Meeting was called to order by 1st Vice-President, Al Haggerty.

5th Arena in Gloucester (Orleans)

Gloucester Township has requested input from BCA re planning the new arena in Orleans. Al Haggerty will write to the Township and include the following comments:

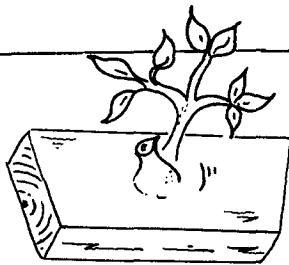
- a) construction should take place as soon as possible to relieve the pressures on available ice time;
- b) a two-storey structure would be suggested with the size somewhere between those of the Blackburn and Earl Armstrong arenas;

- d) a "crush" area similar to the one at Earl Armstrong is recommended.

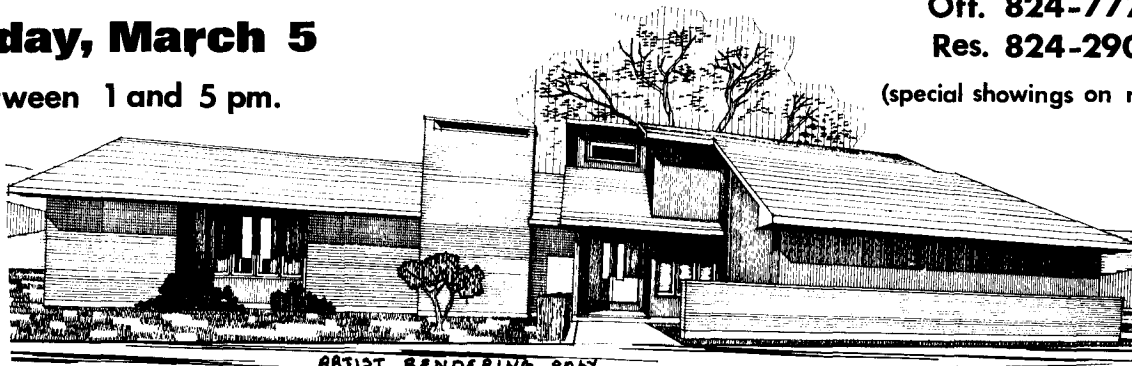

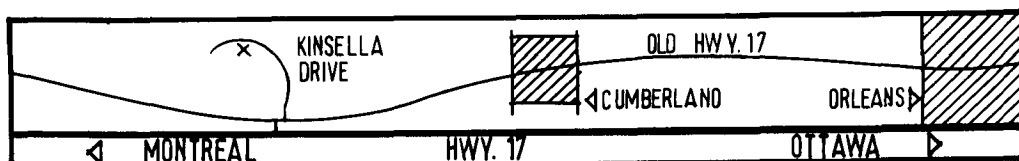

1. BE IT RESOLVED that the proposal to build two new tennis courts in Bearbrooke Park which was rejected as priority #2 in the list of projects presented for approval by the B.H.C.R.C.C. be reconsidered as priority #8.
2. BE IT RESOLVED that \$3,000.00 be allocated for the purpose of adding an over-hang to the existing backstop and bleachers for spectators.
3. BE IT RESOLVED that a minimum of \$12,000.00 from funds available be earmarked for development of a ball diamond facility the cost of which would be approximately:

