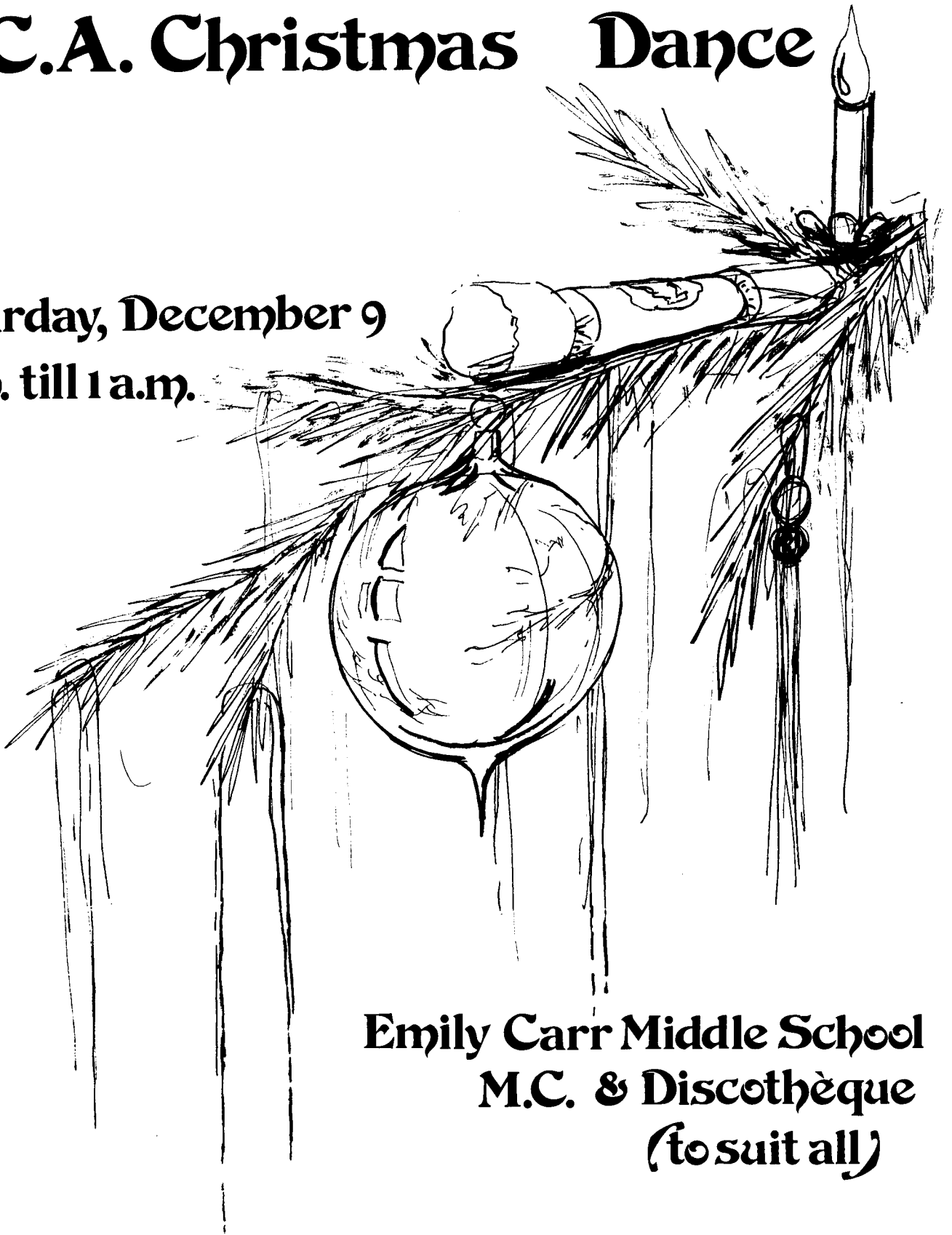

Blackburn Hamlet By-Pass

Since the last issue of the BANAR, the Ontario Municipal Board has reached a decision to permit major growth in the Orleans area. This confirms the need for a feasibility study of a possible by-pass route to carry traffic which cannot be accommodated on the Queensway.

Terms of reference have now been approved and the study will get underway shortly. One issue emerging is what will happen to Innes Road as a result of the study? Hopefully, when its role as a "non-throughway" is confirmed, attention will be given to necessary functional and visual improvements.

