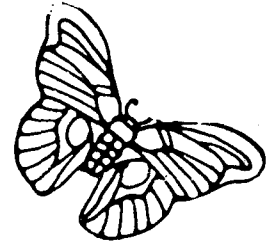

REZONING OF INNES ROAD:

Since the last issue of the BANAR, several changes have been made with regard to the rezoning of Innes Road. The Planning Board met on June 8th and after much discussion decided to present the following for council's approval:

- On the north east and north west corner of Innes and Bearbrook, the zoning will be changed to CR-1. This NEW zoning definition means "commercial/residential". Should this pass it would allow convenience stores, cleaners, etc. and apartments and offices.


This of course is contrary to the wishes of the Community Association which voted with a majority to see only residential zoning in this area. This new zoning of CR-1 is unique and was created by Planning Board for this site only.

As we go to press we are awaiting the council meeting for a final decision to reject or approve the Planning Board Recommendations. We shall keep the community advised.

SUMMARY OF MINUTES OF DIRECTORS MEETING, MAY 10, 1983

PRESENT: John Pollard, Joanne Bushell, Trixie Clow, Gord Kemp, Dennis Donnelly, Pat Vasudev, Mike Irvin, Gloria Dawn Warkentin-Coulter, Linda Phillips, Christine Clarke

President Pollard called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. John Pollard read the minutes of the last meeting.

Treasurer - (Dennis Donnelly) - The audit is in process, copies will be provided. Problem of deposits-no copy made for the Treasurer. He also mentioned Mrs. Morgan is retiring as bookkeeper and we are looking for a replacement.

Civic Affairs - Mr. Pollard advised 60-70 people attended the Rezoning Public Meeting. A community position was clearly stated with a majority voting against any further commercialization on Innes Road.

Fun Fair - (Linda Phillips) - advised that everything is organized for Fun Fair. Hopefully the weather will be good.

Special Projects - (Dave Ross) - The Fertilizer Drive realized a profit of \$1,800. The Volunteer Dance was a great success, with approximately 170 people attending.

Transportation - (Mike Irvin) - A letter from H. Allen had been received and Mike read same concerning the By-Pass. No final decision has been made as yet and John Pollard said that the four lane Innes Road is still an option.

Membership - (Gord Kemp) - Tennis registration was wrapped up May 7. Membership drive - approximately \$8,000 has been collected to date.

Education - (Gloria Dawn Warkentin-Coulter) - Informed us that buses will be discontinued to Blackburn Public School beginning in September 1983.

Sports - (Pat Vasudev) - A few points were raised concerning the annual report of the BHMHA regarding Ice Allocation and Fund Raising Activity. The GRCC is presently reviewing the Ice Allocation Policy.

Other Business - The annual General Meeting will be held on May 31 with executive positions open for Fun Fair, Membership, Youth Activities and Secretary Directors.

Meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.

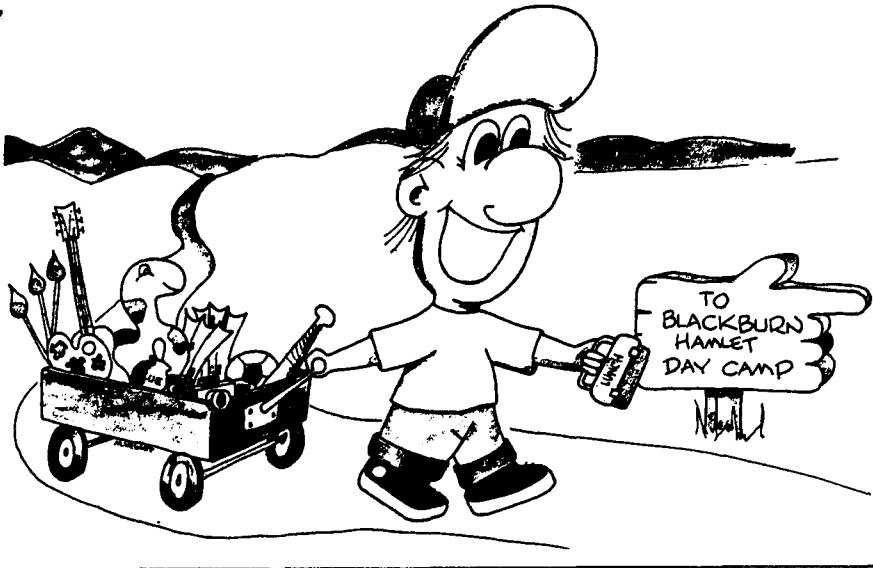

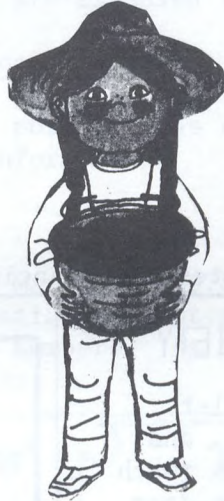

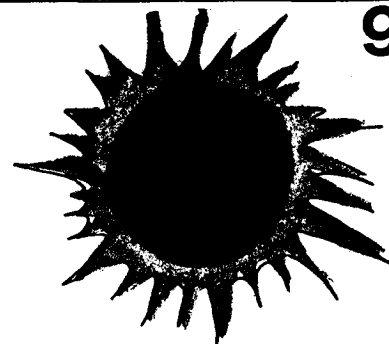

The wind-up dance was its usual raving success.

