FROM YOUR PRESIDENTGENERAL MEETING - JANUARY 31ST

My thanks for an excellent turnout to the General meeting held January 31st. The Mayor and all the Aldermen (with the exception of Harold Keenan) were in attendance to discuss the traffic situation.

Most of the Aldermen were telling us that the N.C.C. will NOT permit the By-Pass "E" to go ahead. It is their land and their decision. Some of the Aldermen suggested a modified "B" plan where soccer fields could be used as a buffer between the southern part of the Hamlet and the By-Pass. Another suggestion was of course 4-lane Innes Road. At the conclusion of the meeting a motion was passed by the residents in effect, which calls for a perimeter road around the eastern area.

After several discussions with many elected officials of ALL levels of government, my personal concern is that if a compromise is not reached by the community, a decision will be imposed on us and it appears to be Plan "B", modified "B" or 4 lane Innes Road. My reasons for this concern is the residents to the east of us are starting to demand that a solution be found - I doubt they will care (as we would) what route is selected to solve the problem. Their pressure is going to be severe.

WITH REGRET

It is with mixed emotions that I have tendered my resignation as your President of the Blackburn Community Association. I have accepted a new position and will be moving with my family to Toronto.

Since coming here 6 years ago I have been actively involved in the Blackburn Hockey Association, Blackburn Hamlet Community Recreations Committee and the B.C.A. Gwen has also been actively involved in the B.C.A., first as Education Chairperson and later as Editor of the BANAR.

We have both enjoyed volunteering; have worked hard at it; made a contribution (we hope), made some mistakes along the way (but show me a volunteer who hasn't) and had a great deal of fun and satisfaction. For those of you who have never volunteered, why not give it a try? You will find it very rewarding as we have and meet many super people.

We will miss the community spirit we have here in Blackburn, it is unique and something you all can be proud of.

We wish you luck in your endeavours to keep this one of the best communities in the area.

The President, John Pollard, called the meeting to order at 8:05 p.m.

Opening Remarks: The chairman outlined the format of the meeting. He then proceeded to read the "Policy for the Distribution of Grants" outlining the purpose, grant eligibility, application procedures and grant review.

1. Public ratepayers meeting concerning the distribution of recreation grants:

The Treasurer, Warren Hanstead, presented the proposed budget.

Discussion: Points were raised concerning grant to Les Chansonniers; increase from the city for ice time by 9% while increase in city grant only 5%.

MOTION: Moved by Ron Robin and seconded by Terry Heaslip that the distribution of the Recreation Grants as submitted by the Treasurer be approved. MOTION CARRIED.

2. Blackburn Hamlet Community Association - Proposed Budget:

The treasurer pointed to some corrections to be made to the proposed budget which was tabled: on page 4, the expenditure column for the Scouts should read "\$2,000" instead of "\$2,500", while Lacrosse should read "\$800" instead of "\$750".

Discussion: Points were raised concerning the Fun Fair reserves and safety hazards at rink at Emily Carr.

MOTION: Moved by Warren Hanstead and seconded by Mike Irvin that the B.C.A. proposed budget be approved with the corrections brought forth by the Treasurer. MOTION CARRIED.

3. Blackburn Hamlet By-Pass:

The Chairman gave a brief background on the different alternatives discussed in the past and the apparent position of the present Council. The Council members present, including the mayor, were given the opportunity to express their views on the subject.

Discussion: During discussion, the assembly was informed of a study of another by-pass which would link to the 417 on the east end and not come back to Innes Road. A copy of the Council minutes on that subject will be published in the BANAR. The loss of soccer fields in the Hornet's Nest was addressed. Council members encouraged residents to write to the N.C.C., the Regional Council and their provincial and federal representatives to express their concerns. Members were informed that Innes Road will be upgraded from Highway 417 to Blair Road in 1988. Suggestion was made that it might be in the best interest of Blackburn Hamlet to find alternative solutions to the traffic problem other than the by-pass and that construction on the east side should be halted until a solution is found. Suggestion was made to have sidewalks on both sides of Innes Road to ensure safety of children.

MOTION: Moved by André Pagé that: "Whereas the problem affecting the Blackburn Hamlet originates from the east end; whereas Blackburn Hamlet suffers the effect of any traffic; whereas the community of Blackburn Hamlet does not wish to see Innes Road become a four-lane thoroughfare; whereas the community of Blackburn Hamlet wishes to see a ring road around the community not too close, defined as "option E", be it resolved that the Council of the Blackburn Community Association be directed to advise the Council of the City of Gloucester to support the concept of a circuit road directing the traffic east to west." Seconded by Jack McGee with the following amendment: "The ring road be extended to connect with Walkley Road." Further amendment proposed by Jackie Madill: "That the preferred option is the furthest one and the unacceptable option is alternative B". MOTION CARRIED with the above amendment.

MOTION: Moved by Jack McGuinty that "Whereas the ring road discussion seems to have ceased some time ago, the chairman of the Blackburn Community Association be instructed by this meeting to give some leadership by calling a meeting of all community associations which may be affected by this by-pass." Seconded by Roger Major with the following amendment: "To also include an invitation to community associations in the West End." MOTION CARRIED with the above amendment.

The meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m.



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4 Letter to the Editor BY-PASS

The enclosure is an excerpt from material I prepared last November describing Gloucester's relationships with the NCC and other federal government agencies. The specific portion deals with the By-Pass and a particular "alternative" which retains the wide route but offers some other advantages which should be attractive to all communities along the Innes corridor, the NCC, the RMOC, and Gloucester.

THE BLACKBURN BYPASS

We have a problem with Innes Road which has, in the last year, become acute.

Blackburn Hamlet was designed in the early 1960's by the NCC and Gloucester as an urban island in the Greenbelt. Many who have chosen to live there did so on the basis that Blackburn would retain some of the advantages of both urban and rural amenities with few of the disadvantages. This meant close association with the open, natural areas of the Greenbelt and isolation from the smell and noise of urban traffic corridors. From the beginning, Blackburn people have advanced the concept of a collector role for Innes Road in the Hamlet and a wide bypass to carry the arterial traffic around the Hamlet.

From the beginning, a bypass has been included in the plans, but it has generally been a narrow or tight-to-the-community route. This route passes about 170 meters south of the existing Blackburn community. The route favoured by Blackburn and Gloucester has been a wide bypass with part of the alignment being near or on the Renaud Road. Certainly the bypass route favoured by the NCC has been one fairly close to the existing development on the south side of the Hamlet. The stated position of the NCC is based primarily on preservation of agricultural land. A more important problem is the future use of land between Blackburn and a wide bypass...it is unlikely that significant portions of it would escape urbanization eventually. There may be servicing constraints now, but ways have always been found to lay more pipes wherever development opportunities have arisen within 10 miles of Parliament Hill.

Another difficulty is pseudo-jurisdictional. A bypass or whatever would become part of the RMOC primary road network. Hence the RMOC must be included in any planning and, of course, the design and construction. The NCC recognizes this and tends to consider Gloucester's involvement as secondary or even superfluous. Like it or not, the works being considered are in Gloucester and are vitally important to Gloucester residents. If the NCC will not listen to and consider proposals from Gloucester, then we will be continuing a period of very strained relations!

The problem has become critical with the increased rate of development in the Eastern Urban Community. Construction of arterial road works should be occurring now, but is at least 5 years away even if agreements, plans, resources can all be accommodated at a reasonable rate.

There is another alternative. This is to connect an arterial from the Orleans Blvd at Innes to Highway NO. 417 at Walkley Road and include a connection with Blair extended south of Innes. Part of the route could follow the Renaud Road or CPR right of way; the CPR has indicated a desire to close the line south of the Renaud Road which runs between Ottawa and Navan. Such

a roadway would offer a number of advantages to Gloucester -

- 1) it would perform the function of the Blackburn Bypass without being either a "tight" bypass or providing the hazard of future development caused by a wide bypass (it would not enclose land)
- 2) The historic bypass provides no solutions for the heavy traffic on Innes Road between Blair and Highway No. 417. Bringing traffic around Blackburn and back to Innes ensures congestion west of Blair even if several lanes are added to Innes.
- 3) The route suggested can form the first link of an Inner Ring road in the eastern end of the RMOC. Toward the west, the Inner Ring is conceptually located between Walkley and the Hunt Club Road (extended to Highway 417). The ring roads are vital transportation components in the development of the RMOC for the encouragement of commerce and industry outside the core area. In the long term this will relieve the heavy traffic burden imposed by the concentration of jobs in the central area.
- 4) This arterial would provide an improved route from the Eastern Urban Community to the southern part of Gloucester. Such links are badly needed. The Anderson Road is one. The Hawthorne Road is another and it could be linked easily (and sensibly) to the Walkley-417 interchange.
- 5) Gloucester desires some significant development of industry in the Orleans centered area. This would be encouraged by improved access to the Uplands airport which the road proposed would provide.

It is to be hoped that the transportation planners of the RMOC will consider this route in the very near future.

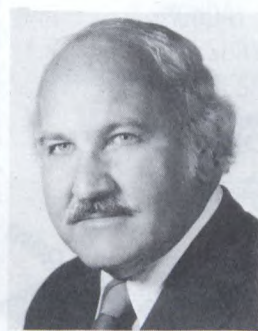
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Emily Carr School

Our Peewee team did it again! They won the Eastern Division Peewee title with a perfect 8-0 record, scoring 375 points along the way with only 30 points against. At the OCMFA Cheerleading Competition, organized by our own Jean Seeney, the Blackburn cheerleaders did exceptionally well. The Bantam and Mosquito Bengalettes captured first place in their respective divisions, with the Peewee Bengalettes finishing second.

Photos of the winners will be displayed in the Banar (either June or September issue) depending upon the date of graduation and publication deadline.

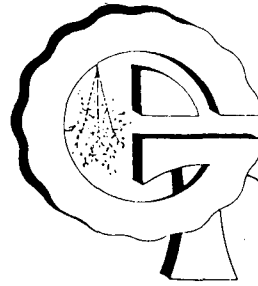