A second issue relates to the proximity of the proposed by-pass to the southern part of the community. It is essential that this issue be satisfactorily resolved during the course of the study.

Bus Service

Twenty-three interested residents turned out on Halloween night to participate in a two and a half hour workshop. This was a follow-up to the very well attended General Meeting reported in last month's BANAR and OC Transpo representatives were again in attendance. Agreement has been reached on the following service changes to be implemented at the beginning of December:

- a) extension of route 36 beyond Shoppers City to NRC;
- b) re-routing of 36 to cover Cyrville Road;
- c) re-routing of 36A to pick-up passengers for the 36 from Cleroux;
- d) termination of 36A on the arena road (this provides timed connection with 36 and eliminates Autumn Hill problem).

The remaining problems have to do with routing and frequency of route 36 buses within the Hamlet. As a result of the workshop, a basic proposal will be presented as a resolution in next month's BANAR. The basic proposal will be subject to a number of options which will be presented as amendments to the main motion.

A General Meeting will be held in January to vote on the amendments and main motion. In brief, the picture is shaping up as follows:

- Amendment No. 6. Present 36 service to be reduced to one hour frequency in "off-peak".
5. Minibus only to be used in "off-peak".
 4. 36 service to travel down Centrepark.
 3. 36 service not to travel down Westpark.
 2. Reduction of speed and improvement of road-beds.
 1. Investigation of additional "collector bus" for local pick-up.
Route 36 buses to depart from central point.

Main Motion: Retain route 36 subject to any changes.





DO YOU GIVE A HOOT ABOUT YOUR CHILD'S EDUCATION?

In the past the education committee of Blackburn Community Association has done an excellent job in acting as a liaison between the home, school and board. They have held informal meetings with principals, information meetings for the public all-candidates meetings and made presentations to the Carleton Board of Education on behalf of the community. HOWEVER, if this committee is to continue (and the need is present) we must have members from the community who will

give a little of their time to assist. Serving on this committee would not involve excessive meetings but would help to ensure that the needs of all the children in the community are met. Parent groups within each school should consider having a representative on this committee so that the needs of each school are represented. Volunteers from both the Catholic and Public school systems would be welcome. Our main objective will be to act as a liaison in keeping the lines of communication open. YOUR CHILD needs your support so if interested please contact me at 824-8122.

In addition, I invite parents, principals, teachers to contact me and keep me informed regarding activities occurring within the schools. If there is a special event or something you feel the community at large would be interested in, let us hear from you. An informed community is an interested and active community. In this vein, let us look at the community schools as they started another school year. Three months have gone by and students are settling into their regular classroom routines.

BLACKBURN PUBLIC SCHOOL: The approximate enrollment in this school as of September 30/78 is 278 students in grades K-5. Mr. W.G. Crowder is the new principal this year, returning to the Hamlet to assume these duties. The school consists of 11 classes and no portables are on sight.

GLEN OGILVIE SCHOOL: In this school we find an enrollment of approximately 840 students in 31 classes K-5. The largest enrollment in the area it is necessary to have 5 portables on sight. French Immersion classes involve about three-quarters of the school population. One English class is conducted at each level with 2 English classes at the grade 4 and 5 level. From the approximately 840 students, 500 are bused to the school. Mr. Robert Whittle is the new principal this year.

ECOLE STE. MARIE SCHOOL: Enrollment figures for this school in the Hamlet are approximately 310 students. No portables are needed as the students are housed in some 11 classrooms. This school is a French language school and the principal is Mr. R. Vachon.

BLACKBURN ROMAN CATHOLIC SCHOOL: A total of 660 students attend this school in 25 classes with grade levels from Junior Kindergarten to grade 6. Due to limited space 6 portables are on sight this year. The school also draws from the Pineview and Navan areas. A new school is planned for the Pineview area, hopefully in the near future and will relieve some of the overcrowding when completed. The principal of this school is Mr. H. Marshall.

EMILY CARR MIDDLE SCHOOL: Mr. Carson Stratton has joined the staff as principal of this grade 6-8 school. Enrollment figures are approximately 728 students. Due to the number of students enrolled it is necessary to have 2 portables. The school is divided into 5 "houses" House Bella Coola, House Comox, House Haida, House Nootka and House Tlinget with a total of 21 classes. Busing is necessary for approximately half the students attending Emily Carr.

