# BLACKBURN COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

## A NOTE ON THE PROPOSED GLOUCESTER LEISURE SERVICES

Gloucester City Council established a Leisure Services Planning Committee (LSPC) to study and recommend policies to the Council on the logical implementation process for leisure activities in Gloucester. As an initial step in the process, the LSPC prepared a Discussion Paper describing the planning, implementation and maintenance of leisure services in Gloucester. The document was distributed to the various R.A.'s in the City seeking community input to the proposed concept.

In Blackburn Hamlet, a Task Force (G. Bushell, M. Roche, R. Root, A. Szabo, H. Wittenburg, and P. Vasudev) was established under the auspices of the BCA to review the discussion paper and prepare a brief for submission to the Planning Committee. A meeting of the members of the LSPC, Task Force members, Directors of the BCA and BHRCC and Co-ordinators of Sports/ Recreation programs was held on February 18th to discuss the implications of the concept as it affects the Blackburn Community. The LSPC chairman, Mr. Roy Yorke, addressed the group on the purpose of the LSPC, defined the basic principles involved and outlined the proposed recommendations. Briefly, the proposal recommends:

- The GRCC would be disbanded and would be replaced by the Gloucester Leisure Services Committee (GLSC) It would be appointed by council.
- All CRCC's would be disbanded. The area mil rate levy of CRCC's would cease and all park and recreation facility development would be done by the City.
- The per capita grant allocation would be done by the GLSC under a set of policies designed to distribute those funds on an equitable basis across the city.
- Many of the tasks of the GLSC would be accomplished by using AD HOC sub-committees as required to provide community input.

Mr. Yorke concluded by saying that it is the Planning Committee's observation that the leisure services in Gloucester were not adequately planned and that his committee firmly believes its proposal will simplify process of planning and implementation of leisure services. He, however, admitted that the LSPC doesn't have all the answers; but stressed that public input is essential to developing a methodology.

Following the presentation, a number of significant issues and concerns were discussed and commented. Briefly, these include: the need of a local group to focus attention on local needs, the planning and delivery of programs, the implications of "contracting out" the programs, the community autonomy, per capita grant allocation policies, the existing community reserves, the sense of community identity, the make-up of the proposed GLSC (the structure, criteria for selection process), the resource implications (tax base) to accommodate the expanded roles and responsibilities of the City's Recreation and Parks Department, etc.

At the conclusion of the meeting a brief was submitted to the Planning Committee. The following reflects some of the highlights of the submission.

1. The paper does not address the merits of the new proposal vis-à-vis the existing structures.
2. Equitable representations from each area in the proposed Leisure Services Committee are not clearly enunciated. An area such as Blackburn may not be able to build up cash reserves for future developments because new residential areas require the majority of the monies available.
3. Links to the community are not defined at all. If RA's and CRCC's are to be disbanded, these entities ought to be replaced by Community Associations which could provide such a link that is essential to a community living.
4. In Blackburn, our facilities (e.g. swimming pool, tennis courts, ball diamonds, outdoor rinks, etc.) are developed for the benefit and enjoyment of our residents. The implementation of the proposed concept will deprive us of our community autonomy.
5. Without the mil rate levy collected for the CRCC, the BCA funding could not cover the operations. If this occurs what guarantee does the committee provide that Blackburn will have a swimming pool, properly maintained pathways, baseball fields, tennis courts, etc.
6. The Planning Committee feels that there appears to be a greater reluctance by many people to make commitments as volunteers. If so, what plans does the committee have to solicit or exert volunteering efforts?
7. How does the council plan to make appointment to the Committee? What criteria will be used for such appointments?
8. How does the Planning Committee see the effectiveness of Ad Hoc sub-committees? If there are not equal representation on the committees, pure numbers may dictate that some areas receive more attention than others.
9. It appears that the present GRCC will become a super committee called the Gloucester Leisure Services Committee. and that this new committee will encompass all of the present RA's and CRCC's. If this is the case, it will certainly destroy the strong sense of community that is a fact of life in Gloucester, it will undermine volunteerism in our city, and it will most certainly be viewed as just another distant inaccessible bureaucratic body by the "ordinary" citizen.

