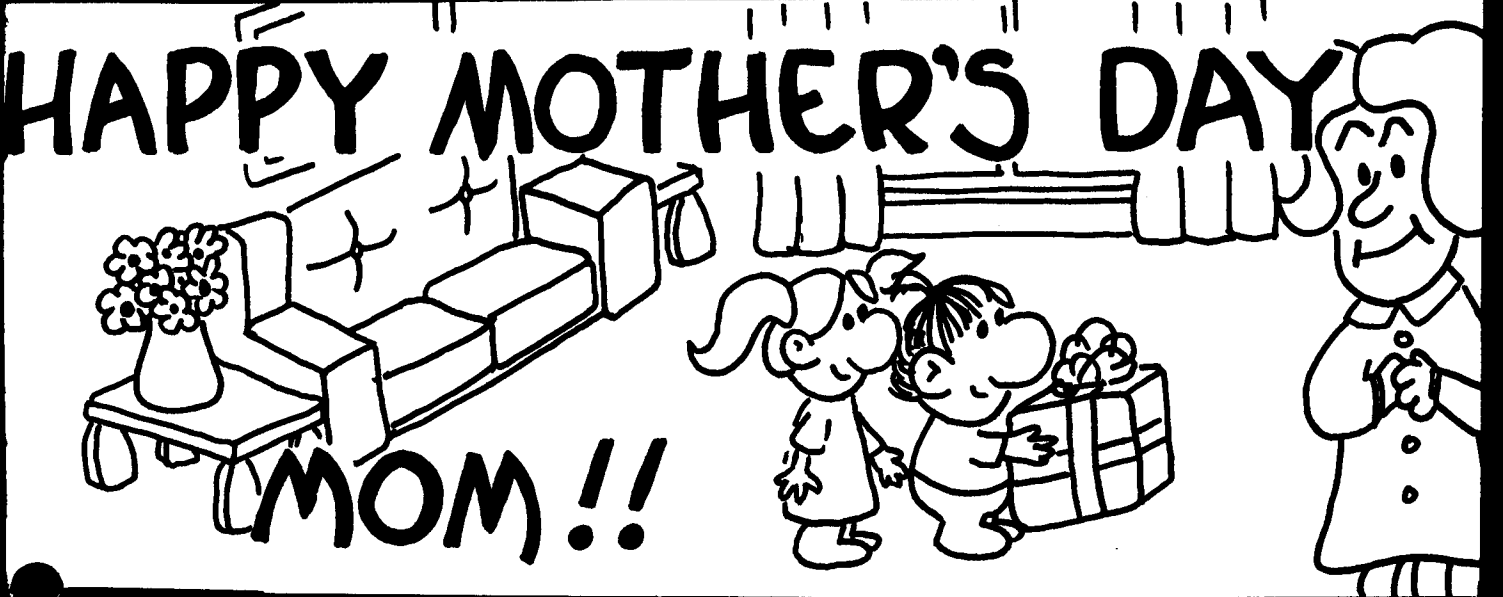

### FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

#### CANTEEN OPERATION IN BLACKBURN ARENA

The Blackburn Arena canteen has been managed by the BCA since the arena first opened. The canteen staff consists of volunteers from the community who sign up for canteen duty at sports registrations. Revenues from the canteen are used to subsidize sports activities and thereby reduce registration costs. Although this arrangement has worked well from Blackburn's point of view, we have been advised that it is no longer satisfactory to the City.

