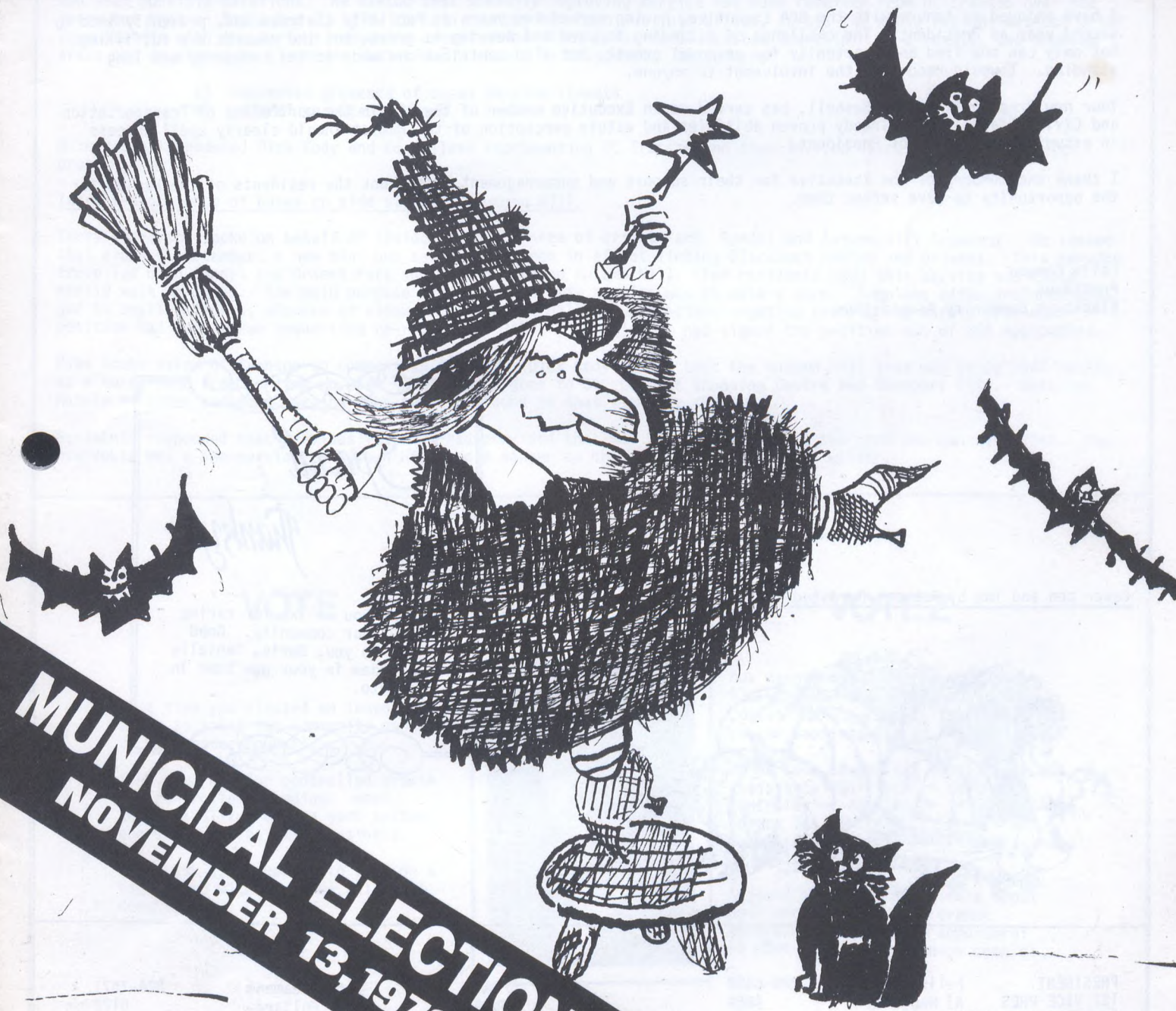

GENERAL MEETING

Held on 26 September, 1978

The meeting consisting of approximately 50 people was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Felix Comeau who introduced Mike Roche, the Transportation Member of the BCA Executive.

Mike Roche explained that the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the present bus service, identify problem areas, and seek possible solutions. He stated that steadily improving service had been received from OC Transpo over the years but that on September 5, 1978, certain changes had been put into effect, across the whole region, without prior consultation with the various community organizations that exist in Gloucester Township. As a result, two problem areas had developed in Blackburn Hamlet which should be discussed. These were:

- a) increased presence of buses on side streets
- b) general service problems.

