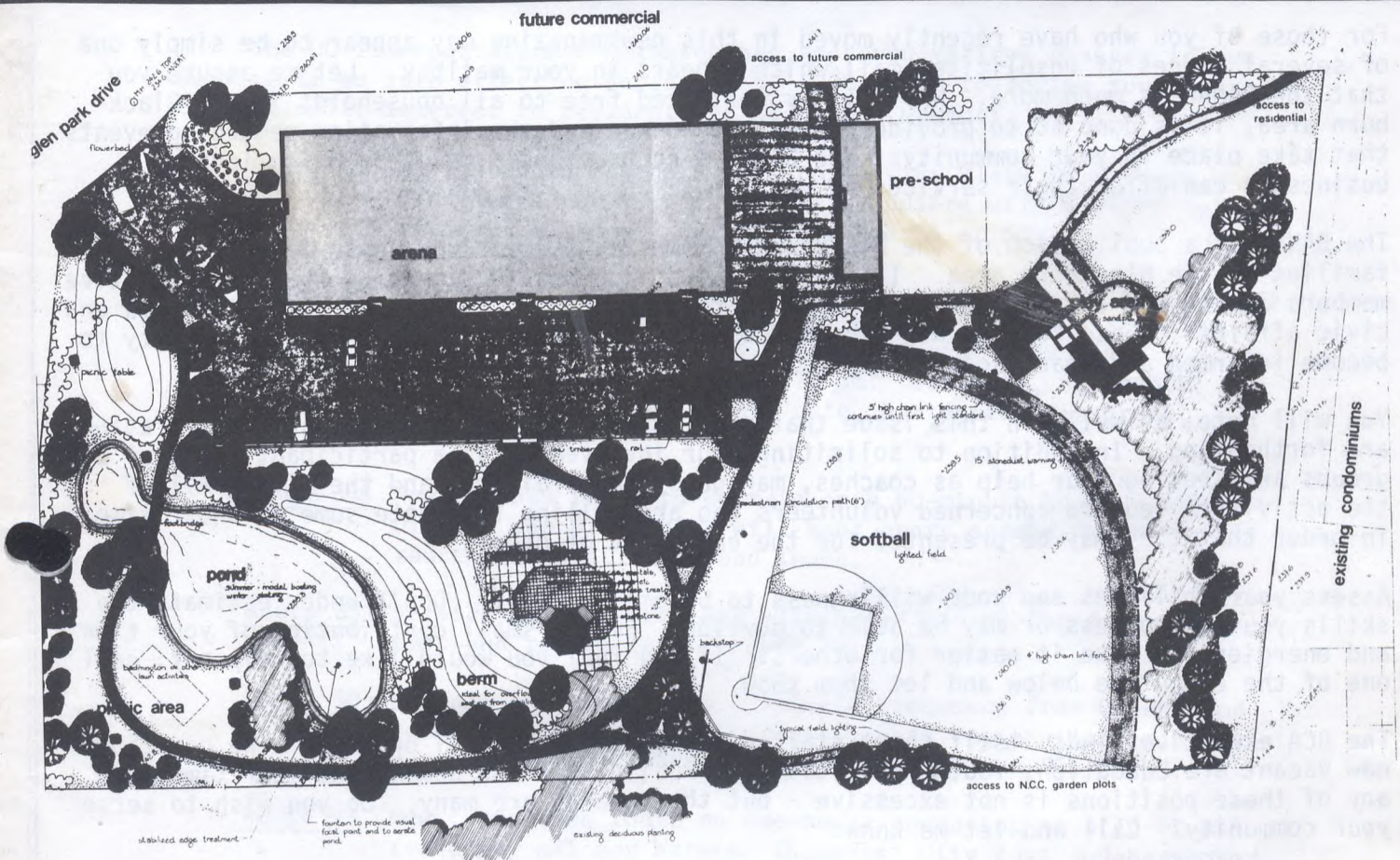

TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE NOTICE

Bus Service Changes

The OC Transportation Commission has approved various changes in bus service to go into effect on September 5, 1978. The following routes are of particular interest to residents of Blackburn Hamlet:

Route 25 Re-routed in downtown Hull to service Place du Portage only. Passengers for Terrasse de la Chaudière will be able to transfer on Albert Street to route 64 or 65.

