INNES ROAD BYPASS STUDY

By the time this issue of the BANAR reaches you, the Regional 'Open House' Meeting will have been held and the consultants will have reported on the results of their technical analysis of route alternatives. Based on the information available at the end of September, the recommendation will be for a two lane, upgraded Innes Road and a bypass running about 500 feet from the southern boundary of the community.

The salient points to be considered in relation to this recommendation and the draft position paper published in the October BANAR are as follows:

- a) The initial position paper opposed the four-lane Innes Road option and any alternative which would adversely affect the essential character of the community;
- b) Since 1972, the community has consistently supported a wide bypass alternative (i.e., well to the south);
- c) The capital costs of the five proposals evaluated by the consultants revealed that the widest bypass going via Renaud Road was the cheapest alternative at \$6.6 million.
- d) The evaluation of alternatives was conducted by a technical working group comprising regional, township, Cumberland and NCC officials, plus the consultants;
- e) The factors considered were traffic service, cost, community impact, property impact, vegetation impact, agricultural land impact and recreational land impact;
- f) Weights were assigned to the various factors by each individual member of the technical working group as part of the evaluation;
- g) Although the evaluation procedure used has the appearance of being scientific, it in fact represents the subjective views of the nine individuals forming the technical working group.

It is anticipated that the recommendations of the technical working group will be presented to Gloucester Council in mid-November. If you have an opinion on the most appropriate option and have not yet expressed it, the time to be heard is now. You can communicate your views to members of the BCA Sub-Committee or, if you prefer, to any member of the Gloucester Council. COMMUNITY RECREATION CENTRES COMMITTEE**

Pursuant to the provisions of By-Law No. 172 of 1975 of the Corporation of the Township of Gloucester and the resolution of Council dated the 10th day of April, 1978, the following are the particulars of the upcoming Annual General Meeting to be held on NOVEMBER 29, 1979:

1. The meeting will be held on NOVEMBER 29, 1979 at 8:00 p.m. in the Library of Glen Ogilvie Public School, Blackburn Hamlet.
2. Each separately assessed property is entitled to file either one statement of support of or one statement of objection to the proposal which is referred to hereinafter with the Committee whose postal address is:

In the event of receipt of both a statement of support and objection in relation to the same property, both statements will be disregarded. All statements must be received no later than the day prior to the specified date of the Annual Meeting.

3. The object of the Annual General Meeting is to ensure that ratepayers and Council are kept fully informed and to determine the extent of approval or opposition to the proposal.
4. During the past year (1979) the committee held regular meetings at which, in addition to its usual duties of overseeing the park facilities in Blackburn Hamlet, it planned, developed and undertook the following activities:
 - a) Authorized the construction of two new tennis courts in Bearbrook Park adjacent to the existing courts, together with improvements to present facilities, such as lighting, at a cost of some \$55,000.
 - b) Authorized the placement of playground structures and other improvements, such as landscaping, in Red Maple Park, Keystone Park, as well as undertaking a joint venture with the Carleton Board of Education in the construction of a creative playground at Glen Ogilvie Public School. The total cost of the structures and other improvements was some \$30,000.
 - c) With the assistance of the Township Recreation Department established rates and policy with regard to Bearbrook Swimming Pool; hired a pool manager and provided direction where required; net cost \$4,200.
 - d) Hired a person to assist the Township in providing general park maintenance at a cost of some \$1,150.