It may be noted that the first "round of consultation" has ended in February. The Planning Committee will be developing a definite plan based on the input (I would hope) it received and a second round of consultation process will take place towards the end of April. The Committee then hopes to submit the final report to the City Council by the end of June. Please watch for the announcements in the BANAR in the coming months.

On a personal note, I would like to thank all those who attended the meeting and expressed your views and concerns to the planning committee. Hope to see you again in April. Sincere thanks are also expressed to the Task Force members for their invaluable input.

I have a few more copies of the Discussion Paper and our submission to the Planning Committee. If any of you are interested in having a copy of the documents, please give me a call.

Based on the quotes received, printing of the Banar was given to Beauregard Press for the month of March. The difference in printing costs will be approx. \$400.00. No contract has been awarded and further orders are subject to approval from B.C.A. Exec.

## COMMITTEE REPORTS

**Pat Vasudev:** Pat chaired a meeting on the Leisure Service Report on Tuesday, February 18, 1986. The Leisure Services Planning Committee consists of Roy Yorke, Mary Bryden, and Ken Steel. The complete report should be presented to Gloucester Council by June '86.

Very few sports groups are using the storage space at the Blackburn Arena. Gloucester Insurance policies only cover sports equipment when stored on city property. Equipment stored on personal property is covered under the individual home owner's policy.

**Robert Madill:** We have a new post office box number, 8634, which is larger than the old one, and at a cost of \$50.00 New stationery will be ordered.

**Ken Greenlaw:** Ross MacQwen of the B.M.H.A. has a petty cash standing advance of \$1,000. and would like to increase it to \$2,000. Some discussion followed on accountability.

**MOTION:** It was moved by Ken that the B.M.H.A. be given a \$2,000. standing advance, and that the FUN FAIR Committee also be given a cash advance. The motion was seconded by Robert Madill and carried.

The Blackburn Optimist Club are donating \$500.00 towards an Art Auction, and request that the B.C.A. put in \$350.00. This may become an annual event, that if successful, will be able to carry itself. The exhibition is to take place the end of May. Discussion was deferred until March 19th meeting.

**Eldon Kemp:** Maintenance had trouble with flooding the rink this year. The water was not turned on early enough. The rink will be closed by the end of this week.

**Hedy Burton:** She is gearing up for Day Camp. Suggestions are out for a computer camp.

**Jane O'Reilly:** Volunteer Dance is coming up March 21, and she will be needing help.

**Bill Horne:** The Fun Fair Committee is rolling along. A new addition this year will be the Volks March, which is very popular in Europe. The idea is to have family participation in a walk of 12 or 20 km. The starting point will be the arena with check points and refreshments along the way.

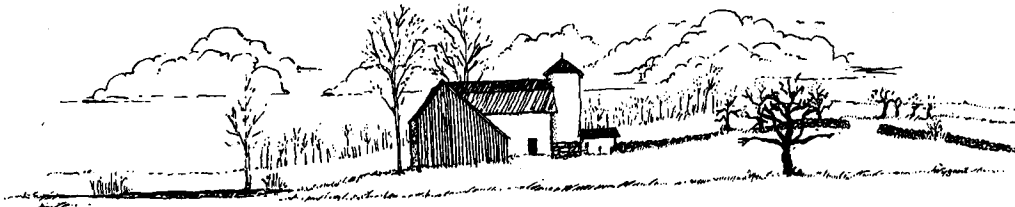

The number of youth in sports groups is declining and for future use, statistics on adult and child population in Blackburn Hamlet will be procured.

**MOTION:** Moved by K. Greenlaw that the Recreation Grant Allocation by approved. Seconded by P. Flinn, motion carried.

Ken moved that the Ratepayer's meeting be adjourned. H. Wittenburg seconded the motion, motion carried.

