

BCA DIRECTORS MEETING

September 2, 1980.

President Mike Roche called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

The Minutes of the June Directors meeting were previously distributed.

MOTION: Moved by Gwen Pollard, seconded by Nelson Williams that the Minutes be adopted. CARRIED.

President Mike Roche welcomed George Franche who has volunteered to work with the Membership Committee assisting George Dunthorne.

President Mike Roche recommended that we gear some of our energy in 1980-81 towards (a) Road Safety for the Children in the Community (b) strengthening of our volunteer base (c) strengthening of our Community Association procedures.

Carry Over Business of 1979-80

Bill Graham (2nd Vice-President) - Bill Graham reported that all school board bookings have been arranged for 1980-81. Bill Graham and team interviewed candidates for Canteen Manager(s) and is happy to report that a contract has been signed for the season 1980-81. Storage - Bill Graham and Gwen Pollard contacted the Township to make arrangements for storage space. The Township Staff has advised them that storage space will be available in the Blackburn Arena. Gwen Pollard investigated the space and reported that the space would not be acceptable for some of the articles. Bill Graham will contact the Township to seek more suitable accommodation.

Sheilagh Dubois (Education) - Reported that the Separate High School students have been provided with OC Bus Passes and Phase 1 of Ecole de l'Est is to open at the end of September. Crossings - Gwen Pollard gave a brief report on the crossing on Bearbrook Road. Findings were that the motorists are still going too fast but she felt further observation is required and will report again at the October meeting. Gwen Pollard also mentioned that the buzzers are not always working properly. Library - Sheilagh Dubois reported that Mrs. Whitehead of the Gloucester Public Library will require furniture in the children's area, also, that the library is to be located behind the Toronto-Dominion Bank - moving to new location December 1, 1980.

MOTION: Moved by S. Dubois, seconded by G. Pollard that the Blackburn Community Association allocate \$100,00 to the Blackburn Public Library for the purchase of furniture for the Children's Room in the new library location and that the Directors review the situation once the library is settled in its new premises. CARRIED.

Janet Wilkinson (Fun Fair) - President Roche has been advised that Janet Wilkinson will not be able to undertake the responsibilities of Fun Fair Director this year.

George Dunthorne (Membership) - G. Dunthorne will be meeting with the Sub-Committees regarding the BCA Membership Drive during the month of November. Newcomers Club - Mike Roche, George Dunthorne and Gwen Pollard to meet with Trixie Clow, Chairman of the Newcomers Club.

Gwen Pollard (Publicity) - Gwen Pollard reported difficulties with the BANAR distribution, Gwen informed the Directors that the Scouts are no longer interested in undertaking the delivery of the BANAR. Gwen also informed the Directors that she has contracted the French Scouts for the September issue only. To be reported at the October meeting. Soul Food - Gwen Pollard suggested charging a nominal fee for Church notices in the BANAR due to recently increased page requirement and the number of changes of Church notices required.

MOTION: Moved by Gwen Pollard, seconded by S. Dubois we charge the following nominal fee for Church notices in the BANAR. Notices up to 10 lines \$2.50 for 9 issues (\$18.00 up to Summer 1981). Notices over 10 lines add 10¢ per line per issue. In addition there would be a charge of \$5.00 if the notice is changed more than once a year. CARRIED.



The Blackburn Hamlet Pre-School has opened its doors once again, with 120 local area three and four-year old children taking part ... and do they take part!

So far the children have been analyzing the changing sessons, making applesauce, doing woodwork, watching chickens lay eggs and, in the words of the school's Director, Phyllis Frost, "simply experiencing life".

On one outing to Kemp's apple orchard, the children picked apples and some of them learned that some trees are good for climbing. The kids returned to school, not to eat the apples, but to chop them, cook them, and, as one said, "make some very slimey stuff that tastes great". Says the Director, "The children learned that apples come from, not a store, but a tree, which comes from a seed. The next day we extended that to talk about apple juice during their snack break."

All of which explains why several parents in the area have been informed by their three and four-year olds on the joys and procedures of making "slimey stuff".

Another trip during September was to an animal farm operated by a Gloucester fireman, Doug White, who in recent years has been a frequent visitor to the school. He recently hosted several children, showing them his collection of black ducks, baby rabbits, chickens, pheasants and other birds. This month, the Gloucester Police Department will visit the school to show the children a film on Block Parents.