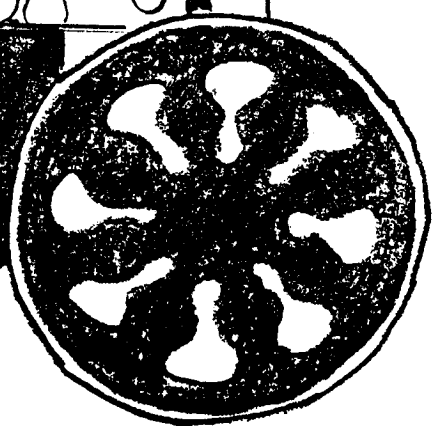
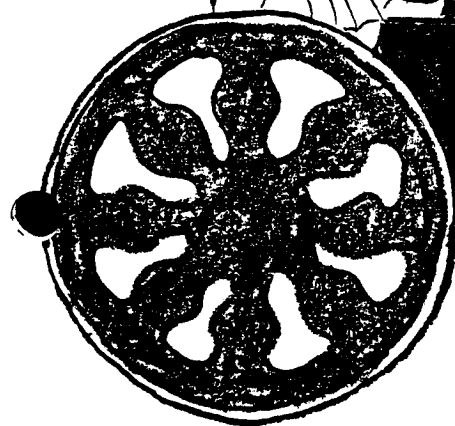
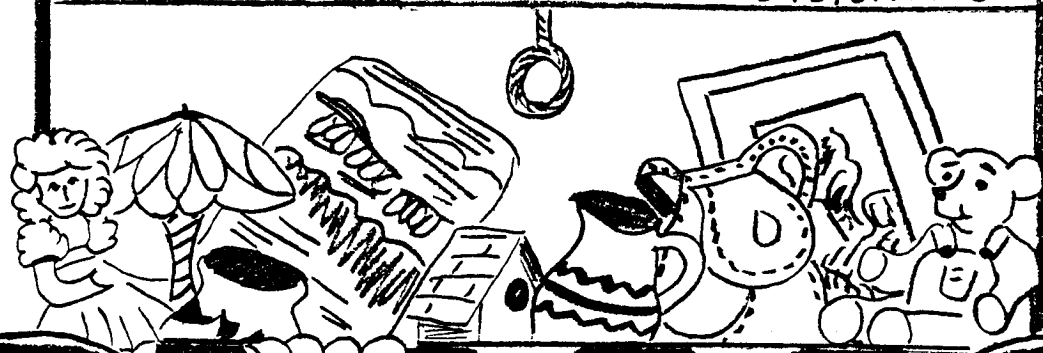

School's In!...

SCHOOL PATROLS - CROSSWALKS

Last month I discussed in this column School Bus Safety. On checking with the Carleton Boards' Transportation office I was pleased to learn that there were only 2 or 3 minor accidents during last year. I'm sure you will agree it's a very good record and with the awareness of motorists, students, parents and teachers we should be able to keep the numbers down.

HOWEVER...over the past six weeks concern has been mounting with regard to the crosswalks in the Hamlet. Residents in the area are concerned for the safety of their children. In particular mention has been made of the one on Bearbrook. In addition, residents are concerned about the safety of the Innes/Bearbrook intersection. To date the use of school safety patrols have been used. Lately, however some problems have come to light regarding this practice.

- older children are not respecting the young (10 & 11 year old) crossing guards
- the crossing guards are not always reliable
- school dismissal times are not the same and in the case of the Bearbrook crosswalk, patrols are only on duty for Blackburn Catholic when in fact children from FOUR SCHOOLS use it
- school patrols from Blackburn Catholic are not insured against any accident.

With traffic increasing on Innes Road, this intersection is becoming hazardous, with several near misses this fall. As a result of the concerns mentioned above, I have approached the township of Gloucester requesting ADULT CROSSING GUARDS. As Education Chairman and on behalf of the BCA, I have requested that council consider hiring two guards, one for the Innes/Bearbrook crossing, and one for the Bearbrook crosswalk. These adults could be available for all dismissal times and over the lunch period. In addition, adults would have the respect of ALL children; adults would have a STOP sign for motorists; with high snow banks an adult is more visible to motorists and an adult would be more reliable.

If you have strong feelings about the use of ADULTS instead of children, please contact me at 824-8122 and advise me of your support. As a community working together-we could make school crossings safer, and possibly prevent YOUR CHILD from being critically hurt.

