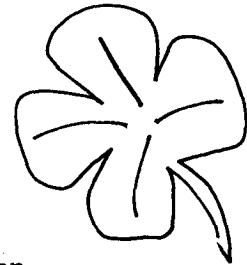
FROM THE B.C.A. DIRECTORS

A pot-pourri this month.

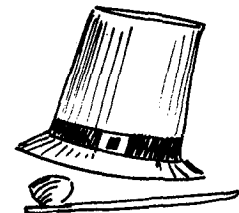

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE B.C.A. DIRECTORS MEETING JANUARY 22, 1985

PRESENT: Roger Pyper, Ron Robin, Joanne Bushell, Pat Vasudev, Robert Madill, Trixie Clow, Gloria Dawn Warkentin-Coulter, Jane O'Reilly, Eldon Kemp, Ken Greenlaw, Phyllis Frost and Marg Maddock. There were two guests, Richard Bisson, from the Parks and Recreation Dept., City of Gloucester and Hedy Burton.

ABSENT: Harvey Wittenberg

The President, Roger Pyper called the meeting to order at 7:37 p.m.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded, that the minutes be adopted as amended. **MOTION CARRIED.**

CORRESPONDENCE: A letter was received from Les Chansonniers expressing their gratitude for the \$500 grant they received from the B.C.A.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Ken Greenlaw (Treasurer) - He distributed copies of the proposed 1985 budget and reviewed it with the executive. He noted that it represented an approximate 5% increase over 1984's budget.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded that the B.C.A. continue to honour expenses submitted by Eldon Kemp for maintenance up to February 22, 1985. All expenses rightly attributed to the B.H.C.R.C.C. will be channelled to that body by that date. Every attempt shall be made to have a direct billing system in place. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Ron Robin (2nd Vice-President) - An appointment has been arranged with Jean Pigott (Chairperson of the N.C.C.) to discuss the Bypass situation. Also, would all the Directors prepare an inventory of B.C.A. equipment over \$50. in value, and ask their affiliated groups to do likewise. It is required by our Insurance Company.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded that Robert Madill be appointed Chairman of the Transportation Committee. **MOTION CARRIED.**

Trixie Clow (Special Events) - After some discussion, it was unanimously agreed not to have a fertilizer drive this year. Because it was included in the proposed 1985 budget, and published in the Banar, it will be formally withdrawn at the Annual General Meeting on February 12th. The date for the Volunteer's Dance is tentatively May 3, 1985.

Jane O'Reilly (Publicity) - She will be advertising for new staff for some of the positions with the Banar, effective this fall.

Phyllis Frost (Youth Activities) - The \$1.00 charge proposed for the Parent-and-Tot skating sessions at the Blackburn Arenahas been suspended for the balance of the season.

The next meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on February 26th in the library at Glen Ogilvie Public School. Everyone welcome.