Mike Roche introduced Dick Cody and Ed Kollsh representing OC Transpo and then invited discussion of the first problem area.

Increased presence of buses on side streets - Autumn Hill

Terry Henderson spoke on behalf of residents in the area of Orient Park, Rondel and Autumn Hill Crescent. He stated that since 5 September, a new mini-bus service had been in effect linking Blackburn Hamlet and Orleans. This service travelled down Rondel and Orient Park and made a turn on Autumn Hill. Few residents used this service and could easily walk to Innes. The main purpose of going into this section was to make a turn. Problems cited included danger to small children, absence of sidewalks on Autumn Hill and a gradient creating traffic and safety problems. A petition had been taken requesting re-routing of 36A. 190 residents had signed the petition out of 206 approached.

Mike Roche asked OC Transpo to comment on the 36A. Dick Cody agreed that the Autumn Hill area was being used partly as a turnaround area to link up with the 36 which goes to St. Laurent Shopping Centre and Shoppers City. Unfortunately no other suitable turning area could be found in that vicinity.

Residents responded that previously the 36 had provided the link to Orleans without the problems caused by 36A. The new route was a non-service to Autumn Hill and a danger to children, particularly in winter.

Minutes of 26 September General Meeting - Continued.

Westpark

Marilyn Giekes reported for Westpark Drive and some residents on side streets off Westpark. She stated that a petition had been taken and 86% of the households were in favour of continuing the new 36 bus route on Westpark Drive. Problems cited were the presence of small children and the unsuitability of the road structure. Also there appeared to be no economic justification for the frequency of the 36, considering the low utilization by residents of Westpark and side streets off of Westpark.

Other residents added their views:

- a) farthest distance to Bearbrook is 0.4 miles;
- b) two senior citizens and some teenagers wish to retain new service;
- c) shock damage to houses and noise pollution;
- d) effect on property values;
- e) excessive speed of some buses;
- f) twenty-two buses counted driving a ninety-minute period;
- g) road not built for buses;
- h) large buses (55 passenger) being used on 36 service as well as medium buses (31 passenger);
- i) the express route is acceptable as it provides a real service;
- j) the 36 route provides 4 buses per hour until past midnight which appears unjustifiable in terms of the ridership.

Views were expressed that the sector streets (Westpark, Northpark, Southpark, Eastpark and Centrepark) had been built as collector streets but there was considerable doubt concerning the ability of these streets to handle fixed routes like the 36, or even the 25 express service.

OC Transpo representatives stated that it was the intention to use only the medium size buses on the 36 route and that they would look into the complaint that large buses were also being used.

During the discussion of routing to avoid Westpark, there was a reaction from Bearbrook residents who felt strongly that they did not want the 36 route on Bearbrook, having experienced bus traffic going past their houses over the last few years.

Eastpark, Ridgeburn Gate, Northpark

Mel Dighton reported on behalf of Eastpark residents and stated that a petition had been started but was not complete. It seemed that about 65 per cent of the households polled were opposed to the 36 route. He could not understand the economics of large buses travelling practically empty on a thirty-minute frequency. He asked that the justification was. OC Transpo representatives replied that the following factors had led to the discontinuation of tele-transpo:

- a) maintenance cost per mile was nearly three times as great for mini-buses as for the large buses;
- b) extra minis had to be employed during peak hours causing additional labour and operating costs;
- c) operation of radio-control dispatch centre was costly;
- d) many users preferred fixed route over uncertainty of service on call.

Residents questioned the cost aspects, e.g., how did total operating costs compare between tele-transpo and new fixed routes, and had the mileage increased? OC Transpo representatives replied that it was still too early to know.

Southpark, Tauvette

Residents of Southpark and Tauvette were concerned about the condition of the roads but expressed satisfaction with many aspects of the bus service. A teenage representative spoke of the need for buses for young people and the importance of not developing an anti-bus complex. The point was made that there is a great absence of facts and figures about roads, operating costs, destinations, etc., against which to judge the existing service.

The OC Transpo representatives stated that origin/destination surveys were conducted from time to time with bus users but that no data was available to them from the household level. The driving force behind most of the changes was the new route 99 which runs from west to east across the region conforming to future rapid transit concepts.

