POSITIONS OF THE BCA EXECUTIVE - SUMMARY STATEMENT OF DUTIES

- PRESIDENT: The chief executive officer of the association who presides at all meetings and is chairperson of the executive. Co-ordinates the activities of the various committees and sees that they function; is the chief spokesman for the association; is also recommended for appointment to the Blackburn Hamlet Community Recreation Centre Committee.
- 1ST VICE-PRESIDENT: Assists the president in carrying out the latter's duties and substitutes for the President in the event of the latter's absence; assists in the functioning of committees as required.
- 2ND VICE-PRESIDENT: Assists the President in carrying out the latter's duties and assists in the functioning of committees as required; is also responsible for the booking of the schools for community activities and co-ordinating the community use of schools.
- TREASURER: Is responsible for the financial operations of the Association carrying out the normal banking operations of the Association and keeping the financial books of the Association; prepares monthly financial reports for the Executive and quarterly reports for the Association.
- SECRETARY: Records the minutes of the Executive and General meetings of the Association.
- ADULT ACTIVITIES: Organizes and co-ordinates entertainment and social functions for the Association. This usually involves planning and co-ordinating three to four social functions a year. The bulk of the work for these functions is usually delegated.
- CIVIC AFFAIRS: Represents the Blackburn area at all levels of government and before any agent or board of government in such matters involving inter-community activities and is concerned with those matters affecting the general well-being of the Blackburn area which do not fall within the terms of reference of any other standing committee of the Association.
- MAINTENANCE: Maintains the facilities of the Association. This involves the maintenance of the outdoor ice rinks and ball diamonds that are the responsibility of the Association. It involves the hiring of persons to perform these tasks and co-ordinating their activities.
- MEMBERSHIP: Organizes the annual membership canvass and keeps the membership list of the Association up to date.
- PUBLICITY: Is the Editor and publisher of the Banar.
- SPORTS: Organizes and administers such sports and athletic activities as required by the Association. This involves securing the necessary leadership for the various activities and chairing meetings of the Sports Committee; is also recommended for appointment to the Blackburn Hamlet Community Recreation Centre Committee.
- WAYS & MEANS/SPECIAL PROJECTS: Promotes and carries out programmes for the raising of funds for the Association.
- TRANSPORTATION: Deals with all matters relating to public transportation affecting the residents of the Blackburn area.

**YOUTH ACTIVITIES:** Co-ordinates activities which are of need and of interest to the youth of the Blackburn area and acts as a liason with the Executive for the following: Cubs, Scouts, Venturers (Group Committee), Brownies and Guides and Rangers; co-ordinates the Summer Day Camp.

**EDUCATION:** Acts as a liason between the community and the School Boards reporting on items of concern and interest in education.

**FUN FAIR:** Organizes and co-ordinates the annual Fun Fair.

Essentially the responsibilities of these positions are to act as a co-ordinator in carrying out the various programmes and activities of the association. The Executive member co-ordinates groups of volunteers who organize the programmes.


Dear Sir:

Dear Sir:

I have for reply yours of March 9, 1977. I would first like to thank you and your Association for your support of a proposal which I hope will come into reality within the next year or so.

As you can see, a lot of time and a lot of thought has gone into the future policing of this Municipality. A lot of ground work, if not all, has already been completed. The concept of 'team policing' is no more or no less than each community having its own small Police Force, where people of each community and the police officers in that community grow together at the same pace. In this way, officers will know their people and the people will know their officers and if they work together, how can anybody lose?

The team officers assigned to each community will be 'generalists' and will be responsible for all policing in that community - school patrols, community work, plus regular police work, of course. They will not establish policies, nor will they be Police Administrators as such. All administrative policy decisions and support services will originate as they do now.

To answer your specific questions:

(1) Will this mean an increase in overall police strength? My answer is "No". We have now grown with the community to the size where manpower and equipment is compatible with this new form of policing.


(2) Is the co-ordination capability of the police such that their efficiency will not be lessened by this dispersion? My answer, as I see it, the co-ordination capability is no problem and if the citizens and the police team work together, our co-ordination efficiency will be greatly increased.