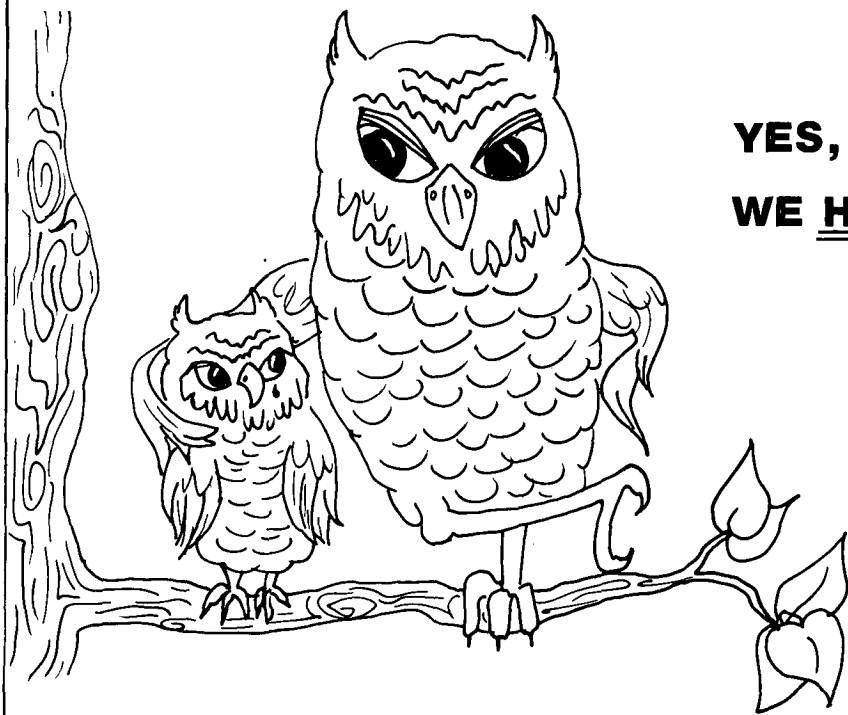

BCA Sponsoring a Creative Writing Contest

Heather Umelas Presents Brief to the Carleton Board of Education

The following is the Brief presented by Heather Umelas, Co-ordinator of the BCA Education Committee, to the Field Services Committee, Carleton Board of Education at their meeting on February 1, 1978 at Colonel By School -

"At this time, I will take the opportunity to express some of the concerns that we have in our community. The facts and figures contained in this brief have been obtained with the co-operation of the schools, therefore, represent a realistic picture of the situation.

In one of our K-5 schools, Glen Ogilvie, presently there is an enrolment of 821 students. The enrolment at Glen Ogilvie is the highest in the Carleton system for a K-5 school. To accommodate this many students, it has been necessary to have five portables on location, as well as students accommodated in the mezzanine of the school. The operational capacity as set by the Board is 770 and, as the figures indicate, we have exceeded that figure. The overcrowding is not caused by the students of the community but as a result of the students being bussed in for French Immersion. It is not the intent of this Committee to ask the Board to limit the numbers of students in French Immersion but to re-evaluate its present policy on the opening of French Immersion Centers or its lack of policy on allowing French Immersion in other schools. We are proud of our community school and feel that it serves as an example for other communities on how well the core program and Immersion program can co-exist in one school.

The supervision of 550 students who are bussed in and must remain for lunch in a school without proper lunch facilities is next to impossible. In an effort to reduce the number of accidents that were occurring during the lunch hour, the school reduced the lunch hour by fifteen minutes, causing strain on a number of local children who must walk home for lunch and get back to school in the given time, particularly during the winter months.

The resource centre and gym are heavily taxed; once again due to the high enrolment.

The projected enrolment for September, 1978, is 125 students. 100 students are expected to move on to Emily Carr Middle School in September, 1978. Although these figures do not represent an increase in student population, lack of space will still remain critical.

This year Kindergarten students occupy 2½ classes; in September 1978 5 classes will be required to accommodate these students.

Figures that we have indicate that there are a sufficient number of students bussed in from Convent Glen and Queenswood combined to form one full grade two class, and one full grade three class in Convent Glen or Queenswood in September 1978.

We appeal to the Board to give this matter consideration as it is unrealistic to add any more students to an already over-populated school.

The Board passed a motion last year guaranteeing that the cell program would be instituted throughout the Carleton system by 1980. Perhaps we could hear from the Board in the near future to know if Glen Ogilvie is being considered for this program in September 1978.

Emily Carr, our middle school, is also suffering from the stress of over-crowding. The present enrolment at Emily Carr is 748 students. Portables are on location and students are being housed in converted locker rooms and the science lab. It is difficult enough to administer programs in a closed school, but in an open concept school, these problems are magnified.