In one of the school's classrooms, children can work with wood and tools, fashioning all kinds of wonderous inventions. One youngster brought home a block of 4" x 7" pine with two nails in the centre. His creation? "You sit down and hold the nails between your knees and then you do some colouring. It's a knee table".

If you have any small pieces of soft wood, the school would appreciate receiving them so the kids can all become Master Fix-It. Phyllis Frost is also looking for a four-foot by four-foot piece of bathroom carpeting for use in the school. Any donors of either wood or carpeting should phone her at 824-3251.

FOSTER CARE - WHERE WOULD IT BE WITHOUT YOU?

Foster Care is today's and tomorrow's issue! For those who are not familiar with the term, Foster Care is a placement service for children who have been separated from their natural parents; it provides the child with a stable, supportive family atmosphere.

Every month, the Children's Aid Society of Ottawa-Carleton has to find a placement for close to 85 children. Of that number, 62% are 10 years old and over. A third of all our placements are on an emergency basis. Unfortunately, only 10 to 14 new foster, homes a month are approved and waiting for placements. More than half of them are offering their home to a child under 10 years of age.

On October 6, 1980, the Ontario Ministry of Community and Social Services and the Children's Aid Societies are launching a two-month foster home recruitment campaign in an attempt to improve the situation. We hope to elicit a widespread community response through the use of intensive advertising on radio, television, newspapers and outdoor billboards.

BLACKBURN PARK (behind the arena)



Help the Aged

With the onset of a new decade Help the Aged announces its fifth year of operation in Canada. We ask that you join with us by looking back over the past year to recap major developments that have taken place.

The office in Canada's capital has made a major contribution to our Canadian and overseas aid programmes by working several major fund raising events.

This past year students in Eastern Ontario have supported numerous projects; i.e., Irrigation Project, Kerala in Southern India, Dairy farm in Elapakham, India; Hearing Aids for the elderly in Ontario and training of personnel for Old Peoples Centres and Home in Chile. The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) has given grants to many of these projects.

The Community Appeals programme brought to Ottawa and district the first annual "Trim a Tree of Hope...this Season" campaign. Help the Aged in conjection with local churches and Senior Citizen groups, requested the public to Trim a Tree, and to promote an awareness of the elderly at this special and often lonely time of year. We are extremely pleased with the support that the Trim a Tree of Hope campaign gained and we look forward to achieving even greater success in 1980.

The most exciting program Help the Aged has taken upon itself this year is the \$105,000.00 Rolls Royce Raffle. Tickets are available in Eastern Ontario for \$2.00 a ticket. 



My decision to seek the office of Reeve of Gloucester is one that is not taken lightly. I have been approached and am encouraged by the number of people of all ages and from every sector of Gloucester who have urged me to accept this challenge.

There is no doubt in my mind that Gloucester needs a different kind of leadership -- leadership that will speed up the decision-making process and make the best use of the special talents of all members of Council and staff. I believe that Council meets too often engaging in lengthy discussions which are time consuming and do not ensure the best interest of our ratepayers.

I am convinced that we should establish a system where specific members of Council should be given direct responsibility to investigate problems, hear delegations from ratepayers working closely with already established Standing Committees; i.e., Recreation, Planning, Library Board, Works, etc. and with the appropriate Head of Department submitting firm recommendations to Council It has been my experience that lack of accurate information properly presented has the effect of confusing issues of importance and of delaying the decision-making process.

Regional reports should be available to all members of Council at the Township Hall in a room reserved for Councillors and the Reeve. In the new year, two members of Council to Region should discuss items of particular importance to Gloucester and be guided at Region by the concensus of all Council members.

At Regional Council, there are two specific items of importance that should have priority:
(a) Justification for an additional \$5 per capita from the province for Gloucester Police Department and others in the region without becoming involved in a full Regional Police structure. At our present population, this would increase Gloucester's revenue by \$350,000.
(a) A more equitable system of levy to offset our share of Regional Transport deficit namely 100% on equalized assessment rather than 50% equalized and 50% passenger miles which is presently creating for Gloucester and others in the Region an undue hardship.

I have served on the following Committees at Regional Council: Board of Health, Social Services, Transportation and Ad Hoc Committee on Police, and I am convinced that my approach of co-operation rather than confrontation has been effective in contributing to the quality of service and to the objectives of these committees in R.M.O.C.

I feel fully competent to serve Gloucester both at the local and Regional level and am fully prepared to give the necessary time and effort to meet this challenge. I have always taken the positive approach to efficient administration, planning, recreation and parks development and adequate police and fire protection service. I ask for your support on Monday, November 10.






