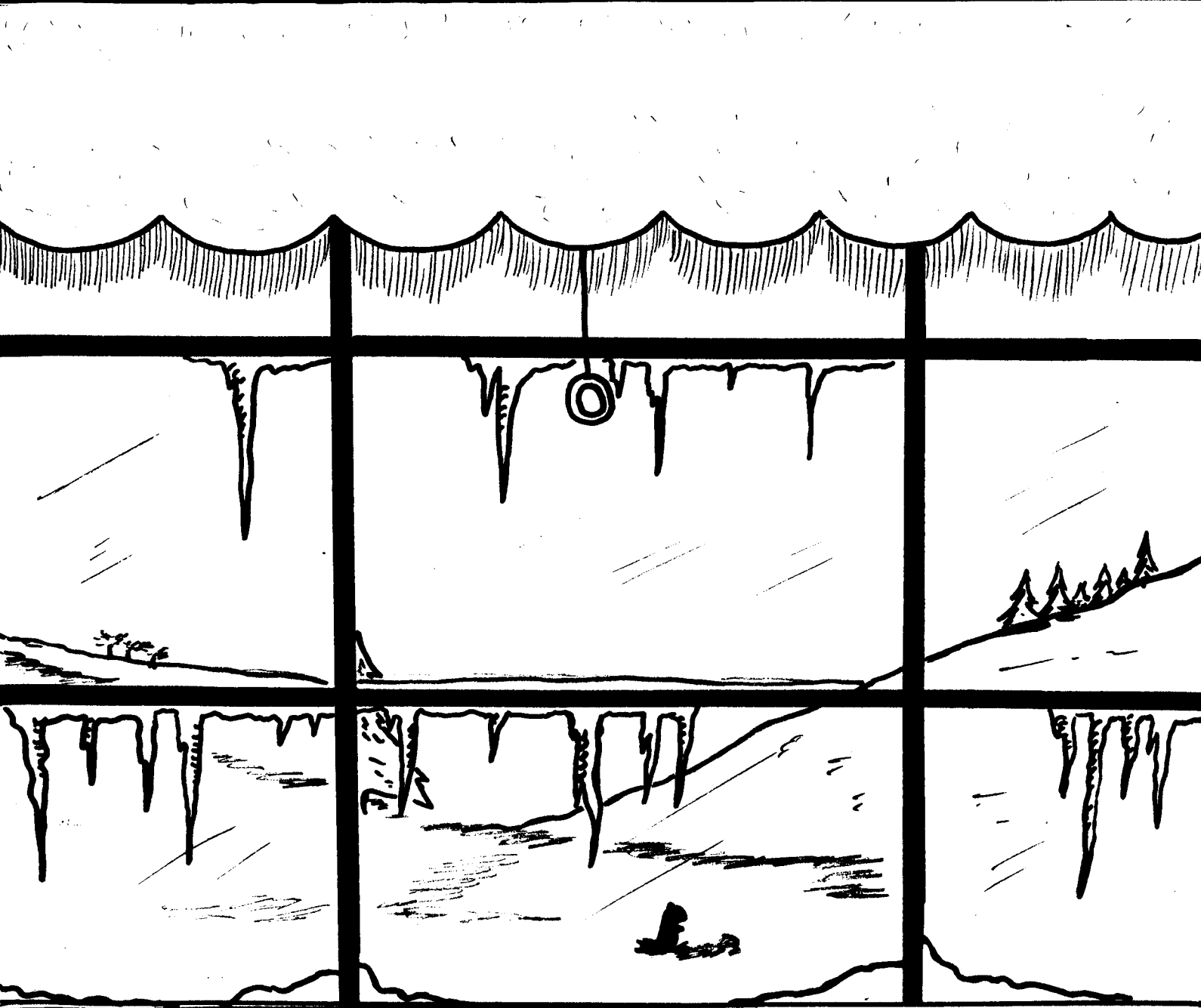



4 BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING

Minutes of the BCA Executive meeting held Feb 1, 1977 at the Rec Centre, 2336 Orient Park Drive.

Committee Reports:

Ad hoc Finance Committee: - Interim procedures to be followed until a new treasurer is appointed were presented. Fran Black is acting as the bookkeeper. Lawrence Zinman is acting as the financial advisor to the committee and will also help close up the 1976 books and set up the 1977 ones.

