Since taking over as Editor of the BANAR in June, I have become aware of a growing criticism of our community newspaper. Several people have approached me and voiced a concern that the BANAR has become far more commercial than in its formative years. In answer to these people I would like to make several points.

The BANAR was established several years ago. Its aim was threefold: First, to inform the residents of the Blackburn Hamlet area of the local news and events; second, to publish the minutes of the BCA executive and general meetings; and third, to carry reports from various convenors on the BCA. These three aims are still the main purposes of the BANAR. But, in the last few years the cost of publishing the BANAR has increased, largely due to higher printing costs. This means that the BANAR loses money almost every month and these losses must be covered from general BCA funds. To offset these higher costs we are attempting to find a cheaper printing method.

The commercial enterprises that advertise in the BANAR are either local business or ones which provide a service not found here in Blackburn. We would hope that by carrying their ads we are encouraging you to make purchases from these businesses since they are also the ones who help support out sports teams and local events. Local businesses also help reduce the property tax burden. We endeavor not to carry more than two ads for any one service and are always searching for new businesses in the area in whose services you might be interested.

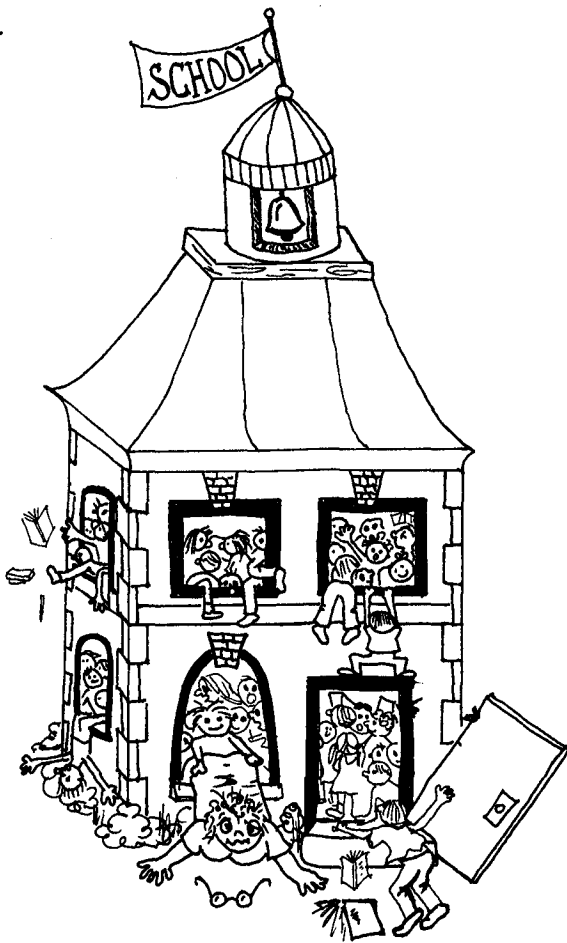

CIVIC AFFAIRSNew Lights at Innes and Cyrville Roads

You may have noticed that westbound traffic on Innes Road during the morning rush hour was very slow during the first part of September. In fact, on one or two mornings it was stop and go from Tauvette Street through to Cryville Road. There were two major reasons for the delay: 1) the timing on the new lights at Cyrville and Innes Roads did not allow enough time for through traffic on Innes, and 2) there is no right-turn lane for west bound traffic turning onto Cyrville Road. Both of these problems were brought to the attention of the Regional Government. Subsequently, region changed the timing on the lights which has alleviated much of the delay at Cyrville Road. However, I am still requesting that they provide a right turn lane.

Gloucester Township

I presented a number of issues to Gloucester Council at their September 21st meeting:

- a) Sidewalks: Council passed a resolution for the construction of asphalt sidewalks along the north side of Innes between Eastpark Drive and a point east of Cleroux. Some sidewalks will also be built between Red Maple Crescent and Innes Road. Total cost is estimated at \$31,000. I reminded Council that we also need sidewalks on the south side of Innes Road and slong Navan Road, especially now that some pedestrian crossing lights may be installed. Council informed me that they might be able to build some short portions on the south side of Innes Road this fall in the areas of proposed crossing walks.
- b) Some residents of Cleroux Street approached me regarding the placement of speed limit signs on their street in the hope of reducing traffic to a safe speed. I asked council to place such signs on Cleroux, however, to have any street posted to 40 km/hr (25 mph) requires a Township Bylaw. Township no longer posts residential streets to 50 km/hr (30 mph) as provincial law states that all residential streets are that unless otherwise posted. Consequently, I am hoping to have a bylaw introduced soon requesting that Cleroux be posted to 40 km/hr.
- c) A group of residents on Glen Park Drive signed a petition requesting that the large radio-controlled model airplanes be banned from Tauvette Park. Noise, danger to traffic on Innes and to children