With the five elementary schools listed above, the approximate number of students attending in the Hamlet numbers 2800 with the classes numbering approximately 100. In addition, two high schools serve the Blackburn Hamlet, Gloucester High on the west, and Cairine Wilson secondary on the east.

GLOUCESTER HIGH: Gloucester enrollment figures as of September 30/78 are in the area of 1900 students. Mr. Terry Brennan is the principal of this high school which draws students from the Blackburn Hamlet area. Last year there was an overcrowding problem so in order to alleviate this portables were added this year.

EDUCATION CONTINUED:

CAIRINE WILSON SECONDARY: Students from the eastern section of the Hamlet attend Cairine Wilson where there is a total of 1035 students enrolled in 124 courses. This presents an increase of approximately 200 students over last year. If the present rate of growth continues, it may be necessary for portables next year. As well as the need for class space there will be a need for more lab and technical space. A study we have been told is underway with school officials to decide on ways of providing space. Further information regarding this will be forthcoming later in the year. Mr. J. McDonald is principal of the school.

In future issues of the Banar, the Education Committee hope to have information briefs on a number of topics including curriculum, special services, overcrowding or declining enrollment and how it will affect your child, busing and other topics of general interest. If you would like to see information on a particular topic, please feel free to call.

ELECTIONS: Elections will have taken place by the time you receive this issue. In the next Banar, we will have an article introducing your new trustees on the Carleton Boards of Education.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE: I would like you to refer back to the beginning of this article and give serious consideration to the need for members to assist on the Education Committee of the Blackburn Community Association. There is a need and those who will benefit from such a committee will be YOUR child.

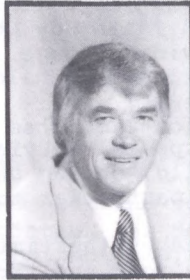

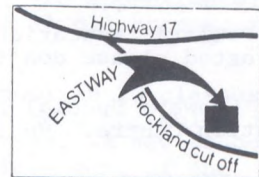

NOTICE OF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE BLACKBURN HAMLET COMMUNITY RECREATION CENTRES COMMITTEE

Pursuant to the provisions of By-Law No. 172 of 1975 of the Corporation of the Township of Gloucester and the resolution of Council dated the 10th day of April, 1978; the following are the particulars of the upcoming annual general meeting to be held on November 28, 1978:

- 1. The meeting will be held on November 28, 1978 at 8:00 p.m. in the library of Glen Ogilvie Public School, Blackburn Hamlet.
- 2. Each separately assessed property is entitled to file either one statement of support of, or one statement of objection to the proposal which is referred to hereinafter with the Committee whose postal address is:

K1B 3Y6

In the event of receipt of both a statement of support and objection in relation to the same property, both statements will be disregarded. All statements must be received no later than the day prior to the specified date of the annual meeting.

- 3. The object of the annual general meeting is to ensure that ratepayers and Council are kept informed and to determine the extent of approval or opposition to the proposal.
- 4. During the past year the B.H.C.R.C.C. has in addition to its usual activities of supervising and maintaining park facilities in Blackburn Hamlet been engaged in the following activities:

- a) Discussed the development of Orient Park park including review of preliminary concept plans and discussion of further land acquisitions adjacent to the park. Negotiations are in progress with the N.C.C. respecting lease of N.C.C. lands adjacent to the park.
- b) Engaged in discussions and negotiations with the Carleton Board of Education concerning the upgrading of the school yard for use in non-school hours as a park, play and baseball facility. A consultant has viewed the site and expressed a preliminary opinion.
- c) Developed a concept plan for Red Maple Park which is now up to basic standards. This and items (a) and (b) as well as playground facilities for other Hamlet parks are to be paid for out of the \$50,000 budgeted amount already approved although specific amounts are not yet earmarked for specific parks.
- d) Hired park and pool supervisors and maintenance personnel for the summer months at a cost of \$13,300.
- e) Developed a concept plan for the development of a softball diamond at Ecole Ste. Marie in accordance with the previously approved amount of \$12,000.
- f) Authorized and completed the construction of a wading pool in Bearbrook Park, adjacent to the existing pool as well as a grassy landscaped enclosure and an addition to the existing building to house additional pool equipment and provide secure storage facilities at a cost of \$40,464., which cost was applied against the capital reserve fund. Wintario and provincial grants have been applied for in connection with this project.
- g) Negotiated with the separate school board a lease of sufficient lands adjacent to the existing tennis courts for two new tennis courts and authorized the preparation of tenders. The sum of \$ 40,000 which was previously approved for this project has been earmarked.
- h) Improvements to the existing tennis courts such as lighting, a windscreen and other similar items has been discussed with the BCA representatives. The previously approved sum of \$15,000 is budgeted for such improvements.
- i) Discussion as to the placement of approved basketball and volleyball facilities in an amount of \$3,000.
- j) Discussions of ball diamond improvements excluding Bearbrook park and landscaping in several parks for the previously approved amount of \$10,000 have ensued. Due to the still uncertain requirements for landscaping no further action has been taken.
- k) Quotations will be requested for the overhang to the backstop in Bearbrook Park which has been previously approved in the amount of \$1,000.

