FROM THE B.C.A. DIRECTORS

It is nice to open the New Year on a successful note albeit a relatively minor one. As you will find later in the BANAR the B.C.A. Executive was successful in getting the budget process completed in order to have it published for your perusal prior to the public meeting to be held February 12, 1985 at 8 p.m. in Glen Ogilvie School.

You will see that there is a breakdown of the anticipated City Grant to the Recreation association (which function the B.C.A. discharges as a result of input from user groups). Once all of the Grant has been accounted for, it is incorporated into the revenue of the B.C.A. for bookkeeping purposes. A careful examination will reveal that by-and-large, deficits of sports groups are covered by the Grant. The remaining deficit is made up by the B.C.A. itself.

It has been said that in order to get a good turn out at a Community Association General Meeting one needs a contentious issue. However, since none exists at this time we can only encourage you to study the budget and attend to express your views. We assume that if you don't attend you are content with what has been done.

Some time ago an ad appeared in the BANAR soliciting a Chairman for the Fun Fair. You are reminded that the B.C.A. Executive will shortly be required to determine the viability of Fun Fair for 1985 based on the availability of a Chairman. Should you be contemplating providing this necessary service we would appreciate your making it known by the February 12, 1985 meeting.

Should there be any other matters you, as ratepayers and B.C.A. members, wish to discuss please feel free to attend. THANK YOU.
