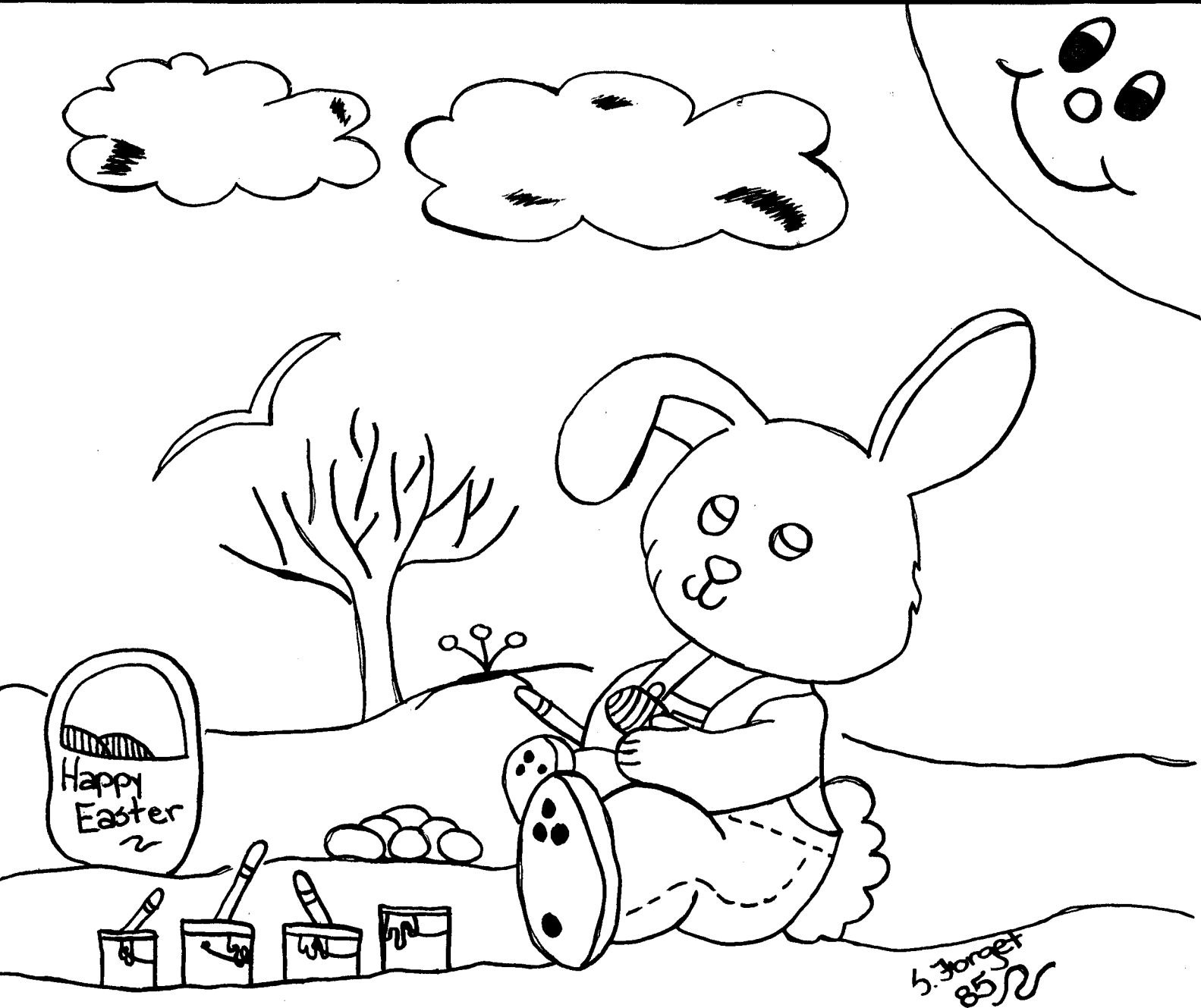

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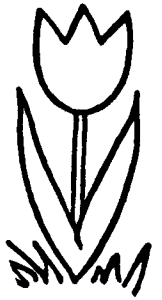

