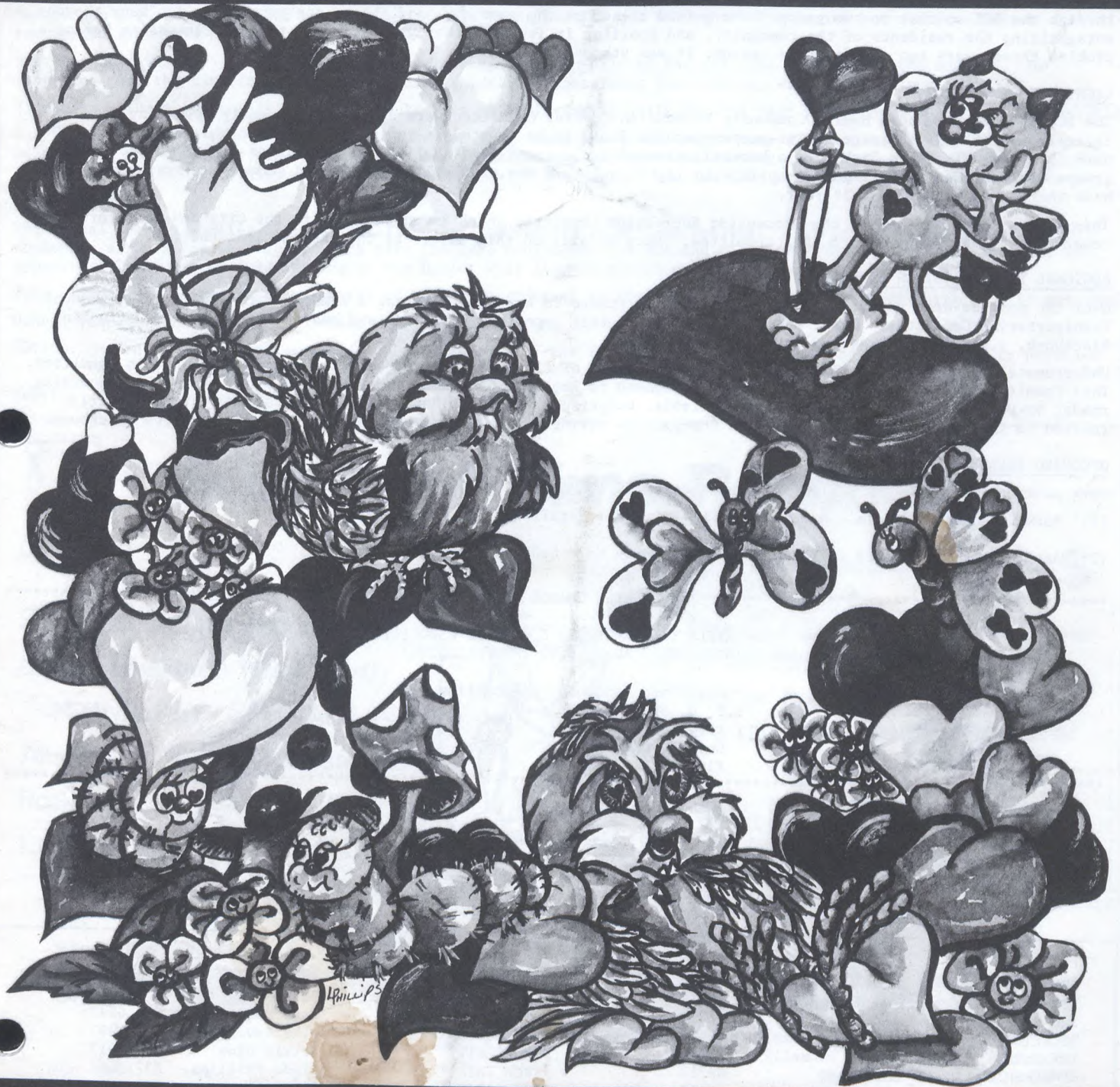

FROM YOUR PRESIDENT

1983 BUDGET

I am pleased to report that the Recreation Grant of the City of Gloucester and the BCA grant distributions have been completed for the year 1983. It is a difficult task to review all of the presentations and prepare the recommended distribution, but after a great deal of work by the Treasurer and Budget committee, it was presented to the Members of the community on January 25.

