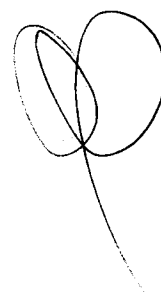

# BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING

Minutes of executive meeting held November 2, 1976 at the Rec Centre, 2336 Orient Park.

Les Mandigo, insurance agent from the Royal Insurance Group advised the executive on the types and amounts of insurance coverage carried by the BCA.

Mr. Paul Dupuis, principal of Emily Carr Middle School discussed the use of the school for Youth Disco's and other activities. Some discussion ensued as to the best method of minimizing disruption to the school operation as a result of community use. The lack of promised support from Gloucester police, through their community involvement program, at the Friday night disco's was also discussed.

## Committee Reports:

Ways and Means: Lorrie Saville stated that we have realized a profit of \$1500 on expenditures of \$18,000 from the Tuck Shop at the Detention Centre. A motion by Lorrie Saville that we stop operating the Tuck Shop as of December 31, 1976 with the understanding that the Detention Centre tak over operation, was approved.

Civic Affairs: Claude Goldberger reported from the Township council meeting that a street sign at Navan and Innes would be erected as soon as the storm sewer work was completed. He had received assurances that the pathway from Eastpark to Innes behind Red Maple Court would be improved. He also advised that a meeting of the committee to improve Innes Road was held and that they were ready to approach council with some preliminary proposals on crosswalks, sidewalks, curbs, bypass roads, etc. A motion by Paul Lardner, that the BCA write a letter to the township asking that the necessary zoning bylaws be amended to allow a medical dispensary operation in the Blackburn Medical Centre was approved. An amendment by Art Szabo that the words " in view of the lack of progress in the Blackburn Shopping Centre" be added, was also approved.

Treasurer: Art Szabo moved that the ad hoc finance committee study the separation of all aspects of the bookkeeping function and the treasurer's function and to report to the next executive meeting.

# 4 BCA GENERAL MEETING

There are no minutes for the October meeting as it had to be cancelled. Only 4 people from our community attended -- forcing us to apologize on your behalf to our four School Trustees and Mr. Kiessler from the Volunteer Probation Program.

Your Association can not survive without the active interest of its members!

A motion by Paul Lardner, amended by Dick Cottingham, that a committee composed of the officers of the executive study the question of and recommend to the executive guidelines for the hiring of personnel to do work for the association and that this committee seek the advice of those BCA executive members directly involved with the hiring of employees, was approved. A motion by Paul Lardner, that expenditures of \$31,189.91 for the period Sept. 1 to Oct. 31 be approved, was carried.

A motion by Ev Grover, that an honorarium be given to Bev Lardner for the work she had done on the books in 1976, was discussed in committee. The motion amended by Dick Cottingham making the amount \$200 was approved. Claude Goldberger wished to be shown as opposed to the motion.

A motion by Barry Mehr, that the \$18,600 held in the trust account be transferred to the Community Recreation Centres Committee for work involved in Bearbrook Park, was approved. A motion by Barry Mehr that \$104 be granted to the Gloucester Lacrosse Association to help them defray their additional expenses incurred during the running of the 1976 Olympic Bantam Lacrosse tournament, was approved.

VOLUNTEER PROBATION PROGRAM

For several years now a very successful volunteer probation program has been in operation in major cities across Canada. In Ottawa, the program is under the direction of Judge Thomas Swabey, Chief Criminal Court Judge, Eastern Ontario division. Some adult volunteers work directly with probationers on a one-to-one basis, some work in the courts while others may write pre-sentence reports.

Many teenagers get into trouble with the law because of their friends. They continue to associate with the same people after they appear before the court because they have no other group to relate to. This reinforcement of anti-social behaviour can only lead to additional problems.

A proposal has been put forward to have a carefully screened teenage peer group work with a teenage probationer. We are looking for young people, 18 to 19 years old, although mature 16 and 17 year olds will also be considered. The parents of these young people must know and approve of their involvement, and ideally the parents would also involve themselves to a greater or lesser degree. Officially, the probationer will be on probation to an adult volunteer who works under the direction of a professional probation officer, however he or she will then be encouraged to share in the activities of the peer group. Interestingly, this approach of working with a potential young offender was used, unofficially and on their own initiative, by some members of the Blackburn Youth Council. Applicants will be screened and if accepted, given training for this role.

Dear Sir:

We have your letter dated September 22, 1976 regarding the conversion of oil fired furnaces to gas fuel. In this regard, we offer the following comments particularly as it concerns the deterioration of chimneys.

First, as a matter of routine preventative maintenance, regardless of the fuel used, chimneys should be inspected by an owner annually. Any cracks or loose mortar joints should be promptly sealed to prevent the entry of water into the joints, behind the brick, which might result in spalling or cracking of the brick.

