FROM THE B.C.A. DIRECTORS



Preparations for the annual Budget presentation are well underway. In the interest of efficiency it has been decided to delay the holding of the combined B.C.A. Annual General Meeting for Budget Approval/Rate-payers Recreation Grant Distribution Meeting, until the 12th of February 1985.

This meeting is normally held at the end of January in accordance with the by-laws of the Association; however, adherence to the letter of the law requires the printing and distribution of a special bulletin in mid-January in order to meet the City's requirement that public notice of a rate-payers meeting be given 14 days in advance. We intend to include in the February edition of the BANAR both the B.C.A. Proposed Budget and Recreation Grant Proposed Distribution. This issue is distributed at the end of January and by putting it in the BANAR we will save the Hockey Team youngsters (distributors) a double January hike. The by-law will be submitted for amendment at the General Meeting.

Elsewhere in this issue you will find a notice from the Blackburn Hamlet Community Recreation Centres Committee (B.H.C.R.C.C.) that it will hold a General Meeting in mid-December. We in the B.C.A. would encourage you, the residents of the Hamlet, to attend this meeting since the B.H.C.R.C.C. is responsible for the allocation of rate-payers monies. Citizen interest ensures that it is being done to your satisfaction.

On another vein. Since we in the executive periodically deliver organization mail in the evening, a search for house numbers is often required. Many house numbers are not readily identifiable. You might stand outside your house and try and view it from the perspective of an emergency vehicle (fire, police, ambulance, doctor etc.). Such a requirement would not be the time to have a delay in finding your house. A gram of prevention is worth a kilogram of cure!!

Have a safe and enjoyable Christmas Season and we'll see you at the General Meeting in February.

B.C.A. DIRECTORS MEETING

SUMMARY OF MINUTES OF MEETING OCTOBER 2, 1984



PRESENT: Roger Pyper, Ron Robin, Joanne Bushell, Harvey Wittenberg, Ken Greenlaw, Pat Vasudev, Trixie Clow, Gloria-Dawn Warkentin-Coulter, Jane O'Reilly, Robert Madill, Eldon Kemp, Phyllis Frost, Marg Maddock.

The president, Roger Pyper, called the meeting to order at 7:34 p.m.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded that the minutes be adopted as read. MOTION CARRIED.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Roger Pyper (President) - regarding the 1985 BCA budget requirements by Council: the only requirement is that the proposed budget be published 14 days in advance of the annual general meeting, so Roger suggested that if an announcement of intent to violate the Bylaws with respect to the date of this year's annual meeting only, is included in the next BANAR (Dec./Jan.) and if there are no objections, the Budget would be included in the February BANAR, and the annual general meeting could be held on February 12/85 (17 days after publication).

Robert Madill (Civic Affairs) - the letter about the Huneault Dump was drafted and will be sent to the O.M.B.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded, that a Civic Affairs Standing Committee under the direction of Robert Madill, with members Chris Brett (Vice-Chairman) and Rusty Torobin be struck. MOTION CARRIED.

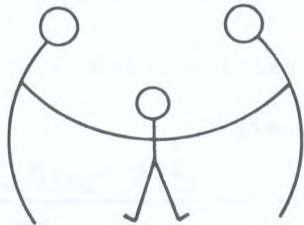
Phyllis Frost (Youth Activities) - a report on the Summer Day Camp was given to all the Directors and discussed.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded that the Directors acknowledge receipt of the 1984 day camp report. We would like to extend our appreciation to Phyllis and the day camp staff for a job well done. The directors also acknowledge that the day camp incurred a deficit of some \$2000, being approximately \$1000 in excess of the original budget deficit and that the Youth Activities Director will explore means of minimizing this deficit. MOTION CARRIED.

- the Parent-and-Tot skating at the arena will charge \$1.00 per child this season (previously it was free) and Phyllis will be writing a letter on behalf of the Pre-School to oppose this. It was agreed that she should also send a letter on behalf of the BCA recommending the charge be dropped.

Pat Vasudev (Sports) - all the Sports Directors will be meeting October 3 and the subjects of Budgets and NSF cheques will be discussed. A Standing Committee for Sports will also be nominated. He requested that consideration be given to moving the fiscal year for sports budgets to September 1 - August 31.