FUND RAISING

The Blackburn Community Association recommended to the sponsoring groups that they also seek funds through their own fund raising activities. However, a word of caution. If this is to be done in the future, (a) it should be organized through the BCA so that no two groups have a fund raiser on the same day, and (b) no one group have too many thereby antagonizing the residents of the community, and spoiling it for the other groups. Door-to-door canvassing became a problem three years ago and for this reason, it was stopped.

LIGHTED SPORTS FIELD

The BCA and the Blackburn Hamlet Community Recreation Centres Committee were approached recently regarding the installation of an illuminated multi-purpose sports field to be located in the park behind the Blackburn Arena. The park, known as Blackburn Park, has a baseball diamond and current plans call for illumination in the future. The groups would prefer a multi-purpose park with lights suitable for baseball, football and soccer and are anxious to have the lights installed this year.

This park is administered by the Gloucester Recreation Committee which is responsible to the City and therefore, we could only refer the groups to this committee. More details on this matter as they become available.

REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

Over the past several years, Gloucester has been fortunate to have our Mayor as a member of the Regional Government Transportation Committee. Mayor Betty Stewart sat on this important committee and had a vote on matters effecting Blackburn, i.e., the By-Pass and Innes Road upgrading.

Unfortunately, for the next three years, we, as the City of Gloucester, do not have a voting voice in this Committee. This Committee is vitally important as they recommend to Regional Government, certain decisions on issues concerning roads, by-passes, rapid transit, traffic controls, budgets, etc. We do have a non-voting observer from Council invited to these meetings but it won't be the same as having an active, strong voice on matters vital to Blackburn.

Special Projects - (Dave Ross) - The Children's play on December 4 was a success. There were over three hundred children present. The Lakeside Players are anxious to return in the spring.

Membership - (Gord Kemp) - The membership drive is being carried out throughout the Hamlet but a few volunteer canvassers are still needed.

Sports - (Pat Vasudev) - Pat attended a fund raising workshop held by the City and reported to the meeting. He requested that the directors come up with some guidelines concerning fund raising within the community.

Treasurer - (Dennis Donnelly) - Dennis would like all outstanding bills for the past year submitted as soon as possible.

1st Vice President - (Ron Robin) - Pat V. and Ron rearranged the arena trophy case allotting one case to the hockey association and the other case to any remaining organizations having trophies they wish to display. This arrangement is on a temporary basis only. Ron will be in touch with the library and the City concerning additional trophy cases.

OTHER BUSINESS

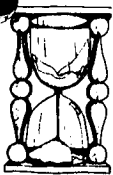

This is a joint ratepayers and community association meeting at which time the 1983 budget for the BCA and the recreation grant allocation will be approved. The topic of fund raising in the Hamlet will also be placed on the agenda.

Dennis requested that the BCA purchase a calculator for the use of the bookkeeper.

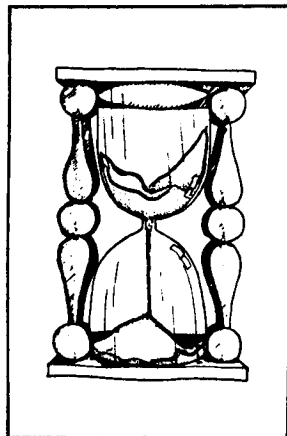

My thanks to the people who expressed their support regarding my comments and concern about the increase in the games played by the competitive leagues and the costs involved. It should be noted, however, that the increase (games and cost) applies to all hockey districts - the comments made by representatives of the recent Ottawa International Hockey Tournament verifies this. The increase in games is affecting the availability of practice hours and game time for the house league players in all areas and we have one good example which is the BMHA loss of ice time at Rockland, Navan, Clarence Creek, Cumberland and other arenas who say they do NOT have the ice time due to the demand by the competitive leagues.

In Gloucester, as we see it and from what we are told, things will be getting worse instead of better unless something is done NOW! We recently were forced to provide the GHA and the City of Gloucester with some of our practice hours for league games and tournaments, also due to the shortage of ice time, the GHA made the decision to use the 6:00 a.m. hour for house league (not competitive) league games. The BMHA has forwarded a letter to the President of the GHA, and to the City, as a protest in the use of 6:00 a.m. hours, and loss of practice hours, with the suggestion that a committee be set up to review the ice requirements, particularly the increase in games, the many hours directed to special events and tournaments. It is our opinion that the games, special events and tournaments, be reduced and the ice time be given to the house league teams. It will be a surprise if something is done, especially when you cannot convince the competitive-minded hockey powers that the house league is the life line for their competitive teams.

