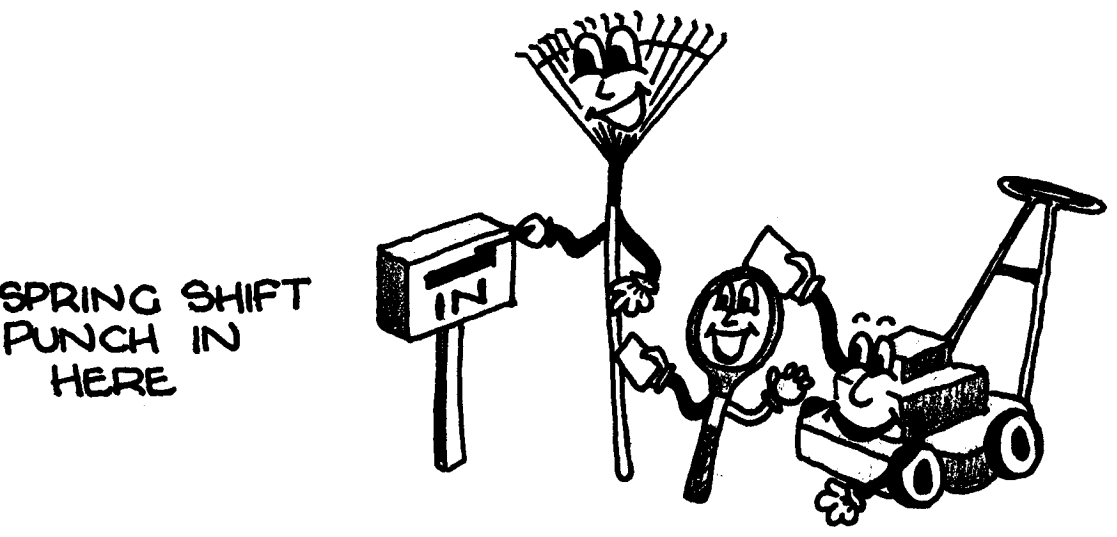
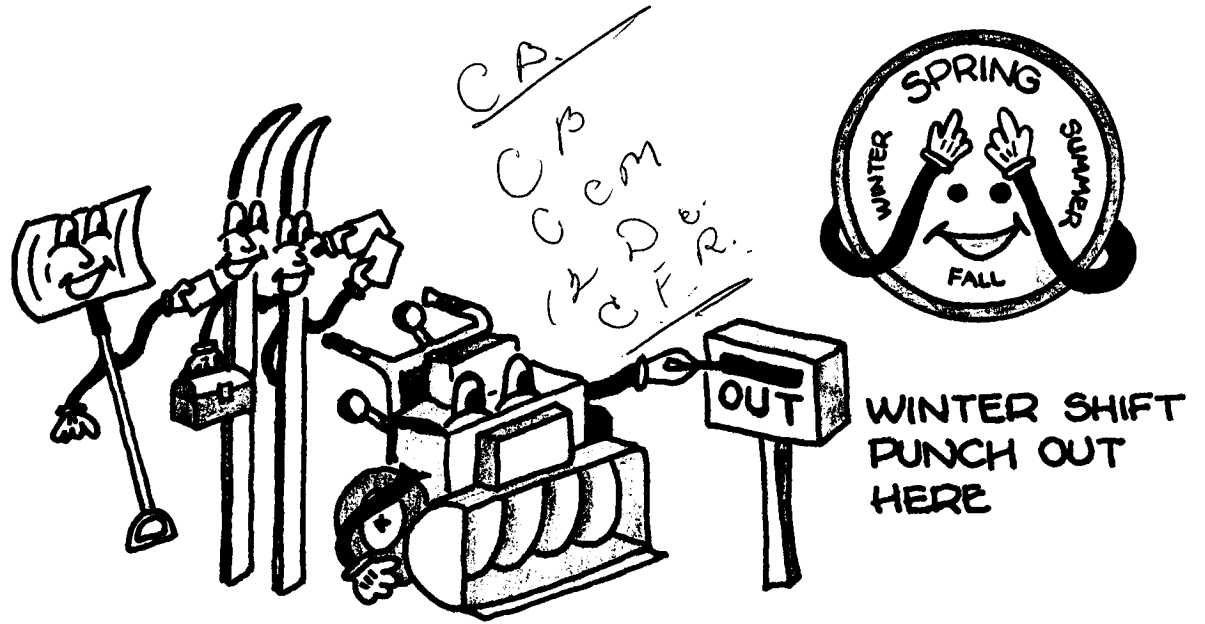

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT**RECREATION GRANT DISTRIBUTION**

As reported in last month's BANAR, a meeting of Blackburn Rate Payers was held on January 26, 1982 in order to seek approval of the Blackburn Recreation Grant for 1982. The proposed distribution was approved but concern was expressed by Scouts leaders that the grant to Scouts (\$1,000) was too small a proportion of the total Recreational Grant (\$34,000). Comparisons were drawn to the relatively larger proportion of program costs being covered for some other Blackburn sponsored activities such as Hockey, Ringette and Baseball. A proposal was made by the Scouts that each activity should receive an amount proportional to the total cost of that activity and the meeting agreed that a working group should be formed, under my chairmanship, to look into the feasibility of this suggestion.

A working group representative of ten activities had its formative meeting on February 9th and a second meeting was held on March 9th. The third meeting is planned for Tuesday, March 30th at 8:00 p.m. in Glen Ogilvie School. The working group has been looking into allowable costs which might be considered for grant distribution purposes in accordance with the proposal. The present method of evaluating grant requests is to consider the size of the amount requested; the percentage change from the previous year; the number of participants; costs to participants; and the availability of funds. Initial indications from the studies underway are that the proportional cost formula would result in considerable extra demands being placed on the limited grant monies with possibility of less reliance being placed by some activities on their own fund raising potential. Because of these and other drawbacks, the working group is giving consideration to other ways in which the existing method of evaluation might be changed.