It was moved by Dick Cottingham, seconded by Evelyn Grover that the report of the committee be approved. Carried.

It was moved by Dick Cottingham, seconded by Terry Goldberger that Mel Stewart be recommended as Treasurer and be put forward for ratification at the next general meeting. Carried.

Maintenance: Eldon Kemp reported that all rinks were in good shape. The dug-out will be built this coming weekend.

Sports: Barry Mehr reported that competitive girl's baseball needs a convenor. Interested persons should contact him immediately.

Education: Heather Umelas reported on the workshop at Algonquin for the education committee. She also gave details of the Education Forum, to be held Feb. 2.

Youth: Terry Goldberger stated that she would like to meet with Paul Dupuis and representatives of the police and youth council. She also stated that the youth council have expressed a wish to be an official part of the BCA.

It was moved by Art Szabo, seconded by Joan Trusdale that Terry Goldberger meet with Gloucester Police and representatives of the school board and youth council to work out appropriate arrangements for the operation of the discos and to report back to the executive. Carried.

It was moved by Terry Goldberger, seconded by Lorrie Saville that an amendment to the constitution be proposed for ratification at a general meeting stating " that the Blackburn Youth Council be a part of the BCA and that the duty of the youth activities chairperson is to be responsible for the operation of the youth council" Carried.

Adult Activities: Dick Cottingham reported that a Monte Carlo night would be held at Glen Gilvie School on March 5, 1977.

Special Projects: Lorrie Saville advised that the Fertilizer Drive is well underway. Sales will start on March 5 and continue for two weeks. Delivery will be done by the Venturers on April 16. There will be a children's play at Emily Carr on April 16 and about 300 are expected.

Transportation: George Bushell stated that we need a representative to sit on the Gloucester Transportation Committee and the Regional Transport Committee.

It was moved by Evelyn Grover, seconded by Joan Trusdale that we ask Chuck Mindach to be the executive representative on the nominating committee Carried.

fulfilling interpersonal relationships, and a greater calmness under pressure.

Researchers are finding TM very useful in institutional settings. The Institute of Living in Hartford, Connecticut, which is the largest private psychiatric hospital in North America, has ongoing TM instruction along with their regular psychotherapeutic programs. Cr. Harold Bloomfield, a Psychiatrist, and author of two best selling books on TM and Psychiatry, has his patients instructed in TM as part of their therapy. According to Dr. Bloomfield, for the majority of persons, "average middle-class neurotics", seeking psychiatric help, psychotherapy has, in general, proved to be only minimally effective. For this reason he says, "the greatest contribution of the TM program to clinical psychiatry may be in helping millions of middle-class neurotics to begin solving their problems and enjoy growing happiness in their lives with little or no professional psychiatric help." Dr. Bloomfield goes on to say, "There are techniques for cooking, gardening, playing tennis, teaching and, perhaps, for every conceivable human activity. In light of the enormous contribution of technology to the comfort and ease of living, it is ironic that a technique for happiness has so long been missing. A growing number of people in the sciences have begun noting that the TM program may be the new technology of happiness."

To describe exactly what Transcendental Meditation is, it might be easier to start by saying what it is not:

- it is not a religion or a religious sect
- it is not exercises or yoga
- it is not concentration or control
- it is not time consuming
- there are no special diets

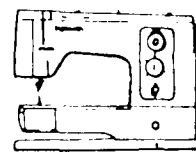

TM is a simple mental technique practised for 15 - 20 minutes in the morning and evening while sitting in a comfortable chair. The technique allows the mental activity to settle down which, in turn, allows the nervous system to gain a deep rest. Heart rate, breath rate, the entire metabolic activity spontaneously quiets down. More recent studies, done on the electrical activity of the brain, show that during TM the brain waves are found to be more synchronized and coherent in their functioning. This may account for why meditators feel more organized and mentally alert during the day.

Here in Blackburn Hamlet the TM program is being offered for the first time. An introductory lecture which will be free of charge will be held at Glen Ogilvie Public School, Tuesday, February 22 in Room 106 at 8:00 pm.
