FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

BCA INCORPORATION

On January 29, 1980, at our last General Meeting, the membership of the Blackburn Community Association approved a set of six (6) By-Laws that will now govern the affairs of the newly-incorporated BCA. These By-Laws are essentially a translation of our old Constitution written so as to reflect the requirements of the Ontario Incorporation Act governing non-profit organizations. However, a few changes were made to clarify some ambiguous areas of the old Constitution.

One such clarification relates to voting by family memberships. Previously, the Constitution was unclear about who could actually vote. Now, two adults per \$5.00 family fee (e.g., husband and wife) have voting rights. All other family members over the age of 18 years may vote as well if an additional \$2.50 per individual has been paid. Of course, individual adults may still apply for membership at \$2.50 and have full voting privileges. Furthermore, partnerships, corporations and other legal entities may now apply for membership and have one vote.

One of the most important changes is in the area described by proxy voting. Our old Constitution did not allow any proxy voting at all. Typical corporations put no restrictions on the number of proxies a shareholder may have. However, the BCA is not a typical business-oriented corporation. Our General Meetings are meant to be deliberative assemblies. Allowing one or a few individuals holding a large number of proxy votes to control the outcome of a motion could nullify debate and discussion. Obviously, full proxy privileges in our situation would be unacceptable.

On the other hand, there have been and will continue to be meetings where some form of restricted proxy voting is justified. If, for some reason, an adult voting member cannot attend an important meeting but still wants their vote registered, they should be able to send someone, with proper written authorization, to act on their behalf. However, our usual informal voting procedure (i.e., through the showing of hands) requires that an individual have one and only one vote. Consequently, a compromise was struck.

A voting member may send as a proxy, anyone who themselves cannot legally vote. This includes all BCA family members between the ages of 14 and 18 years, any BCA family member over the age of 18 for whom an additional \$2.50 has not been paid, as well as any other adult over 18 years who is not a BCA member. Such an arrangement allows a voting member to ask his teenage children, or those of his neighbour, as well as friends or relatives, to represent him at General Meetings. Hopefully, any adult friends or relatives resident in Blackburn will themselves belong to the BCA and, consequently, could not act as a proxy.

There are a few other differences between the old Constitution and our new set of By-Laws but they are, for the most part, minor. Even so, if anyone wishes a copy of the Blackburn Community Association By-Laws, please call me at 824-6524.

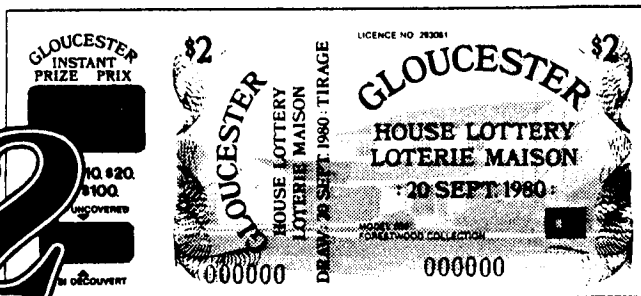

The Gloucester House Lottery is run in strict accordance with the regulations established by the Province of Ontario. Security tickets printed by the Canadian Bank Note Company.

Gerry Beament reported that Art Szabo has now taken over the duties of the Ice Activities Co-ordinator.

George Bushell attended the Blackburn Tennis Committee Annual Meeting held on March 3, 1980. Overall operation of the courts was discussed at length including the following ideas:-

- a pay-as-you play policy.
- hiring of a monitoring service by the BCA's Tennis Committee.
- operation of the courts by Gloucester under the direction of the BHCRC.

The BHCRC is scheduled to meet on March 6, 1980 where further consideration of these and other ideas will be examined.

Gloucester Township want to increase the monthly rental that we pay for the Canteen at the Blackburn Arena or operate the Canteen themselves. The BCA Sub-Committee did not feel that a rent increase was justified but neither did they want to lose the profit generated by the Canteen that would occur if Township operated the Blackburn facility as they do all other arena canteens in the Township. Consequently a compromise was suggested. The Township would manage and operate the Canteen but they would agree to use Blackburn volunteers to staff the facility during the hours that we presently keep it open (i.e. 4-10 p.m. week-days and 10-10 week-ends) and pay us at least minimum wage. It appears, with this arrangement, that the BCA would realize about the same income as now. Furthermore, less work would be involved and the Township would obtain control, provide longer hours of service and so on.

Registration for the 1980 baseball season will be held in early April.

A Nominating Committee will be formed by our next Executive meeting. To date the positions to be filled on our Executive are the following: Special Projects, Membership, Secretary, Education, Sports and President.

