President Mike Roche introduced Andy Shaw and Ian Stoddart of BCA's Youth Centre Committee who gave a report on the possibility of having a Youth Centre in Blackburn Hamlet. Andy's committee was formed after concerned residents approached BCA about the summer nights disturbances in Blackburn parks to see what might be done for the young people with time on their hands. The purpose of the sub-committee on youth had been to investigate ways and means to establish a youth centre. The committee surveyed young people, investigated other youth centres, considered sites, organized a first fund raiser, attracted publicity and considered possible programs, organizations and funding. The committee concluded that a Blackburn Youth Centre is, at least feasible, and would reduce vandalism and contribute to a sense of community and responsible behaviour.

A full and open discussion followed during which Bob Bambrick congratulated both Andy and Ian for their efforts and fully supported the direction they were going in. Questions were raised on programs being considered for the centre, grants available, sites being considered, Board of Directors, fundraisers. Mike complimented Ian and Andy for their excellent presentation and said there are pros and cons and that Andy and Ian will continue to work on the group with BCA as their link.

MOTION: Moved by Jack McGuinty, seconded by Bob Bambrick that a Board of Directors now be formally established under the sponsorship of the BCA to pursue the concept of the Blackburn Youth Centre as described in the Youth Committee Report dated May 4, 1982 with final approval of any funding implications to be subject to approval of a BCA General Meeting. CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

MOTION: Moved by Ron Robin, seconded by John Rowe that the committee be thanked for the excellent job it has done.