playing in the park were cited. The BCA administers Tauvette Park although Gloucester Township leases the land from the NCC for us. Discussion with NCC officials revealed that the flying of model planes in this park violates the terms of the lease. These points were raised with Council and they are going to investigate our lease further and attempt to resolve the problem. The NCC does allow the large radio-controlled model airplanes to be flown on their property at the end of Doman Ridge Road (east of Anderson Road).

- d) A request was made to have a street sign posted at the corner of Innes and Navan Roads. Township is going to contact the Regional Roads Department and attempt to have this done.
- e) A bylaw was passed to execute an agreement for the extension of Glen Park Drive. Again, Council was asked to estimate the construction of the road into the arena would commence and again I was told that they were hopeful that it would begin soon.

Bicycle Right of Ways

Some people in the Hamlet would like to be able to cycle to work using Innes and Bearbrooke Roads. Others want to use Innes Road to cycle to their Garden Plots on Anderson Road. Also students would like to take their bicycles to Gloucester High on occasion. But all of these people want to use our two Regional Roads without the fear of being hit by vehicular traffic. Neither do they want to impede the flow of automobiles. Consequently, they have requested that bicycle paths be build along Innes and Bearbrook Roads, or at least that the shoulders of these two roads be paved. If you are intersted in this issue, please give Fred Chandler a call at 824-2286 and give him your name. This information will be useful when presenting a request to Regional Government.

We wish to reply to your editorial (article) in the September BANAR -- "Is it safe for a twelve year old to play in Bearbrook Park?"

We were playground supervisors in Bearbrook Park this summer during the period June 20th to September 4th, and one of us was on duty seven days per week between the hours of 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. We can certify that to our knowledge there was absolutely no terrorizing, harassment, threats or assaults of any kind to any child during our supervision. Furthermore, there were no complaints received by us from any parent, policeman, or other responsible person that any such actions occurred.

To answer your specific question, indeed it was safe for a twelve year old, or any younger child, to play in Bearbrook Park during our stewardship.

In sum, we believe we performed our supervisory duties in a highly exemplary manner and made many new friends in doing so. We deeply resent the implications carried in your editorial that such a shocking state of affairs existed in Bearbrook Park, as we know it to be untrue during our period of supervision.

BLACKBURN MINOR HOCKEY

Another enjoyable hockey season is under-way for about 430 Blackburn boys and young men. More than 100 are participating in the Saturday morning school development program, approximately 35 are playing on Gloucester Ranger Representative teams and 295 boys play on 18 teams in Gloucester hockey leagues.

The objectives of the program for the boys are - fun, development of hockey skills and the opportunity to grow as individuals in team situations. Leagues and programs have been developed to allow the boys to participate at their proper level of skill development.

This year Gloucester hockey leagues will operate at 4 levels, Greenbelt, Valley, Forest and Meadow in the atom, peewee and bantam divisions. There will also be a novice league, two midget leagues, a juvenile league and a new junior league. Evaluating and sorting out the boys according to skills is a complex job which began in mid-September. Minor adjustments may still occur until the end of November as the team coaches get to know the boys and their skills.

Our hockey school program began October 15th at Blackburn Arena. The boys, from 6 to 10 years of age, have been divided into 3 groups and each group receives 1 hour of instruction on-ice almost every Saturday morning from now until mid-March. We also hope that boys who have been in the school program for 2 or more years will have the opportunity to play in a league formed among Gloucester Recreation Area school programs.

Heather Umelas reported good support for the seminars.

Constitutional Committee

Mike Roche reported that the review of the constitution is in progress and that the consolidated constitution will be presented at the next executive meeting.

The president declared the meeting adjourned.

(The next BCA executive meeting will be held at Glen Ogilvie School at 7:30 p.m. on November 1, 1977.)

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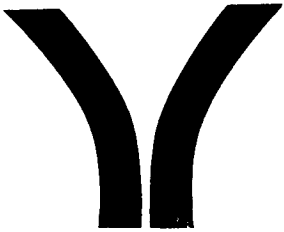

Eyecatching headlines about someplace far away? Or is it possible these descriptive phrases could someday pertain to our own backyard?