We would ask the Board to re-evaluate its present policy on the staffing of elementary schools. System-wide staffing can work effectively in areas where the growth rate is nil or minimal, however, such is not our case.

We build a middle school with special facilities such as a Science lab, Home Economics room and an Industrial Arts room, but it is not the policy of the Board at present to staff these facilities.

In order to make these special facilities operational, it is necessary to draw from the main teaching staff, thus increasing the pupil-teacher ratio. We realize that lowering the pupil-teacher ratio on a system-wide basis is a costly venture however, we believe that special consideration should be given to Emily Carr when monies have already been spent to put in these additional facilities.

Classes of 40 and over in any school are too high, but virtually impossible in an open concept school.

Mr. Chairman, we have been given a presentation by Mr. Brennan this evening on the proposed extended-day schedule. If adopted by the Board, this will go into effect at Gloucester High in September of 1978. As this has been the first public presentation, Mr. Chairman, we ask if it would be possible to have a public meeting in our community before this is adopted as policy by the Board so that we may have an opportunity to have input as many members of our community are concerned about the effect that this proposed schedule might have on the students and families concerned.

We are aware that the present freeze on new construction comes directly from the Ministry of Education, and talks between the Ottawa Board and Carleton Board to date have not been successful in yielding spaces for our pupils in the Ottawa system. We hope that these problems can be resolved with the combined efforts of this Board and communities working together to reach a common goal -- quality education for all students."

For sometime you have been reading in the local newspapers about our accommodation problems, particularly in the secondary panel. Negotiations with the Ottawa Board have been unproductive and the Ministry of Education has not given us any positive assistance in solving our problems. I would like to give you an overview as I see it.

Our elementary panel has some severe overcrowding in various parts of the system. Schools such as Glen Ogilvie and Emily Carr are strained to the limits and those such as Blossom Park and Convent Glen now find themselves full and growing more so. It is evident that we need new schools but we have been unable to get approval from the Ministry to build, although we continue to press.

The secondary panel is in a most difficult situation. By September 1978 we will be short approximately 2000 spaces in Carleton, and every school except J.S. Woodsworth is increasing in population, with some requiring portables or extended days to handle the population. Our vocational students in the west are using facilities in the basement of South Carleton and as well taking classes at A.Y. Jackson Secondary School. Our one French high school, Garneau, is well over capacity and hundreds of Francophone students are scattered through Ottawa schools. Even Carine Wilson may require portables next year. How do we solve our problems?

Ottawa has a declining population, we have an increasing one and they have 3 high schools on the border, Sir John A. Macdonald, Laurentian and Sir Wilfrid Laurier which would help us. We also need new schools as that will not help an overcrowded Gloucester, an Osgoode with 11 portables, or Garneau. We would like to buy or lease or enter into arrangements to acquire space in those Ottawa schools, to house some of our students. The Ministry of Education task force suggested an arrangement whereby both Carleton and Ottawa students would have used Sir John A. and whoever would have the majority of students in the school would manage it. This was acceptable to us, and could work elsewhere, but Ottawa has flatly rejected it.

Ottawa wants us to plug the holes in their system with our children wherever the holes might be. By 1982, 40% of our students would be in another Board allowing Ottawa to have its cake and to eat it. The parents of 40% of our students would be paying taxes and electing representatives to a Board which would have no say in the education of their children and another Board would be charged with that task but have no direct responsibility to the parents. No where else in Ontario does this exist.

In Gloucester we need another English High School and another French High School in the Orleans-Cumberland area. We need a school to house the Francophones from Gloucester who are scattered in Ottawa and we need a new High School in South Gloucester. Our immediate needs could be satisfied with an English High School in the South, a French High School in Orleans and the acquisition of Sir Wilfrid Laurier for the Francophone students.

In addition to relieving the pressure on Gloucester High, the erection of a high school in South Gloucester would give to the students in that area what they have needed for years. Many spend 2 hours a day on buses going to and from Gloucester High, and have difficulty in participating in the activities of the school.