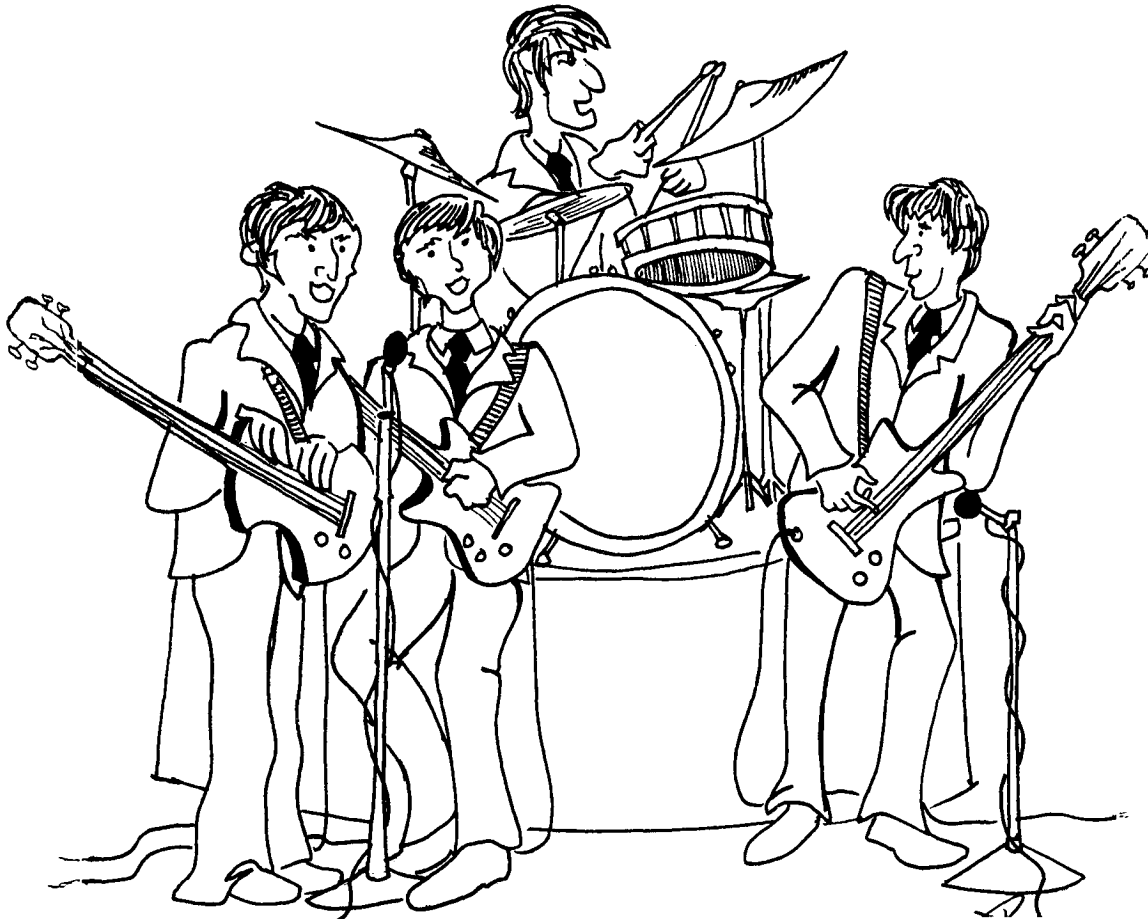

The three and four year-olds who attend the cooperative pre-school spent much of January perfecting their painting skills - using eye-droppers, pine branches, q-tips and fingers. Quite an impressive array of "brushes"!

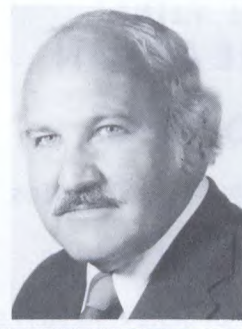

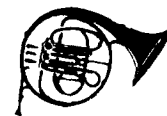
NEWCOMERS' CLUB

FUNDING REFUSAL MAY CLOSE UNEMPLOYED CENTRE

A recent decision by the region's Social and Health Policy Committee could mean bad news for unemployed people in the Ottawa-Carleton area.

At its January 17 meeting, the committee voted 3-2 against giving a \$15,000 grant to the Unemployed Action Centre. The self-help centre, which has been serving the region's jobless with various programs for almost a year, may be forced to close its doors at the end of March.

The centre was started by unemployed people on a part-time, volunteer basis in April 1984. They were swamped by the demand for their counselling services and in July, through a Canada Works grant obtained by the Ottawa and District Labour Council, were able to hire five staff and start full-time operations.

Their services include assistance in sorting through the bureaucracy at UIC, welfare and workers' compensation, job-search counselling, cheque-cashing for those who can't get service at a bank, and referrals to other useful agencies. In terms of UIC counselling, the centre saved its clients almost \$42,000 in benefits from July to October.

In addition, the centre provides access to a typewriter and photocopier for resumés, telephones to assist in job-searching, and the classified want ads from daily newspapers.

Since full-time operations started, almost 1,000 people have used the centre.

Funding from the federal government runs out at the end of March, so the action centre is seeking support from the regional council in order to maintain operations and seek further funds. The Social Planning Council -- the group that reviews all the region's grant applications -- recommended a \$15,000 grant for the centre, but the Social and Health Policy Committee turned it down. Only five of the committee's 11 members were present for the vote.

Ken Clavette, president of the Ottawa and District Labour Council and a member of the action centre's board of directors, said he hopes the municipal politicians will change their minds.

"It would be a tragedy for such an important service to shut down at a time when unemployment is the country's biggest problem," Clavette said. "Other regions in Ontario have seen the importance of funding such centres, and I hope Ottawa-Carleton does the same."

CONSTRUCTION AT DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL
DEFENCE PROVING GROUNDS

Department of National Defence has awarded a contract for construction of two buildings on the St. Joseph Blvd. property, generally referred to as the proving grounds. The value of the construction as shown in the building permit application is \$12.8 million.. The project comprises two buildings - the main building that will include inter alia administration services will have a floor area of 154,000 sq. ft. while the other building of a garage-type structure will cover 48,000 sq. ft.

This development when completed will have a favourable impact of about \$300,000 on the grant-in-lieu of taxes which the City receives from the Federal Government. There will also be a significant increase in the grant-in-lieu of taxes when the 5-year airport reconstruction project (\$48 million) comes into service. Incidentally, Building Permit fees on both of these projects have been received in a manner consistent with private sector construction.