We should like to remind everyone that the B.C.A. depends on volunteers to keep the many programmes in the community going. It should be pointed out that the B.C.A. Directors operate as the Recreation Association for the Blackburn area and as such are required to submit a report to the City, of the disbursements of the Recreation Grant. This will be done after the audit which will commence at the end of March and will reflect the decisions which were taken at the Ratepayers Meeting held on 12 February, 1985. At the same time the operating budget for the B.C.A. was approved for 1985. You may have noticed that Neighbourhood News in the Citizen last month reported that there is some \$30,000 in assets held by the B.C.A. which may, upon the reaching of a concensus, be available for a suitable project. Please let us know your ideas, by sending a short note to the Treasurer. The assumption is that such ideas as may be received would be put before next year's Budget Meeting for discussion.

You will also note that the BANAR editor is advertising for replacement staff. This excellent publication requires your support so that it can continue to provide a forum for neighbourly news.

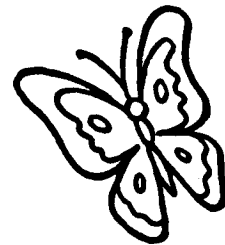

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE B.C.A. DIRECTORS MEETING

ON FEBRUARY 26, 1985

PRESENT: Roger Pyper, Pat Vasudev, Ken Greenlaw, Gloria Dawn Warkentin-Coulter, Jane O'Reilly, Harvey Wittenberg, Joanne Bushell, Marg Maddock, Hedy Burton (for Youth Affairs) and Chris Brett (for Civic Affairs and Transportation)

ABSENT: Ron Robin, Trixie Clow, Eldon Kemp, Phyllis Frost and Robert Madill

The President, Roger Pyper called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded, that it be noted that in previous years the B.C.A. incurred certain maintenance expenses that were properly those of the B.H.C.R.C.C. It is moved that in recognition of the B.H.C.R.C.C. resuming its duties and responsibilities, that any past claims by the B.C.A. be waived. **MOTION CARRIED.**

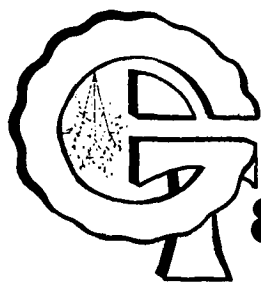
Roger Pyper (President) - There have been six applications for funds from various individuals and groups since the 1985 budget was finalized. Val Katarey spoke on behalf of the Children's Welcome Center. The applications were considered, and in each case, the decision was made not to extend funds to them at this time. A request was made by Bonnie Maitland on behalf of Creations Champagne for assistance with a fashion show. It was approved for consideration and action, with the understanding that any profit be donated to the B.C.A. The suggestion was made that if any community support can be found, that the position of a Director of Senior Affairs be created.

Ken Greenlaw (Treasurer) - As a result of the budget publicity, some new suggestions for capital projects were received: (1) flower gardens along the major (regional) roads in the Hamlet (2) scholarship trusts at Carleton and the University of Ottawa and (3) a senior citizens center. A new appeal for ideas for surplus funds will be placed in the BANAR.

Pat Vasudev (Sport) - The football clubs in Gloucester have formed a new association - the Gloucester Amateur Football Association. A new adult basketball group has been formed and has requested space in one of the local schools, the time and day will be advertised when it is confirmed.

Harvey Wittenberg (Membership) - He will be attending the upcoming sports registrations listed in the BANAR. He noted that in the BANAR ads, the charge for non-B.C.A. members varied from \$10 to \$20 -- the correct charge is \$20.

The next meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on March 26th in the library at Glen Ogilvie Public School. Everyone Welcome.

The results of the 1985 B.C.A. Membership Campaign to date indicate an increase of approximately 125 over last year's membership. As of February 28, 1985 we have a total of 1,635 members.

This is the second successful membership drive for Blackburn and we sincerely thank everyone who purchased a membership - THANK YOU, YOUR SUPPORT IS APPRECIATED. Of course the success of our drive would not have been possible without the volunteers who served as canvassers. I don't believe there is another community where so many people say YES without any hesitation when asked to help. Thank you very much for your efforts, also a special thank you to Peter Bond, Assistant Director.

