FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

The new Board of Directors of the BCA met on September 8, 1981, signalling the end of summer recess and the resumption of activities for the Fall.

There are a number of priority areas for 1981-82. Firstly, we must continue to press for a final resolution of the by-pass issue and the upgrading of Innes Road which is dependant on the by-pass decision. Secondly, we will be seeking advice regarding the future use of accumulated reserves for important community projects taking advantage, where possible, of joint funding arrangements with the City and grants from Wintario and the Provincial Government. Most of the current reserve is attributable to the annual fun fair and the Board of Directors therefore proposes to act on recommendations coming forward from the Fun Fair Directors. More on this in future issues of the BANAR.

Finally, we want to encourage more submissions to the BANAR on community matters (en Français aussi). Blackburn has so many positive aspects to write about that we must never lose sight of the message that 'Blackburn is a good place to live!' Good communities can stand some self criticism so let's not be afraid to air our concerns as well as our pride.

Finally, on a rather sad note, it now seems certain that we will lose the volunteer operation of the Blackburn arena canteen to the City. We appreciated the efforts of Aldermen Allen, Bellemare and Keenan who tried to avert this. Above all our thanks go out to the hundreds of volunteers who made the canteen a success - particularly to people like Phyllis Frost who held the operation together.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

JUNE 2, 1981

Present: Michelle Ashdown, Jo-Anne Bushell, Trixie Clow, Bill Graham, Don Gray, Ken Greenlaw, Peter Houliston, Eldon Kemp, Gail Lacombe, Andy Macdonald, Terry Melski, Gwen Pollard, John Pollard, Mike Roche, Nelson Williams.

Absent: Sheilagh Dubois and George Dunthorne.

President Mike Roche called the Director's Meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. and welcomed the new executive for 1981-82, Michelle Ashdown (Education) and Trixie Clow (2nd Vice-President).

The Minutes of the May Director's Meeting were previously distributed.

MOTION: Moved by Andy Macdonald, seconded by Gwen Pollard, that the minutes be adopted. CARRIED.

CORRESPONDENCE

Letter to Sheilagh Dubois, Education Director, BCA, from Robert Price, Secretary, Gloucester Public Library - Thanking BCA for their donation to purchase tables in the Childrens Room in Blackburn Hamlet.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

President Mike Roche mentioned he was very pleased with the turnout at the General Meeting on May 26th. He advised that Dick Cottingham will be the co-ordinator for the Community Watch Program with John Pollard reporting to BCA on this subject.

Bill Graham (2nd Vice-President) - Canteen - a discussion was held on possible approaches to Council regarding the Canteen and it was agreed that a letter would be sent stating the position of the General Meeting and offering to appear before Council to support the case. Mike will advise GRCC of BCA's approach to Council. Bill and Mike and others to attend Council Meeting if necessary; in the meantime, job descriptions to be placed in the BANAR for a Volunteer Canteen co-ordinator and a Canteen Manager on the assumption Council will set aside the take-over decision.

Andy Macdonald (Civic Affairs) - requested assistance in delivering the By-Pass flyers to residents. Trixie Clow mentioned she would ask the Newcomers' Club to include it when they deliver their next newsletter.

Jo-Anne Bushell (Fun Fair) - all set to go on Saturday, June 6th, still a few dance tickets available for those that want them, as well as buttons.

Eldon Kemp (Maintenance) - briefed the Board of Directors on his proposal which will be submitted to BHRCC with regard to the Tauvette Soccer Field. Eldon also mentioned that construction of the bleachers is coming along well using the donation from the inmates of the Ottawa Detention Centre.

Nelson Williams (Sports) - informed the Directors that he had been contacted by the Badminton people regarding the gym not being available to them. Bill mentioned that there had been a problem of low utilization which should be sorted out in the fall. Nelson also mentioned the Baseball Co-ordinator, Dave Wardlaw, is no longer living in this community and we will need a new Baseball Co-ordinator. Thanks to Dave for doing a super job. Anyone interested, call Nelson Williams at 824-4736.

Terry Melski (Transportation) - informed the Directors that the By-Pass announcement is in the June Gloucester Guide, and will also be published in the Citizen on June 5th, 12th, 19th and 22nd; a special flyer will be distributed to the Community on June 20th, 1981. Mike Roche to give BCA viewpoint at opening of By-Pass Meeting.

Don Gray (Treasurer) - informed the Directors that he had received the City of Gloucester Grant. Don also mentioned that he had checked with the Department of National Revenue on the need for a public auditing firm to do the auditing and informed the Directors that it was not mandatory. He suggested perhaps forming a qualified Volunteer Committee to audit in order to reduce costs. Andy suggested we defer this decision until the fall, but in the meantime, perhaps Don could follow up on his suggestions.

