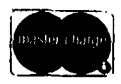

GLOUCESTER FIRE DETECTOR BY-LAW PASSES

"Smoke detectors will be required in all Gloucester Township buildings after October 8 under a by-law approved Monday by Township Council." (Ottawa Citizen, June 6)

What does this mean to residents of Blackburn Hamlet? In many cases, it will require the purchase and installation of smoke detectors! But, what kind? How many? Where? At what cost?

Your Community Association will be inquiring into the whole "smoke detector" situation in the hope that an acceptable product can be located which can:

- a) meet fire safety standards,
- b) be purchased in bulk for residential distribution as a community-oriented project in a manner similar to the annual Fertilizer Drive.

Further news in this regard will be provided in subsequent issues of the BANAR or by separate flyer as soon as more detail is available.

If you decide to purchase detectors privately, please note fire officials' warnings against door-to-door salesmen with products of questionable quality. A check with your Fire Department as insurance against unacceptable appliances and/or improper installation could pay long-term dividends!

CIVIC AFFAIRS

Chip Wagons

Gloucester Council is planning to introduce a Chip Wagon licence. Some of the provisions contained therein are:

- A licence will be valid for one specified location only to cover a period of one year and to cost \$50 (formerly the fee was \$20).
- The Regional Health Unit must approve the vehicle for the preparation, storage, and dispensing of food and beverages, as well as for the disposal or storage of food wastes. Furthermore, an operator must arrange for himself convenient access to washroom facilities. (This is meant to assure (1) that food is safe for consumption and (2) that waste materials, such as grease, are properly disposed.)
- An applicant must submit a general site plan to the Township Zoning Officer and to the Township Planning Department. The site and location of a Chip Wagon must comply with local zoning by-laws. (e.g., minimum set-back regulations will prevent Chip Wagons from parking on the side of a road or street.)
- A Chip Wagon cannot locate closer than 144 metres from an existing eating establishment. (This regulation is meant to prevent Chip Wagons from unfairly competing with existing restaurants, etc. Planning Board initially recommended 400 metres but Council requested the lesser distance.)
- An operator must provide parking facilities for clients (formerly, in some cases, cars had to park on the shoulders of busy roads, causing a hazard for both pedestrian and vehicular traffic).

While the Chip Wagon licence does not address the problem of littering that is associated with some Chip Wagons (and with many variety stores as well), Council is hoping to introduce an Anti-Littering By-law in the near future.

Shopping Centres

Harry King of Kemper Realty informs me that construction of the Shopping Centre on the south-east corner of Innes and Bearbrook is still scheduled to start some time in July with completion in the late Fall or early Winter.

Radcliff Real Estate indicate that construction of their plaza on the south-west corner of Innes and Bearbrook has been delayed until August with completion now planned for late Fall or early Winter.

Chimneys with Gas Furnaces

As a result of last month's article, many people have phoned t½ indicate that their chimney is deteriorating. It is hoped to get together and see if some collective action can be taken.

Crosswalks

Regional Government now informs me that the two pedestrian crosswalks planned for Blackburn (one on Bearbrook near Centrepark and one on Innes near Southpark) will be built in August.

Mixed Softball Tournament, Bed Races, Horseshoe Tournament, Best Parade Float and the Fair King and Queen.

Winners all received ribbons and their names will go on the trophies. The trophies can be seen in the trophy case at the Blackburn Arena. The following are reports from the various convenors:

FIRST ANNUAL BED RACES:

The largest crowd ever assembled in Blackburn Hamlet watched the First Annual Fun Fair Bed Races. Seven enthusiastic teams and their respective pit crews, coaches and supporters cheered them on to victory.

Their competition ran so fast to keep those Moose Antlers from getting . . . that they finished 3rd in the first heat.

The Blackburn Homesteaders (8) had Eldon Kemp riding, pushed by Gord, Murray and Randy Kemp, and Don Budd. Dressed in Homesteader T-shirts they had the most streamlined entry.

The Red Maple Crescents (1) had Jim Goulet riding and was pushed by Barry Hodge, Mike Cray, Jack McKnight and All-American import Bud Kramer. Their Chapparell-style entry complete with spoiler was supported by a sizeable pit crew complete with banner and an abundance of Red Maple T-shirts in the crowd.