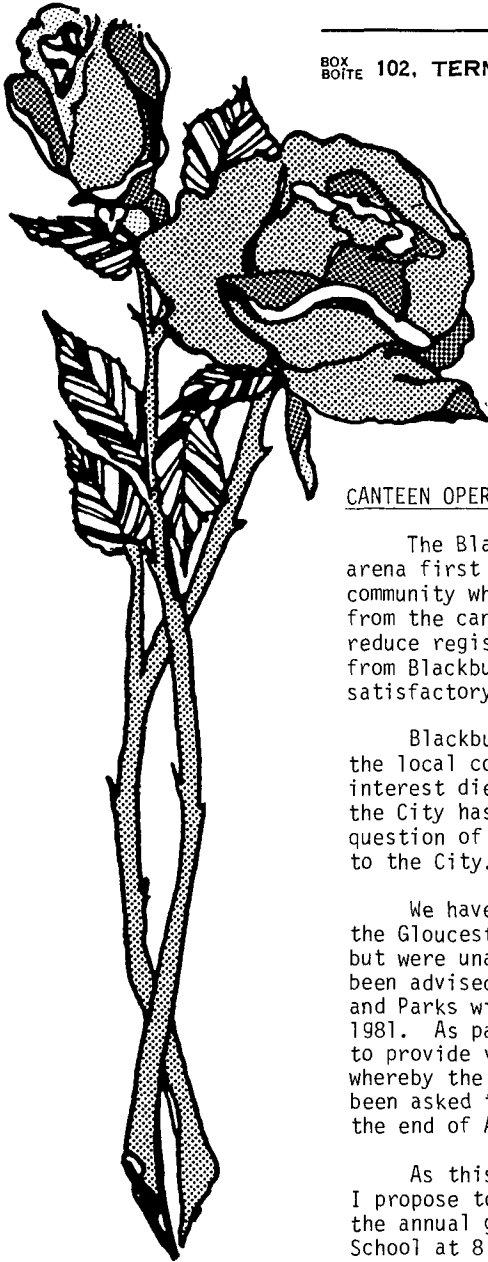
Blackburn's is the only arena in Gloucester which is still run by the local community. Other arenas were once operated in this way but interest died down and the City gradually took them over. The problem the City has with the present arrangement for Blackburn relates to the question of revenue i.e. the volume of sales and how much profit goes to the City.

We have had fairly extensive consultation with City staff and with the Gloucester Recreational Centres Committee (GRCC) over the past year but were unable to reach complete agreement on the matter. We have now been advised of a decision by the GRCC that the Department of Recreation and Parks will take over the operation of the canteen effective May 1, 1981. As part of the GRCC decision, the BCA is being offered the opportunity to provide volunteer staff during the winter months under an arrangement whereby the BCA would be paid for the hours of work performed. We have been asked to reach a decision regarding the provision of volunteers by the end of April.

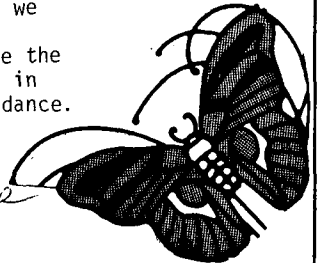
As this is a matter of considerable interest to Blackburn residents, I propose to delay our decision and place the subject on the agenda for the annual general meeting which will be held in the library of Glen Ogilvie School at 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 26, 1981.

#### OTHER ITEMS FOR ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

As usual the annual meeting will receive committee reports and will deal with the election of officers. In view of the special concern we feel over recent cases of vandalism and break-ins we will also be welcoming representatives of the Gloucester Police who will describe the new Community Watch Program referred to in last month's BANAR. All in all it should be a lively meeting and we hope to have a large attendance.



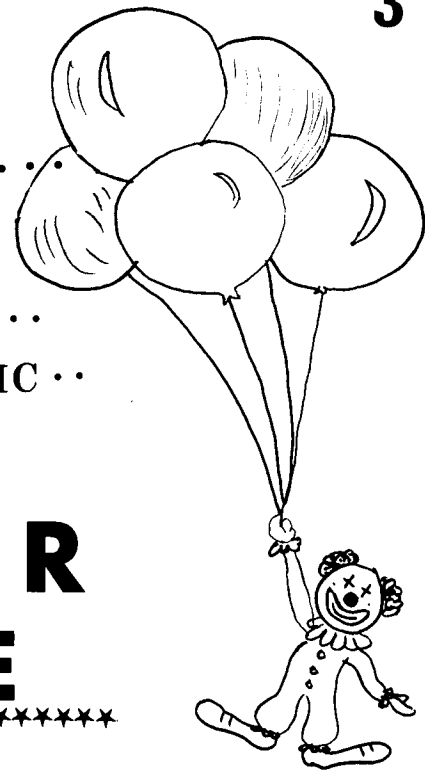

The Minutes of the February Director's Meeting were previously distributed,

MOTION: Moved by Gwen Pollard, seconded by Bill Graham that the minutes be adopted. CARRIED.

## BUSINESS ARISING FROM MINUTES

Gail Lacombe reported to the Directors that a bingo did not appear to be a promising way of raising funds for the library and that other alternatives will be examined.