A decent-to-live-in, law abiding community doesn't just happen. It takes work and dedication by concerned citizens who are prepared to do more than just pay taxes in order for their elected representatives to provide sports and recreational facilities, street lights and paved roads.

One such group of community-minded citizens meet with Chief Duncan of the Gloucester Police Department and some members of his force on the third Tuesday evening of each month.

We - you and I - the Blackburn Community - should be represented at that gathering! How about you? Do you want to assist other concerned citizens of Gloucester Township in their efforts to provide our Police Department with the public support it so greatly requires - and so justly deserves?

Would you not consider it more beneficial to maintain regular contact with those whom we employ to provide protection of our families and property and thus prevent problems before they occur. Or would you rather just attend emotionally charged meetings of concerned citizens in the Glen Ogilvie auditorium after wild and exaggerated rumors about child abuse have been circulated? (Remember last year?)

Granted - no Community - Police Committee is going to solve all of our ills. But its' a good beginning!

What has this group accomplished since its' beginning in February, 1975? Have you ever heard of "Block Parents?" Well, Diane Watson of our community is very active within the committee in striving toward furthering this cause. The programme works and it deserves our support.

The need for a full-time Social Worker to supplement policing activities was identified. A special working committee was formed which resulted in the hiring of Mr. Thomas Hall on September 9th, 1977. He was introduced

during the September 20th meeting and Chief Duncan related brief details of three incidents during which Mr. Hall's specialized services had already been most suitably utilized.

The committee is attempting to facilitate dialogue with our "young citizens." Inspector Cromie has contacted some youth groups, including Student Councils at Intermediate and High Schools. The committee very much wishes to provide our future rate-payers every opportunity to voice their suggestions and concerns.

What do you say? Don't you feel this committee deserves every possible support? The effectiveness of any police department is only as good as the degree to which the citizens whom they serve are prepared to become involved. If you won't do it, why should your neighbour?

Call me at 824-4664. Give me an opportunity to more thoroughly describe the activities of the committee. If you have ever asked, "Where are those guys when I really need them?", or "Why don't they go chasing real law breakers instead of stopping me for speeding on Innes Road?", this may be an ideal opportunity to find out.

Maybe we could form our own community - police committee to liaise with the township-wide committee. What about a combined adult/youth committee? Any and all alternatives will be welcomed!

Gloucester Transportation Consultative Committee

As mentioned last month, the BCA will be represented on the above committee which is being reactivated after having been dormant since 1975. The new committee had its first meeting on September 29 and will normally meet on the first Thursday of each month.

The Consultative Committee is a citizen's committee which acts as a sub-committee of the Gloucester Planning Board. It is responsible for advising on transportation matters and their implications to residents. Planning Board expressed the need for reactivation of the committee recognizing the importance of transportation issues requiring community input. Some examples are:

- Innes Road Feasibility Study
- Regional Rapid Transit Study
- Ottawa River Parkway Study
- Outer Ring Road Study

In addition to Blackburn Hamlet, the Committee will have representation from Beacon Hill, Blossom Park, Convent Glen and Carlsbad Springs.