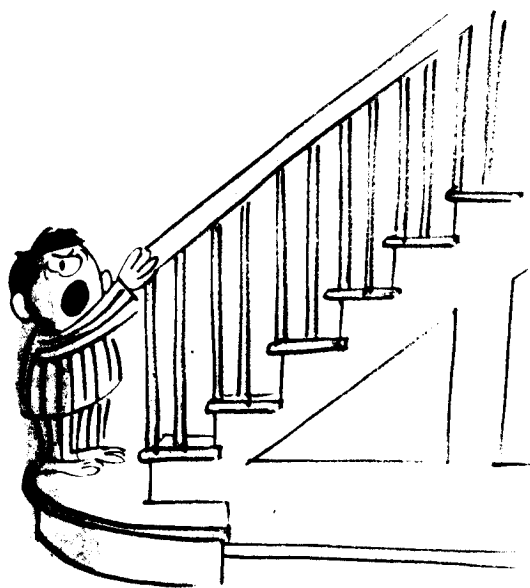
**Pat Flinn:** The balance of the money should be discussed at a future meeting of the B.C.A. as to distribution. We will try to invoke interest in the distribution on funds.

**MOTION:** Moved by Roger Piper that the B.C.A. acknowledge the coming need for this community to foster senior citizens programs by making known that the association is in favour on assigning a sum of money not less than \$500. to encourage senior activities. This money to be assigned if satisfactory application is made prior to the next budget deliberations in the fall of '86. Motion seconded by J. Bushell and carried.

The annual General Meeting was closed by Robert Madill at 9:30 p.m.

and came back from down south with a tan!

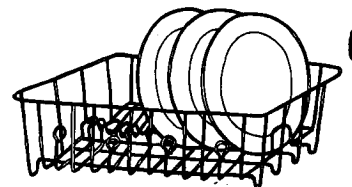
For myself, I worked in my basement on the BANAR in the middle of a hockey game with the back of my chair being one of the goals!

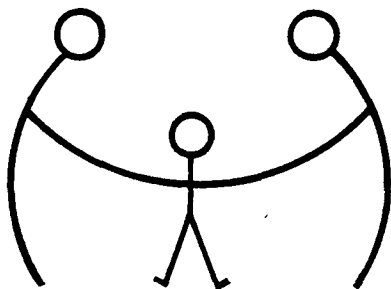

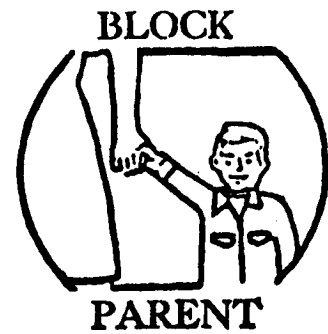

# GLOUCESTER BLOCK PARENTS



## WHY IS A BLOCK PARENT PROGRAM NEEDED?

To provide the community with an organized method of protecting its children and to aid in prompt reporting of emergency problems to the agency concerned, i.e., Police, Fire Dept., etc.

## WHEN IS THE BLOCK PARENT SIGN DISPLAYED?

A BLOCK PARENT does not have to be home and available 24 hours a day. When unavailable, the sign is simply removed from the window. Absence of the sign does NOT mean the house is unattended.

## WHAT IS THE BLOCK PARENT SIGN?

The official symbol of the BLOCK PARENT Home and the Program itself, which should be displayed in a window visible from the street. An indication to children passing by that this home is open to them for immediate help in an emergency.

## WHEN ARE THE CHILDREN TO USE THESE HOMES?

Only in case of emergency - when they are lost, frightened, bullied or followed by a stranger or stray animal. If they need help because of illness or injuries.

## HOW WILL THE CHILDREN RECOGNIZE THE SIGN?

The parents, schools and Gloucester Police Safety Program will teach our children how to recognize the sign and when to use it. Children are taught how to recognize the SIGN, not the home. If they see no BLOCK PARENT signs, the children are to run to the nearest door but not to go inside.

## WHAT IS A BLOCK PARENT?

Any responsible adult who cares about the well-being of children and other persons to volunteer their home as a safe refuge when the need arises. A BLOCK PARENT has no legal status except as a private citizen volunteering to act responsibly in an emergency.

## WHAT ARE THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BLOCK PARENT?

To offer your home as a place of safety from dangerous or frightening situations  
To offer assistance to people in distress and telephone the appropriate emergency service.

To assist the police by reporting suspicious or criminal activity in the community.