Mike Roche reported that to the request for a BCA grant he had received a reply from Mary Wooten, Association for Children with Special Needs, reporting that there is participation from the Hamlet in their program, and requesting information as to how the program could be publicized in the BANAR. After discussion the following motion was made:

MOTION: Moved by John Pollard, seconded by Gwen Pollard that the BCA donate \$100. to the Association for Children with Special Needs. CARRIED.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS

President Mike Roche invited an open discussion on his draft letter to the Newcomer's Club concerning its affiliation to the BCA. After discussion the following motion was made:

MOTION: Moved by Ken Greenlaw, seconded by Don Gray that the letter, as amended, be sent to the Newcomer's Club. CARRIED.

John Pollard (1st Vice-President) - John Pollard informed the Directors that due to the break-in at Blackburn Public School, the "B" Pack of the 1st Blackburn Hamlet Cubs had lost \$69.00 worth of articles, therefore, John Pollard suggested to the Directors that BCA reimburse the cubs the \$69.00 for replacement of the articles. After discussion the following motion was made:

MOTION: Moved by John Pollard, seconded by Andy Macdonald that BCA reimburse the "B" Pack of the 1st Blackburn Hamlet Cubs for \$69.50. This amount to cover an exceptional expense for replacement of certain equipment vandalized at Blackburn Public School. CARRIED.

Bill Graham (2nd Vice-President) - Bill Graham informed the Directors that he and Mike Roche attended a GRCC meeting regarding negotiations on the Canteen Agreement and reported that no changes in the present arrangements are foreseen in the immediate future.

Andy Macdonald (Civic Affairs) - Andy Macdonald informed the Directors that the All Candidates Meeting went well and about 175 people attended. Andy mentioned that he had been receiving a lot of calls regarding the play structure at Ecole Ste. Marie, and since there is a parent-teacher meeting shortly at Ecole Ste. Marie requested a mandate to attend the meeting - to investigate more on prices etc. John Pollard suggested that perhaps the parents of Ecole Ste. Marie should approach BHRCC for financial support towards the play structure. After discussion the Directors were in agreement to Andy attending the meeting. Andy to report at next meeting.

Sheilagh Dubois (Education) - Sheilagh Dubois informed the Directors that she is forwarding a BCA donation to the library to cover the cost of children's tables, with a covering letter. Sheilagh also briefed Directors on the vandalism at Emily Carr School.

Jo-Anne Bushell (Fun Fair) - Jo-Anne Bushell informed Directors that the Fun Fair Committee has had its general meeting. She requested that the BCA Directors again serve as Security Commissioners for the Fun Fair this year. Jo-Anne mentioned that the general store hours will be from 10:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. Fun Fair are looking for an adult co-ordinator for the Youth Corral to work with 3 keen volunteer teenagers, and also looking for a volunteer to co-ordinate a button blitz.

Eldon Kemp (Maintenance) - Eldon Kemp reported that the outdoor rinks were very successful this year but the costs were slightly higher.

George Dunthorne (Membership) - Nothing new to report on Membership at this time. George circulated Newcomer's Club newsletter which he had received.

Gwen Pollard (Publicity) - Gwen Pollard informed the Directors of a letter she had received from the Glen Ogilvie Advisory Council regarding Bill 82. Gwen mentioned that since this is the year of the disabled, she would publish the letter in the BANAR with the hope of inviting a response towards a public meeting on Bill 82. Andy Macdonald suggested also printing an extract of Bill 82 for clarification.

Peter Houlston (Special Projects) - Peter Houlston informed the Directors that the play "Tom Sawyer" is all set to go. Peter mentioned that the products for the Fertilizer Drive will be in the April BANAR - canvassing will be last week of March and first week of April with delivery on April 11th. Peter requested the Directors to submit their volunteers names and addresses to Gail Lacombe by March 20th.

Nelson Williams (Sports) - Nelson informed the Directors that he had been in touch with Harvey Wittenburg regarding the possibilities of developing a more standard BCA crest. Nelson reported that Harvey Wittenburg did not wish to see any change in the present crest. A maintenance sub-committee will meet March 25th at Dave Wardlaw's house regarding ball diamonds. Sports budget sheets have been prepared and sent out. Nelson also mentioned that the Ice Allocation Policy Committee have still not met but a decision is near at hand will probably favour ice allocation giving more weight to participation rites.

Terry Melski (Transportation) - Mike Roche informed the Directors that he had a call from Alderman Harry Allen, City of Gloucester, advising BCA that the Bearbrook-Innes Intersection is up before the Transportation Committee on March 4th.

