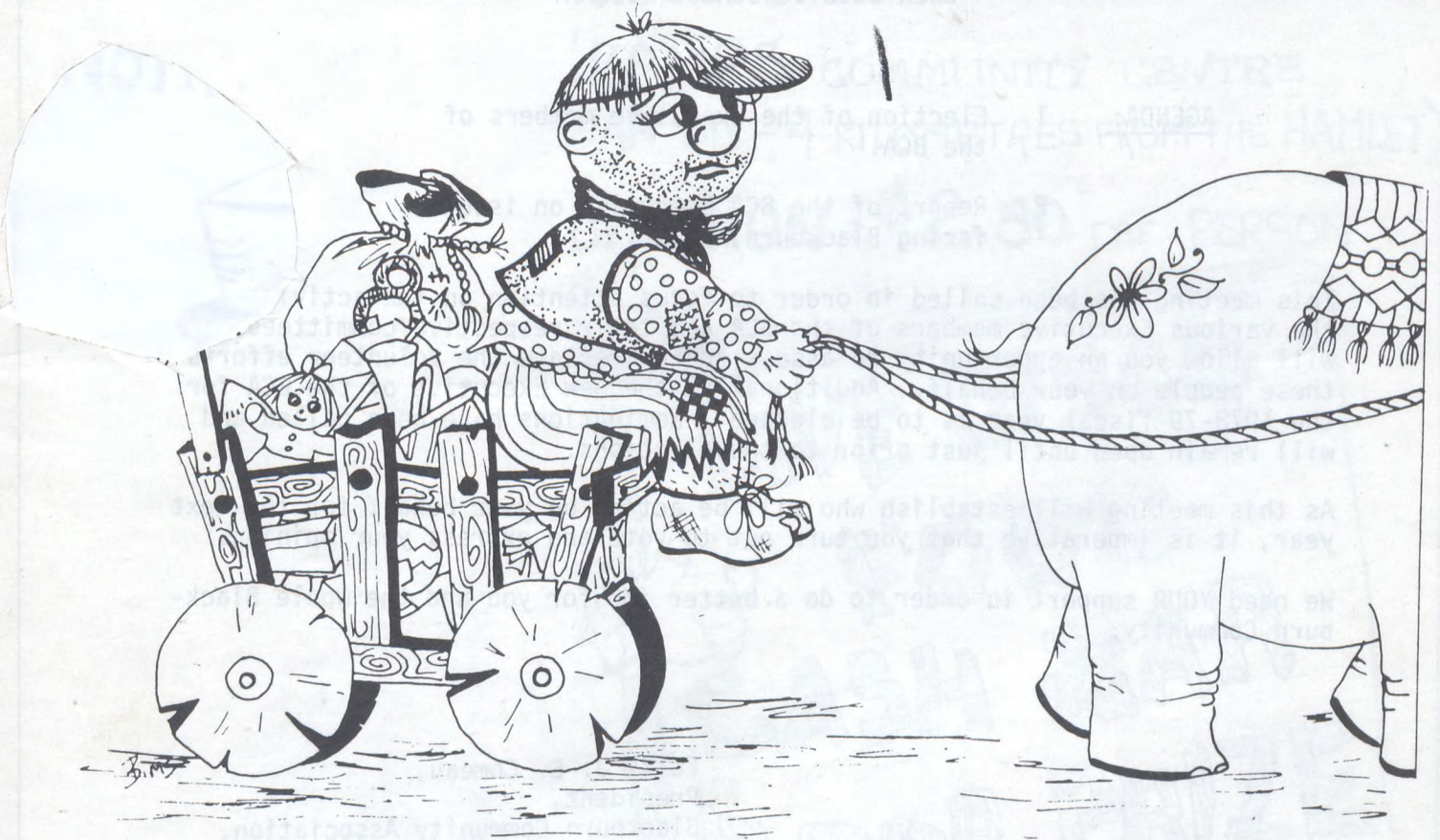

COMMITTEE REPORTS

CIVIC AFFAIRS

Crosswalks

Ottawa-Carleton Regional Government hopes to build two pedestrian crosswalks this Spring in the Hamlet -- one on Bearbrook Road near the South entrance to Centrepark, and one on Innes Road near Southpark. As mentioned last Fall, these walks have a push-button which engages large flashing lights to warn motorists that a pedestrian is crossing the street.

