

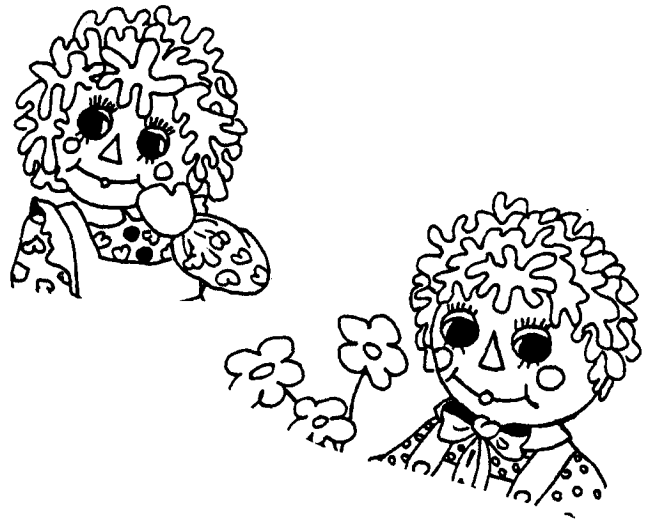

LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL

By delivery date of this issue of the BANAR the baseball program will be down to the playoff stage. Enrollment in baseball this year was the highest ever with over 260 playing in the various age/skill levels. As a rule of thumb one adult is involved as a manager, coach, umpire, etc. for every four children. It should be gratifying to residents of our community to know that with very little persuasion we were able to acquire all the help necessary to carry out this program. For those who help, the real satisfaction comes from knowing they are making a contribution to the well-being of the community and the development of our children, but it is also important to publicly acknowledge their effort and this publication is the best way of doing that. A lot of readers have some knowledge of Little League, its organization and objectives. In this regard you may be interested in the following excerpt from LITTLE LEAGUER, the headquarters newsletter to local Little League Presidents.

"Paramount Studios recently announced the sequel to the production of The Bad News Bears, The Bad News Bears in Breaking Training. This is yet another example of adults using young children to add to the decadence of a society of fast declining moral and ethical values. In both pictures, Paramount uses Little League as a backdrop without making direct references to our program. The actors are of Little League age and the fields of Little League specification.

Recently, the movie studio requested use of the Sharpstown Little League field in Houston for the filming of a portion of the movie. Permission was granted by a city official, and the result was a public outcry by Little League parents. As a result, permission to use the Little League facility was withdrawn.

Paramount Studios contacted the World Champion Cincinnati Reds and asked for

ten players to include superstars Joe Morgan, Pete Rose, and Jonny Bench. After the script had been reviewed, front office officials of the Cincinnati Reds refused to grant permission for the players to appear in the film and stated that they would not permit their players to use the same vulgarities in Riverfont Stadium as children will be using in the movie. A tip of the hat to the Cincinnati front office!

It is imperative that we do not abrogate the responsibility for our children's well-being or become cynical about their value formation."

In addition to our Little League program some may have an interest in watching more competitive baseball. Gloucester has a Mickey Mantle team (ages 15 and 16) which plays home games on Wednesday evenings at Trillium Field behind Earl Armstrong Arena. Gloucester Soccer

Pearbrook Road Soccer Fields - STAT'S Report

The game of "soccer" has grown dramatically in Canada in recent years. Evidence of this growth may be found locally and throughout the Township. In 1976, there were about 550 boys registered with the Gloucester Soccer Association's 28 house league and 10 representative/competitive teams. This year there are 750 boys playing on 43 house league and 10 representative teams. Fully one third of these players come from the "Hamlet". It is now possible for a youngster to begin his soccer career at the age of 7 and continue to play on Township teams into his adult years.

This growth has come about in spite of what can best be described as inadequate playing facilities. In an article which appeared in the CAAR last year, it was reported that the Township was developing 2 small and 4 full sized soccer fields on VCC property off Pearbrook Road opposite the Francon Quarry. It was believed at that time that these fields would be available for use this year. Unfortunately, such is not the case. Gloucester Soccer and Township officials inspected these fields in the latter part of April and it was agreed that the grass needed another full season to "root" properly. To use the fields this summer would be to risk damaging them severely.

This has resulted in our having to place a number of would be soccer players on waiting lists this year. If your boy is not able to play this summer, or if you are not satisfied with the present facilities, we would ask you to be patient a little longer as we are hopeful that the Pearbrook fields will solve many of our problems when they come "on stream". In the meantime, we ask the cooperation of everyone living in the area to stay off the fields as much as possible. Bicycles and more particularly motorcycles can do more damage to a new field in 20 minutes than 50 soccer teams in a full season.

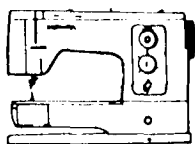

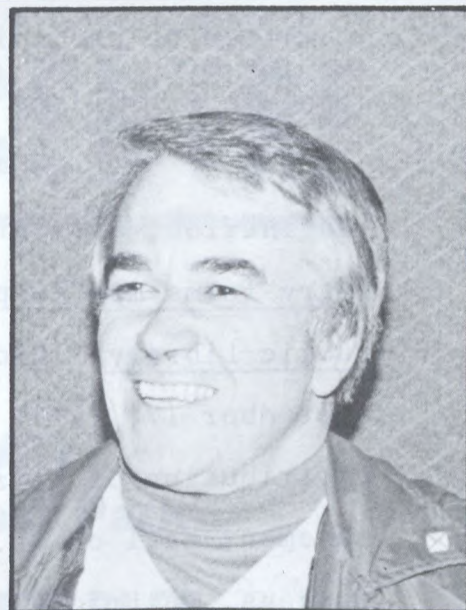
On June 23 Mr. Molloy's Grade 4 class and Mrs. Argue's Grade 3 class are going to Upper Canada Village. There they will learn many things.

