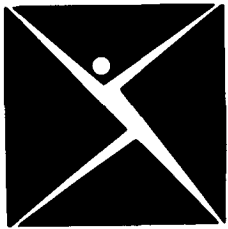

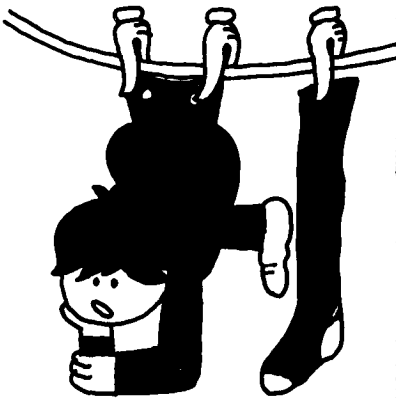

SUMMARY OF THE BCA EXECUTIVE MEETING - MARCH 6, 1979

Al Haggerty (1st Vice-President) reported he is compiling a book on incorporation records which will be kept with the BCA Secretary. Letter of patent, along with copies of all forms pertaining to incorporation, after being signed by the BCA President and Secretary will be placed in the book, as well as copies of all Executive and General meetings. Al will pass original signed forms onto the Bank.

Al also informed the Executive that Plante and Anderson will review the insurance policy in the near future to determine any duplication of coverage between our policy and that of Gloucester Township.

1,400 memberships have been sold to date in the Hamlet. Phil Chartrand also reported that the Newcomers' Club will hold a meeting in April concerning welcoming new residents into the Community.

A BANAR committee consisting of Gwen Pollard, Colin Sangster, Mike Roche and Michelle Ashdown was formed to analyze the requirements of the position of Editor and determine an appropriate division of duties.

A Ratepayers' meeting was held on February 27, 1979 and the distribution of expected per capita grant money from Gloucester Township was ratified. Gerry Beament also stated that registrations for summer sports are presently taking place. Gerry has had no response from the BANAR ad concerning the four sports convenors required. Anyone that would be interested, please contact Gerry at 824-7571.

A meeting of the sub-committee to discuss vandalism in Blackburn Hamlet was held on February 28th at the home of Al Haggerty. Present: Eldon Kemp, Mr. and Mrs. J. Pollard, Mr. and Mrs. B. Parsons, and Al Haggerty. Chief Duncan's comments discussed.

Decision: (1) Investigate noon-hour control of school children. (2) Inquire into possibility of having representative(s) of Gloucester Police speak to executive.

Recommendations: (1) Continue/improve informing Blackburn Hamlet's community residents of existing situation. (2) Seek/find a responsive resident to replace Dave Pugh-Roberts as our Community's representative on the Police/Community Relations Committee. (3) Mr. Tom Hall and a member of the Gloucester Police Department be invited to meet with (a) the facts, figures, stats, etc. and make recommendations.

General Comments: Mr. Hall suggested that providing and publication (regular) of precise, meaningful statistics could have beneficial effects. Example: Kinds/types of vandalism, public or private vandalism.

Following discussion, it was agreed that Al will set up a meeting the first week in April for the Sub-committee to meet with Mr. Hall and Const. Carrier.

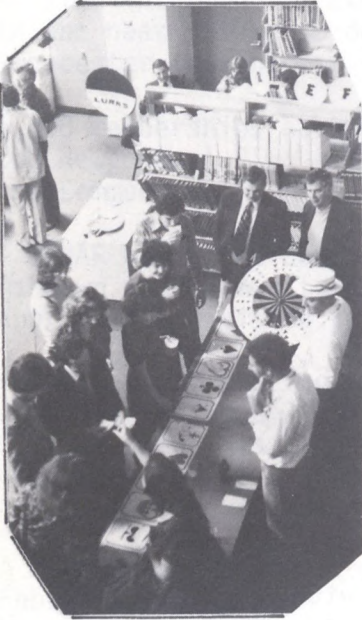

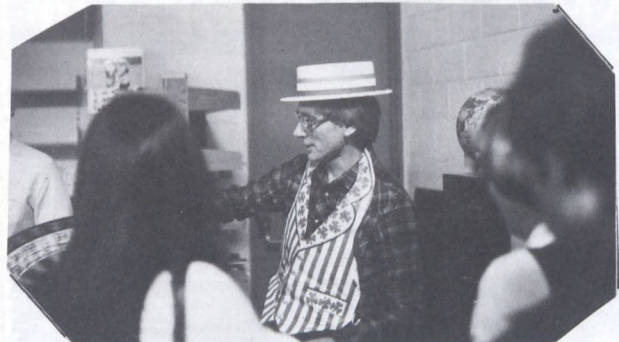

Now that spring is here, programs are being finalized for Bearbrook Pool, with opening scheduled for Fun Fair day demonstrations and public swimming beginning June 4. Family memberships have been raised to \$25 this year - still excellent value judging by the use made of the pool by last year's family members. Single entries are 50 cents; single membership \$12. Learn to swim programs will be held during July and August and 2 bronze medallion courses are scheduled for this summer.