Summary of segment dealing with increased presence of buses

Mike Roche summarized the discussions and pointed out that the old convenience routes and tele-transpo service had been replaced by a route 36 shuttle to St. Laurent and Shoppers City. In view of the relationship with service considerations, he suggested that any motions be withheld until discussion of the next item - general service problems. This was agreed by the meeting.

General Service Problems

Councillor Shackleton expressed concern over the suitability of roads to withstand the shock and vibration of heavy bus traffic and asked whether OC Transpo ever looked into this aspect when designing routes. OC Transpo representatives replied that they selected obvious routes and larger roadways to the extent possible but that there was no consultation on a regular basis with municipal road engineers.

A resident from Centrepark expressed the view that the 36 route should go down Centrepark. Other residents supported the need for off-peak services for teenagers, students and senior citizens in particular.

Comments were received on behalf of residents working in such areas as Startop Road and St. Laurent Boulevard who did not have a convenient bus service. It was suggested that the 36 route should go down Cyrville Road.

Minutes of 26 September General Meeting - Continued.

A number of complaints were expressed about the removal of the 85 service which was convenient for people going to NRC and along Montreal Road. The new arrangements involve transfers at Shoppers City and the possibility of a 30-minute wait if a 36 connection is missed.

A suggestion was made that the 36 service might be extended from St. Laurent to the RCMP and from Shoppers City to NRC and along Montreal Road.

It was pointed out that dropping the old 36 service to RCMP had created more passengers from the 25 which was now overcrowded.

Residents from the Cleroux/Atkins/Keystone area complained that they no longer had a bus service unless they walked to Eastpark.

Summary of Overall Situation

In summarizing the situation, Mike Roche suggested that three alternatives existed:

- 1) continue with the present service;
- 2) make adjustments to the present service; or
- 3) go back to the old service.

It was apparent that many people favoured the third alternative. However, the OC Transpo representatives held out no hope that this was possible.

MOTION

It was moved by John Hollins and seconded by Ed Hunt that:

"BCA advise the OC Regional Transportation Commission of its dissatisfaction with the lack of consultation with the community before the routes were changed on September 5, 1978 which has resulted in a significantly poorer level of service to residents of Blackburn Hamlet. The community association urges OC Transpo to review the service in the area in consultation with the association and then design and implement a service worthy of the name".

The motion was passed with three people opposed.

ACTION

Mike Roche undertook to convey the petitions and the views of the association to OC Transpo, through the Gloucester Transportation Committee. He asked for volunteers who would be prepared to assist in a review of bus service requirements and the following submitted their names:

CIVIC AFFAIRS

Quarry Blasting

No new information has been received regarding the cause of the severe blast which occurred August 29th. However, Environment Ontario is installing instruments in the Hamlet which will continuously monitor ground vibration and over-blast pressure for a period of 6 weeks. It is hoped to eventually have this type of monitoring made permanent and to require licensing of blasting personnel (discussion related to these objectives is still continuing at the Township and Provincial levels). Meanwhile, some residents have filed claims with Francon or their own insurance company as a result of damage occurring on the 29th, but at writing, these claims were still being processed.

Shopping Centres

As you will have noticed, Lehey & Associates has started construction of their plaza on the south-east corner of Bearbrook and Innes. Completion is scheduled for late this year or early next.

Harry King, of Kemper Realty, informs me that the shopping centre planned for the south-east corner of Bearbrook and Innes has signed another supermarket chain which will allow the centre to be completed in 1979.

Last month I welcomed a druggist to the Hamlet, Mr. Ken Erye. Subsequently, I was informed that our new drugstore has two druggists. Consequently, I would like to take this opportunity to welcome, as well, Mr. Gord Lane, and wish him all of the best.

Deteriorating Chimneys

John Mercer (824-6704) is still persuing the matter with the Gas company and with Township and Provincial officials.

Street Lights

It was brought to my attention that Township depends on residents to report burnt-out streetlights. Otherwise, it could be some time before they are noticed by Township employees. Recently, one resident of the Hamlet counted and reported 27 burnt-out lights! However, call Township offices during normal office hours or lights would be replaced in off-hours with a resultant increase in cost.

Municipal Elections

As you are probably aware, Gloucester Township will be having an election on November 13th. Consequently, it is hoped to have an all-candidates meeting here in the Hamlet early in November. Watch for the announcement.