Cablevision. A further survey has been carried out on Bearbrook Road and 35 residents were contacted. The result of this survey was a split vote. Andy Macdonald plans to send a letter to all of the residents informing them of the outcome and that the BCA will take no further action. A letter will be sent to Cablevision, Bell, Township and other involved parties stating the same.

Pet Control. The Pet Control Sub-Committee has met twice in the last month. They have checked with Gloucester Township and two By-Laws related to pet control exist now. (1) Dogs must be licenced. (2) Dogs must be under control of their owners at all times. In addition, there are some areas such as parks where it is posted that no dogs are allowed. The Committee is also meeting with Health officials. Andy hopes that he will have a resume to present at our next Executive meeting along with some ideas on how to solve the problem.

Lois Kemp reported that Fun Fair Day will be held on June 7, 1980. The Fun Fair Dance will be held in the Arena and Harry King is making all the necessary arrangements. The Theme for Fun Fair this year will be "Western". A co-ordinator has been found to run the Teenagers Coral. It will be held in the Lacross Box. The Kiwanis Club is planning a fly-casting contest for adults and children. Both Guides and Scouts are heavily involved with Fun Fair activities this year.

All Blackburn skating rinks this year have had exceptionally good ice conditions. However, when the first thaw occurs the rinks will be closed for the season.

Unfortunately Monte Carlo Nite has been cancelled as no one came forward to organize this event.

Information re the Fertilizer Drive will be published in the April BANAR. Prices have gone up slightly this year.

The Volunteers Dance will be held at Emily Carr on Saturday, April 26, 1980. Chuck Conway is co-ordinating this event.

Mike Roche, Michelle Ashdown, John and Gwen Pollard attended the Gloucester Council meeting on March 3, 1980. The councillors have decided to pay for an adult crossing guard on Bearbrook Road and not ask the School Board for part payment. Council voted to pay the guard up to \$900 to supervise the crossing to the end of the school year. The job involves about 3 hours of work a day at the minimum wage. Gwen Pollard stated that she would try to hire a guard within the next 10 days. Gwen will put notices in the area stores and ask the schools to include an ad in their school letters.

Colin Sangster reported that we are still on an insurance binder and will continue so until Gloucester Township completes the details for the new policy.

An application for funds was received from the Association for Children with Special Needs. They operate a Saturday Gym and Swim Program for children with special needs in Gloucester. A MOTION was made by Gwen Pollard, seconded by Eldon Kemp that \$150 be granted to this Association with the condition that they advertise their Program in Blackburn (i.e. through BANAR ads and direct contact with local schools). CARRIED.

Accommodation - The New French Language High School

The report by Eric Runacres on accommodation in Carleton contains recommendations which have an impact on the eastern area. Specifically he recommended that we acquire Sir Wilfred Laurier by 1982 to be used as a school for Anglophone children and that we proceed to construct a new high school in the Blackburn area for Francophone children.

We had received permission to construct a French language school in the Cyrville area, and an architect was hired and plans were in preparation when the Ministry of Education froze the project. We had also recommended that as an alternative to building a school that Sir Wilfred Laurier be acquired to be used as a Francophone school, but this has been rejected.

Based on the understanding that the Ministry of Education would approve the construction of the new school on the Francon property in Blackburn, the Board approved the change of location to that site and has given the go-ahead to acquire the land and start the school by constructing a unit thereon which will form a part of the total school. This will attempt to meet the overcrowding problem which is particularly critical at Garneau with its 14 portables. It will eliminate the added expense of a portapak unit, which Mr. Runacres suggested to relieve the overcrowding.

The Ministry had approved a project to build a new English language high school in Cumberland, construction to commence in 1982. While this project is not dead, if we acquire Sir Wilfred Laurier as an English school, then we would not likely be able to build the new school for some time. Acquiring Sir Wilfred Laurier might require a change in the boundaries of all of our eastern area English high schools. This does not mean a massive movement from Cairine Wilson to Sir Wilfred. The use to which Sir Wilfred would be put has not been determined, particularly since we do not have it yet, nor would we acquire it before September 1982.

The construction of the new French language high school is needed, as it goes a long way towards recognizing the needs of those children whose first language is French and who live in the eastern area. It is an action which does not take anything away from anyone else, but attempts to give to those who have a need.

CIVIC AFFAIRS

CABLEVISION LINE ON WESTSIDE OF BEARBROOK

A lengthy dispute concerning the erection of a Skyline Cablevision line on the hydro poles on the west side of Bearbrook seems to be drawing to a close with a not very satisfactory ending for some residents.