(3) What are the increased costs associated with this program? My answer is "None". If everyone involved and in particular the citizens work with their police officers in this concept, the overall costs will decrease.

At this point in time, I would like to thank you for your offer of assistance. I am a strong believer in planting seeds and letting them germinate and grow and I am sure that if your Executive and members of your community are aware of the contents of this letter and discuss it over the next several months, you will appreciate how important this could be to your community.

CIVIC AFFAIRS - TRANSPORTATION

As Mr. Claude Goldberger has resigned as Chairman of the Civic Affairs Committee (because of other commitments) I was asked by the Executive of the Blackburn Community Association to act for both Civic Affairs and Transportation until the end of this term of office. I have accepted but would appreciate hearing from anyone who would like to serve on these committees - to meet with OC Transpo re buses, to attend some council meetings, to study the reconstruction of Innis Road if the Region decides to approve the Innis Road Feasibility Study this year, etc. Just give me a call.

- 1) Innis Road Feasibility Study - This year's budget of the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton contains the Innis Road Feasibility study. If the budget is approved, (and this should be known by the time this article reaches you), I have asked Township Council to recommend to the Region that a Community Advisory Committee be formed to work with the Regional Study Team from the very beginning. Township Planning Board has already recommended that communities affected by the Study be involved. Hopefully this will occur.
- 2) Construction and Realignment of Bearbrook South of Innis - The Township has informed me that construction and realignment of Bearbrook Road south of Innis Road should begin sometime in late spring or early summer. The road should be completed by mid-summer, at least as far as the arena. The access to and the parking lot of the arena will be paved at the same time. Eventually this road will be extended to meet Glen Park Drive.
- 3) Shopping Centre - It appears that construction of the shopping centre will commence this summer with opening planned for early December. This is contingent on construction and realignment of the road to at least the arena. See Harry King's article in this issue for further details.
- 4) OC Transpo -
  - summer schedule will mean a slight reduction in service.
  - a shelter will be constructed at Bearbrook Rd. and Montreal Rd. this summer.
  - a shelter has been requested for Innis Rd. and Bearbrook Rd. but because of budget constraints will not be built until next year.
  - extension of service to Hull has been delayed until more Government Departments move across the river.
  - Plans for this year call for the construction of a bus stopping bay on the Queensway at Alta Vista. In addition, service would be improved on Riverside Dr. and River Road. Consequently, Blackburn, Orleans, Beacon Hill, and Pineview service to Confederation Heights, Billings Bridge, Riverside Hospital, Ottawa Train Station, Eastview, Sussex Drive and Ottawa General Hospital would be improved.
- 5) Combination of Civic Affairs and Transportation Committees  
 The Executive of the B.C.A. has passed a motion recommending that the next general meeting of the B.C.A. consider combining these two committees because of the overlap of their areas of responsibility.

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PUBLIC SPEAKING CONTEST

On the morning of March 25th, Emily Carr Middle School held it's annual public speaking contest with Mr. Beech, Principal of Blackburn Public School, Mr. Cliff, Principal of Kars Public School and Mrs. Smith, Vice-Principal of Crystal Bay Public School as judges. Of the sixteen contestants from the school's four houses the winners were Blair McSheffrey and Sandra Tih in the Junior Division and Karen Douglas and Janet Eastwood in the Senior Division.

Blair McSheffrey's interesting and descriptive speech centred on the many attractions of Walt Disney World, Florida. The huge amusement park includes Frontierland, displaying pioneer life; Adventureland enacting African life in the early twentieth century; Tomorrowland, demonstrating the space-age conditions supposedly in store for mankind in future years; Fantasyland exhibiting story-book characters and places and a huge shopping centre providing products selected from nations around the world. Blair thinks this multi-million dollar project is an attraction for people of all ages.

Karen Douglas' very humorous speech told of an eventful day of downhill skiing with her family. Relating all the trouble her mother experienced in learning to ski, she entertained the audience delightfully. She also explained how her family likes to do many other things together the year round.