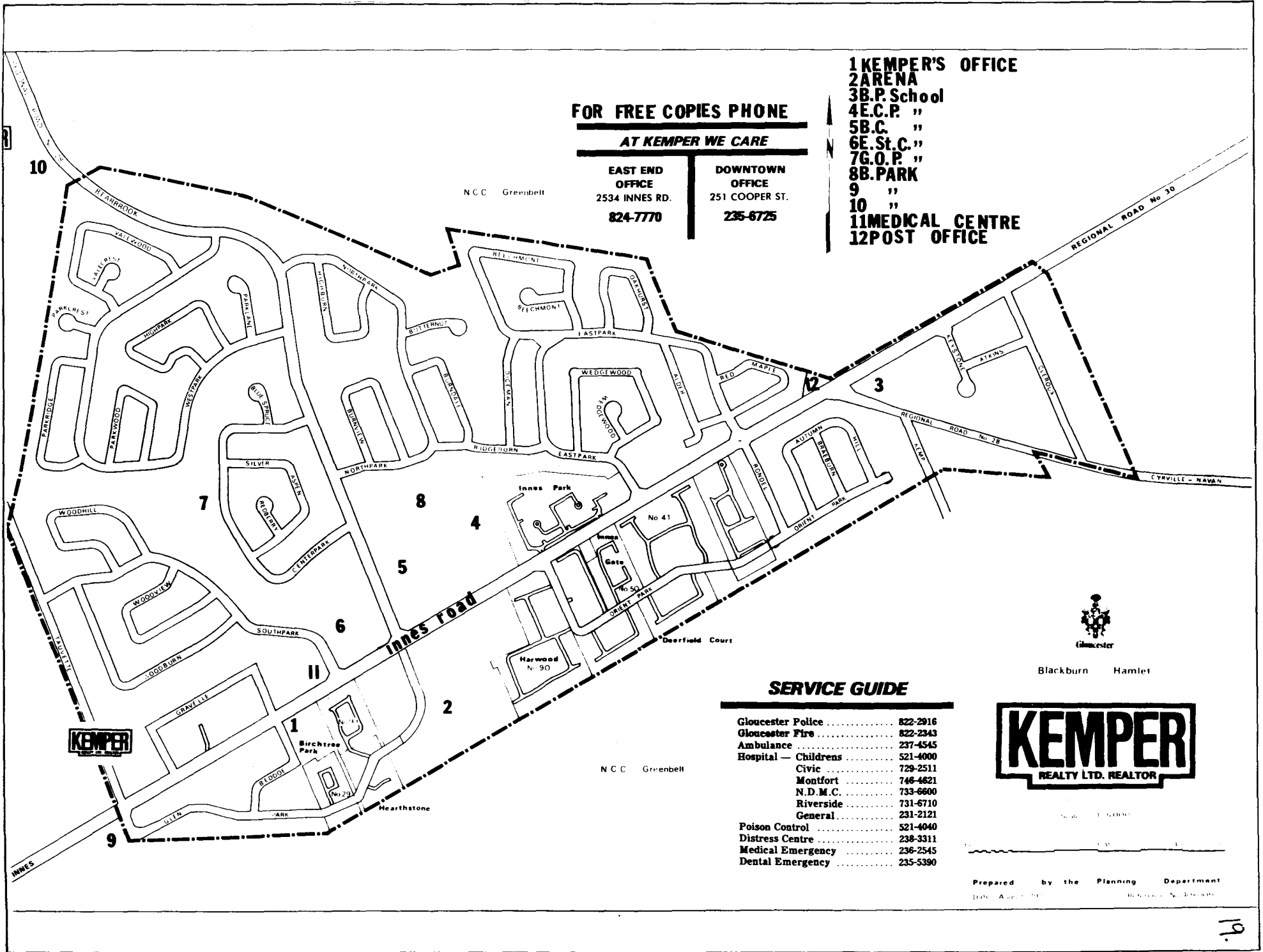

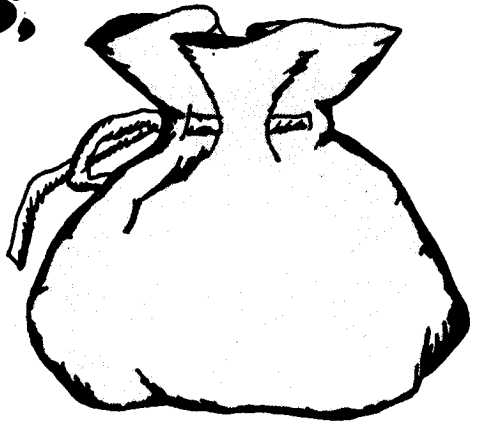



The eye protection now being worn by Canadian workers may be inadequate, according to a recent study conducted by the Canadian Standards Association, the Canada Safety Council and the Construction Safety Association of Ontario.

The survey was taken in connection with the Conference on Protective Equipment (COPE'78), slated for Toronto, January 23-25, 1978, under joint sponsorship of the three organizations.

Of the 2,701 respondents to the questionnaire, all of whom had eye injuries, 1,138 or 42%, were wearing eye protection at the time of their injury. Ten point five percent of these had the object or particle that damaged the eye, penetrate the lens or body of the protector.

Despite industrial safety programs to which most workers are exposed, the survey reveals that injury rates remain significant.

Other sessions at the Conference will examine problems related to injuries to head, foot, ear, the respiratory system, and those resulting from falls that could have been prevented by fall-arresting systems.

The Conference presents a unique opportunity for decision makers in industry, government, labour, and safety manufacturing to chart the future of protective equipment.
