## Attention Blackburn Residents

DID YOU HEAR THE FIRE ALARM??

During the past few weeks, two of our schools have been vandalized! YOU as a member of the community have a responsibility to see this action does not continue..

We as residents, must start "Watching our Neighbourhood". If we do not, it will cost more of your tax dollar to pay for damages we could possibly avoid-if we were not so apathetic and more observant.

In the case of Emily Carr school, the fire alarm was ringing constantly all night! Did YOU hear it? Did you investigate or just ASSUME "the bell was stuck"! Had some caring resident investigated they would have discovered what a child walking his dog that morning did. The child heard the fire alarm, approached the school and discovered windows broken. Upon further investigation he realized there was water covering the floors. Immediately he advised his parents who called the police and school staff.

If you heard the alarm and failed to investigate-your lack of action cost you and all other taxpayers a considerable amount of money.

There is one way we as taxpayers can assist the police in our area. Fast action on the part of staff members who were clearing snow at Blackburn Public School enabled the police to apprehend two youths who were vandalizing that school. If vandals knew the residents of Blackburn Hamlet were observing and reporting ALL SUSPICIOUS ACTIONS OR SOUNDS, the fear of being detected would act as a deterrent. Next time you are coming home late at night, don't drive BY, drive AROUND the schools etc. look for anything suspicious and CALL THE POLICE. DO NOT HOWEVER, become personally involved. There is no harm done if what you suspect turns out to be nothing.

DON'T BE APATHETIC, ITS YOUR SCHOOL AND YOUR TAX DOLLAR THAT PAYS FOR VANDALISM. CAN YOU AFFORD NOT TO WATCH? IT CAN HAPPEN HERE---IT HAS HAPPENED HERE --LET'S PUT A STOP TO IT NOW!!

## ARE YOU GUILTY?

On March 11th, my son was bitten on the face by a loose dog near the corner of Beddoe Lane and Glen Park Drive. The investigation which followed produced one dog matching the description, but because an unqualified identification could not be provided, there was no alternative but to treat my son for rabies. This is a process which normally consists of a series of painful shots every day for FOURTEEN DAYS.

It is apparent that some of the people who own dogs do not consider that the by-law regarding pets need be obeyed. After observing the rabies treatment and the suffering experienced by my son, I am highly incensed by the situation regarding pets and their control. As usual, the actions of a few are giving a bad reputation of those who are conscientious and who maintain control of their pets.

It may not be generally known that if you call the Gloucester Police and provide the location and description of a loose dog, the Pet Control Officer will be dispatched to collect it. I will be taking this action each and every time that I see a dog without full control by means of a leash.

It is my hope that the people who are guilty of the irresponsible act of allowing their dogs to run loose will take corrective measures.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to my immediate neighbours who unselfishly gave their time and effort in attempting to locate the dog. There were also

many others who contacted me with added information and who sent good wishes to my son. All of your efforts and thoughts were very much appreciated. Thanks to you all.

### EDITORS' NOTE:

A reminder as well, now spring is just around the corner--of the recently passed by-law which prohibits owners from walking their dogs in school yards; posted play areas and some parklands. It is also an offence to allow your dog to use the public areas as a "washroom" without owners practising the "STOOP AND SCOOP". As a dog owner and member of this community, it is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to see these by-laws are obeyed for the safety and sanitation of all residents.

MOTION: Moved by Peter Houliston, seconded by Bill Graham that the minutes be adopted. CARRIED.

## BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES

Sheilagh Dubois informed the Directors that tables for the children's area of the library cost \$136. each. Sheilagh suggested that the BCA provide funds to meet the costs of three tables towards which the BCA has already contributed \$100.

MOTION: Moved by Sheilagh Dubois, seconded by Gwen Pollard that the BCA pay up to \$350. for tables in the children's room at the new Blackburn Hamlet Library. CARRIED.

President Mike Roche informed the Directors that the Executive of the Newcomer's Club would be joining our meeting to clarify their letter and to get a better perspective on the role of the BCA.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS

President Mike Roche - Blackburn Crest - discussion on the value of adopting crest. Nelson to contact Harvey Wittenburg and will report at next meeting.

John Pollard (1st Vice-President) - John Pollard informed the Directors that the Karate program is underway and mentioned he was quite pleased with the response to the registration. John also inquired about improving the BCA's mail service. Mike Roche to look into it and will report at the next meeting.

Bill Graham (2nd Vice-President) - Canteen - Bill Graham provided the Directors with copies of his Rental Contract - Parks Recreation Dept. After general discussion the Directors agreed that the proposal be included in the March BANAR and we adopt it as BCA's position regarding the canteen.