Following three different surveys, the BCA has determined that a small majority of the residents concerned are willing to accept the line as it is presently located. The BCA has written a letter to Skyline Cablevision informing the company that the BCA will not make further objection to the cable. However, the BCA does not believe Skyline acted in a civic-minded manner by erecting the cable after the initial objection of residents and the BCA. The Association requested that no further cables be erected in the community without direct consultation with the Blackburn Community Association to determine the wishes of the residents affected.

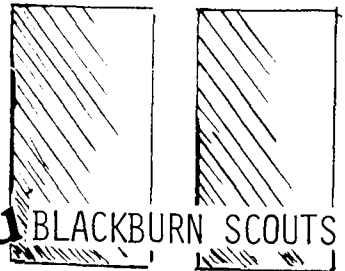
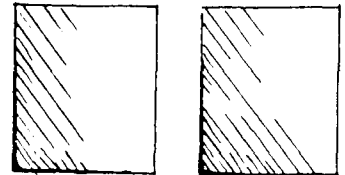

Crosswalk Supervisors have now been hired for the Bearbrook Crossing. If you must stop in the area, stop your car well before the X on the road, allowing your child to walk to the crossing. At this point I would like to thank the school principals for their co-operation with the Police Department and the BCA.

French School and Sir Wilfred Laurier

In this issue of the BANAR, Trustee Ed Campbell has discussed the new French School. As of writing plans are proceeding to build this school in Blackburn Hamlet on Bearbrook Road north. The CBE is hoping to have approximately 250 students enrol in this school in September 1980. Phase I is expected to proceed as quickly as possible. More on this in the next BANAR.

As indicated in Trustee Campbell's article Sir Wilfred Laurier School when acquired in 1982 will most likely require a change in the boundaries of all our eastern area English School. (Secondary) This as he states does not mean a massive movement from Cairine Wilson to Sir Wilfred. However, it could mean a movement from Cairine Wilson to Gloucester for some. There are several possible changes being discussed, one of which is to make Sir Wilfred a French Immersion school. As I stated these are possibilities, **NO DECISIONS** have been reached in this matter. However, if you are concerned, I urge you to contact your elected trustees and make your views known, I along with your trustees will continue to inform you of any decisions reached through the BANAR. I have had some phone calls regarding the above and hope this will clear up any questions.

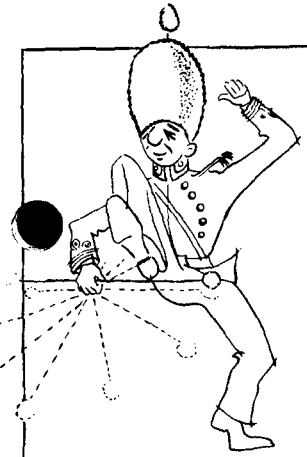

BED RACES

RULES & REGULATIONS

- BEDS**
- 1) Each team will consist of 1 passenger and 4 pushers.
 - 2) Beds must be single or twin size.
 - 3) All beds shall be at least 15 inches from the ground to the bottom of the bed frame.
 - 4) Any attachments to bed frame must not increase the overall width to 5'-0".
 - 5) Beds must be equipped with mattress and pillow.
 - 6) No sharp protrusions or edges on beds that could cause harm to any participant shall be allowed.
 - 7) Items such as bells, sirens, flashing lights, etc. may be added to beds as long as they are securely attached.
 - 8) Beds may be pushed or pulled, at the discretion of each individual team.
 - 9) All beds must have entry number shown in a conspicuous place.

BED RACES (Continued)

- RACE** 10) Shall consist of as many heats as are necessary.
- 11) Each heat will have a maximum of 3 teams participating.
 - 12) Winners of each heat will advance to the final or semi-finals, depending on the number of entries.
 - 13) Starting positions - i.e. inside, centre and outside, will be decided by Captains cutting a deck of cards.

START OF RACE - Upon the word go, one member of each team will be required to retrieve a football and return same to the passenger by the following means. Throw the football or carry it back to the passenger. The passenger must retain the ball in his or her possession throughout the race.

The first team to cross the finish line will be declared the winner.