The BMHA second half fee was due on January 15, 1983. This fee varied with each Division and level of hockey due to the difference in cost for equipment, referees, ice time, team fees, insurance and administrative costs. As promised, we did manage to keep the fee down to a very small increase over last year.

There has been considerable concern in the past year regarding the minor officials' role, i.e., the duties of the scorekeeper and timekeeper. We, unlike many other districts, are very fortunate in obtaining parents to take on these duties and they are doing an excellent job with little guidance. To help the parents in performing the duties in the best possible way, the GHA Referee-in-Chief, Nelson Williams, prepared a list of duties for the minor officials' role. We believe that Nelson Williams' contribution will be most helpful to the parents and we therefore made the decision to include the duties as a part of our Rules, Duties and Responsibilities of the BMHA Constitution and By-Laws. A copy of the duties will be found in the arenas in the timekeeper's box.

Our thanks to Don Morrell and his committee, plus the 26 parents who performed the functions of registrar, timekeeper, scorekeeper and hosts for the very successful second BMHA/GHA Midget House League Tournament. A total of 16 teams participated in the tournament. The winner of the "A" Division was our own Blackburn team, coached by Wil Wilson, who beat out Nepean. Our congratulations to all the team players, and particularly the winner of the "A" Division.

EDUCATION

A multitude of changes have taken place this year in the Blackburn Hamlet schools. Some of the changes dealt with new principals, name changes of facilities, completion of facilities, communications with the parents and the municipal elections.

On the election platforms, literature, meet the trustee evenings, concern over communication between parents, school boards and trustees were of prime interest. Other areas of concern were:

- (1) report cards being explicit in meaning and universal interpretation,
- (2) a return to the basics of education (3 R's),
- (3) parental input into programs administered by the school (e.g. reading),
- (4) parental input into costly items purchased by the school (e.g. computers and their effective educational programming and use).

For those who are not already aware, the name of Blackburn Catholic School has been formally changed to The Good Shepherd. There were a number of reasons given for the name change. Primarily, Blackburn Catholic was a temporary name chosen when the facility was built to depict location and recently the Carleton Separate School Board felt it was time to choose a permanent name. Also, there was confusion in the community and with mail service between Blackburn Public School and Blackburn Catholic School. Now, all of our schools have a separate name identity.

Our students have received their photos and report cards. Comments that have come to my attention are:

- (1) photo packages were not the same, even by children attending the same board. Some parents have complained that it made displaying and gift giving unfair for the child receiving the smaller package (money difference was negligible). Perhaps the advisory boards for the various schools could consult each other before deciding upon their respective photo package.
- (2) report cards for the Carleton Separate Schools were issued mid-November. Report cards for the Carleton Public Schools were issued Christmas week. Some parents have commented they would like to see a report card mid-November as late December is almost halfway through the year.

THE GOOD SHEPHERD has a new principal this year, MRS. BERNICE MacNEIL. In order to foster better communications between home and school, she has implemented the program of each week having the teachers outline work done by the students on a ditto sheet. The student then indicates the activity he/she enjoyed most. Parents, please use these sheets - read them, talk with your child about them and make sure your child can do the activities listed. If your child seems to be having difficulty, contact the teacher. Those sheets provide an easy method for you to keep in touch with the programs your school is using. Please study them carefully. Your child's teacher has spent a lot of time preparing them for you.

The Carleton Board of Education has implemented a new program this year - an Information Public Relations telephone number. Any information you wish can be obtained by calling this number ---- 820-1820 ----.

MR. WILF CROWDER, the principal of BLACKBURN PUBLIC SCHOOL, suffered a serious illness early this fall and has not been able to return this year. Parents and students enjoyed the rapport, guidance and administration of Mr. Crowder. He was always receptive to parental and community needs. We wish him a speedy and complete recovery. Our best wishes to him and his family in the New Year. MR. MICHAEL KNOX, as of January 1, 1983, is the new principal for Blackburn Public School. Welcome to our community!

DR. WHITTLE, principal of GLEN OGILVIE PUBLIC SCHOOL, in his effort to improve communications, is going to give a series of seminars. One of these seminars will be on the "Placement of Students". I urge all parents of Glen Ogilvie students to attend.