MOTION: Moved by Bill Graham, seconded by Peter Houliston that we adopt the Parks & Recreation Proposal as our position regarding the canteen when approaching GRCC. CARRIED.

Sheilagh Dubois (Education) - Sheilagh Dubois informed the Directors that she had been talking to Mr. Crowder, Principal of Blackburn Public School concerning an incident of vandalism, and that all was back to order. Library - Acquisitions - Sheilagh mentioned perhaps we might arrange a fund raising event for the library, a Monte Carlo night. Gwen Pollard suggested we ask for volunteers to organize an event in the BANAR and have the proceeds go for books for the library. Sheilagh Dubois and Gail Lacombe to look into running a bingo at the Fun Fair, to report later.

Jo-Anne Bushell (Fun Fair) - Jo-Anne Bushell reported that the Fun Fair Directors had their meeting and that the general meeting will be February 24th.

Eldon Kemp (Maintenance) - Eldon Kemp reported that he and his staff were able to open the outdoor rinks two weeks earlier this year due to the weather and praised his staff for doing a great job. Mike Roche suggested we send the 1980 ball season bill to GRCC for the diamonds. Winter rinks bill already submitted. After general discussion on the maintenance of ball diamonds it was agreed that the sub-committee, consisting of Nelson Williams, Eldon Kemp, Mike Roche and Dave Wardlaw meet. Nelson Williams to make arrangements.

George Dunthorne (Membership) - Informed the Directors that Orient Park still has to be canvassed and with the baseball registrations coming up perhaps there will be more new members.

Gwen Pollard (Publicity) - Gwen submitted the following guidelines on BANAR policy:

The following BANAR policies apply when articles are submitted for publication in the BANAR:

- 1) Maximum space available to one community group should be one page. If more space is required the Editor should be advised in advance and the group will be charged at cost. This applies to BCA Sponsored Groups.
- 2) Groups who are sponsored by the BCA may submit articles on fund raising and items of information etc. and such articles, ads etc. shall be free.
- 3) Groups not sponsored by the BCA but located in Gloucester will have fund raising ads placed in the BANAR on a cost basis. (service clubs)
- 4) Fund raising material placed free of charge must be submitted by the BCA Sponsored group.
- 5) Groups outside Gloucester will be treated as commercial ads and pay full rates except where information is public interest notices.

- 6) All material will be accepted on the basis THERE IS AVAILABLE SPACE, with Blackburn Hamlet functions a PRIORITY and at the discretion of the EDITOR.
- 7) Original material will not be returned unless requested upon submission. This includes photos which may be cropped to fit.
- 8) Letters to the Editor, must be accompanied by name and phone no. although may be printed with "name withheld" if requested.
- 9) Articles must be brief, legible (typed preferably) and free of copyrights (unless permission is granted). Illustrations must be of good quality. The EDITOR reserves the right to make changes when necessary.
- 10) Sports groups are billed at cost for registration forms in the BANAR.
- 11) Submissions requested in French and English will be printed where space is available.
- 12) Special rates are available for Soul Food ads.

MOTION: Moved by Gwen Pollard, seconded by Andy Macdonald that the Banar Policy be reaffirmed. CARRIED.

Gwen Pollard also mentioned that she had been contacted by the Gloucester Fire Chief to ask residents to have their chimneys cleaned. Gwen also reminded the Directors of the coming Provincial Election on March 19th.

Peter Houliston (Special Projects) - Peter informed the Directors that arrangements for the second children's play are completed and is scheduled for March. Peter also mentioned that the organizing of the fertilizer drive is underway, as well as, the preparations for the Community Volunteers Dance, which will be on April 25th, 1981, at Emily Carr School. Peter to give an update report at next meeting.

Andy Macdonald (Civil Affairs) - Andy informed the Directors there will be an All Candidates Meeting. There are no new developments regarding the possibility of a local liquor store at this time.

Nelson Williams (Sports) - Informed the Directors that he received a note of thanks from Rene Cloutier for BCA input on Ice Policy, expressing regrets that he had been unable to meet further with our representatives but will be in touch with us shortly. Nelson also mentioned he had a call from Clem Pellot, Fitness in Gloucester, who trains people to become instructors. Nelson to invite Mr. Pellot to next BCA meeting. Nelson also inquired about first-aid facilities in the Gloucester arenas. Nelson to contact Barry Coopersmith (GRCC) for information regarding first-aid standards.

President Mike Roche welcomed the Newcomers' Club Executive to the Directors meeting - Trixie Clow, President, Wendy Murray, Past President, and Social Director Janet Howard. After general discussion between the Newcomers Executive and BCA Directors on the roles of both executives, Mike Roche suggested at this time that the Newcomers continue to operate under BCA sponsorship but with their own constitution & by-laws - an autonomous body affiliated to BCA. Mike Roche to acknowledge.