During the membership drive each canvasser was asked to record, or pass on to me verbally, any comments and or suggestions that might be offered by the residents of Blackburn. The most important of these are listed hereunder for your comments:

1. What activities are available in Blackburn for senior citizens?

There appears to be a number of people in the community who feel that there should be some organized activities for senior citizens. Should the B.C.A. take necessary action to form such a group or club? How many of you are interested? WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS?

2. There is a need for a community centre in Blackburn.

Many residents are of the opinion that instead of directing money into parks and more parks, baseball seats, lights etc., that the B.C.A. and the city should direct all efforts and money towards a Blackburn Community Centre. There is a need by the various B.C.A. groups for a meeting place, a place to hold social functions, youth programs etc. WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS?

3. The BANAR

We have a publication, editor and staff, that is second to none. There is no other publication in the area that provides such high quality paper, printing, art work etc., but the publication lacks input by the residents. Should we continue with such an elaborate type of publication? What can be done to get your input? WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS?

4. The B.C.A. vs R.A. vs G.R.C.C. vs B.H.C.R.C.C. etc.

Many are under the impression that the Blackburn Community Association (B.C.A.) members of the board, elected by you, represent the residents of Blackburn on all matters involving the community. This is NOT so. There are many decisions affecting Blackburn residents that are being made by people who serve as volunteer/members on various city council committees and they are not B.C.A. members of the board or in any way responsible to the B.C.A. There is no question being raised as to the capabilities and/or efforts of the volunteers involved, however it is the opinion that the representatives for Blackburn should be members of the B.C.A. board of directors, elected by the residents, where they would be required to discuss items of business affecting the community, to obtain the views etc. of the executive members. In other words, the B.C.A. should provide any representation on city or any other committees where there is business being discussed involving Blackburn. WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS?

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MINUTES OF THE RATEPAYERS MEETING OF THE BLACKBURN RECREATION ASSOCIATION AND THE BUDGET MEETING OF THE B.C.A. HELD AT GLEN OGILVIE PUBLIC SCHOOL ON FEBRUARY 12, 1985

PRESENT: From the B.C.A. Executive: Roger Pyper, Ken Greenlaw, Harvey Wittenberg, Pat Vasudev, Joanne Bushell, Jane O'Reilly, Gloria Dawn Warkentin-Coulter, Marg Maddock
Also present was Richard Bisson, representing the Gloucester Parks and Recreation Department, and more than 25 members from the community.

The President, Roger Pyper, called the meeting to order at 8:05 p.m.

Opening Remarks: The President outlined the format of the evening, and also elaborated on the roles of the B.C.A. and the B.H.C.R.C.C. in the community. He then read the minutes of the January 31, 1984 meeting to those present.

1. The public ratepayers meeting concerning the distribution of the Recreation grant from the city of Gloucester.

The Treasurer, Ken Greenlaw, presented the proposed budget, and answered questions from the audience. He also explained the background of the proposed amendment.

MOTION: Moved by Ken Greenlaw and seconded by Garth Bracewell that the 1985 Recreation Grant be increased from \$38,000 to \$38,750 and to include an allocation to the Gloucester Lacrosse Association for \$750. This motion reflects the late application by the Gloucester Lacrosse Association for a recreation grant, and the B.C.A. decision to recommend a grant of \$750 to them. MOTION CARRIED.

MOTION: Moved by Ken Greenlaw and seconded by Chuck Taylor that the revised recreation grant of \$38,750. be accepted. MOTION CARRIED.

The Gloucester Lacrosse Association formally thanked the B.C.A. for the approval of their grant.

2. Blackburn Community Association - Proposed Budget

The Treasurer, Ken Greenlaw, outlined some changes to be made to the proposed budget.

MOTION: Moved by Ken Greenlaw and seconded by Chuck Taylor that the 1985 B.C.A. budget be amended as follows:

- a. to increase the City Recreation grant by \$750, to \$38,750. and to increase the grant to Lacrosse by \$750, for net effect of nil. This motion reflects the late application of the Gloucester Lacrosse Association for a recreation grant and the B.C.A. decision to recommend a grant of \$750 to them.
- b. to decrease revenue from the fertilizer drive by \$6000 to nil, and decrease expenditures for the fertilizer drive by \$5000, for a net deficit effect of \$1000. This motion reflects the recent B.C.A. decision to cancel the fertilizer drive for 1985.
- c. to increase maintenance expenditures by \$1000, to \$3000, for a net deficit effect of \$1000. This motion reflects a more accurate forecast of proposed maintenance expenditures.

