asked to leave their bicycles at home thus alleviating confusion in the laneways and street in front of the school. This will save bicycles AND CHILDREN from harm.

We would like to take this opportunity to ask volunteer help at your school. This appeal is directed at ALL CITIZENS; whether a homemaker, who may enjoy a short break, a senior citizen who's tired of being "retired", or a young person on half day courses or working late shifts. The time is from 11:45 to 12:15 and the task is lunchroom supervision. If you have young children at home for lunch they would be welcome to join you for the day's lunch at school. Younger brother or sisters are also welcome with the supervising parent. It could be a lunch a week or once every two weeks. Please help out. 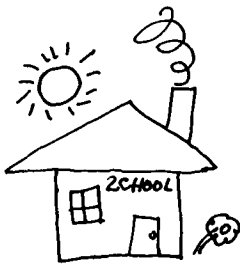

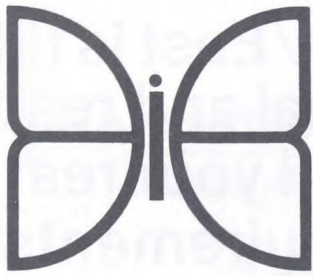
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intercom

My apartment overlooks the main entrance of the B block building at Innes Park. For the past few days I have watched the moving vans edge their way towards the canopy below my window. It is sad.

It's sad because I never knew most of the people who are now moving away. The people I knew, the people who moved into Innes Park about the time that we did, have almost all left. Apartment living is transient, a nomadic life.

And we are leaving too. We are only moving a few miles north, to Convent Glen, and for the time being, I'll continue to write this column. But our term of residence at Innes Park is over.

When we came to Innes Park the second building was incomplete. The model suites were still in B block. Later they were moved to A block and now of course there are none. The contactors were pouring concrete for the top of the parking garage. The recreation centre had just opened.

I first visited the community "in harmony with nature" (Do you remember the old sign?) in the early summer of 1973 when my son was learning to walk and my car was new. We don-



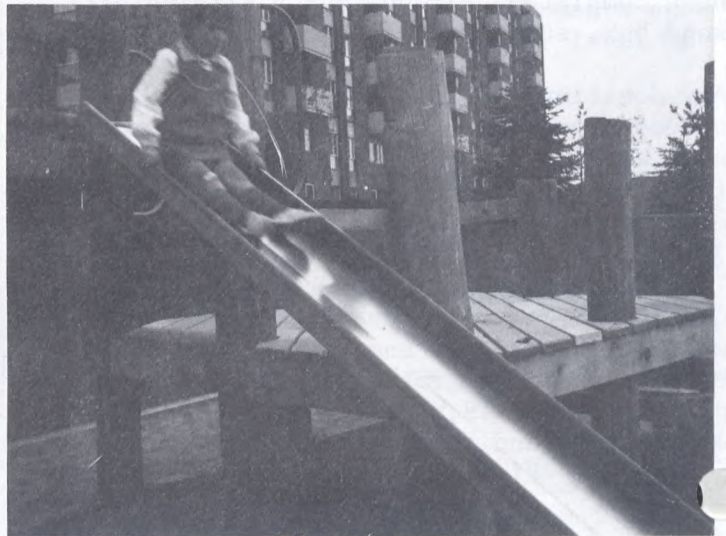
Intercom Editor, Donald Officer, daughter Alexandra and son David in farewell portrait in front of B block

ned hard hats and were shown the half built town houses by the lady who worked in the Costain trailer. The foundations of B block were being laid. We liked what we saw but it seemed so far out. By the time you read this we'll be living in Orleans.

We signed the lease a few months later in the dead of winter. We could not believe the size of the units. Even the halls seemed immense. As we began to move in our boxes of books and trudged down those halls, we realized how immense they really were.

We were told at the time, there would be changes in the Hamlet. And changes there have been. Lights now line Innes Rd. and 30mph signs slow down somewhat the east end cowboys. The teletranspo service has been augmented by express routes and regular bus lines. Bearbrook Park sprang from the fields. The NCC tilled the land across Innes Rd. next to the creek into new allotment gardens. Then Harwood rose between the gardens and the apartments.

Since we have been here, Blackburn Hamlet has gained an arena, a medical centre, a library, a quasi-Italian restaurant and a reputation as an escape route for Regional Detention

That's true of course but we have made some lasting friendships and met some fine people at Innes Park. Looking out of the traffic circle, I know it would have been nice to have known them too.