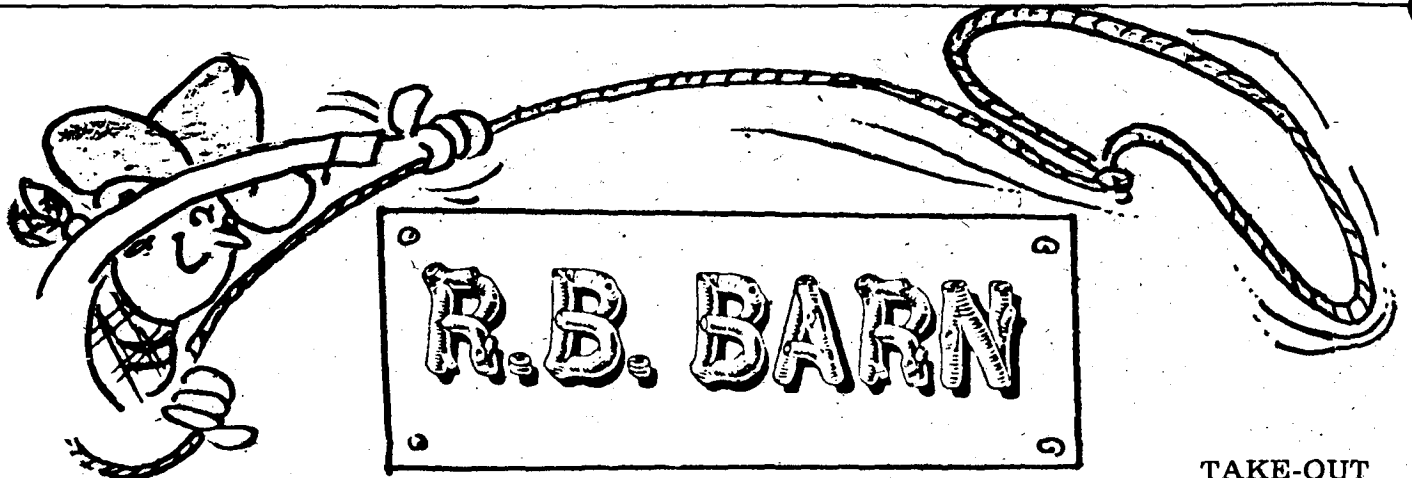
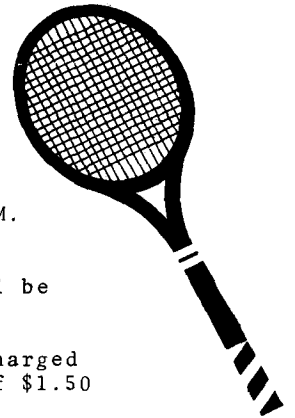

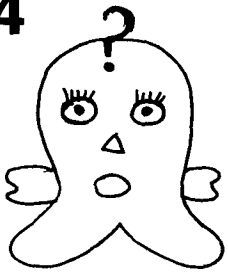

DOG CONTROL IN GLOUCESTER TOWNSHIP

For the past two months, a group of concerned residents of Blackburn Hamlet have been working to develop a formal proposal for improved dog control by-laws within Gloucester Township. This group has been under the auspices of Civic Affairs within the Blackburn Community Association. This report was approved by the BCA Executive at their regular April meeting and was forwarded to Council who are presently revising their by-laws in this area. The five points addressed in the brief are as follows:

1) Licensing

It is mandatory that all dogs be licensed at reasonable cost to the owner. Without effective licensing, tracing of lost dogs and dogs in violation of other by-laws becomes extremely difficult.

2) Dogs at Large

Since major portions of Gloucester Township are now urbanized, the general public interest precludes permitting dogs to run at large. An appropriate by-law should specify that dogs be kept on a leash of a specified maximum length or at a minimum, under the direct and continuing control of the person responsible for the dog.

3) Prohibited Areas

Dogs should be prohibited from playgrounds and schoolyards, whether or not under control of a responsible person/owner.

Negotiations should be immediately initiated between Gloucester Township and the two boards of education to obtain the requisite consent for this by-law to apply to school properties under their control. It is at school where a significant part of the problem now is encountered.

It is unfortunate to have to propose a total ban on dogs in the area, but the potential severe health hazard implied by permitting dogs to urinate or defecate in areas of high use by children (such as our schools, playgrounds) and the apparent unwillingness of a minority of dog owners to regulate their pets in these areas warrant this prohibition. We do not wish to see a severe illness or even death of a child resulting from inadvertent contact with the fecal matter of a parasitically-infected dog.

4) "Stoop 'n Scoop"

The requirement for an owner to clean up dog fecal matter from public property is probably the most controversial element of a comprehensive set of dog by-laws. It is our view that it is an essential element in ensuring effective regulation of dogs in our community. While we recognize that it is a difficult by-law to enforce, in that it requires the active participation of the community in detecting offenders, we feel it is the only effective remedy against those owners who permit their dogs to defecate on our public lands while under their control. This, of course, represents a minority amongst all the pet owners; however, their effect is significant and highly undesirable.

