BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING

SUMMARY OF BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 22, AT GLEN OGILVIE SCHOOL

In light of the strict BCA Budget for 1978, discussion was held on a number of possible fund-raising activities including a showing of oil paintings in the Hamlet. Iris Prentice, Adult Activities Co-ordinator, will make the arrangements for the Showing which will be scheduled for a Sunday in April.

There was also discussion on the Venturers' proposal to staff and run the discos for the youth in the community. Agreement is expected to be reached by the next Executive meeting.

John Fargey will report back to BHCRCR proposing the following changes to the Tennis Court Agreement for 1978:

- a) As requested by BHCRCR, the closing time for the tennis courts will be 11:00 p.m. instead of 12:00 p.m.
- b) The membership fee structure will include a 25% reduction (net) for BCA members.

John Fargey will also suggest that the BHCRCR pay for the cost of maintenance in the township parks, leaving BCA to pay for the cost of maintenance of the ball diamonds on the school properties.

Lois Kemp reported that the first Fun Fair flyer will be distributed the week following this meeting to every household in the Hamlet. The Fun Fair Committee hopes that many in the Community will come forward to help make Fun Fair a success.

The next Executive meeting will be held Wednesday, March 8, at 7:30 p.m. at Glen Ogilvie School.

The following motions, which were tabled at the Annual General Meeting on November 28, 1978, will be considered.

1. BE IT RESOLVED that the proposal to build two new tennis courts in Bearbrook Park which was rejected as priority #2 in the list of projects presented for approval by the B.H.C.R.C.C. be reconsidered as priority #8.
2. BE IT RESOLVED that \$3,000.00 be allocated for the purpose of adding an over-hang to the existing backstop and bleachers for spectators.
3. BE IT RESOLVED that a minimum of \$12,000.00 from funds available be earmarked for development of a ball diamond facility the cost of which would be approximately:

Fill, grading and stone dust	\$7,200.00
Backstop	3,000.00
Fencing	1,200.00
Contingency	600.00
TOTAL	\$12,000.00

4. BE IT RESOLVED that the B.H.C.R.C.C. negotiate with Gloucester Township to share the cost of a lighted ball diamond in the Township park beside the arena (B.H.C.R.C.C. share approximately \$20,000.00).
5. BE IT RESOLVED that 10% of the projected \$195,000.00 in the Capital Reserve Account be set aside to be applied against possible over-runs in costs.
6. BE IT RESOLVED that the unallocated amount in the 1978 Capital Reserve Account Budget be applied towards reducing taxes.

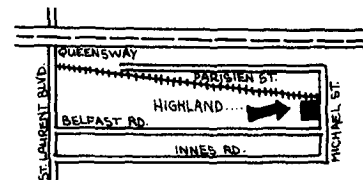

Education

ECOLE M. F. McHUGH SCHOOL

The school was set up at the request of parent groups, hospitals, school boards, and the courts. Its aim is to provide a short or medium term period of a specialized school experience for children with severe emotional or behavioural problems.

The Ottawa Board of Education administers the school for the benefit of French-speaking and English-speaking children from all of Eastern Ontario. It is financed jointly by the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of the Attorney-General.

The school's program is the educational component of the therapeutic programs for school-aged patients of the Royal Ottawa Hospital, the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario, the Ottawa General Hospital and the Ottawa Observation Home. (On the grounds of the Ottawa Family Court.)

The school is under the direction of a Principal responsible to the Superintendent of Student Services of the Ottawa Board of Education. The staff consists of Ottawa Board of Education Teachers, Hospital Child Care Workers and Nurses.

All students are hospital patients or are in custody of the courts. Community schools, Student Services Department, physicians or others may recommend that parents refer their child to one of the three hospitals. Admission to and discharge from M. J. McHugh School is the responsibility of hospital clinical teams or the Courts, but parents may discharge at any time. When it is felt that the child is ready for re-integration, integration procedures are started to have the child return to the best community school for him or her.