John Pollard thanked Sheilagh Dubois, Don Gray and Jo-Anne Bushell for their tremendous contribution to BCA. Sheilagh and Don have completed their term of office. Appointment of Fun Fair chairperson is a recommendation of Fun Fair Executive.

Gwen Pollard (Publicity) - Gwen suggested that BCA send a letter of thanks to the Gloucester Police for their presentation at the General Meeting. Andy to acknowledge.

Ken Greenlaw (Youth Activities) - requested the BCA members of the Bed Race meet June 4th at his residence to have their photo taken for the Citizen.



Guest Art Szabo - Ice Allocation Policy

Art reviewed the results of the Ice Allocation Committee findings. Prime-time ice hours will be on a participation basis and non prime-time hours on a population basis. Art stated that the Sub-Committee agrees with the basic philosophy but would like participation on all ice hours. Art feels that the adult activity will be held back by the policy and has prepared a draft position to go to GRCC indicating the Sub-Committee's concern. Don Gray suggested that the Executive write to GRCC attaching the Art Szabo letter and giving BCA endorsement.

MOTION: Moved by John Pollard, seconded by Don Gray, that the BCA send a letter to the Gloucester Parks and Recreation thanking them for the improved policy re ice allocation. We also recognize that some concerns still exist which should be considered. The letter from the BCA Ice Allocation Sub-Committee to be attached for persual. CARRIED.

Mike Roche thanked Art Szabo (Ice Allocation Sub-Committee) for his important contribution.

Guest Lisa Stymiest, Director of BCA Day Camp, 4th year Honour student at Lakehead University and majoring in recreation.

Lisa has approached BCA for their support regarding a thesis project which she would like to conduct in Blackburn Hamlet on teenagers age 14-19 or grades 8 through 13. Lisa will be preparing a questionnaire to be completed by teenagers to try and find out exactly what they prefer to do with their leisure time. The questionnaire is to be distributed through the schools in January. Lisa also informed the Directors that she will submit her proposed analysis and results to BCA in April. All Directors agreed that it was an outstanding idea.

MOTION: Moved by John Pollard, seconded by Ken Greenlaw, that the BCA support the survey of Youth Activities and needs by Lisa Stymiest. Reasonable operating expenses to be provided through the 1981 Youth Activities budget. Lisa to present her findings to the Executive by May 1982. CARRIED.

Guest Mr. J. Noseworthy

Mr. Noseworthy informed the Directors that he is presently planning to open a Family Amusement Centre or games room at the Commons Shopping Plaza, which will include pinball and video machines. Mr. Noseworthy informed the Directors that it will be supervised by himself as well as one other adult. He has provided BCA with proposed hours of operation as well as proposed rules of business operation. Andy Macdonald suggested we put the idea to the Community via the BANAR to get an indication of the Community's feelings on this business venture.

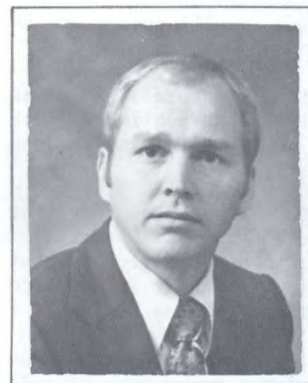

Letters to the Editor

Dear Madam:

The recent decision or rather lack of decision, by Gloucester City Council (and particularly by the Mayor Betty Stewart) removed the operation of the Blackburn Arena Canteen from the Blackburn Community Association (BCA) and transferred the operation to arena staff. In the past the canteen had been operated by over 600 volunteers from the Blackburn area and the profits realized by this operation offset some of the costs of the Blackburn Recreation Programme.

The discussion and debate over the canteen operations have been taking place over the past year. The BCA has made strong and well reasoned presentations to the various municipal bodies involved in the decision making process in Gloucester. The main argument of the municipality was centered on their desire to include canteen revenues in the total arena revenues and realize any profit to offset the expenditures of the recreation and parks department. It is estimated that the municipality will realize a profit of \$3000-\$4000. from the canteen operations during the winter season.

The issue however, is greater than the \$3000 extra revenue for Gloucester. As a former active member of both Blackburn and Gloucester recreation organizations, I view this action as another example of the erosion of support for volunteerism in Gloucester.

There are three organizations who must share the responsibility for this decision. The department of Recreation and Parks, where the takeover idea originated can claim to have satisfied their bureaucratic desire to show an increase in the revenues in the Blackburn Arena accounts. Secondly, the Gloucester Recreation Centres Committee (GRCC), who are responsible for recommending and implementing recreation policy in Gloucester, have shown a lack of leadership in support of volunteers by adopting the Department's recommendation.

Ultimately, the final responsibility rests with that of Gloucester Council. Mayor Betty Stewart refused to take a decisive stance to break a 3-3 deadlock in council over the issue despite strong representation made by the BCA. Aldermen Mary Bryden, Mitchell Owens and Ken Steele must be named as refusing to allow a motion on the issue to be even considered by Council. On the other hand, aldermen Harry Allen, Eugene Bellemare, and Harold Keenan supported the motion to have the GRCC decision reversed. By so doing, these latter three aldermen have demonstrated their strong support of volunteer participation in Gloucester. We should not forget the actions of these aldermen when the next municipal election is held in November 1982.