NOTE: The combined net effect of the above will increase the forecast deficit of the B.C.A. from \$79 to \$2079.

- d. As of December 31, 1984 the B.C.A. is the custodian of approximately \$10,000, on behalf of the B.H.C.R.C.C., and the Blackburn Tennis Club. At the present time it is highly likely that the \$10,000 will be disbursed to the B.H.C.R.C.C. in support of certain capital improvements to be made to the tennis courts. This expenditure is not included in the proposed B.C.A. budget.

Discussion: Questions were received from the audience including concern regarding the current B.C.A. surplus, and the criteria for groups receiving funding from the B.C.A.

MOTION: Moved by Ken Greenlaw and seconded by George Bushell that the proposed B.C.A. budget as amended, be accepted. MOTION CARRIED with unanimous consent.

The following motion, as printed in the BANAR, was read by the President. MOTION: It is moved by Roger Pyper (President of the B.C.A.) and seconded by Joanne Bushell (1st Vice President of B.C.A.) that Bylaw #5 be amended to read in paragraph #1 "An annual budget shall be prepared by the board of directors of the Corporation and shall be presented to a general meeting of the Corporation for its approval no later than the end of February in each year, which budget shall set forth the proper revenue for expenditure for the period from January 1 to December 31 of that year". MOTION CARRIED.

George Bushell commended the B.C.A. for its efforts and the meeting was adjourned.

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES' PENSION FUNDS (ACCOUNTS) - SHOULD ESTABLISH TRUST

Colin Brown et al of National Citizens Coalition please take note.

The balances in the three major accounts at March 31, 1984 were:

Public Service Superannuation Account	\$17,980,598,737.
Canadian Forces Superannuation Account	\$12,268,197,318.

The above quoted figures were supplied by the Federal Superannuates National Association which had been obtained from Treasury Board.

The combined total of the superannuation accounts and the S.R.B.A. amounts to almost 34 billion dollars. This gigantic amount will earn something in excess of 10 percent in 1984-85. If just 30 percent of the earnings in excess of 6.5 percent was considered to represent the pensioners' share of the total earnings it would be enough to pay in full for indexation for the year. If necessary, actuarial deficiencies due to salary increases could be spread over 10, 15 or even 20 years rather than the present practice of 5 years freeing up still more earnings.

It is simply not factual to state that this country cannot afford full indexation of pensions of federal retirees now and in the future.

To me these superannuation accounts including full indexation are actuarially sound. It is to be noted that federal employees contribute 7.5 percent of their salary towards their pension and the employer puts an equal amount in the funds, which is part of the pay package of all employees.

It would seem appropriate and reasonable for the present government to re-instate the 7 percent lost during the restraint program. Since the average federal superannuate is receiving less than \$9,000 annually in pension, he is struggling and needs that lost revenue caused by the restraint program and he needs it now.

This great amount in the pension funds must make Liberal MP Jean-Robert Gauthier feel good as this is exactly what he was telling his Liberal Colleagues during the 6 and 5 debate. However, they would not listen.

The Federal Government should establish a "public trust" to control and administer the superannuation funds. This would ensure all superannuates get the benefits due as per the Acts and not have punitive measures imposed by politicians.

I would urge all superannuates to express their concern to their MPs in order to restore the pension base which was taken away during the 6 and 5 program. The address is House of Commons, Ottawa, Ontario. K1A 0A6. No postage stamps required.