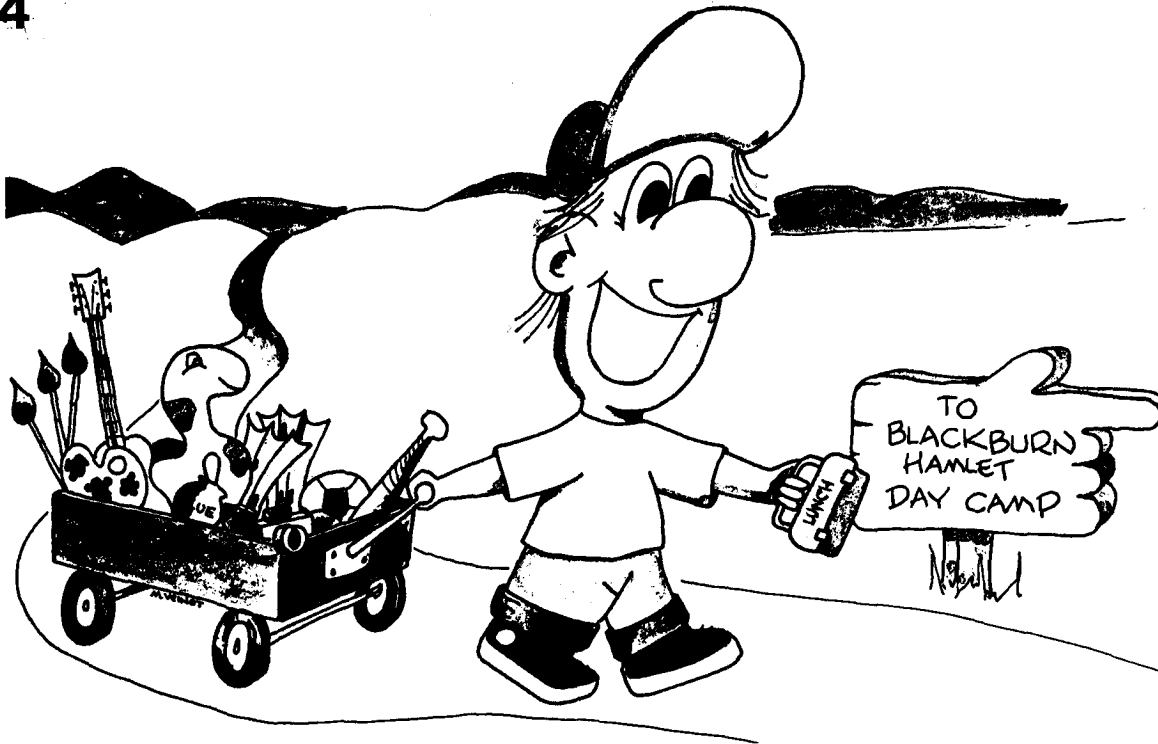

CIVIC AFFAIRS

TAX INCREASE FOR ROTHWELL HEIGHTS SEWERS

Gloucester is proposing to the OMB to undertake \$1.22 million worth of new sanitary and storm sewer construction and house service connections in an area of Rothwell Heights. Approximately \$424 thousand of this will be borne by the benefiting property owners, the remaining \$796 thousand will be charged to the Local Improvement Area. This includes Blackburn Hamlet. The levy is 1.85 mils for the next 15 years (\$9.20/yr. on an assessment of \$5,000).

A group of concerned property owners approached council to contest this levy, in that other areas, such as Blackburn, had their sanitary storm sewers built into the price of the home when purchased. The BCA was approached to support their stand.

After careful consideration, the BCA declined to formally oppose their measure. There were two main reasons:

- 1) While the local improvement district would pay an additional levy of 1.85 mils, the levy against the benefiting properties was much higher (Estimated at \$721.22/yr for 15 years). Thus the levy did not seem to unduly favour the Rothwell Heights property owners.
- 2) There is a longer term consideration to this issue. While it is true that Blackburn residents had paid their initial service in the purchase price of the house, such services do have a finite life and will ultimately have to be replaced. This could be within the next 8-15 years. At this time, the community would undoubtedly be pleased to avail itself of this cost-sharing approach.

Thus, while recognizing that as individuals higher taxes can be opposed on cases such as this, the BCA did not make a formal presentation to council on the subject of this proposed by-law.

Letters to the Editor



In the May issue of the Banar I commented about an editorial that appeared in the Leader re "Volunteerism". The main issue against the editorial was the suggestion by the editor that we, the volunteers, should thank the Mayor and members of the City Council for LETTING us be a volunteer, etc.

In the June issue of the Banar comments were published from the Mayor, and the editor of the Leader, which do require a reply and therefore offer the following:

1. The opinions, comments etc., I expressed in the letter to the Editor (not an editorial as mentioned by the Mayor) consisted of opinions and comments received from many volunteers in Gloucester.
2. Re the Banar. We in Blackburn are very fortunate to have a publication such as the Banar which does provide that opportunity for the residents to express his or her thoughts and opinions FREELY. I certainly hope that this policy of the Banar does not change. Unlike the Banar, the Leader does have certain restrictions as the only comments accepted are that which are constructive, will not be used for a political football or abusive personal attacks (quoted from the Leader). Due to these restrictions and the lack of letters to the Editor in the Leader, I submitted my letter to the Editor of the Banar.
3. The Leader, to many in Gloucester, is considered to be a political publication, as published by the City of Gloucester. As such, the views, comments etc., of the Editor (although stated as the view of the writer only) appear to be generally accepted as the comments and views of the Mayor and Council members.
4. It was interesting to note that as of this date we do not have one member of the City Council, or the Mayor, adding any comment to my letter with regard to the suggestion that we should thank them for letting us be a volunteer. It was stated that this suggestion by the Editor of the Leader was "Food for Thought". The question is for who?

5. It was rather confusing to read the remarks by the Mayor with regard to volunteers, how picked, how honoured etc. The only comment I made regarding this was that I agreed with the recognition of volunteers but thought it should be the area responsibility rather than the City?
6. An error was made in my letter where I stated that the Editor of the Leader was on the payroll of the City of Gloucester. This was incorrect, as I am informed that the publisher, Elokem Enterprises Limited, is the one receiving the payment.

To sum all this up - should the suggestion of the Leader be adopted by the City Council then there is real concern that we will lose a volunteer (including yours truly).