Secondly, when installed by Costain the chimneys are suitable for the fuel used by the furnace when built. Oil fired furnaces produce a hotter, drier exhaust than do gas fired furnaces. When compared with oil, then, the gas furnaces will produce an exhaust which, because it is cooler, contains more moisture. This moisture may condense in a cold masonry chimney, sometimes saturating the brick. Should this occur, the masonry chimney, even with a flue liner quite suitable for the oil burning furnaces, can freeze with attendant spalling and cracking of the masonry.

Fuel suppliers, including Ottawa Gas, are well aware of these characteristics of different fuels. We know that Ottawa Gas has worked hard to test and adjust fuel mixtures to

eliminate or at least minimize the condensation in chimneys. We also understand that when extreme conditions of condensation were discovered and could not be eliminated, Ottawa Gas has installed a metal liner at no cost to the homeowner.

We assure you that the original installations were suitable and appropriate for the fuel used in the furnaces when the house was built by Costain. Whether a liner should be installed in every case of conversion to gas fuel is a debatable question. Certainly, when considerable condensation is evident a liner is essential to prevent damage to the chimney, but this will depend on the siting of the house relative to others, exposure to winds, etc.

Trusting this information may be of some assistance to you.

Reference your letter dated September 22, 1976 regarding the cracks in the chimneys and the installation of class 'B' metal asbestos linings where gas burners have replaced oil burners in Blackburn Hamlet.

Since the start of the conversion of oil-fired furnaces to gas in Blackburn Hamlet during the heating season of 1974-75, Ottawa Gas has been installing an Economite E-20 package conversion unit. Normally this type of unit does not require adjustment as it is set up in the factory. We became aware, however, in the winter of 1975 that flue temperatures in some installations were abnormally low and were causing condensation in the chimney. A random check in Blackburn Hamlet revealed that some of the packaged E-20 conversion units required re-calibration and re-adjustment to overcome this low chimney temperature. In some cases because of chimney height or location, a metal liner was required.

As a result of these early indications, Ottawa Gas undertook to do a complete survey of the installations and adjust the conversion units to the specific installation conditions or remedy the problem by chimney alterations.

The initial survey started in September 1975 had to be stopped in May 1976 due to complaints received from the owners whose homes had been unnecessarily heated up during the warmer weather when we were completing set-ups and inspections. The survey of the conversion of oil to gas burners is now being restarted. To date, we have completed 218 inspections and set-ups and have upgraded the venting of the forced air furnaces and the water heaters. Also, our technicians have completed CO<sub>2</sub> and CO efficiency tests on both appliances.


During the 218 inspections, we completed the lining of six chimneys and repaired two, with the assistance of Costain.

The remaining 198 will be completed this winter and in the case of any types of complaints with regard to chimneys or cracks, would you please have the owners call me at 741-5800, Extension 274, in order that the inspections and set-ups can be completed as soon as possible.

We have contacted D. Morel (Costain) in some instances for assistance with regard to having the chimney inspected in the presence of the owner and Ottawa Gas, and we have been able to satisfy demands towards the repairs of the chimneys.

Hoping this letter will clarify any questions you may have, please do not hesitate to call if you have any further questions.

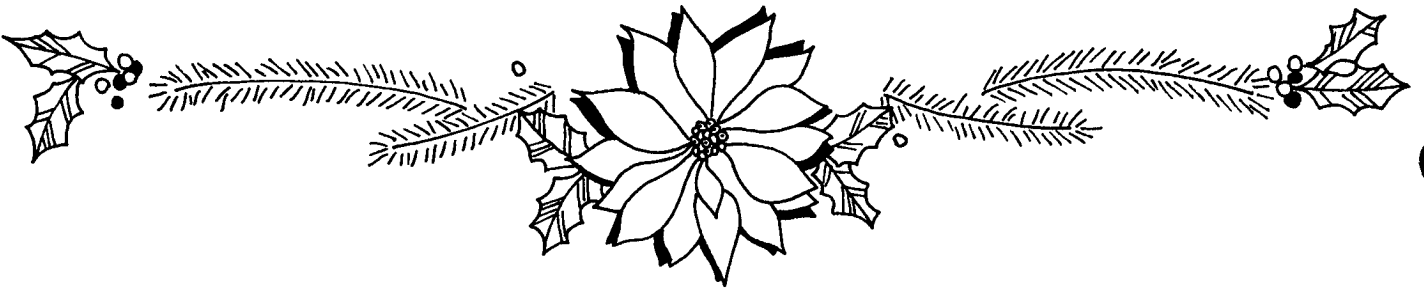

In 1975 the Blackburn Community Association, after receiving numerous inquiries on various aspects of education, directed that an education committee be formed. Peter Sheehan was nominated chairman and was instrumental in the formation of the committee.