- 5. As it is expected that for the year 1979 the Committee will be fully occupied in maintaining and supervising existing facilities and taking further actions to implement the previously approved projects, no new proposals are contemplated.
- 6. Resolution of Council requires this Committee within 30 days after the date of the annual general meeting to submit to Council for its consideration, a list of names of persons whom the Committee, having brought same before the annual meeting, recommends for appointment to serve on the Committee for the next following year. We would appreciate receiving the names and addresses of all interested persons which may be sent to the Secretary at the above address. We will also entertain nominations from the floor at the annual meeting.

AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Members of the
Blackburn Community Association:

We have examined the combined balance sheet of the Blackburn Community Association as at December 31, 1977 and the statements of general fund revenue, expenditure and accumulated net revenue and Bearbrook Park revenue, expenditure and accumulated net revenue for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests and other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances except as explained in the following paragraph.

In common with many non-profit organizations, the Association reports amounts for membership fees, committee revenues and fun fair revenues which are not susceptible of complete verification by audit procedures. Accordingly, our verification of revenue from these sources was limited to a test comparison of recorded receipts against bank deposits.

In our opinion, except for any adjustments that might have been required had revenues been susceptible of complete audit verification, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Association as at December 31, 1977, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

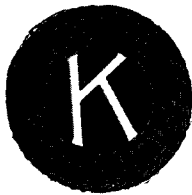

When someone fails to show up for duty, or advises at the last minute they will not be available, additional work and sometimes expense is incurred, so may we please have your co-operation.

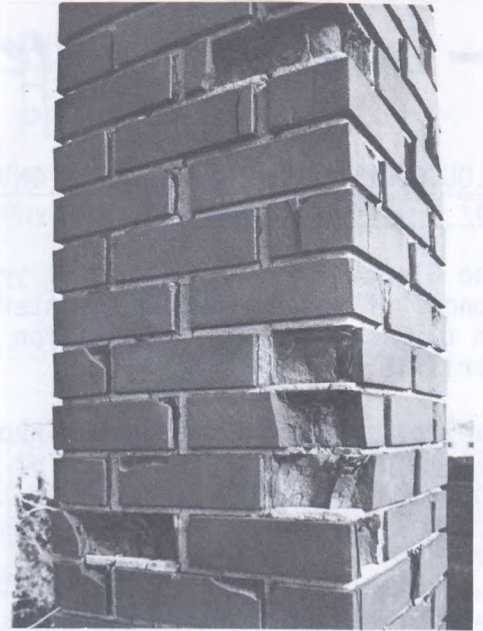
When you are on duty please be on time (or preferable a few minutes early) and ensure that one adult is in that canteen at all times.

Civic Affairs Chairman and John Mercer attended Gloucester Council meeting of October 16, 1978 to request Council to delay signing franchise agreement with Ottawa Gas which was up for renewal. This was favourably received by Council and they further agreed to the arranging of a meeting between parties (Council, Ottawa Gas, Costain and homeowners) to discuss and hopefully resolve the situation. They also agreed tentatively to conduct an inspection of all homes in the Hamlet which have converted to gas.

Quarry Blasting

Installation of monitoring equipment by Ontario Ministry of Environment has been postponed for a month or so due to equipment malfunction. Mrs. E. Gigantes, local provincial MP, is pursuing Legislation route and training requirements for Ontario.