Don Gray (Treasurer) - Don Gray informed the Directors that his new bookkeeper is Mrs. Doreen Morgan, 10 Woodview Cresc. Don Gray requested the Directors concerned when writing cheques to stamp or write the item or event on the back for identification purposes.

Ken Greenlaw (Youth Activities) - Ken Greenlaw informed the Directors that he had been in contact with the Principal of Ecole Ste Marie regarding the Detention Centre's donation towards a play structure in their area with the hope that the Board would contribute towards construction. After general discussion the Directors felt that since the donation would not even put a dint in the cost for a play structure that we concentrate on our second priority (bleachers). Eldon Kemp and Ken Greenlaw to look into details of second option and if not agreeable move to priority three "library". Ken to contact Detention Centre for their input and report at next meeting. Ken also mentioned he had attended the Cub Annual Dinner and really enjoyed the occasion.

Guest: Clem Pellet, Director of Fitness and Aquatics in Gloucester.

Nelson Williams introduced Clem Pellet to the Directors. Mr. Pellet gave a brief outline on his program regarding training people as instructors to conduct fitness programs in Gloucester Communities. Don Gray suggested to Mr. Pellet that he perhaps provide BCA with specific programs in fitness e.g. a cross country skiing fitness program that would be of interest to the Hamlet. After general discussion, the Directors agreed that Nelson Williams should keep in contact with Mr. Pellet for next season as such a program would be of interest to the Hamlet.

Guest: Dick Cottingham

Dick Cottingham gave a brief outline on Operation Identification and mentioned that it is an umbrella program of programs such as: Neighbourhood Watch, Neighbourhood Surveillance, Police Vacation Program and Home Security Program. Dick also mentioned that pamphlets, stickers and markers will be available for use. After general discussion Andy Macdonald suggested perhaps a presentation on Operation Identification at the May general meeting, May 26, 1981. Dick to get back to Andy by May 1st if date suitable.

#### OTHER BUSINESS

Eldon Kemp mentioned he had visited Glen Ogilvie School one evening recently and remarked that there were only two badminton players occupying the whole gym. Bill Graham to look into the apparent low utilization.

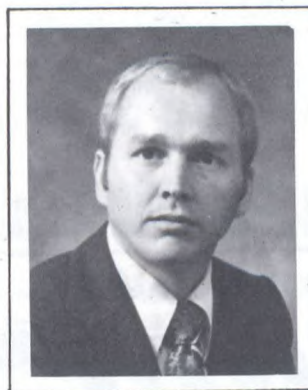

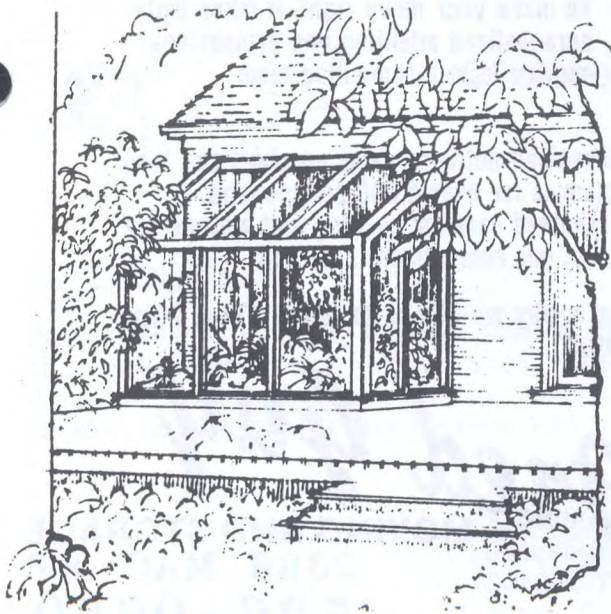

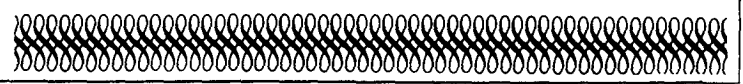

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR...



Dear Editor:

The April BANAR report by S. Swanson concerning the recent Glen Ogilvie Advisory Council meeting with Dr. John Jarrett speaking about Bill 82 was interesting but disappointingly biased. One wonders if all of the "questions that were posed" were quite so negative and one-sided. If so, I feel sorry for the people who posed them. Do they have any idea just what a handicap is? Are they parents of a handicapped or learning disabled child? I think not.