Route 36 Eliminated in its present form and replaced by a new all-day route on a 30-minute frequency from St. Laurent Shopping Centre via Blackburn Hamlet to Shoppers' City East. Blackburn Hamlet routing will be: Tauvette, Southpark, Innes, Eastpark, Ridgeburn Gate, Northpark, Bearbrook, Westpark.

Route 36A New minibus route to operate on a 60-minute headway between Orleans and Blackburn; will meet every second mainline route 36 bus at Navan and Innes.

Route 85 Service east of Cummings eliminated and replaced by new east-end routes (e.g., route 36).

Route 30 New all-day route on a 30-minute frequency from Queenswood Heights to Shoppers' City East. This route will replace the service currently provided by routes 36 and 85.

Route 99 New cross-town route on Queensway operating on a 10-minute frequency all day between Shoppers' City East and Bayshore.

Tele Transpo By re-routing the 36 service to cover more of the residential area in Blackburn Hamlet, OC Transpo believes that the elimination of Tele Transpo can be achieved without an unreasonable reduction in level of service. A possibly undesirable effect for some people will be the increased presence of larger buses on roads within the Hamlet. The decision to discontinue Tele Transpo was based on high operating costs and low daytime usage.

Meeting Experience with the new service may dictate the need for adjustments. Your comments and suggestions will therefore be appreciated. In view of the potential interest, there will be a general meeting of the BCA in the library of Glen Ogilvie School on Tuesday, September 26, 1978 at which transportation issues will be discussed and note taken of concerns regarding the present bus service.

MINUTES OF A JOINT B.C.A. AND B.H.C.R.C.C.
 HELD ON JUNE 27, 1978 AT GLEN OGILVIE SCHOOL

Felix Comeau called the meeting to order at 8:16 p.m.

This special meeting was called to discuss the site plans for the Blackburn Park, a Township Park south of the Arena, and Orient Park Drive Community Park, south of Orient Park Drive, east of the McDonald Development. The two Community bodies in attendance were to present to the Township the Community in-put for the design of these Parks so that final planning and construction could proceed as soon as possible.

Blackburn Park: A Site Inventory/Analysis drawing was presented by Jack Copeland to familiarize those in attendance with the Park area. Two concept plans were presented. After considerable discussion it was subsequently decided that Bill Upper and Jack Copeland would present the following ideas to the Gloucester Township.

- a structural playground
- a softball field (possibly lighted)
- a pond

Gloucester Parks and Recreation was to further study the proposals in concert with the landscape architect to come up with a final concept plan.

Orient Park: With consideration of the discussion and proposals relative to Blackburn Park, Mrs. Darling was to further consider the requirements of the Orient Park Drive Community Park so as not to conflict with or duplicate the Township Park.

Meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

The Recreation and Parks Department of the Township of Gloucester invites your comments on the Blackburn Park Master Development Concept Plan, shown on the cover. The park, designated as a Township park, is located off Glen Park Drive, south of Innes Road in the Hamlet.

The Master Concept Plan includes a hard-surface play area, basketball court, and a softball diamond. Also planned is a park pavillion, picnic area, and a 12" deep man-made pond which would be used for outdoor skating during the winter and model boating throughout the summer. For the children, a creative play area is being proposed. The park facilities connected by asphalt pathways, will be combined with landscaped open spaces.