On a more subjective note, Gloucester's action means that our family has spent \$30 more than expected on already costly recreational activities. We consider that we have \$30 less to spend at the canteens in Gloucester, especially at Blackburn Arena. I suggest that as a community we unite and boycott the canteen in the Blackburn Arena as a demonstration of our support of the BCA position.

Dear Editor:

Since the arena in Blackburn was opened, Blackburn residents have staffed the canteen, been very successful at it; reduced the hockey and sports fees; and contributed towards community spirit. A decision has now been made by the Gloucester Recreation Committee and Council to take the operation of the canteen away from our community. There are various reasons put forward by these two committees for their action but the main one comes down to the fact the City is not receiving revenue from the Blackburn Arena. Other communities it is said, are resenting this

fact. EVERY COMMUNITY HAD THE OPPORTUNITY OF OPERATING the arena canteen in their area but no longer wish to do so for various reasons, one being lack of volunteers.

Blackburn was unique...we ran a successful canteen WE WORKED AT IT. Blackburn did not sit back and ask for handouts, we worked for part of what we received. It is not the fault of Blackburn that other communities chose not to volunteer their time and thereby use the canteen to reduce their costs.

It is obvious to me that the Gloucester Recreation and some members of Council don't really appreciate volunteers unless it is on their terms. They have 'destroyed' a network of some 600 volunteers. The people you will see behind the counter at the canteen will now be paid by Gloucester City, in turn paid by YOU, the previous volunteer. You will lose the approximately \$8,000 which was turned back into the community to reduce sports fees and you will pay more for your registration fees. Your BCA executive negotiated over the past year to prevent this action. I wish to make it clear that the responsibility for this action, and for your increased fees lies solely with the Gloucester Recreation Board and the City Council..

Gloucester, we thought, had tried to encourage the volunteer worker in the past (giving free dinners etc). It seems strange that in view of this, they have just destroyed a community spirit involving some 600 volunteers. I urge you to remember the actions of your COUNCIL members who voted against the community. For the record the members of Council who voted AGAINST BLACKBURN are: Mary Bryden, Mitch Owens, Ken Steele and Mayor Betty Stewart. Those members who FOUGHT FOR THE COMMUNITY are: Harry Allen, Eugene Bellemare and Harold Keenan. The next election is November 1982, one short year from now when you can show your gratitude for those who appreciate our communities efforts by a well placed X...

In addition, my family plan to boycott the Blackburn Canteen in future, to prove that the Volunteers in this community did a super job of running our Canteen.

A council vote on September 8th, took operation of the canteen away from Blackburn Community Volunteers. As a result registrations held to date (for Sports) do not include Canteen duty.

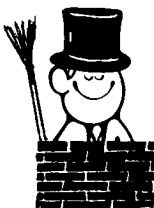

We are now into our 1981/82 Hockey Season with league commencing on Saturday, October 17, 1981. There will be little change from the game schedule we had last year, i.e., most of our games will be played on the weekends, the majority at Leitrim, and we will still have to make use of the early morning hours in order to give each team one hour of practice each week.

We did gain additional ice time for practices through the new allotment schedule drawn up by the City of Gloucester Recreation Department, however, with the loss of the ice time we had at Navan, we are back to what we had last season. The good news is that we will see a few more of our league games played in other arenas such as at Blackburn, Orleans and Potvin. There will no longer be any of those horrible 6:30 a.m. league games, however, there still will be games at 7:30 a.m. Instead of having the majority of our practice hours on the weekends, the same time as our league games last season, a good portion of our practice hours have been spread throughout the week days.

The No Body Contact for all levels of hockey in the GHA has been changed to "No Deliberate Body Checking". A clear definition will be available prior to the first league game. There would appear to be some concern about this rule being applied to the Midget and Juvenile levels, however, the GHA confirmed the decision of No Deliberate Body Checking being applicable to ALL levels for this season. This move is an attempt to return the house league hockey to having fun - a move that is being seriously considered by many other areas throughout Ontario. Many of us, over the past few years, have fallen into that competitive NHL type hockey that is not and should not be a part of house league hockey. We do have competitive (Gloucester Rangers) teams that play the NHL style of hockey, and every player has the opportunity to try out for such a team if this is the style of hockey he wishes to play.

Parents have the choice of registering their 3-4½ year old children in the Monday- Wednesday-Friday morning or afternoon half-day program, or in either of the two Tuesday-Thursday half-day programs.

The full-time teaching director, two teachers and two duty parents work with the 30 children enrolled in each of the four programs, producing a low pupil:adult ratio of six to one.