The aims of the Committee are twofold. Firstly, to act as a liaison between the community and the six local schools and, secondly, to become an information gathering and dispersal centre for educational matters. One or more members of the Education Committee has been assigned to each school and have met with the principals as a group and in their individual schools to learn about school policy and curricula and to explore ways in which the Community and the schools. Frequent meetings of this type are planned in order to keep up to date.

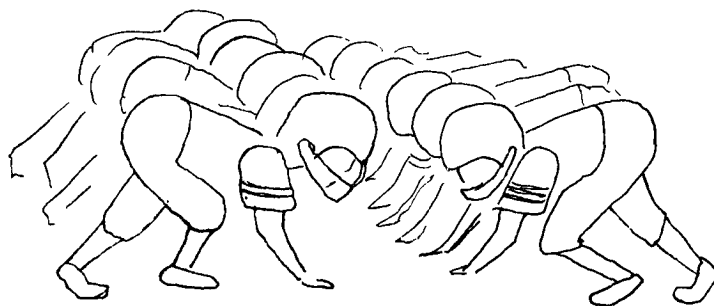
Meeting with Principals:

INCORPORATION

In the 1975-76 executive year an attempt to get the BCA registered with the Province as a Corporation met little success.

However, we are trying again, and everything looks promising. The first step of "name clearance" has just been successfully achieved. This involves a search by the Companies Division of the Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations, Toronto, to ensure that the name Blackburn Community Association does not in any way conflict with the name of another corporation registered in Ontario.

The next step is the formal application for incorporation. We hope this can be made soon and that our application is approved.

The advantages of incorporation are many: especially the fact we become a body legally recognized as such and not just a group of people with no official status. We are perhaps one of the few community associations which will have this privilege.

You may recall that in early 1976 the Carleton Board of Education hesitated to hear our brief, because we were not a legal entity, representing Blackburn Hamlet. To them we were just "a citizen".

## Readers Asks About BYOB

Dear Sirs:

I read Intercom regularly and must admit that it gives good coverage of the events it reports. However, like all journalism Intercom does not follow-up sufficiently on what it once considered news. Here are some examples.

You used a lot of space to write about attempts to create Innes Park Community Association, the ill-fated IPCA. You told us about the plans and the survey that bombed in the spring of 1975. Does this mean that nobody has tried to do anything since? Doesn't anybody care that the facilities we pay so much for are so little used?

Everybody knows that our BYOB parties were unequalled. We had a terrific formula and a great group organizing them. Why can't we pull one off every couple of months? I don't even know if there's one planned for New Year's Eve.

You did a piece about a year ago on a co-op crafts group that a lady in one of the townhouses had joined. Did she or anyone else get one going here? We never heard. And the Photography Club, they appeared to have a well thought out program and keen members. Has any one of them come out of the dark room since the last report in Intercom?

I have some questions about itself. The issue before you started publishing in the Banar, which I admit was a good move, you ran a crossword puzzle. We never saw the solution. I wasted a Sunday afternoon on it. Putting it politely, some of your clues were crummy. I still believe you owe us the answers.

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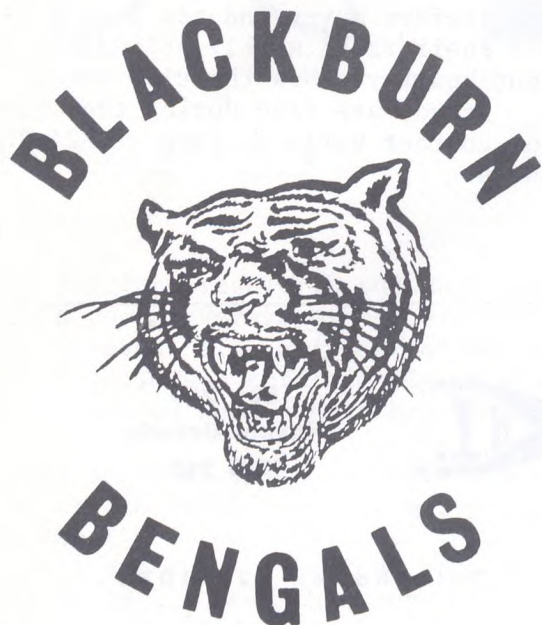

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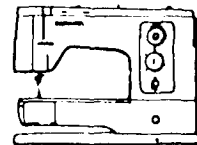
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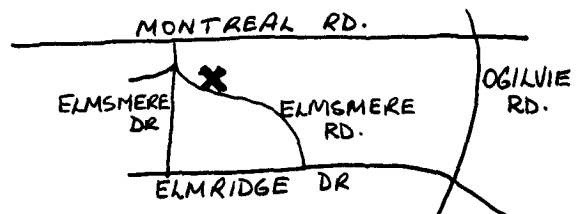