## WHAT IS NOT EXPECTED OF A BLOCK PARENT?

To provide food and beverage, toilet facilities, transportation, or administer first aid. To leave his or her home and break up a fight. To actively engage any dangerous person.

## HOW IS A BLOCK PARENT SELECTED?

Everyone over the age of 16 in a prospective BLOCK PARENT home will be screened by the Gloucester Police Dept.

## HOW DOES ONE APPLY TO BECOME A BLOCK PARENT?

By obtaining an application form from the Gloucester BLOCK PARENT Committee or contacting the Gloucester Police Dept. Community Relations Branch - 822-2916.

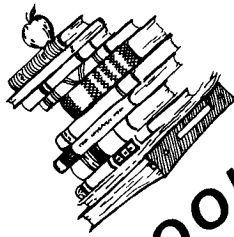
### STREET HOCKEY

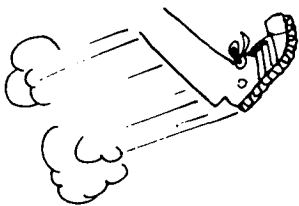

# Softball



## RULES AND REGULATIONS:

1. Registration Fee: \$30.00 per team regardless of size - all teams must have a minimum of 9 players (5 males plus 4 females).
2. Teams are to be made up of players from the same street. The tournament will be run as one street against another. No other groupings will be accepted.
3. Players: There must always be at least four females on the field at all times. All players must play at least two innings on defence. No player can play on more than one team.
4. Every player must bat in the regular batting order with a male-female rotation regardless of the number of players. Failure to follow this rotation will result in an automatic "out" at the umpire's discretion.
5. Games will last 4 innings or ½ hour, whichever comes first. All semi-final and final games will last four innings regardless of time.
6. Teams will be given a 5 minute warm-up time prior to the start of each game. This time is to be shared by both teams.
7. No more than two players under the age of twenty-one are allowed to play on one team.
8. No cleats will be permitted.
9. Pitchers will pitch to their own team, but must pitch from the regulation distance, for safety reasons. No walks will be issued, nor will a player receive a base if hit by a pitch.
10. No leading off the bases will be permitted until the ball has crossed the plate. A base may be stolen if the pitch is a called strike. A player must return to the preceding base if this rule has been broken but may initially be tagged out, i.e., a player attempts to steal second when a ball is called and is tagged out on his way to second, he/she will be ruled "out" - but if he/she has made it safely to base they would be awarded a safe trip back to first base.
11. All other rules will be taken from the Official Softball Association Rule Book. The umpires' ruling will be final.
12. All teams will be guaranteed two games.
13. No more than 9 players will be allowed to bat in any single inning, except for the final inning.
14. Teams displaying poor sportsmanship will be asked to withdraw from the tournament. Remember this is a FUN TOURNAMENT!
15. Players' lists and registration fee must be received before SATURDAY, MAY 10th. For more information call Darryl at 824-3067.

YOUR ALDERMAN'S REPORT

Traffic is a concern to us all in Blackburn and will become more of a burden when we realize the fall-out from the Queensway reconstruction beginning in late spring. The St. Laurent bridge will be reconstructed over a two year period and will demonstrate the lack of planning in road construction in the region over the past 25 years.

The need for other roads from the east is readily apparent and a new arterial route which would by-pass the Hamlet can accomplish this. It could meet 417 at Walkley and provide a link with both roads. One of the difficulties has been in defining a route to by-pass Blackburn with which the NCC would agree. This issue is being pursued strongly with the NCC and Regional Government showing a determination by Council to obtain a resolution of the problem.

When the Minister of Transportation and Communications was in Ottawa-Carleton recently, Mayor Allen and some of us met with him and Gilles Morin, M.P.P. It was a positive meeting, and I believe that there is an increased realization that we in the east have problems to be addressed.

The continued development east of us continues to build the pressure, and I have taken the position that construction should slow if the roads are inadequate. The point needs to be made, although much of the area in which there is growth is beyond our jurisdiction. I am more confident of the future in this area because there is full realization by Council that it is not enough to be in favour of something, but that energy and effort is required.