Other Business - Innes Road is being widened to four lanes from the 417 to Blair Road only. New sewer and gas lines are being installed at Innes Road just east of Blair Road. Barry Turner should be consulted on the Hornet's Nest/Eastern Parkway situation.

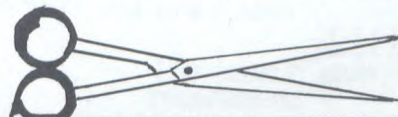

- a. Contrary to what some Blackburn Hamlet residents believe, the Blackburn Community Association serves BLACKBURN - not just the residents in the Hamlet. The Blackburn area covers such areas as Anderson Road, the Hamlet, Innes to Page Road and up to the Fourth Line. There are approximately 275 homes outside the Hamlet - approximately 1,200 people.
- b. Members of the B.C.A. have FIRST preference in the registration and participation insofar as the B.C.A. organized activities are concerned. Those residing outside Blackburn are accepted as Associate Members should there be a vacancy. (Note: this ruling does not apply to boys' hockey and girls' ringette).
- c. As a result of a ruling by the City of Gloucester, residents of Notre Dame De Champs area may register and participate in Orleans or Blackburn.
- d. Your \$7.00 membership fee is NOT for sports. The fee supports the association in providing you with the BANAR, and a variety of organized activities - SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE.

