## FROM THE B.C.A. PRESIDENT



Since this is the last edition of the BANAR for the summer, and since we have had our annual General Meeting at which the financial statement of the Association was presented, and since a new slate of Directors has been elected, it is appropriate to summarize the activities of the last year.

The B.C.A. has continued to provide a focal point for community activities and as such has permitted an orderly co-ordination of a host of programs.

Meetings with city officials, both elected and bureaucratic have served to keep both them and us aware of events which impinge on the Blackburn area. The N.C.C. has given us assurance that they have postponed activity on extending the parkway through the Hornets Nest playing fields, which will be of assurance to soccer teams. The East Urban Communities continue to press for improved road facilities, but thanks to our Civic Affairs Director and his team both they and area governments are aware of the concerns of the Hamlet vis a vis Innes Road.

The Youth Program has continued to provide a wide range of activities including the summer Day Camp whose vigourous program is well subscribed.

Educational matters have been watched and will be watched and reported upon by the Education Director.

Special Projects and Fun Fair/Day Directors have provided that essential ingredient to community spirit by co-orinating the Volunteers Dance, Fashion Show and the Fun Fair/Day activities.

Under the management of our Membership Director a larger number of memberships than ever have been taken out. This fact alone gives evidence that there is a continuing interest in having a community association.

Our Maintenance Director has evolved to become also maintenance director for the B.H.C.R.C.C. as well. This change is rewarding evidence that these two organizations have common interests in providing both facilities and programs for the community which must be, from time to time, co-ordinated.

The Sports Director has provided the most time consuming and energy demanding efforts in ensuring that the various sporting programs are run in a business like manner. The provision of a focus for these activities has permitted the pooling of monies through a common banking system which has enabled us to generate added revenue by judicious management of our funds.

The First Vice-President has been a touch-stone to the organization bringing her expertise to many activities and more particularly being the co-ordinate for booking space in schools for many groups which require room to conduct the many events which go on in the community.

Second Vice-President has kept a watchful eye over insurance matters and provided sage advice as to better ways of getting things done. His energy in contacting N.C.C. has been invaluable.

The record of meetings and the reporting of them has been ably handled by our Secretary.

The Treasurer has effected a first class management of financial matters and has ensured that the large sums of money handled by the Association have been responsibly husbanded. In this he was given sterling assistance by Mrs. Joan Ronan, our book-keeper. Thanks Joan.

Finally, but not least, the Publicity Director has continued the excellent production of the BANAR, a paper whose superb professionalism gives a first class forum for community identity and the exchange of ideas.

Many of the people above, are going on to provide service to the community in either the same portfolio or another. They will be joined by new volunteers and thus the vitality of the B.C.A. is ensured.

The Directors have been most ably complimented by the multitude of leaders of various programs whose interest and enthusiasm has ensured that this remains a lovely community in which to live.

And me. I've had the honour to preside over this great group of ladies and gentlemen. Thank you all and every good wish to our successors. God Bless.

## **BCA DIRECTORS MEETING**

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE B.C.A. DIRECTORS MEETING
ON MAY 28, 1985

PRESENT: Roger Pyper, Pat Vasudev, Ken Greenlaw, Gloria Dawn Warkentin-Coulter, Jane O'Reilly, Harvey Wittenberg, Joanne Bushell, Trixie Clow, Marg Maddock, Phyllis Frost and Ron Robin (Directors) and Hedy Burton and

Gilles Parent (Parks and Recreation, City of Gloucester)

ABSENT: Eldon Kemp and Robert Madill

The President, Roger Pyper, called the meeting to order at 7:06 p.m.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded that the minutes of the April 30, 1985 meeting be adopted as amended. MOTION CARRIED.

In a telephone poll conducted May 6-8, 1985, the B.C.A. Directors authorized advances to increase from \$2,000 to \$5,000 for the 1985 Fun Day.

Roger Pyper (President) - He reported that at the previous B.H.C.R.C.C. meeting, it was decided to hold regular meetings on the second Tuesday of each month.

Ken Greenlaw (Treasurer) - He reviewed the audited financial statements to be tabled at the General Meeting later that evening, and discussed the conditions for the transfer of the funds held in trust for the Tennis Club, to be put towards the upgrading of the tennis facilities this summer.

MOTION: Duly moved and seconded, that the audited financial statements for 1984 be approved, and that Roger Pyper and Ken Greenlaw sign on behalf of the B.C.A. MOTION CARRIED.

Harvey Wittenberg (Membership) - The Membership Director position on the 1985-86 executive is still vacant. The current B.C.A. membership stands at 1,679.

Pat Vasudev (Sports) - He distributed and reviewed the yearly summary of the Revenue and Expenditures of the Sports

Programs. He noted that the number of participants has levelled off in the last few years, and that the

average age of the participants is increasing.

Phyllis Frost (Youth Activities) - She reported that the counsellors for the Summer Day Camp have been hired, and the first session is scheduled to start July 8th.