Sidewalks

Gloucester Township has completed a section of asphalt sidewalk on the South side of Innes Road between Bearbrook and Beddoe Lane. Township was asked to give this area priority so as to have sidewalks on both sides of Innes near the proposed crosswalk. Of course, Township was also asked to construct a sidewalk on the South side of Innes from one end of the Hamlet to the other, but budgetary constraints do not permit this at present.

Some people have wondered why proper concrete sidewalks are not being constructed along Innes. Township will not build these until the question of the By-pass and the width of Innes is resolved.

Traffic-Signal Studies

Residents on Orient Park have indicated some difficulty in entering Innes Road at peak hour times. As a consequence, I have requested Region to conduct a traffic count (vehicles and pedestrians) this summer to see if signals are warranted at this intersection.

Innes-Cyrville Intersection

Region has indicated that they will again be looking at a proper right-turn lane for this intersection (i.e., for vehicles westbound on Innes). It is hoped that they will build a turning lane much like the one that exists at Blair and Innes.

Shopping Centres

Detailed plans for the construction of a 60,000 square foot shopping centre on the South-east corner of Innes and Bearbrook will be presented to the Gloucester Planning Board on June 14. Harry King of Kemper Realty informs me that he hopes to begin construction in July with completion scheduled for late 1978 or early 1979.

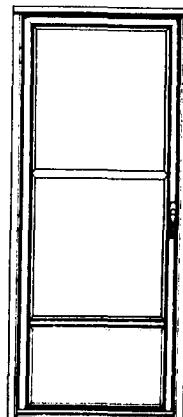

Radcliff Real Estate indicates that they hope to start construction of a 14,000 square foot plaza (with an additional 5,000 square feet of office space) this month (May) with completion in September. It would be located on the South-west corner of Innes and Bearbrook.

Bicycle Routes

Fred Chandler and I attended a public meeting of the Inter-Governmental Bicycle Committee. A proposed network of bikeways for the Ottawa-Carleton Region was presented and discussed. This network includes routes along Innes, Bearbrook and Blair and while implementation is a good distance in the future (even given Regional Government approval) at least the first step has been taken. I will be reporting highlights of this Committee as they develop.

Chimneys with Gas Furnaces

Many oil furnaces in the Hamlet were converted to gas a few years ago and it appears that some of those chimneys without a steel liner are rapidly deteriorating (especially those made of grey brick). Flue temperatures associated with a gas furnace are lower than those of an oil furnace and as a result, moisture condenses in the chimney, saturating the brick and mortar. Freezing of this moisture with attendant expansion can eventually cause the chimney to weaken and crumble. If you have noticed any problems with your chimney, give me a call and perhaps some collective action can be taken.

TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

Service to Hull

OC Transpo advises that, due to the construction of new buildings in Hull, notably Place Chaudiere, there will be restrictions on the use of certain roads in Hull and it will not be feasible after September next for the No. 25 service to make loops off of both Maisonneuve and Eddy. OC Transpo claims that it was not consulted until recently on plans affecting its routes and has not yet determined precisely what adjustments to make. One possibility is that the 25 would cross the Portage Bridge, as at present, but continue up Maisonneuve and return to Ottawa across the Alexandra Bridge. Passengers travelling to the Eddy area would have to transfer to another bus on the Ottawa side of the river.

Sunday Service

Details should be available soon of the proposed ORANGE routes to be operated on Sundays. These routes are being specially designed for Sunday users and a link from Blackburn Hamlet to the network is expected. Route planning is being based on likely destinations such as churches, hospitals, and recreational areas.

Rapid Transit

Regional planners still have their hands full with the current phase of the rapid transit program but have funds in their budget to start considering the Eastern corridor later this year. The long awaited decision of the O.M.B. on the future size of the Eastern Urban Community is an important factor.