Without a "stoop 'n scoop" provision, the sidewalks and accesses to parks and schoolyards will remain fouled, and the prohibition of dogs from parks/schools proposed in 3) above will merely result in irresponsible owners permitting their dogs to defecate at the perimeter of the prohibited area, thereby transferring the problem to the access. This effort has already been observed in the vicinity of

- 4) Glen Ogilvie Public School, where dog prohibition signs were recently erected.

It is our belief that the community itself can contribute to the enforcement of this by-law, particularly when infractions involve persistent and visible offenders.

- 5) Enforcement

Without an accompanying process of by-law enforcement, any by-law will be ineffective. Your 1980 proposed budget contains \$30,000 for a dog control officer and equipment; this budgetary item should be approved. The control officer should be capable of working flexible hours, perhaps even split shifts, in order to cover off early morning/late evening periods, when dog-at-large activity is at its peak. Consideration should also be given to augmenting the control officer with a summer student to extend the period of coverage. Nepean currently does this. Fines for infractions should be at a level that violators would be deterred from repeated offenses. Finally, a public information campaign should be undertaken to increase the awareness of all township residents of their dog-related responsibilities.

It appears from published reports that Council has already been considering points 1), 2), 3) and 5) for implementation this spring. The "stoop 'n scoop" provision may or may not be included at this time. If you have any views on this, you may contact the BCA Civic Affairs Chairman or one of your elected representatives on Council.

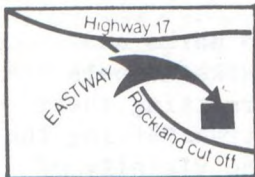

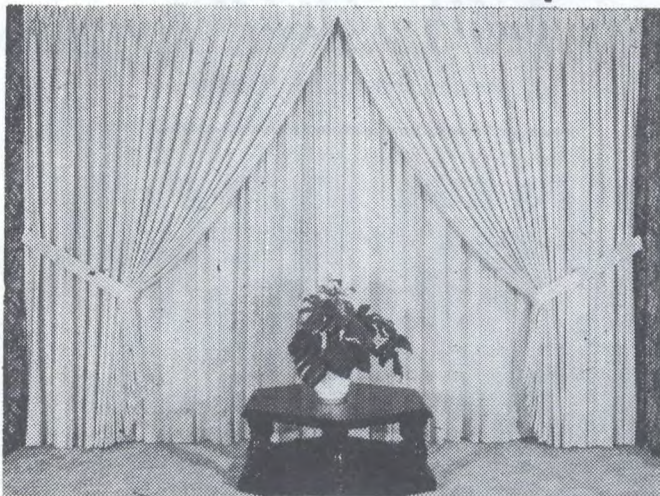

of 0.3 - 0.4 sq. ft. of space per resident served. Although most of its branches are in extremely cramped quarters, the Board realized that commercial development in Blackburn Hamlet had reached a stage which provided an excellent, and perhaps unique, opportunity to move this branch to a ground-floor location in a shopping centre.

During 1978, discussions began with two developers, and by the end of the year the Board decided to negotiate with the owners of the "The Common".

During 1979, plans were delayed by a number of legal objections by the other developer. These were ultimately quashed by successive decisions of the Gloucester Committee of Adjustment, the Ontario Municipal Board, and the Divisional Court of Ontario.

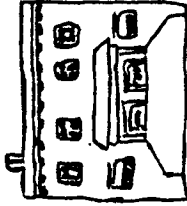

Despite their former financial position, these women are now single parents and are forced, at least for now, to live on Welfare. They are like thousands of other women across Canada, who must somehow manage to live below the poverty line.

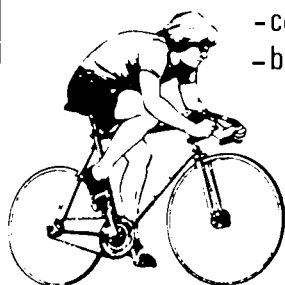
Forty-four per cent of mother-led families live below the poverty line. If a single-parent mother must rely on a former husband or Welfare, she will almost certainly be destitute. If she works, she is bound to be underpaid and discriminated against.

In Ontario, there are two Welfare Programs:

1. Short term emergency welfare, which is administered by the local municipality. Payments vary from region to region.
2. Long term "Family Benefit Assistance" (FBA) which is provincially administered. This is often called Mothers' Allowance.

In order to receive Welfare or Mothers' Allowance, you must apply and prove that you are destitute. You must sign a waiver which allows the government to check bank accounts, credit ratings, etc. to make sure that you are telling the truth.