When I was in Blackburn Library last month, I noticed they did not have copies of the minutes of board meetings for Carleton and Carleton Separate. The Library, however, will gladly display them. I will be contacting both boards and requesting 2 copies - one I will keep on hand for quick reference to any of your queries, and the second copy I will deliver to our Library. These should be in place by February 1983. Please take the time to peruse them. They will allow you to monitor programs and activities, your tax dollars and the activities of your trustee.

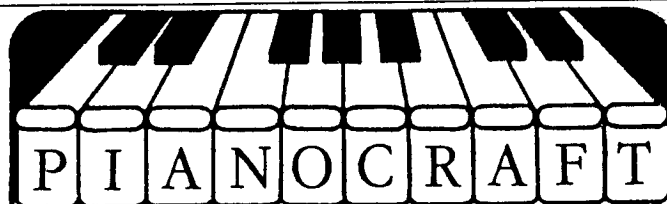
GLEN OGILVIE

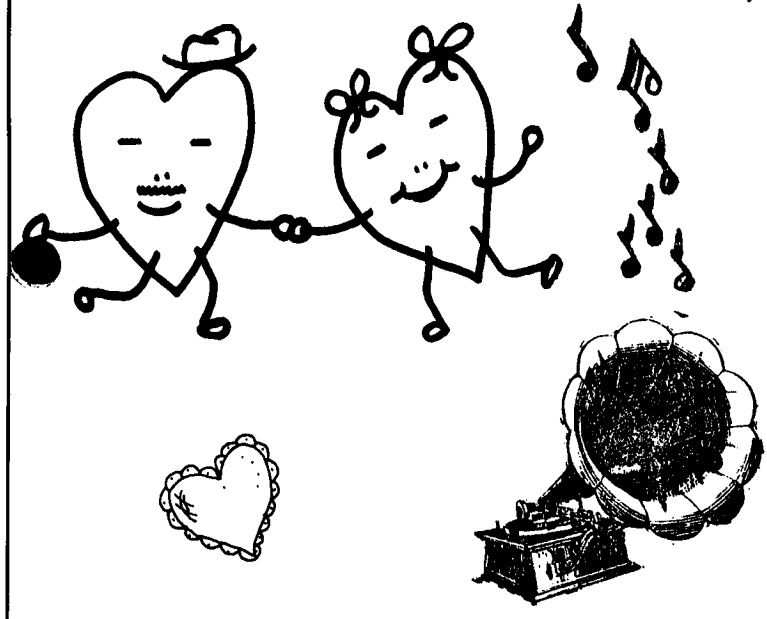

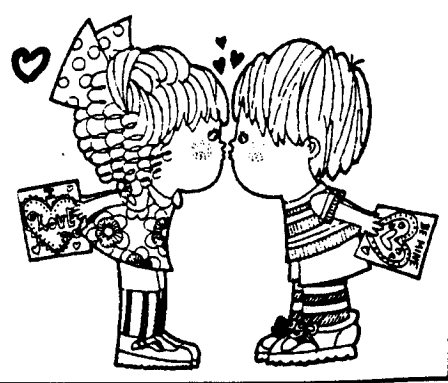

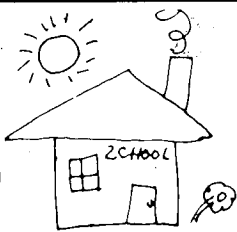

Blackburn Hamlet PRE-SCHOOL

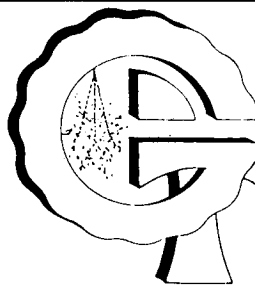

CONGRATULATIONS !

On November 8 during the municipal election, Gloucester residents took the opportunity to give an overwhelming vote of support in favour of multilateral nuclear disarmament. Ninety-six percent of the total number of voters took part in the referendum, with 75.5% voting in favour of urging our federal government to negotiate with all governments the implementation of balanced steps which could lead to the earliest possible achievement of general nuclear disarmament. So far, one hundred and ten municipalities across Canada have placed themselves squarely behind the goal of disarmament, with the "yes" vote averaging 77%.

The work of the Gloucester Ad Hoc Committee of Operation Dismantle has only just begun, however, as we now proceed with a follow-up campaign designed to pressure the federal government into proposing a worldwide disarmament referendum to the United Nations. We have requested meetings with Mr. Robert MacQuarrie, our M.P.P., and Mr. Jean Luc Pepin, our federal Member of Parliament, to continue the campaign for official action in this regard.