New Civic Affairs Chairman

Mr. Barry Parsons is taking over Civic Affairs as I have been appointed President of the B.C.A. (Felix Comeau is moving to Toronto). I know Barry will do a good job and I hope he enjoys Civic Affairs as much as I did. TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

Bus Service

Following the General Meeting reported elsewhere in this issue, a letter was sent to the General Manager, OC Transpo, conveying BCA's concern that prior consultation did not take place before recent changes in bus service were decided upon.

In addition, attention was drawn to problems that now exist regarding the number of buses on the streets and the service being provided. It was requested that a joint review take place and that mechanisms be developed that will provide for community input to be considered before future changes are finalized.

Blackburn Hamlet By-Pass

Terms of reference have been developed to prepare a functional design for a proposed by-pass running to the south of the Hamlet. A qualified consultant has been identified by the regional planning department and it is expected that the study will get underway early in the new year.

Public participation will occur at four stages. First, there will be an "open house" at the commencement of the study. Subsequent meetings are planned at the route identification stage, the evaluation stage, and before final route selection. BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING

BCA Executive Meeting Held September 19, 1978 at Glen Ogilvie School

Felix Comeau announced that he and his family would be moving to Toronto and that as of October 31, 1978 he would be resigning as President. A successor would be chosen by the executive at their next meeting of October 3, 1978 and nominations would be heard at that time.

It was also pointed out that three other executive positions were vacant: Publicity, Education and Youth Activities. Members of the Executive were asked to seek out interested candidates.

Dick Cottingham, who had been looking after and running the BCA printing press, indicated that considering the current use of the press it was not advisable to continue operating and maintaining the press. A motion was passed to authorize the sale of the press. Local requirements for photocopying and printing is to be contracted through the chairman of Publicity for all Hamlet groups.

Eldon Kemp, Chairman of Maintenance, indicated that it would likely cost the BCA about \$2,000 beyond the amount to be obtained through insurance for repair of the field house at Blackburn Public School, that suffered fire damage earlier this year.

Lois Kemp has agreed to remain on as Chairperson of Fun Fair. This coming year will see past Chairpersons actively helping and supporting Lois. Additional community support is being solicited.

Colin Sangster pointed out that all schools are booked for evening and weekend activities and that about three weeks lead time is required for obtaining a new booking.

BCA Executive Meeting Held October 3, 1978 at Glen Ogilvie School

Two nominations were received for the position of President of the BCA. Members of the Executive voted by concealed ballot and chose George Bushell as the new President to take office November 1, 1978.

Mike Roche, Chairman of Transportation, led discussion on the outcome of the General Meeting of the BCA held September 26, 1978 to determine the community's reaction to the new busing routes and schedules. A complete report is provided elsewhere in this issue. He also discussed the status of the Innes Road implementation study and stressed the importance of public input into the forthcoming meetings to be announced.

Al Haggerty noted that Information Gloucester, a valuable Township service, is in need of volunteers to help out - call 741-0770. Free air time is available to any group to announce or discuss activities of interest on television or radio.

Barry Parsons was nominated to replace George Bushell as Civic Affairs Chairman.

Following the meeting, John Fargey agreed to stand as Publicity Chairman and Gwen Pollard volunteered as Education Chairperson. Gwen will also be co-editor on the BANAR.

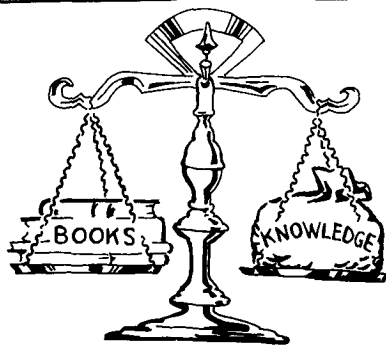

2. Each separately assessed property is entitled to file either one statement of support of, or one statement of objection to the proposal which is referred to hereinafter with the Committee whose postal address is:

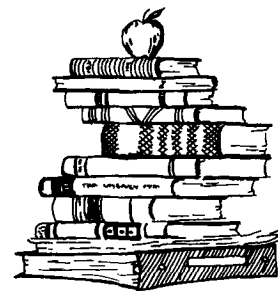

In the event of receipt of both a statement of support and objection in relation to the same property, both statements will be disregarded. All statements must be received no later than the day prior to the specified date of the annual meeting.