MOTION: Moved by Peter Houliston, seconded by Sheilagh Dubois that the meeting be ajourned. CARRIED.

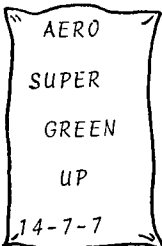
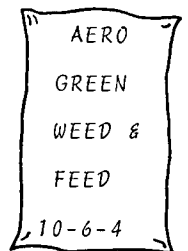

A commercial firm was hired to withdraw the water, but the school was left smelling very musty. There was also some minor vandalism.

It would seem that Blackburn Hamlet is currently prey to school vandalism. The Neighbourhood Watch being advocated in our area could prove invaluable in such cases. Let us all keep our eyes open and be sure to report unusual occurrences immediately to the authorities.

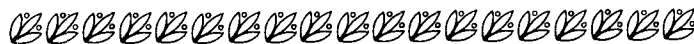

**BILL 82**

Glen Ogilvie School Advisory Council recently invited Dr. John Jarrett, Superintendent of Special Services of the Carleton Board of Education, to speak about "Bill 82" and its implications as far as school taxes and classroom changes are concerned. Dr. Jarrett explained that the philosophy behind Bill 82, which holds the School Boards of Ontario responsible for providing a program of studies for every school age child regardless of any handicap, is that all children will benefit from the de-institutionalizing of children who are presently educated separately from the vast majority.

It is hoped that, by integrating these children as much as possible into the regular classrooms, those with handicaps and learning disabilities will have a much enriched daily experience which will provide them with important life situations that their present segregation denies them. At the same time, individual programs will be required in many cases, as they are even now, for many students who are either ahead of or behind their peers in one or more subjects.

Questions that were posed: How will these children be received? How will their special needs be met? How can teachers who already have their hands full with as many as 30 active youngsters handle someone who will require more than 1/30th of the teacher's attention? How much actual education will a learning disabled child receive in a regular classroom?

Children tend to react negatively and sometimes scornfully toward those who repeatedly make mistakes -- how will this affect the children with learning difficulties? Will the schools be given extra staff or will the "volunteer" be asked to carry the extra load? Many families have found it necessary to withdraw their learning disabled children from the public system and seek help elsewhere because of the social problems their children face and the lack of a program that helps them to progress -- in what way will Bill 82 meet this need? How well will the average and above average children be served?

For further information, feel free to contact any one of your school trustees: Ed Campbell, Gerald Halpern and Jeff Slater; or Dr. John Jarrett himself as Superintendent of Special Services of the CBE.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:**

*Bill 82 is an important issue, possibly affecting many children. I would invite "Letters to the Editor" on this subject - pro or con. As we go to press, the Provincial Government has agreed to financially assist the Boards of Ontario in the amount of \$27.5 million. This assistance is to help implement this program in our schools. Please write with your comments.*

# What Is Bill 82?

## Education

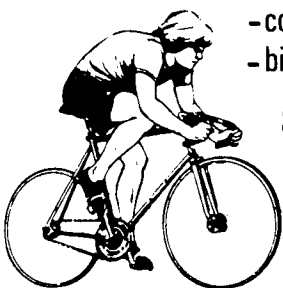
*A Guide to Bill 82.* The ministry has published an information leaflet regarding Bill 82. It is an Act that ensures that every exceptional pupil in Ontario receives an education suited to his or her needs and abilities. The Education Act, 1974, contained only permissive legislation for special education. A school board could, if it wished, provide special education programs and special education services for its exceptional pupils. Although most boards provided some programs, Bill 82 removes the optional status of special education and makes it the definite responsibility of all school boards to provide special education programs for the students. Bill 82 ensures increased access of all Ontario school age pupils to a publicly supported education, regardless of the pupil's special needs; the provision of special education programs and special education services that meet the needs of exceptional pupils; involvement and participation of the parents or guardians of exceptional pupils in the assessment, identification and placement of such pupils, including the right to withhold permission for a particular placement and the right to require a review of the pupil's placement at any time.

Bill 82 provides:

- that every child of school age must be enrolled in school upon presentation by the parent or guardian;
- effective 1 September 1985, public and separate school boards will be required to provide for the education of their trainable retarded pupils;
- effective 1 September 1985, the existence of an exceptionality no longer will be a justifiable reason for not receiving instruction from a school board;
- it is possible that, in a small number of cases, it could be found that a particular child is a "hard to serve pupil" who cannot profit from institution. In these cases the school board will assist the parent or guardian to locate appropriate care or treatment services. An appeal mechanism is available where the parent or guardian disagrees.