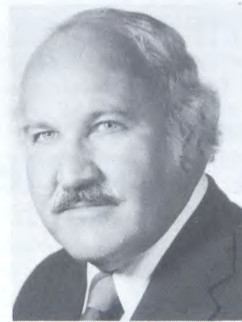

195th BROWNIES

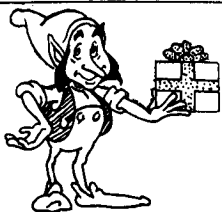










BHCRC ANNUAL MEETING

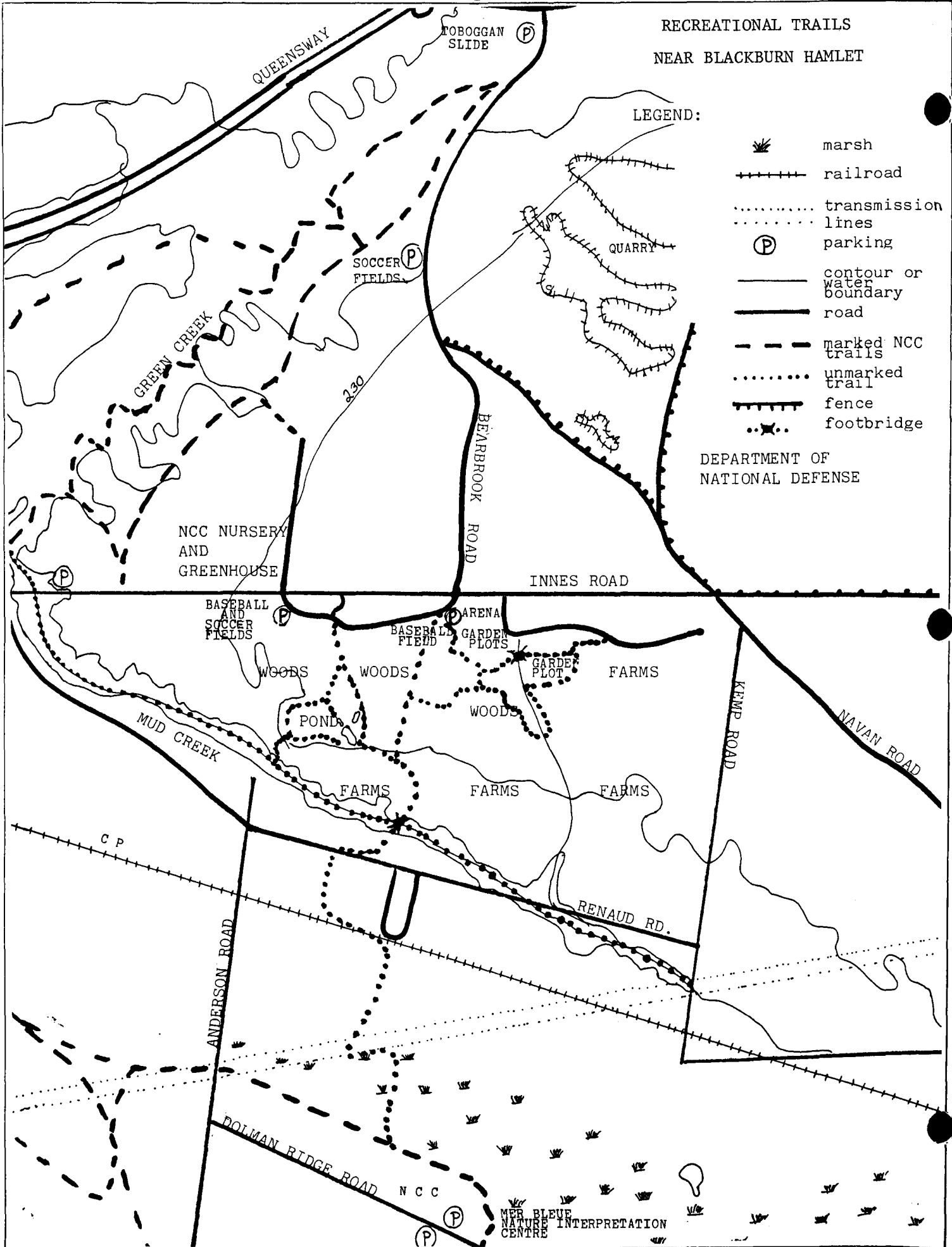

For the cross-country skier and snowshoer, winter is a marvellous season in Blackburn Hamlet. As the temperature falls, the creeks, swamps and ponds freeze and are covered with snow. By January, the ice is thick enough to support a man, creating ideal conditions for exploration.

Remember! Proper etiquette must be observed at all times. The National Capital Commission owns most of the land surrounding Blackburn Hamlet. The NCC prohibits the use of motorized vehicles and any destruction to the animals or plants. Staying on established trails is encouraged. When traversing a farmer's field it is wise to adhere to the established right-of-way. Also, use caution when crossing a frozen body of water.

With this in mind, enjoy your winter. Watch out for good tobogganing sites, too, there are several to be found.

YOUTH PROGRAM

The Gloucester Centre for Community Resources has had a Youth Program since the spring of 1982. The format has been small discussion groups held either in local schools or at the Centre. The intent has been to provide group support and counselling, as well as factual information around areas of common concern. The focus has been preventive rather than purely therapeutic.

The Centre had been concerned for some time about the wide range of youth problems in the community. In 1981 the Centre's Program Committee talked with various resources dealing with youth and to the youth themselves. Youth groups appeared to be the best way to respond to the needs of these particular adolescents. The Family Service Centre initially provided funds for the program. Later, the Gloucester Kinsmen Club provided a grant and Gloucester City Council has given monies for the 1984 program. Other community organizations have also contributed.

The program is supervised jointly by the Resource Centre and the Family Service Centre and parents are asked to participate in the evaluation. Referrals to the groups are made by school guidance staff, parents and other agencies working with youth. A social worker leads the group, but members also help design the informal program. Films and guest speakers are also included. The groups meet after school for about two hours.

In 1983, a support group for parents of teens was developed to share concerns and learn more constructive ways of dealing with their problem teens. As well, some family and individual counselling has also been provided when requested. This past summer, a pilot program combining group discussions and recreational activities was held in two separate locations in the community.

This fall four groups are being organized - three in local schools and one at the Resource Centre.

The present program has been developed as funds have been obtained. The youth served, their parents, guidance counsellors and social workers endorse the need for a permanent youth program. Hopefully this is not too far in the future.

HOME SUPPORT SERVICES

Home Support Service is a homemaker program offered by the Regional Social Services Department. The site office for Gloucester is located at the Gloucester Centre for Community Resources located at 2040 Arrowsmith Drive (off Jasmine).

The program consists of a Teaching Homemaker and Home Helpers. The Teaching Homemaker provides guidance, direction and support to individuals and families to become more skilled, independent and self-sufficient in various aspects of homemaking such as budgeting, household organization, parenting, cooking, meal planning, shopping, crafts, etc. The worker makes home visits or conducts group sessions in the neighbourhood. Anyone, regardless of income, qualifies for this program.

Home Helpers support individuals and families by performing such services as light housekeeping, child care, shopping, escorting, etc. They work on a part-time basis, with flexible hours. They provide a very valuable service to families in crisis or with chronic care needs; they, in turn, received good training and valuable work experience. Families must go through a means test in order to qualify for this particular service.