The group present apparently wondered "How well will the average child be served" if Bill 82 is implemented. They should be made aware that most learning disabled children are average or above average in ability. If they need material presented a little differently than some other children why must this be done in 'special' classrooms? These children have the same rights to regular classroom learning as the run-of-the-mill, stereotyped, so-called 'normal' child.

Do they think that by integrating handicapped children there will be wheelchair traffic problems in every school corridor? True, some children may be in wheelchairs. Some may not appear 'normal' and others may have difficulty communicating in a clear fashion. However, the vast majority of handicapped children look just like everyone else. They simply require more assistance or more supervision than most youngsters. Is this a valid reason to segregate these children?


Please don't worry about "negative and scornful reactions" or "social problems" faced by our handicapped or learning disabled children. Do people not realize that these children have experienced years of periodic negative peer reactions long before they were ready for school? Seldom does a handicap 'rear its ugly head' the first day of school. By far the majority of handicapped children are well adjusted to their disability long before they enter kindergarten. Perhaps it is time the 'normal' child learns how to accept those not quite so fortunate.

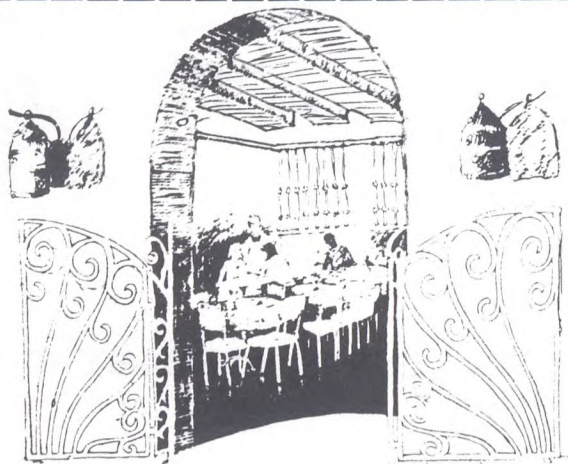

Discussion of Concepts:**Gloucester Community Watch**Police - Vacation Check

In addition to neighbours being aware of a homeowner's absence the Police can be advised as well. Upon a written request a Program Participant can have his home checked by the Police Department. The frequency of this Vacation Check is subject to the workload requirements of the Police Department.

Operation Provident

The Gloucester Police have been allotted a block of numbers by the Ontario Police Commission. These numbers will be issued to any business, church, school or public department that wishes to join the Community Watch Program.

Implementation of Community Watch Program:Community

Upon written invitation the police department will attend and meet with a community group and provide an overview of the program as well as a demonstration of various devices and methods to prevent entry to homes. This meeting is used to introduce the program into the community and to motivate the community to join in the development of the Community Watch Program.

Ideally this program will be most effective if everyone in a community takes part, however, this rarely occurs. The next best approach is the creation of Security Pockets.

A Security Pocket is a cluster of program participants in one particular area that work together as a unit. This unit of participants is called a Sector. By involving the neighbours that surround him a homeowner can create in essence a Security Pocket. This has the advantage of showing the criminal a united effort, thus acting as a deterrent. Homes involved in the program are identified by a bright red DECAL provided by the Police. This DECAL is placed on the front and rear door of a participating residence. An additional DECAL for a participant's vehicle can be provided if radios, tape players and CB's, etc. are marked and inventoried.

Sectors are formed at this first community meeting and a spokesman for each sector is chosen. A sector will then, upon a written request, arrange a meeting with the police to discuss the finer details of the program. This second meeting is held in one of the sector homes and a Home Security Check is performed. All of the participants in the Sector should be present. The Home Inventory Sheets Suspect Identity Sheets and a Program Information Packet are distributed at this stage.

The Sector leader could then advise the Police when his participants had completed the program requirements and the Police Department would then distribute the DECALS to the participants.

It can be seen that this program involves three meetings between the Community and the Police.

The single security check at a Sector home eliminates the need to inspect every home in the program. Most homes in a Sector most likely are constructed by the same builder and thus visiting each home is redundant.

A Sector meeting also "breaks the ice" for neighbours that may not have met before. This, in turn, reinforces the feeling of "community" which is vital to this program. A greater number of questions posed at a Sector meeting will also provide a richer experience and may touch on topics that an individual Home Security Check may miss.
