Do you know your policemen? Do they know you? Would you like the opportunity to casually chat about the community, minor problems, etc?

Well, you may have a chance!

The Police-Community Task Force Committee has asked the BCA to consider whether the idea of a closer working arrangement is possible. Briefly, its this. Three officers per shift are assigned to Blackburn (total of 9). They stay in this area on assignment for up to three years. Instead of doing office work in Lietrim, they could work out of a sub-station in the Hamlet. In essence, they spend all their working time here! Not driving back and forth. Not here today and in another part of the Township tomorrow.

The idea has merit:

- closer personal contact
- a chance to gain the "pulse" of the community
- to solve problems casually
- to aid in preventing a crime
- to show our young that a policeman is a human too!

There are drawbacks:

- remoteness from the authority he works under
- becoming too close to people
- losing objectivity
- sorting out the "personal" from the "professional"

But, your BCA thinks it deserves a try! After all; it may give our boys in blue a chance to get out of that car and walk the sidewalks! It may give our youth the opportunity to know the police by their profession and their humanity, rather than the white car that goes by.

Are you in favour?

BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING

Minutes of the Executive Meeting held March 1st, 1977 at 2336 Orient Park Recreation Centre.

Correspondence

Letter received from John Smith, Minister of Correctional Services regarding the decision to build the Detention Centre. Letter stated that Gloucester Township was agreeable that the new facility be built within it's borders.

Letter from Information Gloucester requesting a donation towards the cost of their operation.

Letter from Pierre Lalonde, Festival of Spring representative requesting that a representative from the BCA attend a March 2 meeting regarding plans for the festival.

Letter from Steven Beshurah, Recreation and Parks regarding the development of Track and Field in Gloucester.

Letter from W. Downton suggesting an official Blackburn coat of arms.

Copy of minutes of Jan 13 Rapid Transit Priority Corridor Study Community Advisor Committee.

Items of Business

Mrs. G. Banbury reported on a proposal put forward by Police Chief K. Duncan at the last Police/Community Committee meeting. The proposal was essentially that a number of precincts be established in communities like Blackburn with permanent staff assigned to the area. It was decided that a letter should be sent to the Chief of Police strongly supporting the idea and that a member of the executive attend the next Police/Community Committee meeting.

Committee Reports

Finance: Because of the lack of interest in the last general meeting, Mel Stewart was not ratified as treasurer. In the absence of a negative vote it was decided to consider Mr. Stewart ratified and is now deemed treasurer of the BCA.

L. Zinman as financial advisor to the Finance Committee explained the Balance Sheet for 1976. The books are now approved for submission to the auditors. A Statement of Operations up to February 25 was submitted. Moved by Barry Mehr, seconded by Peter Sheehan that the statement be approved as read. Carried.

Sports: Barry Mehr moved, seconded by Heather Umelus that as per Pierre Tessier's letter we send \$200 to the Greenbelt Riding Academy as support of their program for disabled children. This grant to be reviewed annually. Carried.

A letter from John Fargey proposed that a coordinator be appointed for canvassing sponsors for Fun Fair, teams, etc. Barry Mehr will arrange a meeting of interested people to discuss further.

Attention: The Editor

Dear Sir;

Blackburb Hamlet was named after Robert Blackburn, MP for Russell county in the late 1800s. The hamlet is over 100 years old and the history of this area is available at the main public library.

The enclosed is an interpretation drawing derived from the discription for the official BLACKBURN coat of arms as registered with the College Of Arms in England. There is one exception being that the original displays a crest of an extended arm cut off at the shoulder holding an exploding bomb, above the helmut.

The colors are red, black, blue and silver/white, however, the Family Coat Of Arms Shop Ltd., 158 Sparks St., K1P5C1, 233-1221 has indicated that the black can be used in lieu of blue, therby matching the red, white and black colors now being used on Blackburn hockey sweaters and crests.

It is proposed that the BCA adopt and register the coat of arms for Blackburn with Ottawa City Hall, with the following changes:

- a. eliminate the crest entirely as it is inappropriate, or insert a new design which would represent the hamlet in some way, such as willow trees, a small brook, some other desireable symbol;
- b. a new motto in Latin to meet Blackburn's desireable or specific goals or ideals, such as "The Winning Spirit" or any other appropriate phrase. Possibly a request in the BANAR for a motto would give residents a chance to introduce their own; and
- c. the blue check pattern be changed to entirely a black pattern, thereby eliminating the blue and matching Blackburn's existing red, white and black colors.

There could be a community project initiated to advertize our community by placing a copy of the new coat of arms on the front of the Blackburn

In association with the coat of arms it is proposed that the Blackburn competative teams be called some appropriate name, such as the Blackburn Barons/ Baronettes, Royals, Knights, Lancers, Crusaders, etc. If there are names such as Rockland Nationals, pembroke Lumberkings, West Ottawa Golden Knights, and Gloucester Rangers, then Blackburn could possess a name affiliated with the coat of arms, rather than by the advertizers.