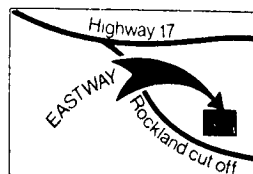

SPORTS

When registration for various sports programs takes place the convenor is naturally interested in having parents volunteer their assistance. When parents are enrolling their children in these sports programs they usually think in terms of managing, coaching, etc. and then disqualify themselves because "I don't have sufficient knowledge and experience in this sport to make a contribution". Often this may be true so the reason is perfectly acceptable. On the other hand, if we look at the sports picture in the community in its broadest dimension, numerous jobs can be identified which are just as important as managing or coaching a team but which require virtually no expertise or even knowledge about sports per se. What is required is administrative talent - organizational skills, ability to communicate and the ability to make things happen when they should. Some examples of these administrative jobs are: Sports Chairman of the BCA, Blackburn Arena Ice Co-ordinator, Canteen Co-ordinator, Canteen Convenors and Sponsorship Co-ordinator. At the present time we are looking for volunteers for all of these jobs which need to be handled if the community association is to continue functioning as it has in the past. Some are a little more time-consuming than others but there is not one which represents an extraordinary burden on a person's time. Perhaps a thumbnail sketch of each job would prove enlightening.

Sports Chairman - Representative on the BCA Executive to whom the Convenors of various sports programs report, monitors program performance, assesses budget requirements, consults with program Convenors and represents BCA to Gloucester Parks & Recreation Committee.
Canteen Co-ordinator - Prepares the canteen duty roster from supplied lists of participants in selected programs and obtains assistants to administer the roster.

Canteen Convenors - Distribute copies of the duty roster to those individuals selected to cover a 3 - 4 week period and contact people by telephone as a follow-up reminder, occasionally helping to arrange for substitutes.
Blackburn Arena Ice Co-ordinator - Control point for use of the ice surface by activities under the auspices of the BCA. In other words farms out to team coaches hours that are canceled by someone else or offered to us by the Gloucester Hockey Association and collects, where applicable, the rental for the time allotted.

Sponsorship Co-ordinator - Contacts individuals and companies doing business in Blackburn Hamlet in an effort to obtain sponsorship of teams participating in various sport activities and collects fees from those agreeing to assist.

From these very brief descriptions it is hoped the reader can see that the jobs are not onerous and in most cases of fairly short duration. As already indicated, we are not looking for people who know a great deal about sports but rather for people who will get the job done when it has to be done while maintaining good inter-personal relationships.

The rewards for taking on functions like these are considerable but not taxable. That is to say there is no pay but there is considerable personal satisfaction to be gained from knowing you have made a contribution in the community; from the opportunity to practise salesmanship, communication, innovation; from developing new relationships or even friends and from broadening knowledge of the community. As was said above, the BCA is looking for some volunteers. If you are one, please speak to one of the Executive or telephone John Fargey - 8102.

AN OPEN LETTER TO BLACKBURN HAMLET RATEPAYERS

This letter is to apprise you of the efforts of the Blackburn Tennis Committee to increase the number of tennis courts in order to satisfy the needs of the residents.

Another formal request and motion for monies to build two (2) additional courts will be tabled at the Special Ratepayers Meeting on 28 March, 1978.

The justification for expansion is based on the following factors:

Tennis has by far the largest number of active participants of any organized sport or recreation activity in our Community, catering to the needs of all age groups.

The operation and maintenance of the tennis facilities, being entirely self supporting, impose no additional financial burden on the Community. In actual fact, it has consistently generated a significant annual surplus since inception three years ago.

With the current membership at 1,150 persons, the players per court stands at about 300, twice the maximum number recommended.

The courts are in continual use, weather permitting, from early May to late September which is a longer season than enjoyed by any other group, except the Arena which is indoors.

The profits from Tennis were instrumental in obtaining a large Wintario grant which will be used for something else in the Hamlet.

Just a reminder that the mill cost/5,000 dollars evaluation for the courts is \$1.95 with a yearly surplus of \$4,000. In contrast the swimming pool is \$7.80 with a yearly deficit of \$7,500.

The Blackburn Tennis Committee, as part of the Blackburn Community Association feels that tennis is an important recreational activity serving the needs of the community at large and that to continue to serve the growing interest in this sport, it is necessary to increase the number of courts available for players.

If you support this feeling, turn out and make your wishes known.