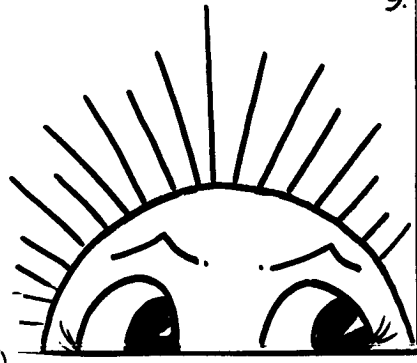
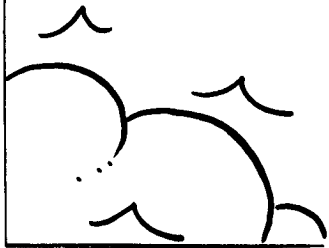

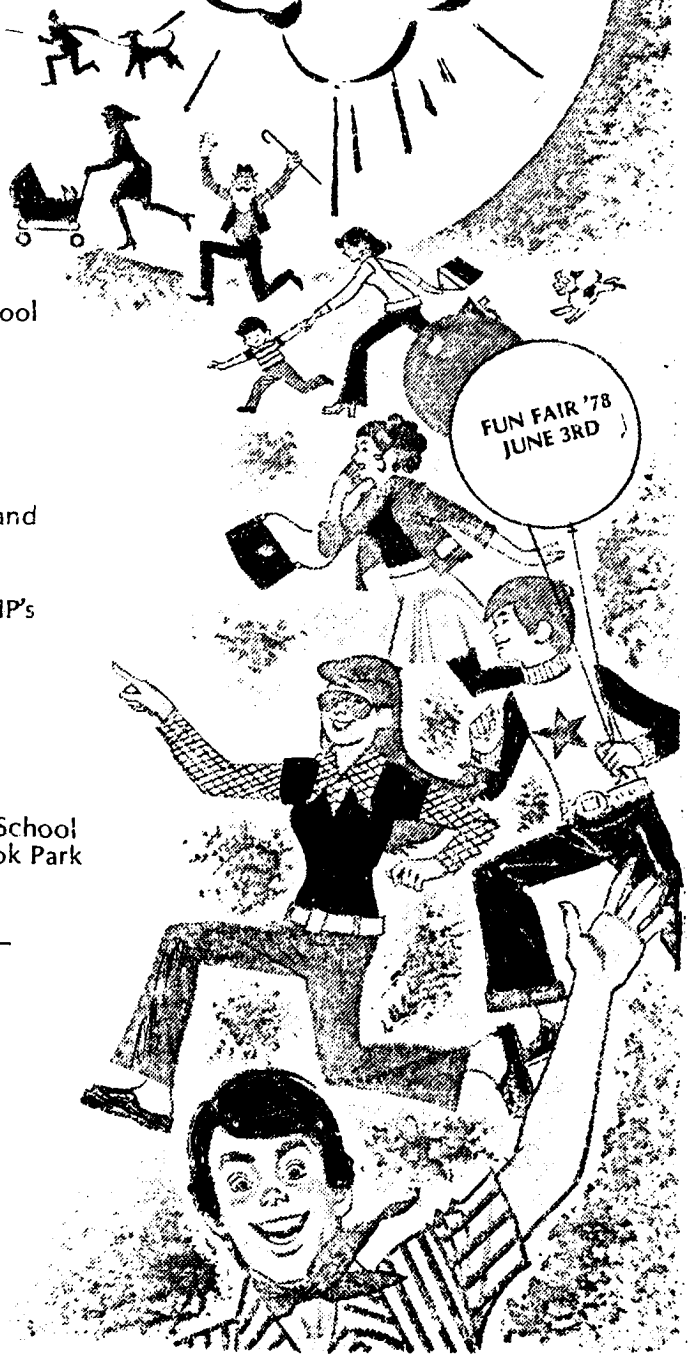

The bus will leave on the ½ hour from the Emily Carr entrance and travel South Park, Tauvette, Glen Park and drop off at Blackburn Separate School.