Contracts have been let for fencing along the Navan Road side of Keystone Park and negotiations are underway for a joint school board/community playground in the park. Red Maple park plans have been completed for some time and have top priority on the list of Township projects for this spring. Unfortunately, BHCRC is not able to proceed with plans for Orient Park as yet, since negotiations for an extended park are still not complete. However, consideration is being given to levelling a portion of the present park and placing temporary play equipment on it, so that Orient Park residents do not have to endure another summer without a play area.

Specifications for the new tennis courts are being drawn up; the BHCRC needs final provincial approval on the Wintario application before proceeding with construction.

The BHCRC is again hiring a maintenance attendant and two supervisors for the Hamlet parks during the summer. Supervision schedules will be published at a later date. Repairs to play structures should be complete before the play season is in full swing.

Since I am shortly moving from Ottawa, I am now resigning my position of Chairman of the BHCRC. I have enjoyed working on the Committee and I wish success to all those Blackburn Hamlet residents who continue to donate so much of their time to the development of their community.

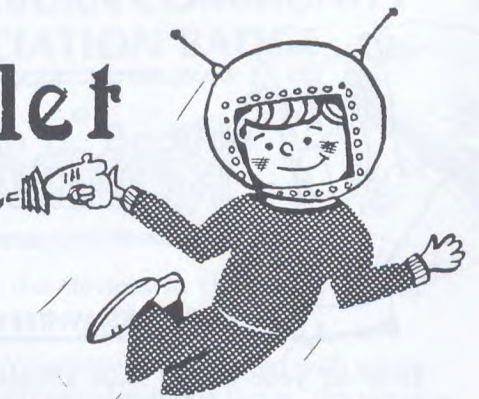

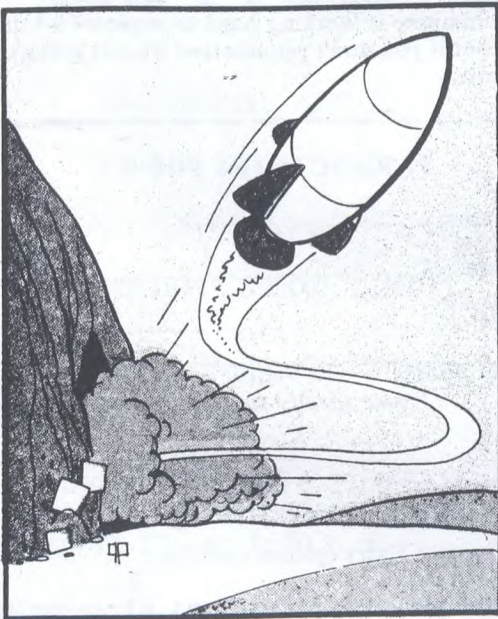

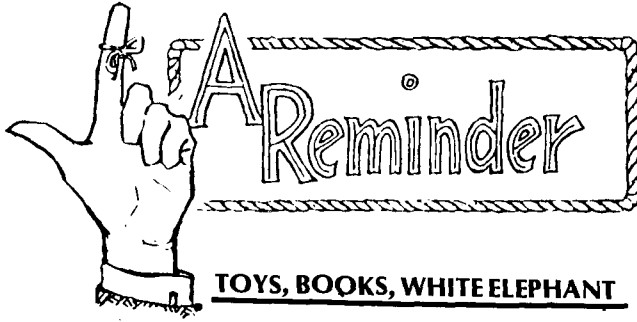

The meaning of the devices in this design are as follows:

The black wavy diagonal stripe edged with white is a symbol for a stream of running water, the word "Burn" being an Old Country term for a brook or stream. Naturally, this "Burn" is black in colour, for Blackburn.

The hornets or wasps (bees) as well as the black wavy stripe are derived from the Arms of Blackburn, Lancashire, England.

The Bees are an emblem of skill, perseverance and industriousness and may, in our badge, be regarded as an indication of the ambition of the members of the Blackburn Community Club to express these qualities not only as participants in sports but as spectator-supporters.

The name "Hornets" seems appropriate for the senior team, while the junior or midget group might be called the Blackburn Wasps - a smaller but equally effective counterpart of the bigger "Hornets".