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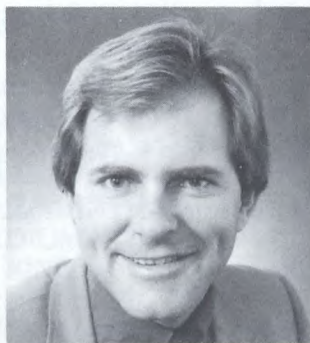
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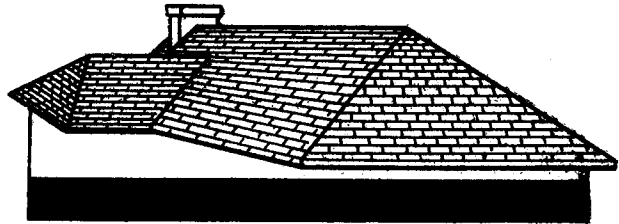


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DEVELOPMENT AT QUEENSWAY/ST. LAURENT BVLD.TO HELP GLOUCESTER

The Provincial Department of Transportation will be carrying out a major improvement project at the Queensway/St. Laurent interchange. Construction start is scheduled for Spring 1986, and when completed should assist in a more efficient flow of Queensway west-bound traffic.

The Region's transitway program is dovetailed with the above Provincial reconstruction plan. The St. Laurent transitway station is under construction and the underpass of the Queensway just east of Belfast Road will take place starting in 1986. Only one Queensway detour arrangement will be required for the underpass and the reconstruction work on the interchange. This eastern leg of the transitway to St. Laurent Blvd. is expected to be in service by Fall 1987 and will facilitate express bus service from Blackburn Hamlet, Orleans and the Beacon Hill area. Immediately following this part of the transitway will be the St. Laurent to Blair Road section - revised planning shows this leg to be in service by 1988 or early 1989.

Significant development in the north-east quadrant of the Queensway/St. Laurent interchange can be expected. The realignment of Michael St. by the Region will be an important contributor. Already MacDonald Developments who own the Chimo Inn have applied to Gloucester for site plan approval for a motel on their adjoining property. This motel will be called Welcome Inn and comprise two storeys and seventy-four rooms. Construction start is expected to be July/85.

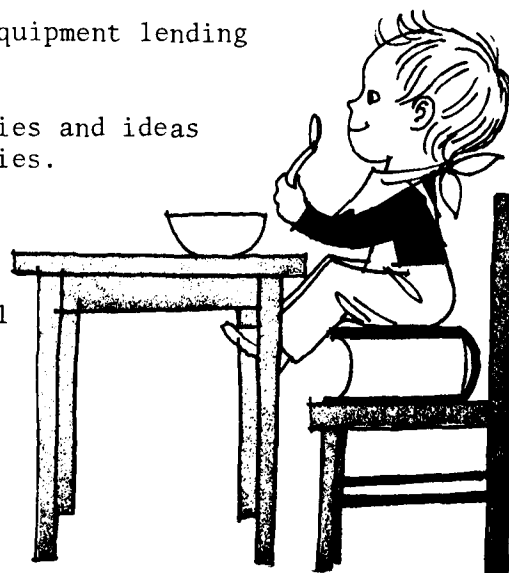

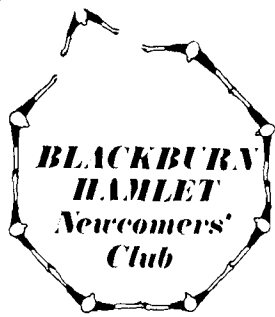

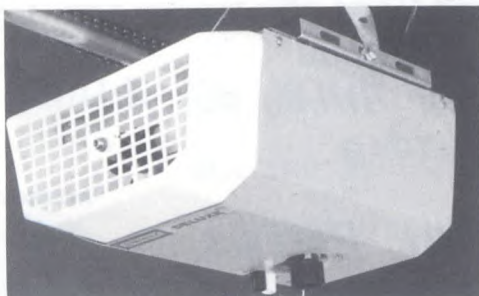

- c. to renew a sense of purpose and of being needed in elderly persons who otherwise encounter problems in adjusting to complete retirement; and
- d. to encourage seniors to remain independent and active members of society, rather than become burdens on health and social services.

Immediate benefits to the applicants hired and to their employers are obvious. The community, as a whole, benefits from improved tax collections, savings in unemployment insurance, and in-care programs for the elderly. The greater the number of older people who continue to work and add their productivity to the marketplace, the better off the community is economically and socially.