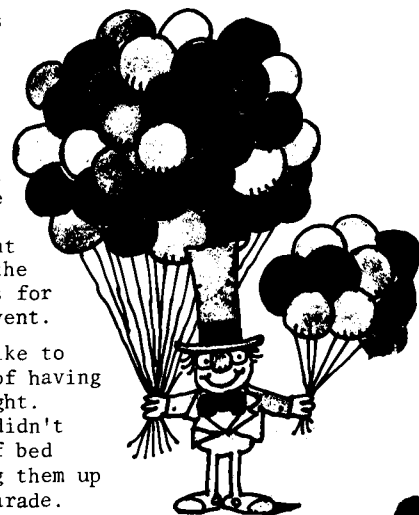
The varied activities for people of all ages, organized totally by Hamlet volunteers never ceases to amaze us.

BLACKBURN BENGALLETES CHEERLEADERS

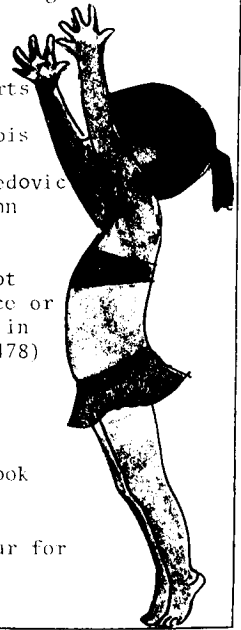
The Ottawa Rough Riders have the "Rhythm Riders", the Blackburn Bengals have the "Bengalettes"!

SCOUTING IN BLACKBURN HAMLET

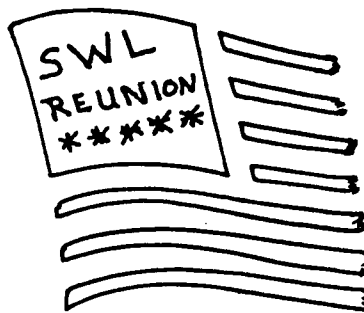
BEAVER AND WOLF CUB GRADUATION CEREMONIES

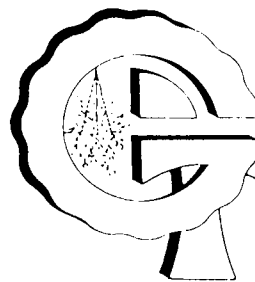

Aquatic Exotic: Something Special from B.C.

An exhibit about the tremendous variety of marine animals in British Columbia waters highlights the National Museum of Natural Sciences' summer activities. This photographic exhibit deals with four major groups of animals: Sea Anemones, Sea Slugs, Sea Stars and Fishes.

In addition to the main exhibit, the museum is pleased to announce the temporary display of a full scale model of the now famous Leatherback Turtle. The original specimen measuring 2.13 metres long and weighing 438 kg was obtained by the museum after it was caught in fish nets near Blanc-Sablon, Québec. The replica was produced by museum model maker Ron Séguin.

Aquatic Exotic will be on view to the public in the Temporary Exhibits Gallery from May 31 to September 18. The exhibit was produced by the British Columbia Provincial Museum and funded by the National Museums of Canada. The underwater photographs are by Brent Cooke of the British Columbia Provincial Museum's Aquatic Zoology Division.

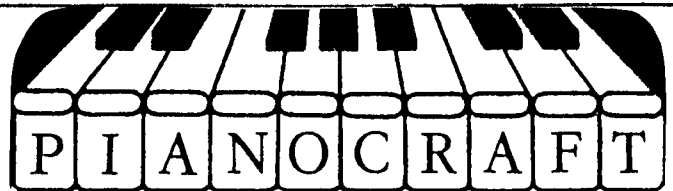

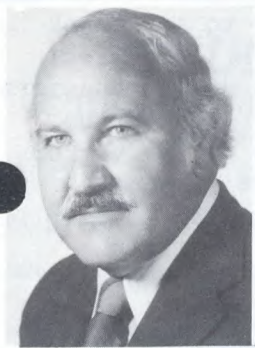

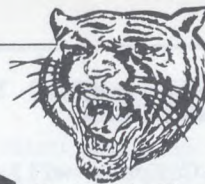

BLACKBURN BENGALS MINOR FOOTBALL CLUB

Tenth Year

1983 marks the tenth year of competition for the Bengals in the Ottawa-Carleton Minor Football Association. Boys living in Blackburn Hamlet and points east (Orleans area, Navan, Cumberland) are invited to try out for the Bengals three teams - Mosquito, Peewee and Bantam. With the introduction of the CANFIT player classification system for 1983, boys aged 8 to 16 years of age are now eligible to play for the Bengals.

CANFIT Player Classification System

For 1983, players will be placed at their respective playing levels (Mosquito, Peewee or Bantam) based on the CANFIT system developed by the Canadian Amateur Football Association. CANFIT takes into account a boy's strength (based on a measurement of forearm circumference), age, and height, and promises to be a much improved and safer classification system than the age/weight ratio taken into account in prior years. The physically smaller 14 year old, for example, may be eligible to play Peewee, a 16 year old, Bantam.

Registration & Try Outs

Registration and training camps will start August 15 at Emily Carr Middle School at 6:30 p.m. Try-out fee is \$6.00 (includes free Bengals T-shirt). All equipment is supplied except footwear (soccer cleats recommended) and a registration fee of \$45 (\$40-BCA members) is payable by those making the teams. An eight game schedule is played commencing in September with playoffs finishing in early November.

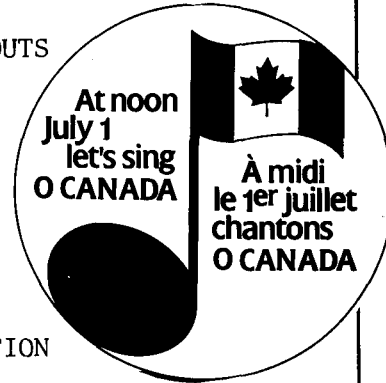