An "exceptional pupil" means a pupil whose behavioural, communicational, intellectual (including the intellectually gifted), physical or multiple exceptionalities are such that he or she is considered by a board committee to need placement in a special education program. A "special education program" means an educational program that is based on and modified by the results of continuous assessment and evaluation and that includes a plan containing specific objectives and an outline of educational services that meet the needs of the exceptional pupil. 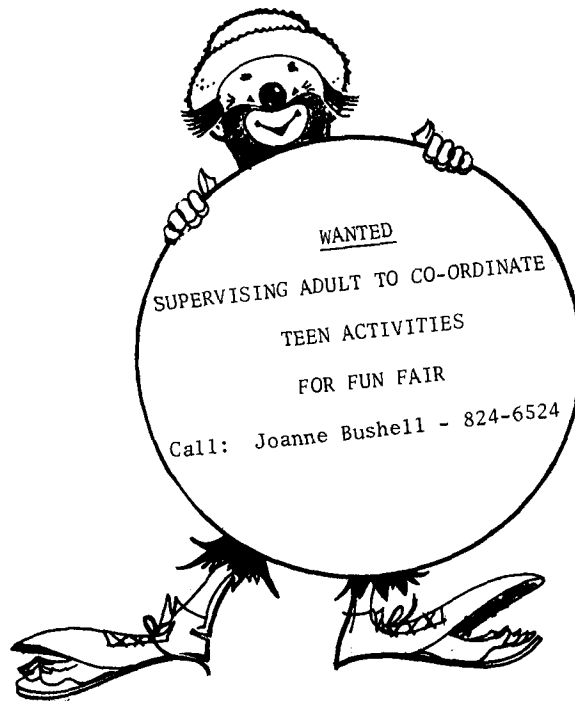

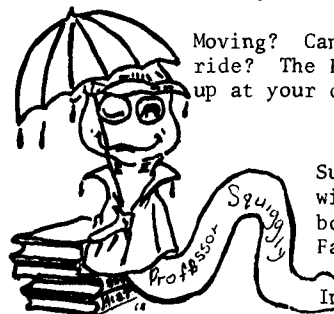

## INTRODUCING - Gloucester Community Watch

The Gloucester Police Community Watch Program is a crime prevention package aimed at reducing residential break and enters in Gloucester. It will do this by placing an emphasis on the citizen to become more aware and equipped to deal with prevention. The Police will assist, teach and advise the citizen, but the actual success will ultimately depend on how the citizen uses his/her crime prevention.

Most break and enters are committed by unsophisticated amateurs who are motivated primarily by opportunity.

Reducing opportunity is accomplished in three ways. Firstly, by increasing the difficulty on entry by physically making it difficult to enter. Secondly, by discouraging theft by making the items easily identifiable. This makes disposal of an object more risky for both thief and "Fence". In the event an object is stolen and later recovered by the police, the object can be traced to an owner, hence a higher recovery rate is also possible. Thirdly, a thief is less likely to try an entry if he knows that the neighbourhood has citizens that have been trained to spot characters like him. Even if he doesn't know about these trained citizens, his chance of being detected is greater.

Commercial and public establishments in Gloucester are given the opportunity to mark property under OPERATION PROVIDENT. Operation Provident is a National program aimed at the deterrence of theft and the recovery of stolen items.

The community watch program is aimed at Prevention and Detection of crime and provides a mechanism that assists in recovery of goods if it should occur.

### DISCUSSION OF CONCEPTS

#### 1. Home Security Check

An officer invited by a homeowner will inspect his home to see if improvements regarding locks, doors, alarms and windows can be made.

A sheet listing these various areas of security and suggested improvements will be left with the owner.

The actual carrying out of the improvements will be the owner's sole responsibility.

#### 2. Home Inventory

- (a) A home inventory entails the notation of all pertinent facts about "stealable" items in the home. This is done on a standardized Home Inventory Sheet provided by the Police and contains necessary information such as Make, Model, Serial Number. In the event of a theft the items stolen can be placed on the Police Computer which is used by all Police Agencies in CANADA. Copies of these sheets can be given to an Insurance Agent and may aid in the future settlement of a claim.

Not all items have make and serial numbers unfortunately. There are several solutions to this problem, each having its own pros and cons. As an aid to the home inventory sheet items can be photographed.

Small items such as jewellery and watches should also be considered for marking by a jeweller.