JANUARY HOLIDAYS???

In the last BANAR I informed you that the Ont. bus drivers association had approached the Minister of Education with a proposal that the schools close in January. I am sure you all read in the local newspapers how the Ottawa Board decided the idea had merit until they heard to the contrary from their taxpayers. It seems the Ottawa Board has decided to reconsider with another vote. It seems unlikely that this idea will go further. In any case the Carleton Board is not considering the proposal. Had the Ottawa Board carried out this motion, Carleton would have to consider it as well. It was interesting to note one reason for this proposal by the bus drivers was to avoid accidents in January. When checking with the Carleton Board re accidents, none of the three minor accidents occurred in Jan. The ice storm in November caused more concern.

CAIRINE WILSON ENROLLMENT..

As expected this year, Cairine Wilson is "bulldozing" at the seams. Seven portables are now on sight with enrollment in the area of 1230. Overcrowding is evident in areas such as gyms, washrooms, science labs and cafeterias. Teachers are being added to relieve the overcrowding of some classes. It seems very evident now that students from Blackburn Hamlet entering Grade 9 in September 1980 will not be welcomed at Cairine Wilson but sent to Gloucester instead. It may be necessary to hold a public meeting before Christmas to discuss this with the parents involved. We will confirm this with the Board members and have more information next month.

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Parent Interviews

The purpose of interviews is to improve communication between the home and the school, and ultimately the education of your child. The teacher will want any problems resolved, just as you do.

EXPRESS CONFIDENCE IN YOUR CHILD

Focus on both the negative and positive but start with the positive.. Ask the teacher what strengths your child has displayed.

DESCRIBE CHILD'S WEAKNESSES

Both you and the teacher know your child isn't perfect, well not quite anyway. Be open about his problems and expect the teacher to be open with you. After you've heard each other, then the real sorting of problems and the setting of goals can begin.

TURN THE PROBLEMS INTO GOALS

Laziness? Clowning around? are these the messages you are receiving? If so dig deeper. Can he not do the work? If so, set a goal to find out just what level of achievement he has attained and what evidence there is that he could do better work. Is he clowning around to attract attention? Set a goal then to look into his social

skills. Find out the facts.

SEEK NEW SOLUTIONS IF NECESSARY

In some cases, children with learning disabilities will never be able to complete the same amount of written work as their peers. If so then insist on shortened assignments, oral exams etc. Set a goal for yourself to find ways to help your child. Obtain all the help that is available and rightfully a part of your child's program.

DEMAND THE FACTS

Open records are available. If you are expected to help your child, make your willingness known by getting involved. Also make it clear that you will need the facts accessible formerly only to teaching staff. Ask for results of standardized tests.

USE AVAILABLE RESOURCES

Even when you go "up the system" you may be helping the classroom teacher as well as your child, more than you think. School systems are large and implementation of change occurs slowly. Community support may be needed, and you, the parent, supporting the idea may be the key to effecting change.

Andy McDonald and Peter Edwards joined our Executive meeting to review the Draft - Position Paper re the Innes Road Bypass Study. A motion was made by Morris Neuman, seconded by Colin Sangster that the Draft - Position Paper be published in the October BANAR.

Mike Roche informed the Executive that the next Public Meeting regarding the By-pass will be held on October 18, 1979 at Glen Ogilvie School. The Gloucester Township Committee and our BCA Sub-Committee are meeting on September 27, 1979 for further discussion re the By-pass.

Many of the Hamlet residents feel that the two crosswalks that have been established in our area are unsafe. A Mrs. Joanne Fenrick feels that the crosswalk on Bearbrook Road is extremely unsafe and is circulating a petition. Mike Roche will contact Mrs. Fenrick. Michelle Ashdown felt that if Mrs. Fenrick wrote a letter to the BANAR Editor re the hazards of the crosswalk that this might be helpful. Peter Edwards stated that he personally feels that the crosswalks are particularly unsafe at night due to their lighting system.