The Carleton Board has taken the position that it wants Sir Wilfred Laurier to house the Francophone students. Presently hundreds are scattered in the Ottawa schools, and have been for some time. They have wanted a school to which they can relate as do many others- and Sir Wilfrid would do this quite well. If we allow English students to filter into Sir Wilfrid it is unlikely that we will get that school for the Francophones, nor will we get an English High School in South Gloucester. Our best course is to resist merely being a feeder for Ottawa.

In the meantime it is essential that plans be made to house our students in Gloucester High and our other schools. A proposal has been made for Gloucester which would do that and still permit flexibility. The extended day would have the 12s and 13s starting at 7:30 a.m., the 9s and 11s at 9:30 a.m. and the 10s at noon. It is felt that educationally the students would not suffer and they would still be able to participate in the same extra-curricular activities as in the current year. It is basically an adjustment of schedule to permit the required utilization of resources.

The Mayo Report suggested 2 Boards, East and West, and the Carleton Board has gone on record as favouring this. It could result in a freer use of available resources without the stumbling blocks of jurisdiction and management which we now face. This would not eliminate the need for new schools but it would hasten the resolution of some problems.

Perhaps by the time you read this a solution will have been found, but much depends on the response from the Ministry of Education. Fiscal prudence demands the use of Ottawa spaces and we agree but we recognize that that approach will solve only part of the problem. Let us hope that our expanding system will ultimately be recognized by the Ministry.