The Bengals who operate under the auspices of the B.C.A. have three teams

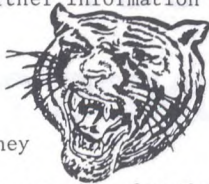
MOSQUITO - 9 - 11 years of age, 115 lb. weight limit

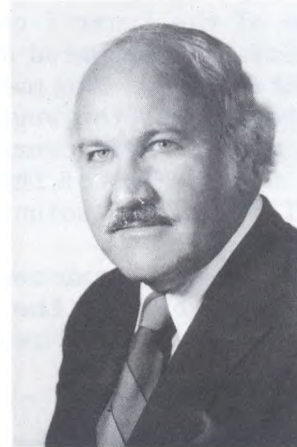

AUDITORS' REPORT

The Members,
Blackburn Community Association.

We have examined the balance sheet of the Blackburn Community Association as at December 31, 1981 and the statements of revenue and expense and surplus and Fun Fair revenue and expense and surplus for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests and other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, except as explained in the following paragraph.

In common with many non-profit organizations, the Association reports amounts for membership fees, committee revenue and Fun Fair revenue amounting to \$172,608 which are not susceptible of complete verification by audit procedures. Accordingly, we were unable to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenue, excess of revenue over expense for the year, or surplus.

In our opinion, except for the effect of any adjustments which might have been required had we been able to satisfy ourselves with respect to the revenue referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Association as at December 31, 1981, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, except for the recording of fixed assets as described in note 1 to the financial statements, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The previous year's figures were reported on by another auditor.

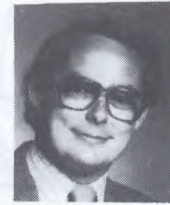

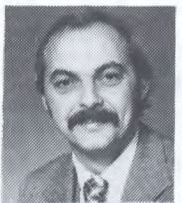

GLOUCESTER BLOCK PARENT - NEED YOUR HELP!

The Gloucester Block Parent Program was first started in March 1976 by the Gloucester Police Force to the residents of Carson Grove.

The Block Parent Program was designed for the protection of children by providing several easily identified homes in each block to which a child may go for protection and/or assistance in an emergency. Today, we find the program used by everyone. The program is beneficial to all as an excellent form of protection.

However, now that the Gloucester Block Parent Program is six years old and that many Block Parents feel that since no children have ever come to their door that their help is no longer required - the ever important Block Parent sign is now placed in a closet and forgotten.

A Block Parent's role is simple: once an application is filled out and approved by the Gloucester Police Force, the Block Parent simply places the sign in his or her window.

The Block Parent's job is not a difficult task but he or she must remember to remove the sign from the window when that person is not available to help - i.e., in the shower, workshop, resting, or not at home.

Large numbers of children beating a path to your door would indicate that the program was not working properly (i.e., for food, drink, use of bathroom, etc.). Therefore, each time that a child uses a Block Parent home, it is for a serious incident. The Gloucester Police Force has taken the time to teach all the children in the City of Gloucester the correct way of using a Block Parent home. Now it is up to each and everyone of us to put our signs in our windows for our children!

If a child uses your home (i.e., lost, sick, hurt, bullied, etc.), the Block Parent simply contacts either the child's parents or the Gloucester Police. The Block Parent does not transport the child but simply provides a place of refuge in case of need.

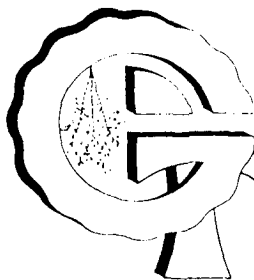

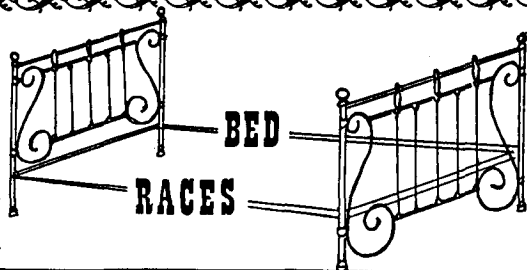

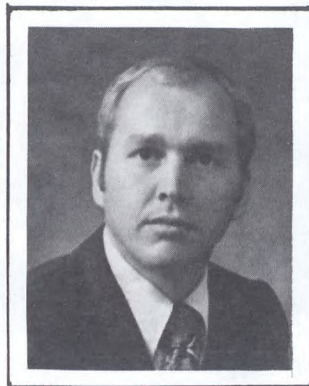