George Bushell is happy to report that Keystone Park, Red Maple Park and Glen Ogilvie Park play structures were installed over the summer. Orient Park has not been built due to the lack of sufficient land at the park site.

It was agreed by the Executive that no better price could be obtained from Ottawa Gas than \$163.00 for a new chimney liner although it was felt that this was not a satisfactory settlement.

It was unanimously agreed by the Executive that the month of issue shown on the front cover of the BANAR will be the month following the actual distribution date (the distribution date will still be the third week of the month). Furthermore, nine issues instead of ten will be published. The issue previously distributed in December will be dropped. With the new dating policy BANAR covers will now read October, November, December, February, March, April, May, June and July.

Chuck Conway informed the Executive that there will be no Octoberfest as no one responded to the BANAR article. However, a children's play will be held sometime this Fall.

Gerry Beament (Sports) presented a new organization for the Sports Committee. Unfortunately many positions still need a volunteer. This organization chart will appear in the October BANAR and hopefully some Blackburn Hamlet residents will come forward and volunteer for the positions of his/her interest.

Day Camp this year was most successful and an estimated profit of \$243.00 was made. 401 participants joined in the Camp activities. Many thanks to Gwen Pollard for all her hard work in helping out with the Day Camp.

The Fun Fair was very successful this year with a profit of \$9,597.65.

HOW TO GET MORE HEAT FROM A FIREPLACE by Sir Michael Chimney Sweeps

Fireplaces are enjoyable but inefficient. There is a net heat loss as fireplaces seldom replace all the warm air which is drawn from the house. A simple, no-expense improvement is to build high heat value fires. Here's how:

1. Remove the grate and build the fire on a bed of ashes. If andirons are used cover the legs with ashes.
2. Place a log against the back wall and a log about 2" smaller in diameter at the front of the fireplace leaving about 6" between the logs. Bed these retaining logs in the ashes to prevent air getting under the fire.
3. Set paper and kindling between the retaining logs and as the fire catches add dry logs. The retaining logs control air flow and reflect heat into the centre producing a heat pocket. Instead of leaping flames and heat driving up the chimney, hot coals are formed which radiate heat into the room. When the retaining logs burn up, push them into the heat pocket and replace them.
4. Keep the ash base at a depth of 2" to 3" so that on retiring you can cover the coals with ashes. This is safer and convenient as a few pieces of kindling placed on the still glowing coals, when the ashes are removed several hours later, will regenerate your fire. The excess ashes are a valuable soil additive for gardens.

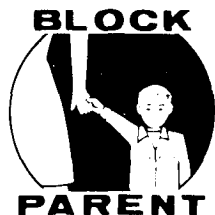


This fire-building method gets more heat sooner for less wood; uses less kindling; and is safer as there are fewer leaping flames to ignite the creosote in the chimney. Try it -- you'll be pleased.