3. The object of the annual general meeting is to ensure that ratepayers and Council are kept informed and to determine the extent of approval or opposition to the proposal.
4. During the past year the B.H.C.R.C.C. has in addition to its usual activities of supervising and maintaining park facilities in Blackburn Hamlet been engaged in the following activities:
 - a) Discussed the development of Orient Park park including review of preliminary concept plans and discussion of further land acquisitions adjacent to the park. Negotiations are in progress with the N.C.C. respecting lease of N.C.C. lands adjacent to the park.
 - b) Engaged in discussions and negotiations with the Carleton Board of Education concerning the upgrading of the school yard for use in non-school hours as a park, play and baseball facility. A consultant has viewed the site and expressed a preliminary opinion.
 - c) Developed a concept plan for Red Maple Park which is now up to basic standards. This and items (a) and (b) as well as playground facilities for other Hamlet parks are to be paid for out of the \$50,000 budgeted amount already approved although specific amounts are not yet earmarked for specific parks.
 - d) Hired park and pool supervisors and maintenance personnel for the summer months at a cost of \$13,300.
 - e) Developed a concept plan for the development of a softball diamond at Ecole Ste. Marie in accordance with the previously approved amount of \$12,000.
 - f) Authorized and completed the construction of a wading pool in Bearbrook Park, adjacent to the existing pool as well as a grassy landscaped enclosure and an addition to the existing building to house additional pool equipment and provide secure storage facilities at a cost of \$40,464., which cost was applied against the capital reserve fund. Wintario and provincial grants have been applied for in connection with this project.
 - g) Negotiated with the separate school board a lease of sufficient lands adjacent to the existing tennis courts for two new tennis courts and authorized the preparation of tenders. The sum of \$ 40,000 which was previously approved for this project has been earmarked.
 - h) Improvements to the existing tennis courts such as lighting, a windscreen and other similar items has been discussed with the BCA representatives. The previously approved sum of \$15,000 is budgeted for such improvements.
 - i) Discussion as to the placement of approved basketball and volleyball facilities in an amount of \$3,000.
 - j) Discussions of ball diamond improvements excluding Bearbrook park and landscaping in several parks for the previously approved amount of \$10,000 have ensued. Due to the still uncertain requirements for landscaping no further action has been taken.
 - k) Quotations will be requested for the overhang to the backstop in Bearbrook Park which has been previously approved in the amount of \$1,000.
5. As it is expected that for the year 1979 the Committee will be fully occupied in maintaining and supervising existing facilities and taking further actions to implement the previously approved projects, no new proposals are contemplated.
6. Resolution of Council requires this Committee within 30 days after the date of the annual general meeting to submit to Council for its consideration, a list of names of persons whom the Committee, having brought same before the annual meeting, recommends for appointment to serve on the Committee for the next following year. We would appreciate receiving the names and addresses of all interested persons which may be sent to the Secretary at the above address. We will also entertain nominations from the floor at the annual meeting.



Gloucester Public Library



Blackburn Library

The Gloucester Public Library Board is planning to relocate its Blackburn Hamlet Branch to the proposed shopping centre, "Blackburn Shoppes". The Board would like to keep your Association informed of its plans, and to receive your comments. The following are the Board's reasons for considering the move.

In the delivery of library services, the Board feels that the provision of suitable quarters must be one of its primary concerns. Suitable quarters have the following characteristics:

1) Good Location

Experience has shown that a public library is like a commercial enterprise: the community makes the most use of it when it is located in a busy commercial area where there are numerous other activities and sources of interest. Blackburn Shoppes promises to provide such an environment.

2) Easy access

This refers to traffic access, adequate car parking and street level situation. The third qualification is very important for the elderly, the handicapped, and small children. As you know, the library is located at present at the second-floor level. Some users have also complained about inadequate parking.

3) Adequate Space

Modern public library services include the provision of space for programs, reading, and study, as well as for books. To meet this requirement, the Library Board has adopted a standard to provide between 0.3 to 0.4 square feet of library space per capita for the population served. The present location provides 0.17 square feet, while the new location will provide almost 0.4 square feet per capita.

In summary then, new quarters in "Blackburn Shoppes" would provide a more suitable location, better access, and more space than is available at the present library. Re-locating the library will inevitably entail increased costs, for both the initial "start-up", and the ongoing operations; the Library Board feels, however, that the costs are justified by the important role which the public library is called upon to play in this community.

The Library Board will be pleased to answer any questions you may have and to receive your comments on its plans for the Blackburn Hamlet branch.