## THE CARLETON BOARD AND THE GREEN PAPER

*by Ed Campbell - Trustee - Carleton Board of Education*

In the February issue of the BANAR there was an article relating to the restructuring of the Boards of Education in Ottawa-Carleton, and since then, the Green Paper on Education has been published by the Ministry of Education. Perhaps some comment is required, in defence of the Carleton Board and on the Green Paper. The March issue of the BANAR contains a list of the suggestions made in the Green Paper.

Much comment has been made in recent times concerning the tax base in Ottawa and in Carleton; Ottawa has a higher commercial base than we do. However that does not mean that we automatically have a right to share in their pie. Even if we do, it is not clear how great a gain there is to the Carleton ratepayer. The grants would drop correspondingly and it then becomes a question of the amounts which are expended by the Board over Provincial ceilings. Our Board is attempting to define more clearly this matter in preparing the response to the Green Paper - to date, no one has been able to state clearly what the benefits are.

The problem of financing is one that affects both separate and public Boards, and in my view, if our concern is the tax base and the distribution of Ottawa's wealth, then the Province should be looking at the restructuring of the financing of education, not the restructuring of the delivery of education.

The Green Paper has made suggestions for possible changes and with the exception of the fifth suggestion, they give clear control to Ottawa. In the East-West split - #3, in the East Board, Ottawa would have 16 out of 20 members elected and Osgoode, Gloucester and Cumberland would have 4 ( 3 public and 1 separate ). Maybe some would say let Ottawa take over, but we have spent 10 years building a good educational system, why destroy it? Why lose control of it?

I do not suggest that the system should be a memorial to its founder, Bill Davis doesn't need one. But I tire of the view that change is always better. Surely we need stability in education and growth based on it, and not periodically tearing apart what we have, in hope that something better will spring forth. It has been said that those who oppose change are those politicians protecting themselves and members of staff. Anyone who opposes change is often characterized as having an interest to protect. I do have an interest - the continuation of a viable system of education involving a lot of capable people who are dedicated to improving education for our children.

## WHAT'S HAPPENING? EDUCATION WEEK

This meeting will be an information evening to inform the public about the Green Paper issued by the Ontario Ministry dealing with possible re-organization of the Ottawa, Carleton Boards. In addition accomodation problems will be discussed and the public is invited to come with questions on any topic of concern. Trustees from both the public and separate schools; principals and administration staff have been invited to attend. The meeting will be held at Glen Ogilvie Public School, beginning at 8: p.m.

### SCHOOL EVENTS DURING EDUCATION WEEK-April 23-27

Cairine Wilson Secondary School will be holding an Open House on the evening of Tue. April 24th from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. The public is invited.

Emily Carr Middle School will be having a Display Day, Thursday April 26th during the day and the evening as well. Displays of crafts, hobbies and school work will be in the gym, an invitation is extended to the public.

Blackburn Public School, students and staff are hosting an Open House for two days during Education week. Notices will be sent home at a later date.

Glen Ogilvie Public School are planning a number of activities during the week to include: a trampoline demonstration, a multi cultural dessert tasting program.

### BOARD REPORTS:

The Ad Hoc committee of the Board on Eastern Accomodation recommended to the board that as a temporary measure for 1979-80 that a total of 7 portables be added to Cairine Wilson school. This will bring the total number to 8 on sight, for September 1979. In addition it was stated that Grades 5 and 6 from Convent Glen be directed to Henry Munro for grades 6 and 7 in Sept. 1979, this will alleviate somewhat Emily Carr school. These recommendations were approved at the March 19th meeting.

The Special Services Department also plans to add a Senior Learning Disorder class at Emily Carr Middle school in September of 1979.

The School Year Calendar has been set for 1979-1980 and will include 11 PA Days with Christmas holidays set for Dec. 22nd through January 2nd; and the Mid-Winter break Monday March 17th to Fri. March 21st/80.

As a matter of interest the Planning Director advised the Board members that it will be necessary to add 23 portables in the system in Sept/79 at a cost of \$400,000. For reasons of space or program 12 will be required in the elementary panel and 11 in the secondary (7 of these to go to Cairine Wilson).

### KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

Glen Ogilvie Public School will be holding Kindergarten registration on May 2nd and 3rd. Children who live in the Glen Ogilvie School attendance areas for French immersion and for English programs, and who will be 5 years old before December 31/79 are eligible. To register, please call or visit the school to arrange an appointment for one of the above dates. (824-4014)

Blackburn Public School held registrations on April 11th. However, if anyone missed this date they are invited to contact the school (824-1581) and arrangements will be made to register.