Creative Playground at Glen Ogilvie

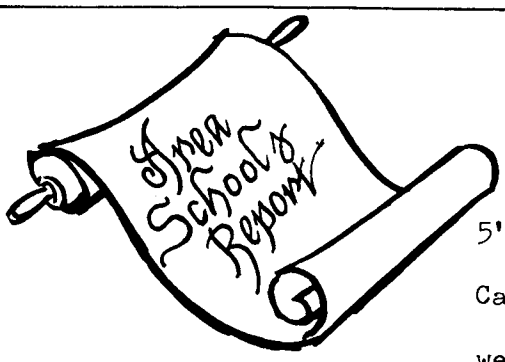

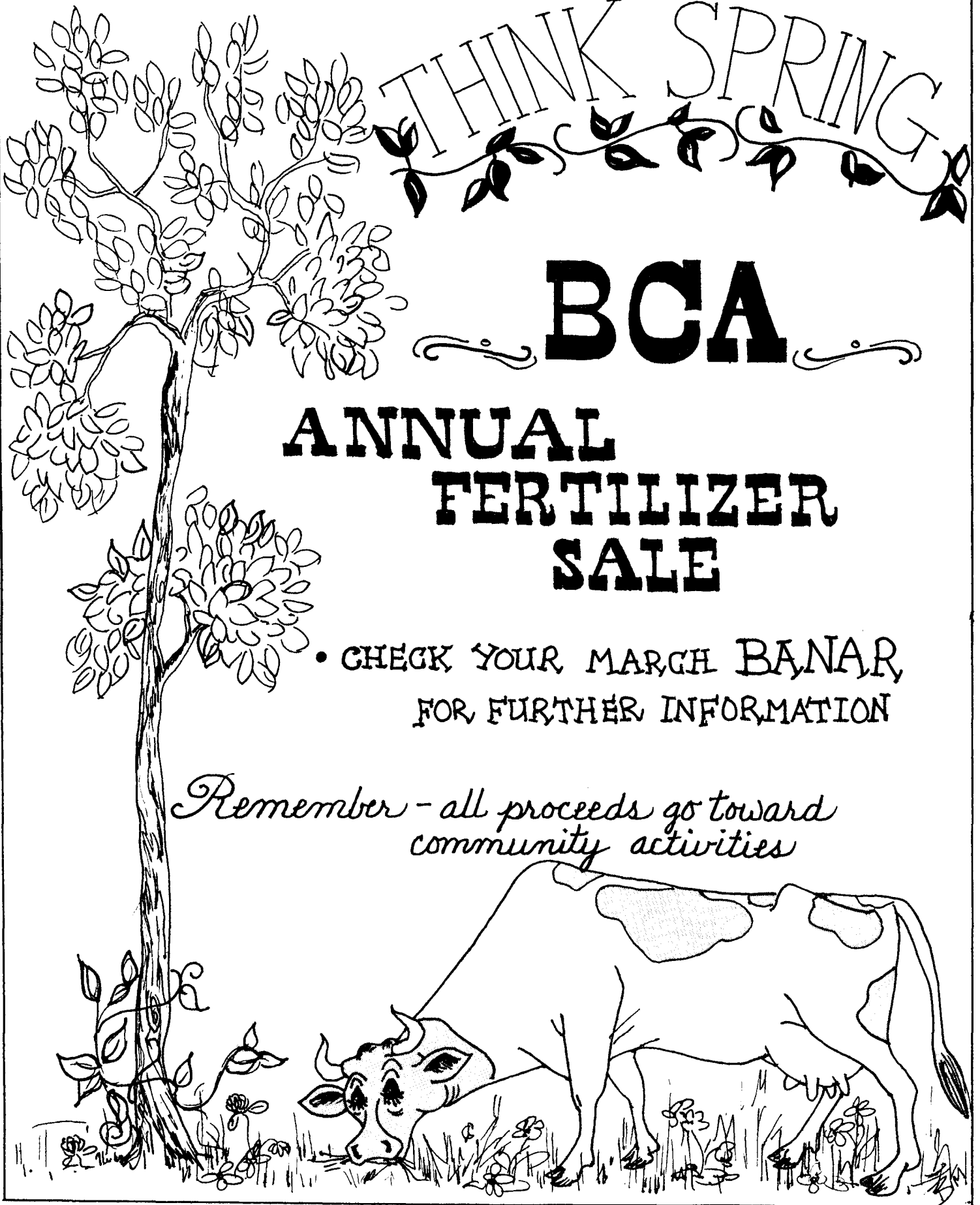

Innes Road and the Blackburn Hamlet By-pass

In 1972 a plan for the future development of Blackburn Hamlet was endorsed by a General Meeting of the BCA. The planning document identified the question of a future east-west arterial road as a key issue requiring attention and recommended that, when traffic volume warranted, the necessary arterial should be constructed as a by-pass running well to the south of the Hamlet. It further recommended that Innes Road be developed as a collector road for Blackburn Hamlet, that it revert to a township road, and ultimately be severed at the eastern boundary of the community. Six years later, as things stand today, the Regional Government and Gloucester Township recognize the principle of a southern by-pass but no study has been launched to confirm its feasibility. In the meantime, needed improvements to Innes Road have been held in abeyance.

A recent traffic survey found no justification for a new arterial at this time in view of the low volume of through traffic. For example, during the p.m. peak hour the number of eastbound vehicles passing through the Hamlet, along Innes Road, was 127 compared to 520 stopping in the Hamlet. On a daily basis (7:30 a.m. to 5:45 p.m.), the figures were 406 passing through versus 2128 stopping.

The future need for an east-west arterial road is based on planned growth of the Eastern Urban Community (including Orleans) but this has been uncertain because of lack of agreement on what the level of planned growth should be. This uncertainty has been a delaying factor in getting the by-pass feasibility study underway. Some resolution appears to be in sight in that the Region has now proposed a planned population limit of 75,000 to the Ontario Municipal Board but this recommendation is unlikely to receive approval before this summer. This means that the feasibility study may not get underway before the fall or even later.

It has been suggested, in view of the uncertain prospects for the by-pass, and the possibility that a four-lane Innes Road might be required in any event, that emphasis should be placed on the development of Innes Road as soon as possible. It must be recognized of course, that if the by-pass requirement were de-emphasized, it would be hard to re-introduce. Under the circumstances, the best approach is probably to await the OMB decision later this year and then to press for the earliest possible completion of the feasibility study, by the Region, with full participation of our own community representatives. I am sure many of you have views on this question. The Transportation Committee would be pleased to receive them.