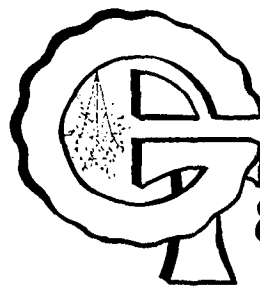

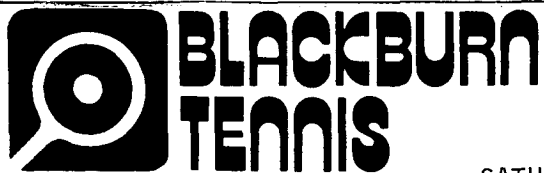

Gloucester Legal Aid Clinic

Do you have a legal question or problem but are unable to afford to pay a lawyer for the advice that you need? At the Gloucester Legal Aid Clinic you can get legal advice or direction without cost.

The Legal Aid Clinic is part of a system of free legal assistance for low income people who cannot afford to pay a lawyer. The Ontario Legal Aid Plan will issue a Legal Aid certificate to qualified people who need a lawyer to represent them in serious legal cases. They also provide two fully staffed full-time clinics in the Ottawa-Carleton area for cases which require ongoing representation or court appearances but which do not qualify for a certificate. The University of Ottawa Law School also provides a Student Legal Aid Program for certain other types of cases. The Gloucester Legal Aid Clinic has been established to supplement and assist these other groups.

A problem which someone brings to the clinic is handled in one of four ways. The lawyer will give on-the-spot advice, if appropriate, or he will refer the client to the appropriate agency for that person's particular problem. A resolution of the problem may be obtained with a letter, phone call or simple research. Alternatively, an application for a Legal Aid certificate can be completed and forwarded to the Legal Aid Office in Ottawa. The Legal Aid Office will determine whether the person qualifies for a certificate according to their financial means and the nature of the problem. If the certificate is granted, the person would be entitled to choose the lawyer who would represent them on a panel of lawyers participating in the plan.

The clinic is located in the Gloucester Centre for Community Resources at 2040 Arrowsmith Drive. It is open Tuesday evenings from 4:00 - 8:00 p.m. You can be seen

without an appointment and the clinic is not limited to the residents of the City of Gloucester. Telephone inquiries are generally not accepted unless it is an emergency. The clinic deals most often with questions about separation, divorce, landlord and tenant law, wills and estates, the criminal code, personal accidents and injuries and consumer problems. Problems of a commercial nature cannot be dealt with under the program.

The clinic is staffed by a lawyer from the community and bilingual services are usually available.

Further information about the legal aid clinic and the other services available at the Gloucester Centre for Community Resources are available by calling the Centre at 741-6025.

OTTAWA SENIOR CITIZENS COUNCIL INC.**Clinics Offer Free Income Tax Assistance**

Thirty-eight income tax clinics will be held at various locations throughout the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton, between March 4th and March 28th, 1985, 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., Monday to Thursday, by appointment only.

This free professional assistance to complete income tax returns is provided to assist senior citizens, people on restricted incomes and the handicapped, subject to certain income criteria. The program is a co-operative effort by the Ottawa Senior Citizens Council, the local chapter of the Institute of Chartered Accountants and the Region.

For an appointment at the tax clinic in your area or for more information, phone 563-2601 Monday through Friday, 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., from February 18th until the program ends March 28th, 1985. Special mailing arrangements have been developed for the handicapped.

THE CANADIAN NATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR THE BLIND

WHEN YOU MEET A BLIND PERSON

1. Treat blind or visually impaired persons as you would anyone else. They do the same things as you, but sometimes use different techniques.
2. If you are not sure how much a blind or visually impaired person sees, ask. Not all blind or visually impaired people have total absence of sight. Most have some sight and make the best use of what vision remains.
3. Speak to blind or visually impaired persons in a normal tone of voice. Identify yourself and let them know you are addressing them by using their name or touching their arm. Be sure to indicate when you are leaving.
4. When walking with a visually impaired person, let the individual take your arm. Pulling a visually impaired person by the hand is awkward and confusing.
5. Do not hesitate to use words such as "see", "look", or "read". Visually impaired persons will use such words in their vocabulary as often as anyone else.
6. Describe your surroundings, whether it is the scenery from a moving car, an interesting incident on TV, or the layout of an unfamiliar room.
7. Give directions clearly and accurately. Pointing or using phrases such as "over there" will be of no assistance.
8. Never distract a dog guiding a blind person. The dog guide is responsible for the safety of the blind person and such interference could lead to unnecessary tragedy.
9. Avoid the impulse to rush to a blind person's aid. If you are not sure whether or not he/she needs your assistance, ask.
10. Remember, when you meet a blind or visually impaired person, common sense and courtesy can lead to an enjoyable friendship.

The priority for the Board this year, according to the chairman will be to find suitable accommodation for the Ogilvie Road Branch

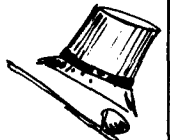