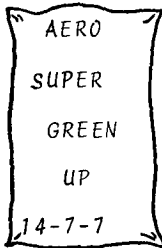
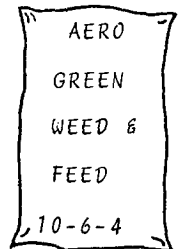

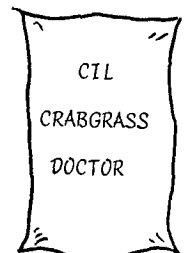

Publicity (Gwen Pollard) - Now has an interested volunteer to take over the BANAR.

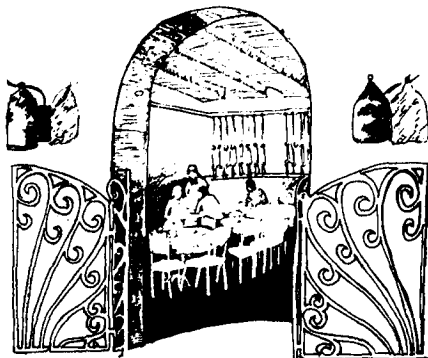

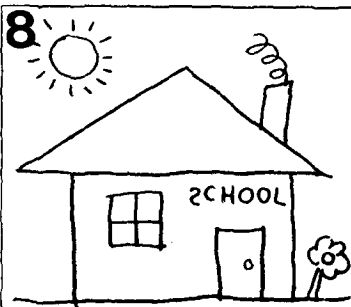

From the Editor's Desk

Of course the "lowly teenager" is blamed in every case and in fact, usually it is the "teenager" - BUT, it is a handfull not the majority.

Referring back to the article, it is very evident that teenagers themselves, given the chance are just as concerned about the destruction and let's hand it to this particular group, they are doing something about it! This is their school, their lockers, their washrooms that are being "ripped off". You don't think they are angry???

This feeling will, if encouraged, expand to their own communities, if we as adults

allow it. Far too often we are very quick **9** to say "NO" when our teens are looking for something, a games room, dances, a community hall etc., they want to be part of this community and if we allow this they too would take pride in the community and help to keep it as we all want FREE OF VANDALISM.

Just an added word to Officer Brian McHale who with Chief Ken Duncan's kind permission has spent many hours with the core group of the S.I.A., counselling them on how to react as a "positive peer pressure group". He has shown a group of caring teens how to work with each other; the adults amongst them; and the police to create a better community. This training and his caring will bring rewards via our teens to the community.

After reading these articles on these pages, I hope you will realize that there is a lot of teenagers willing and in fact acting, in a mature way to make this community what we as adults would like to see.

Next time you read in this BANAR that the teens are requesting something of their own-- think POSITIVE, remember what a great many teens are trying to do. What do you say-- LET'S GIVE THEM A HAND--ENCOURAGE THEM!

GARDENING IN GLOUCESTER

By now, most members of the Gloucester Allotment Garden Association will have started their gardens indoors. Tomatoes, peppers, cabbage and head lettuce are just some of the vegetables that require that four to six-week head start. Cucumbers, watermelons and muskmelons can wait until the early part of May as they sprout quickly.

Indoor growing facilities can be as elaborate or as simple as you wish, but properly controlled, can save you a considerable amount of money. A simply light unit is the best way to raise your own plants. A four-foot unit with one cool light and one grow light is most popular, and comes with legs and reflector. You can also install heating cables if you wish to keep the soil at 75 degrees.

Many people grow things year round. African violets and other flowers can be

raised at other times of the year and then you can switch it over to vegetables in March.

The kind of soil you start your seeds in is also important. Many people feel that any potting soil will do, and that is where they run into trouble with weeds growing up. They should use a pro mix which is already made up.

There are several new varieties that Gloucester gardeners will be trying this year. In addition to new cucumbers, beets, broccoli and beans, there are also peanuts on the market. After undergoing tests in Aylmer, Quebec, last year, it was determined that peanuts could be grown in the Ottawa area. All that is needed is 110 growing days in warm sandy soil, fairly high in phosphorus content - and a little luck!

The greatest innovation this year, however, is a new potato grown from seed. The Explorer potato seed is germinated in the same way as tomatoes or green peppers. They should be transplanted in late May. Harvesting will occur 90 to 120 days later.

Thanks go to the many volunteers who organized this day and made it the success it was.





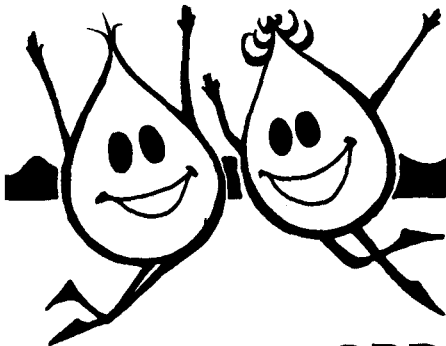

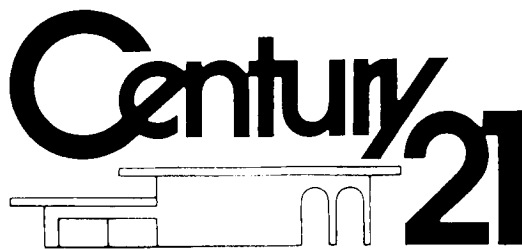
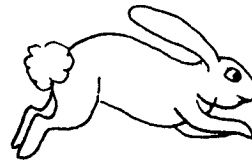