The above proposal is submitted to assist Blackburn in establishing itself among outside communities as well as to remember the hamlet's heritage and that it is not lost amongst advertizer's nsmes.

It is hoped that the proposals put forth are reviewed and actioned by the BANAR and supported by the Blackburn executive.

One can visualize after acceptance and registration this spring, of new Blackburn stationary, school blazer crests, spot sweaters and new sign at the entrance to Blackburn displaying the Blackburn coat of arms.

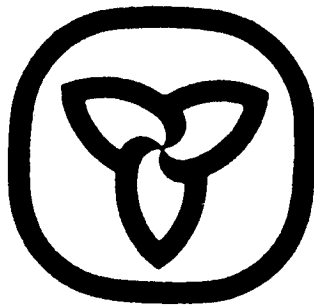

- EMPLOYMENT:** The Ottawa Adult Probation Office operates an Employment Pool that assists ex-offenders with their own rehabilitation by helping them to find and maintain suitable employment. We are looking for volunteers to get involved in this project.

Now that Spring thaws may occur at any time, proper homeowner maintenance regarding the roof of your home is very important. The problem of roof leaks may arise when the melting snow forms "ice dams" that cause the water to back up under the shingles.

The most critical areas are at the gutters and the valleys of the roof. The ice and snow should be cleaned off at these areas in order to prevent any damage during the freeze and thaw cycle. However, the homeowner must use extreme caution to avoid damaging the shingles during the removal of the snow and ice. We suggest that you contact a local teenager who for a few dollars may be interested in tackling the job.

A more permanent solution and less work is a lead covered heating cable fastened in a zig-zag pattern along the lower edge of the roof or in the valleys. Correct placement of this cable ensures proper drainage. If you have a gutter, the cable should be laid along it and down the drain spout. This heating coil can be purchased at any large building supply store or general merchandise franchise outlet.

WHY SHOULD WE HAVE BLOCK PARENTS?

If a child is in need of help and away from their immediate home area, he or she knows that there is a Block Parent Home nearby to provide refuge. The program is designed to reduce the number of child molestations and other problems and to assist the Police.

WHO CAN BECOME A BLOCK PARENT?

Anyone over the age of 16 can apply to become a Block Parent whether married, single, working or a senior citizen. All Block Parents must be approved by the Police Department.

HOW MUCH WORK IS INVOLVED?

A Block Parent Sign is displayed in a window visible to the street only when it is convenient to the Block Parent. If being disturbed by a child would be inconvenient (ie.-resting, ill) the Block Parent sign is removed.

HOW OFTEN ARE BLOCK PARENT HOMES USED?

In the first year of operation in Gloucester Township, Block Parent Homes have been used about a dozen times. With more Block Parents in Gloucester it is hoped to reduce these incidents even further - the molesters, bullies, etc. will realize we care about our children and are on the alert.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Become a Block Parent. Instruction Sheets are given to each approved applicant so a Block Parent will know exactly what to do should their Block Parent Home be used. Remember to take down the Block Parent Sign when unavailable.

MARCH IS SWIM A THON MONTH !

During the month of March, swimmers of the Gloucester Swim Club will canvas every house in Blackburn Hamlet and the rest of Gloucester Township for the support of their community for their competitive swimming program. The swimmers will be asking for pledges of a few cents per length for the endurance swim they will make on Sunday, March 27th. On that day, they will each swim 200 lengths of a 25 metre pool, (that works out to about 3 miles) in a period of 2 hours or less.

It's a swim which most of the members of the Club will easily complete. In fact, any average 9 or 10 year old with some competitive swim training will easily meet this standard and will, at the same time, demonstrate the exceptional physical fitness and strong heart lung capacity of the youngsters who participate in the Canadian competitive swim program.

The annual Swim A Thon is designed to raise the funds needed to operate the program of the Clubs. It is a nationwide campaign conducted in each locality by the local swim club. Most of the money raised is kept by the local club to support its own program. The cost of running such competitive swim clubs as the Gloucester Club is very high. Rental of pools, coaching salaries, travel expenses of the swimmers travelling to out of town meets administrative costs, etc., all add up to a sizeable annual budget. A small portion of the money that is collected is passed on to the provincial and national swimming associations to support the development of strong Canadian teams for international competition.

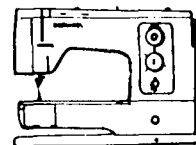

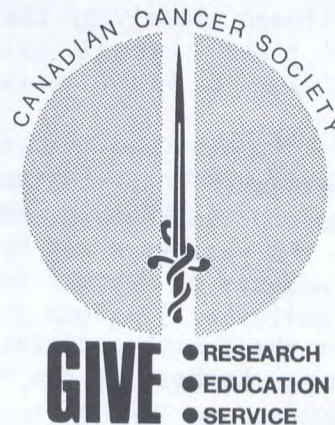