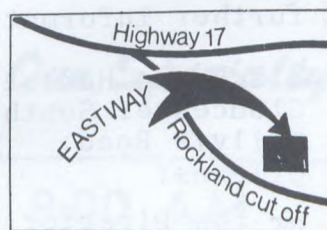

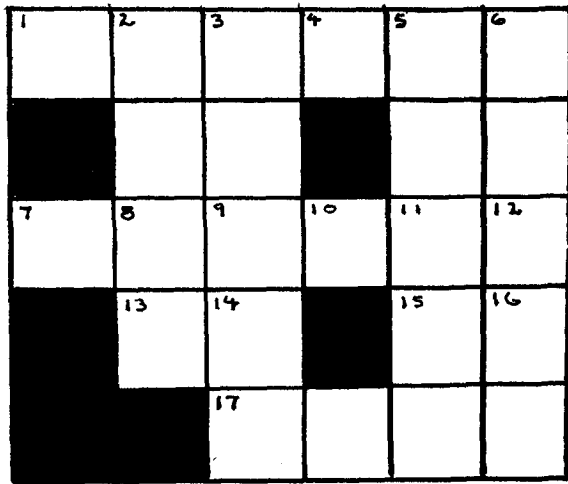

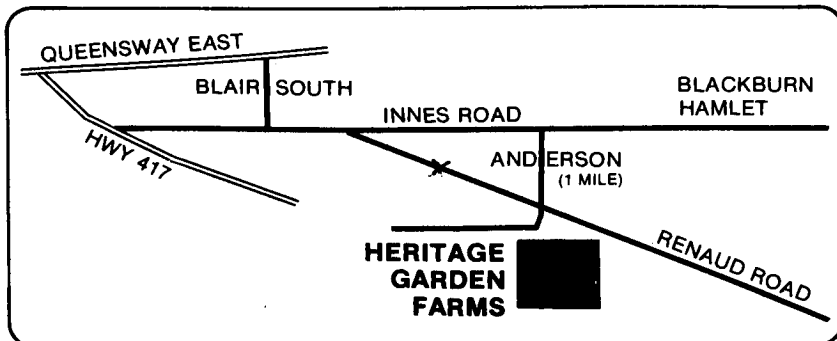

DESCRIPTION

The Detached Worker Program is an intensive long-term program for children (ages 8 to 15) and their families requiring on-site intervention when maladaptive acts are occurring. Children and their parents are constantly confronted with the natural consequences of their behaviour. In addition, Detached Workers manipulate events in the child's environment to produce heightened consequences to deviant behaviour so that it becomes highly negative for the child to continue his behaviour. At the same time a socially acceptable course of action is offered and when the child takes it, he is rewarded in order that it becomes a pleasant event. Each child is also taught to positively cope with his environment by learning new social skills and by developing alternative ways to achieve his/her goals. A Detached Worker also intervenes in the child's family - teaching child-rearing skills to the parents as well as developing positive child-parent relationships.

A full-time Detached Worker has a caseload of five units - a unit being one child, siblings or a small natural group. Caseloads remain small because of the nature of the clientele and the intensity of involvement. With reference to the latter, Detached Workers become intimately involved in all aspects of the child's environment - his family, school, peer group, local store owners, and so on. A worker, who is on call 24 hours a day, would spend an average of 18 months to 2 years intimately involved with each client. Detached Worker Program clientele come from families lacking in adequate strengths and are in need of constant support and counselling. Their children are chronically acting out in the community, that is, involved in constant disruptive and deviant behaviour in their homes, schools, and local environment. In order to bring the child under control and bring permanent attitudinal change, a worker must spend a large amount of time with them and in their milieu.

Referrals are made by the Police, Courts, Probation Officers, parents, teachers, and such agencies as the Children's Aid Society, the Family Service Centre, the Royal Ottawa Hospital, Children's Hospital and so on.

HOMEOWNER TIPS

Now that summer has arrived, the homeowner can experience real problems with excessive humidity and condensation in the home but particularly in the basement area. Condensation becomes a problem with water pipes and toilet tanks.

Must-smelling basements are caused by warm moist air coming into contact with cold concrete walls which creates damage to floors and damage to basement contents.

We recommend that basement windows be closed on hot humid days but open for ventilation during clear and cooler days. This ventilation control can do much to minimize the problem.

The best solution, however, is the acquisition of a dehumidifier to be placed in your basement. This investment will pay dividends by keeping your basement and contents dry and comfortable.

Other solutions to annoying problems of sweating pipes and toilet tanks are as follows:

- for pipes, wrap with insulation wrap available at your local building supply dealer.
- for toilet tanks a styrofoam liner may be installed in the tank; this liner is available at most plumbing supply stores.

The above suggestions will do much to lessen the discomforts of hot humid Ottawa summers.

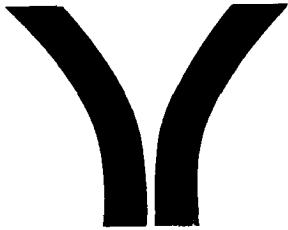