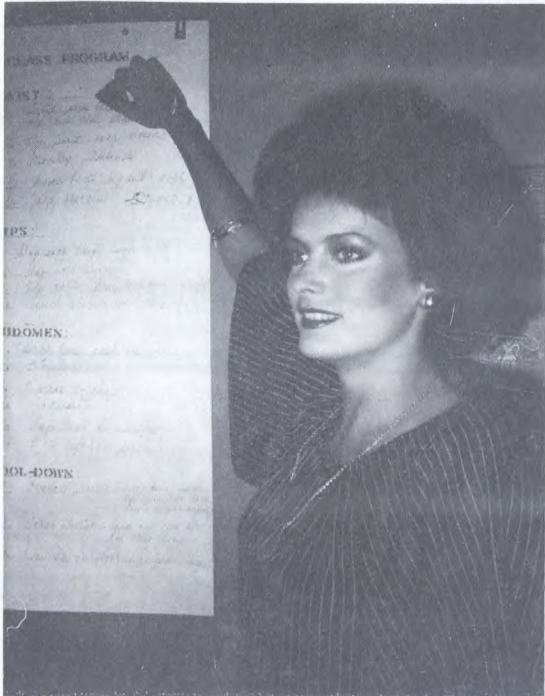
Summer Exercise Stretches into Fall

Suzanne Laroche's twice a week exercise sessions begun this summer in the rec. centre exercise room, continued through the fall.

The all female group, although reduced in numbers since it began in Aug. attracts a few ladies every Monday and Wednesday from 6:30 to 7:30.

Suzanne's mix of easy to more taxing movements is an effective blend of yoga, jazz and calisthenics. Conditioning and stamina are the main goals of her program, but mindful of participant interest she also gives dieting tips and beautification information.

Miss Laroche is a public servant by day: she divides much of her own time between workouts at Vic Tanny's and occasional modeling assignments. She traces her interest in fitness

from the times she lost a couple of modelling jobs by not being too trim. She finds the problem no longer arises.

For anyone who would like to join, Suzanne has some advance advice. You will be tired after the first few sessions until your body becomes accustomed. Don't expect instant results in weight loss. Remember that exercise helps you lose inches, not pounds. New mothers often feel out of shape, but they are loose not flabby. Exercise tones them up quickly.

"My classes are casual and friendly." says Suzanne. "We have a mixture of single and married women, with a fairly wide range in age." She explained that although only women have responded so far that men would be welcome to join. "Their strength and endurance would make them pace setters for the class."

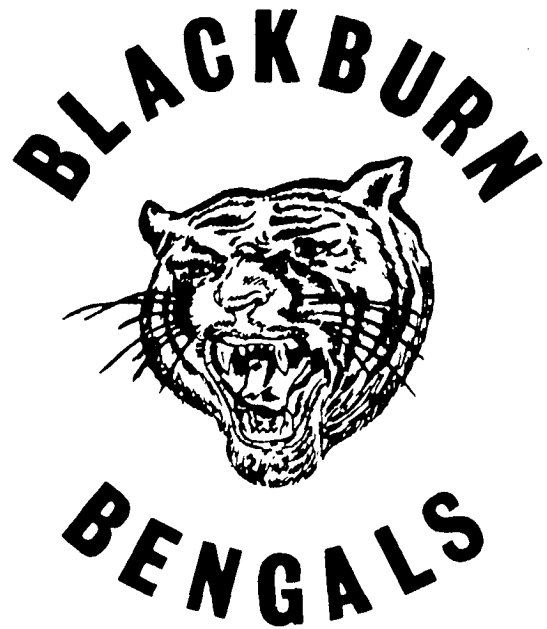

DWIGHT R. PROUDFOOT

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An increasing number of us in houses a few years old may find areas along the living room window ledge in particular where paint does not adhere for long and which seem to become pulp like or softer than normal. At the onset of such symptoms future costly repair work may be spared by baring the infected area, impregnating the infected and surrounding area with Creosote, (using a brush, an eye dropper, or some such device - this fluid will migrate through the wood grain well beyond the point where it is applied).

Creosote, although an excellent wood preservative, must be handled carefully; it is a poison and stains are difficult to remove.

After treatment, fill cavities with water putty, caulk cracks where rain and condensation tend to run and repaint. If wood must be replaced, use cedar; it is not so subject to rot.

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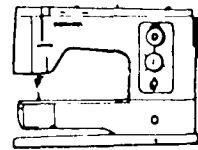