Ena Dhamija, though not a winner, brought the house down as she spoke on women's rights, claiming that society, up until just recently, has been educated to believe that women are inferior to men (cheers from the boys, boos from the girls). 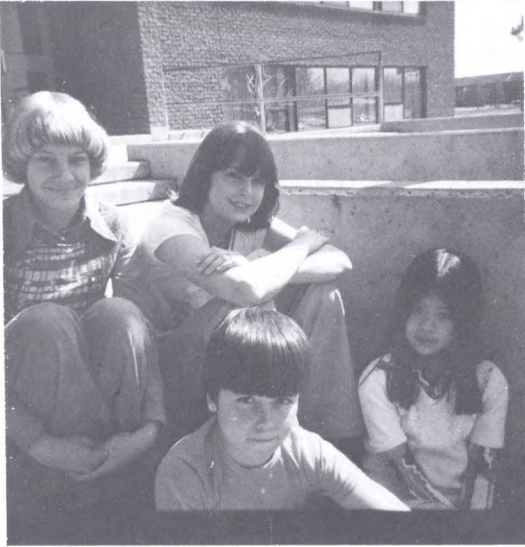
A lingering death makes other people suffer besides the patient. The patient's family suffers also. They cannot stand by and watch part of their family deteriorate and just lie there in bed and die.

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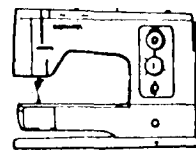
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BLACKBURN HAMLET COMMUNITY

To bring you and our community up to date on the shopping plaza you should first know that the delay has been in part due to the problems in acquiring the land to extend Glen Park Drive from Innes Road to the arena.

This road is required in order that the shopping plaza may have an entrance from Innes Road as well as Glen Park Drive. All indications now are that the Township have acquired this land and although Glen Park Drive may not be connected this year to the existing Glen Park Drive it will be built from Innes Road to the arena this year.

Other problems with the start of the shopping plaza have been to secure a main food store as the key tenant and at the time of writing this letter it has been done in principal.

If all goes well the shopping plaza will be open before Christmas of this year but the cost per square footage for leasing the space has not been determined by the developer at this time.

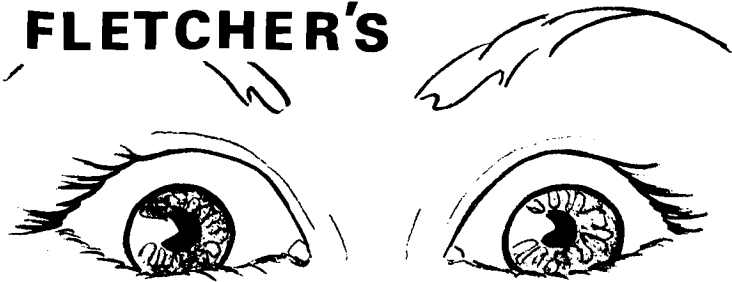

DID-JA REMOVE YOUR SIGN?

Children trust you - don't let them down by displaying your Block Parent Sign when you aren't available! To ensure proper use of the Block Parent Sign, spot checks will be carried out in future.

ASSISTANCE!

Follow your Instruction Sheet ... main points are as follows:-

Molestation or Indecent Exposure - attempt to get a description of the stranger or his car. Immediately, call the Police Department and keep the child with you. DO NOT question the child at length.

Bullying - try to break it up. Call the Police if it continues.

CARPET MAINTENANCE

You can contribute greatly to your carpet's performance, protect your investment, and prolong the life of your carpet by following the simple maintenance procedures.

Establish a regular vacuuming schedule to suit your family's living habits, the colour and fabric you selected, and the amount of traffic and the pattern of traffic in your home.

Bright and light colours tend to show soil more readily than tweeds and will require more attention. Plush carpets show pile disturbance more readily than low, level-loop constructions. Shags tend to hide soil and dirt; however, vacuuming and raking are needed to maintain the tumbled shag texture. You can expect to vacuum rooms like the family room, Vestibule, or hallway more frequently than others due to the amount of traffic exposure.