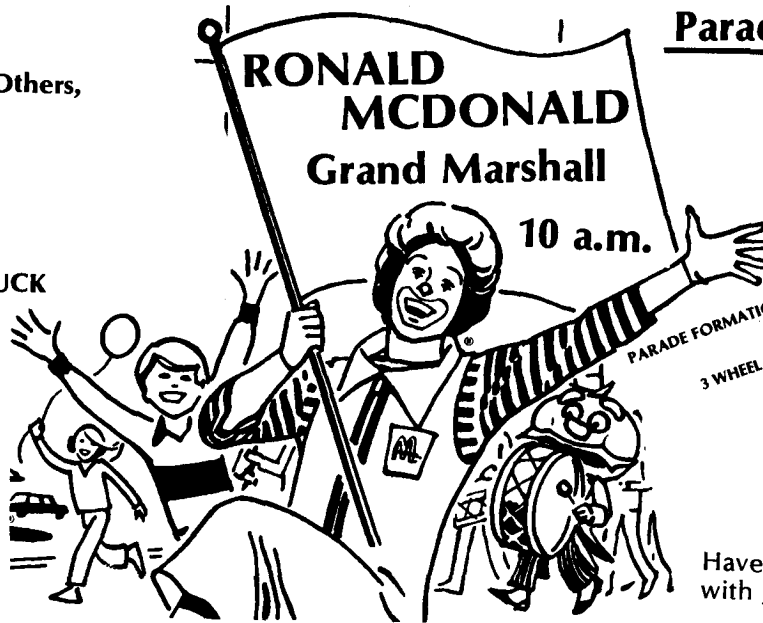

SPORTS

The summer sports programs are now all actively organized with the participant registration higher in all cases than in previous years and as in the past, we have successfully obtained an adequate number of interested adults to properly administer them all.

Girls softball under the direction of Joe Chapman, Burke Darling and Joan Klenavic was organized into 12 teams involving 165 players. In addition, Ken Davies is once again looking after the competitive girls softball team.

Murray Russell's program for ladies softball has over 60 participants this year with five teams organized for local competition with some inter-community games planned against North Gloucester.

Soccer throughout the Gloucester Township has again grown in size over other years with more than 1,100 children enrolled. Just over 300 of these are from Blackburn Hamlet, a significant increase from last year. Harold Beamish, Convenor of the Tennis Program, reports that registration is up again this year with nearly 1,200 player tags being distributed. The program got under way in early May with Chris Morris being engaged as the Monitor.

At the time of writing, Lacrosse registration is up slightly with 60 enrolled so far. Bert Lambert is once again in charge of this program in our community.

The baseball program got under way in early May with over 250 player participants divided into five age/skill levels. Queenswood Village had teams playing with us in previous years but are not participating this year.

While we have done well in obtaining voluntary help for all the programs mentioned above, we have, so far, received no volunteers to act as Canteen Co-ordinator next Fall. Lest people think this is an unimportant function, everyone should know the operation of the canteen from January 1 to the end of March produced over \$5,000 in net

revenue for the BCA. Ice co-ordinator for the Blackburn Arena is another important function that needs to be identified well before the season starts on Labour Day. Let's hope that by the next issue of the BANAR we can report volunteers have been found for these jobs and also for the Equipment Custodian's job in baseball. 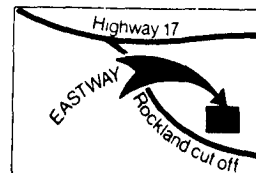

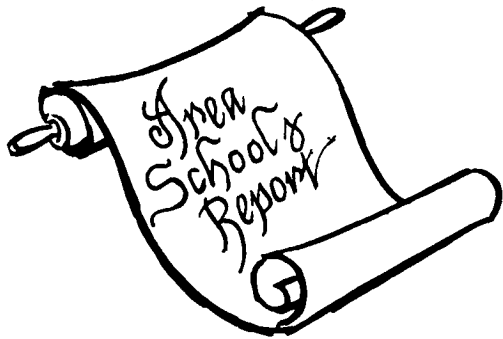