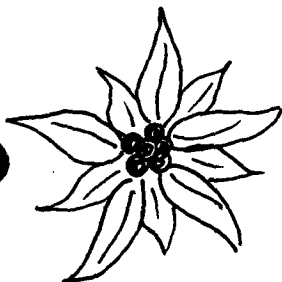

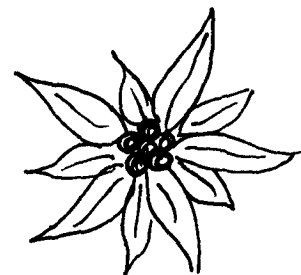

CIVIC AFFAIRS

CROSSWALKS

Region was forced to change its implementation schedule this summer and as a result they will not be able to install crossing lights on Bearbrook (near the south entrance to Centrepark) until later this fall. As for the lights on Innes Road between Southpark and Beddoe Lane, they are now planned for next spring. Gloucester Township requested that these lights be relocated somewhat with the result that more crossing counts must be taken.

SHOPPING CENTRES

Lehey & Assocs. indicate that they still hope to complete their plaza (to be located on the south-west corner of Innes Road and Bearbrook) by late fall or early winter.

Harry King of Kemper Realty informs me that he is now re-negotiating for a major food store to be located in the shopping centre planned for the south-east corner of Innes and Bearbrook (the former food chain has called a halt on all new construction in Canada). Consequently, this centre will not be opening until sometime in 1979. In the meantime, Mr. Ken Eyre has opened a drugstore in a temporary building on the site. The B.C.A. welcomes the arrival of a drugstore to our community and wishes Mr. Eyre well.

CHIMNEYS

Mr. John Mercer is leading the sub-committee investigating deteriorating chimneys (related to gas furnaces) and he should have more to report next month. If you want further information give him a call at 824-6704.

QUARRY BLASTING

Most residents of the Hamlet are probably aware of the severe blast which occurred on the morning of August 29. Discussions with the Manager of the quarry and with the president of Francon indicate that CIL was experimenting with a new blasting technique that day. Several charges were planned to explode a few milli-seconds apart in a number of holes. This method, with several small charges, was to have less effect on the surrounding environment than one with a single large charge. However the blast did not go as planned. CIL speculate that there was an hydraulic connection between the holes (i.e. water in the rock and holes) and that the explosion of the first charge produced water pressure in a second hole forcing a detonator and/or explosive into the air where it exploded. This caused severe over-pressure and airborne concussion and as a consequence residents of Blackburn heard a very loud bang, windows rattled and dishes shook. CIL also feel that because some of the charge was probably in the air at the time of the explosion, ground vibration would be actually less than usual. Notwithstanding this, there is strong evidence that some basement walls were actually cracked on August 29 and that the ground shock was much greater than normal. Consequently some Hamlet residents have made claims against Francon (and his insurance agent has investigated). In addition, the following parties have been contacted in an attempt to ascertain what actually occurred and who is responsible for whatever damage did occur:

Civic Affairs Continued ...

- Environment Ontario (re Vibration and Sound)
- Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (responsible for Pits and Quarries)
- Ontario Ministry of Labour (Health and Safety)
- Gloucester Township

Hopefully, by the next Banar I can give a more conclusive report concerning this particular blast. However, the problems related to quarry blasting go beyond this particular incident and can perhaps be divided into three time-frames:

1. Present-to-Date

The concern of residents here is to obtain just compensation for any damage that may have been caused by quarry blasting in the past. If you feel that you have suffered damages related to explosions at the quarry you can submit a claim to:

However, be aware that not all basement cracks are necessarily the result of quarry blasting. Settling of foundations and house design problems can also cause cracks (e.g. there are some house models that show cracks in the same location).

2. Near-Term

The concern here is to ensure that blasting errors do not re-occur at the quarry and that their explosions do not bother Hamlet residents. Perhaps tighter controls (e.g. ensuring that blasts do not occur under heavy over-cast conditions) and licensing of blasting personnel is necessary. Some provinces require much more of blasters than does Ontario and further discussion is planned regarding these aspects (i.e. with Provincial Ministries, Members of Parliament, Municipal Representatives and others).

3. Long-Term

Some estimates indicate that the quarry has sufficient rock to allow them to continue operating for at least ten more years. Many Hamlet residents feel that if the problems outlined in 1 and 2 above are not resolved satisfactorily, pressure then should be mounted to have the quarry closed before all of its rock supply is exploited. What do you think? If you have any opinions or ideas please give me a call.