Vacuum lightly each day to maintain the brightness and texture of the pile and to remove surface soil and dirt.

At least once a week (more frequently in heavy-traffic areas), give your carpet a thorough vacuuming. If particles of soil and dirt become embedded in the pile, your carpet will lose its bright appearance. The friction of embedded particles against the sides of the fibre may cause the fibre to split and break.

Use the proper equipment for cleaning your carpet. Although an inexpensive carpet sweeper will remove surface dirt, it will not effectively remove dirt that is embedded in the pile. Generally, the upright beater-bar sweeper will do the best job because it combines strong suction and a revolving brush that loosens embedded particles without snagging the pile. Be sure to adjust the height of the brush so as to avoid excessive abrasion.

SPILLS ON CARPETS

Always take immediate action so that spills do not become spots or stains. Almost all spills can be satisfactorily removed if given immediate and appropriate attention.

Liquids: Absorb as much liquid as possible by blotting (never rubbing) with a clean, absorbent material like a tissue, paper towel, or sponge.

Pastes: Remove excess by scraping carefully, working from the edge of the spill to the center to prevent spreading.

Powders: Remove by vacuuming; do not moisten.

Always blot or gently scrape up as much of the substance as possible before it soaks into the carpet.

If you know what a spot is, use a carpet shampoo solution on water-soluble spots such as soft drinks and candy. Use cleaning fluid for solvent-soluble spots such as grease and tar.

Always test shampoos and cleaning fluids on inconspicuous areas of your carpet before applying them to the spot itself. Apply a few drops of the solution to each colour in the carpet, then hold a white tissue against the area for ten seconds. Examine the tissue for dye transfer, then allow the carpet to dry, and examine it for colour change. Some cleaning solutions fade or change the colour of certain carpet dyes and make the spot even more unsightly.

If you don't know what the substance is, first try a liquid carpet shampoo (dilute according to directions on the container). Do not use a liquid household detergent or soap. These will leave a sticky residue that will cause resoiling and may damage the fibre.

This is a Co-operative Nursery School run and supported by the parent body. Each member family shares the responsibility of duty days (approximately once every 6-8 weeks). In addition every family will help in the maintenance and construction of the School and serve on one other committee.

The General Registration Day is Saturday, April 30th at the Pre-School from 9.00 a.m. to 1.00 p.m. This Registration Day is for families who are not present members of the Pre-School. This is a first come, first served basis.

The children must be 3 years old as of December 31, 1977 in order to be enrolled in the 2 or 3 half day program. Children must be 4 years of age as of December 31, 1977 in order to be enrolled in the 5 half day program.

Families interested must first observe the program of their choice and have the Registration form signed by the Director of that program. Appointments for observation may be made by phoning Nancy Clark at 824-3973.

The proposed fee schedule for 1977 and 1978 is as follows:

- 2 half days - \$21.00 a month
- 3 half days - \$31.50 a month
- 5 half days - \$52.50 a month.

If shampoo doesn't work, allow the area to dry and try a dry-cleaning fluid such as trichloroethylene. Never use carbon tetrachloride, gasoline or lighter fluid. Be sure to follow directions on the label regarding adequate ventilation.

Never apply shampoo or cleaning fluid directly onto the carpet. This will over-wet the carpet and cause a "ring", or it may drive the stain down to the backing. Instead, apply the cleaning agent to a clean, white absorbent cloth and lift the spot with a twisting motion, taking care not to spread the spot. Frequently refold the cloth to present a new clean area. Dry the area by placing a pad of tissues (about half inch thick) on the wet spot under a weight for several hours.

Always avoid overwetting the carpet or allowing dry-cleaning fluid to contact foam-rubber backings and padding.

If the area where the spot was removed appears lighter and brighter than the surrounding carpet, the entire area should be cleaned.

If neither shampoo nor dry-cleaning fluid will work, try one of the commercial spot-removal kits or contact a professional cleaner.

Once the stain is removed, allow the area to dry completely, then brush the pile gently and vacuum it thoroughly.