Jane O'Reilly (Publicity) - The BANAR staff have been invited to participate in Media Week by Skyline Cablevision, and she has been asked to do a live interview from the Gloucester Fair.

Trixie Clow (Special Projects) - The Volunteer's Dance was a success, and the total cost will be less than the \$500 originally budgetted. It was agreed that next year the dance will be for the whole community and will be held on the first Friday in March.

Ron Robin (2nd. Vice-President) - He expects to receive a copy of the new insurance policy from Marsh & McLennan imminently.

The next meeting will be on June 11, 1985 at Glen Ogilvie Public School at 7:30 to transfer to the new 1985-86 executive. Everyone welcome.

#### AUDITORS' REPORT

The Members
Blackburn Community Association

We have examined the balance sheet of the Blackburn Community Association as at December 31, 1984, and the statements of revenue and expense and surplus for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests and other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, except as explained in the following paragraph.

In common with many non-profit organizations, the Association reports amounts for membership fees, committee revenue and tennis fund revenue amounting to \$172,155 which are not susceptible of complete verification by audit procedures. Accordingly, we were unable to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenue, deferred revenue, excess of revenue over expense for the year, or surplus.

In our opinion, except for the effect of any adjustments which might have been required had we been able to satisfy ourselves with respect to the receipts referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Association as at December 31, 1984 and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, except for the recording of fixed assets as described in note 1 to the financial statements, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.





## FROM YOUR ALDERMAN

#### BLACKBURN HAMLET

A Ward in the November 12th 1985 Elections

Ontario Municipal Board recently handed down its decision on wards in the City of Gloucester. The Board members did not accept the recommendation of Council to have a combined Blackburn-Orléans ward with three aldermen elected to Council. Instead they split the area into two wards -Blackburn with one representative and Orléans with two representatives. While I appreciate the fact that the Hamlet is set aside like an island in the Greenbelt I don't see any real advantage in it becoming the smallest ward with only one representative on Council. Some members of Council were quoted in a report by the Citizen: "interest by all aldermen in Blackburn problems would likely diminish". I don't accept that as completely valid -Blackburn Hamlet is a vibrant, healthy community whose demands have not been unreasonable. Such a community will send an effective member to sit on the Council and  ${\bf I}$  can assure you Blackburn hamlet will continue to attract my interest and support.

I made a presentation at the Ontario Municipal Board hearing — I suggested three wards with two members each plus the Mayor and two Regional Councillors elected at large. This would have given a better mix of ward representatives and at-large representatives as well as ensuring that those who sit on the Regional Council have a total municipal perspective and correlated accountability.

The members of the Board decided that the process of election to the Region was beyond their mandate and should be dealt with by way of a recommendation by the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing to the Cabinet. Provincial policy statements have been calling for direct election to regional councils and underscoring the importance of accountability. The Province has approved such an arrangement for Nepean plus the added feature that regional councillors also sit on the local council. A similar arrangement for the City of Gloucester would provide additional support for a small ward such as Blackburn Hamlet.

Gloucester Council has passed a resolution requesting the Minister of Municipal Affairs & Housing to consider its By-Law (based on the highest percentage achieved in the elections) and make a recommendation to the Cabinet. We will await the decision and consistency in application of policy by the Queen's Park authority. Failing this the respective legislation provides for the matter to be determined by resolution of the Council of the area municipality. This is a last resort and has potential for many undesirable situations — one example would be representatives going to the Region who did not publicly seek such a mandate and therefore can hardly be held accountable. I expect that the Province will carry out its responsibility and make the necessary changes to the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton Act.

SCOUTING IN BLACKBURN HAMLET

The graduation ceremonies between the Beaver, Cub and Scout levels have begun. While the Leap-up from the Cub to Scout level is planned for June 4, the Swim-up from Beavers to Cubs were held by colonies and packs in May.

# To Blackburn Homeowners:

Many homeowners in Blackburn Hamlet are in a position of requiring their roofs re-shingled. The following queries should be considered when hiring a roofer.

Ask for references:

References expose the history of a roofing company. Experience and quality workmanship will insure a dry home.

Ask about guarantees:

Roofing guarantees on workmanship range from 1 to 5 years. Be convinced that the guarantee will be honoured by an established company.

Ask if the old shingles should be removed:

Most roofs in Blackburn Hamlet are badly curled and bubbled therefore it is recommended they be removed. If not, they restrict the new shingles from sealing properly.

Ask about different grades of shingles: Most manufacturers offer two grades of shingles. In most cases guarantees are for 10-15 years.

Ask how they intend to dispose of the old shingles:

Beware of the garbage box!!

It may block your laneway for up to one week even though the actual job only took just a few days to complete. Also if the box is not properly supported it may leave permanent damage.

A roof that leaks and is not detected promptly will deteriorate the plywood sheathing and eventually the framing of your home as well as destroy your insulation and the drywall of the ceiling. Therefore, it is very important that the job be done properly.