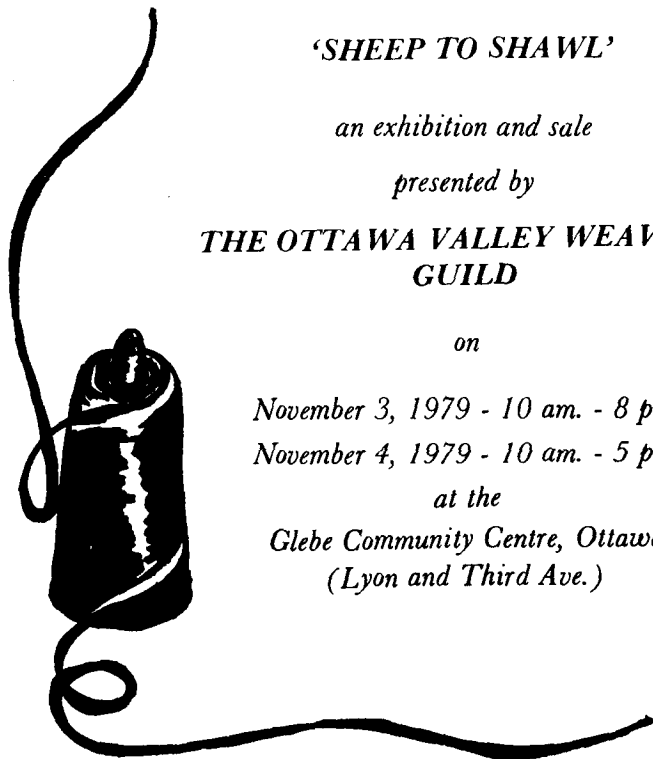

HOUSE PLANTS by Lyn Novak

It to cover a few more basic needs of your tropicals so we can move on to more interesting "stuff".

WATERING - The roots require a certain amount of air. If you overwater your plants, the leaves turn yellow and drop off without wilting. If you underwater, the plant is deprived, its growth is retarded and finally it wilts and dies. So proper watering is very important. Most of your purchased plants come with a "care tag" giving you a general idea of their watering needs, but often this is not enough.

You cannot water on set days because some plants "drink" more than others; some like to stay moist while others like it on the dry side; however, there is a basic rule which applies to most plants: Do not water until the top half inch of soil feels dry and crumbly to your fingers. Then soak it thoroughly, not just the top.

Generally, your smaller plants will require water every few days, while the larger ones (especially in plastic or glazed containers without a drainage hole) need water less frequently. Only during active growing season (Spring-Summer) or while flowering, you must not let them dry out too much.

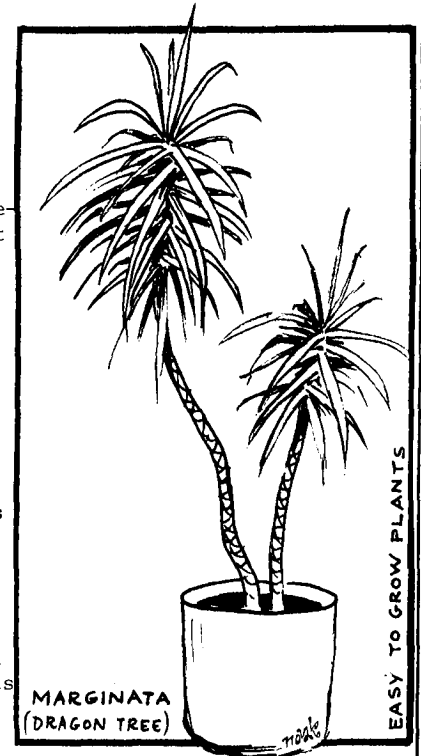
Your cacti should not be watered for 2-3 weeks or until you see it shrink slightly.

Watering before noon is better and using rain water instead of tap water encourages healthy growth as rain contains no salts and has dissolved nitrogen in it.

FERTILIZER - Plants can grow for years without it as your soil already has some in it. But healthy plants with bushy growth and colourful flowers that you see at your friend's house get at least an occasional dose of it. Overdose can harm them. Fertilize once every 2-4 weeks in the growing season; once or twice in Fall and Winter.

SOIL - You can use garden soil for many plants (not all), provided it is rich; your plant doesn't require special soil; you kill all pests and larvae in it by baking it or by chemicals; or if you don't care about any of the above. General purpose potting soil is almost as cheap in the long run; it contains fertilizer to last for a period and it is suitable for most house plants. (Add a few pieces of activated charcoal; it will keep the soil from getting sour.)

PESTS, FUNGUS DISEASES - There are chemicals for all, but not all chemicals can be used on all plants. Don't use anything reading only half the directions like I do. Viruses are generally incurable. If you don't see signs of pests, your plant could be suffering from inadequate light, improper watering, lack of nutrients or the wrong soil type.