#### (b) Property Marking

Much emphasis has been placed on this aspect of property identification but its role is really secondary. An object can have a special number engraved on it, but without the Home Inventory sheet, an owner will have quite a time remembering all the correct facts if a theft occurs, especially if many items are missing.

An engraved mark is a supplementary number much like a second serial number. In fact, that's how it is entered on the computer. There is no need for the Police Department to maintain a file of all the engraved numbers or inventory sheets since this information is only required when a theft has occurred. This provides a degree of privacy to all citizens in the program. Simplicity and lower administrative costs are also advantages to not having a central index at the Police Station.

A marking system does not solve the problem of identification; it merely aids and only if a Home Inventory has been completed.

#### 3. Neighbourhood Surveillance

An increase in awareness and the realization that theft can occur to you and not just other people is a basic premise of Neighbourhood Surveillance.

Neighbourhood Surveillance provides citizens the opportunity to sharpen observation skills before they or a neighbour becomes a victim. A Suspect Identity Chart is provided by the Police to each participant. This assists in recalling details about suspects or suspicious persons. A telephone call to the Police Department and keen observations are all that a citizen needs to engage in Neighbourhood Surveillance. It is a good way of being a good neighbour.

The participant is also encouraged to make a trusted neighbour aware of any extended periods of his absence from home. This increases recognition of certain events that ordinarily would be perceived as routine.

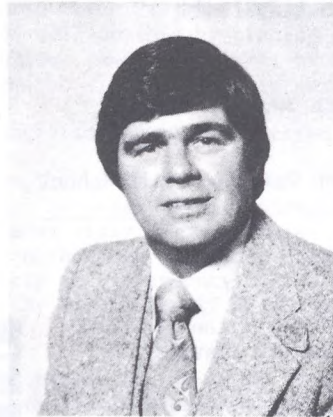

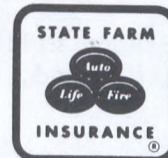

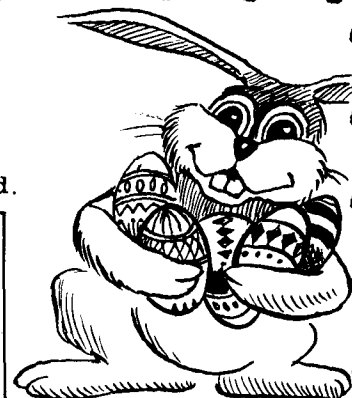

# GLOUCESTER LACROSSE ASSOCIATION

TRY IT - YOU'LL LIKE IT  
CANADA'S NATIONAL SPORT

For years Gloucester has had a large Lacrosse Association handling children from tyke level up to juvenile. We are attempting to promote lacrosse in Ottawa and vicinity and are organizing city (house) league and competitive teams, in all areas of Gloucester. The most frequent question parents ask is: "Is it a very rough game?" We feel, it isn't as rough as hockey and probably has fewer injuries.

How is it played? First, its called Box Lacrosse and is played on the same floor as hockey. With six players on the floor, it is almost identical to hockey. A Lacrosse stick is used to catch and throw a ball. It is easy for children to master, as it is basically an extension of one's hand. Basic skills are quickly learned, so don't be afraid to try it.

Equipment is minimal for a child who plays hockey. A helmet with cage, shoulder, elbow, knee & kidney pads; shorts & running shoes are required. A lacrosse stick is the main item. (A free stick is given to every new tyke or novice player).

Throwing and catching the ball can be practical against a brick wall, garage door, etc., by using a tennis ball. The city league schedule leaves weekends free and requires two nights per week. An interlocking schedule is played with Gloucester teams and South Ottawa and Nepean, with home games at Walkley, Armstrong, Leitrim and Blackburn arenas. Competitive players will also play in our city league. Schedule runs from April 20 to June 25 with competitive players continuing into the summer months.

I would hope parents with children from seven years of age and up would give serious consideration to registering their children. We hope to have some films and a demonstration in the near future. 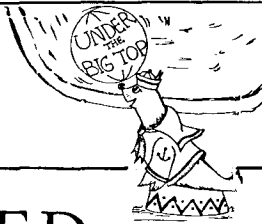

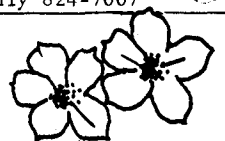

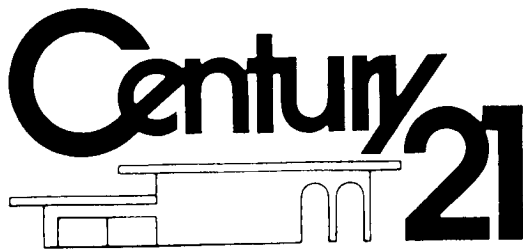
