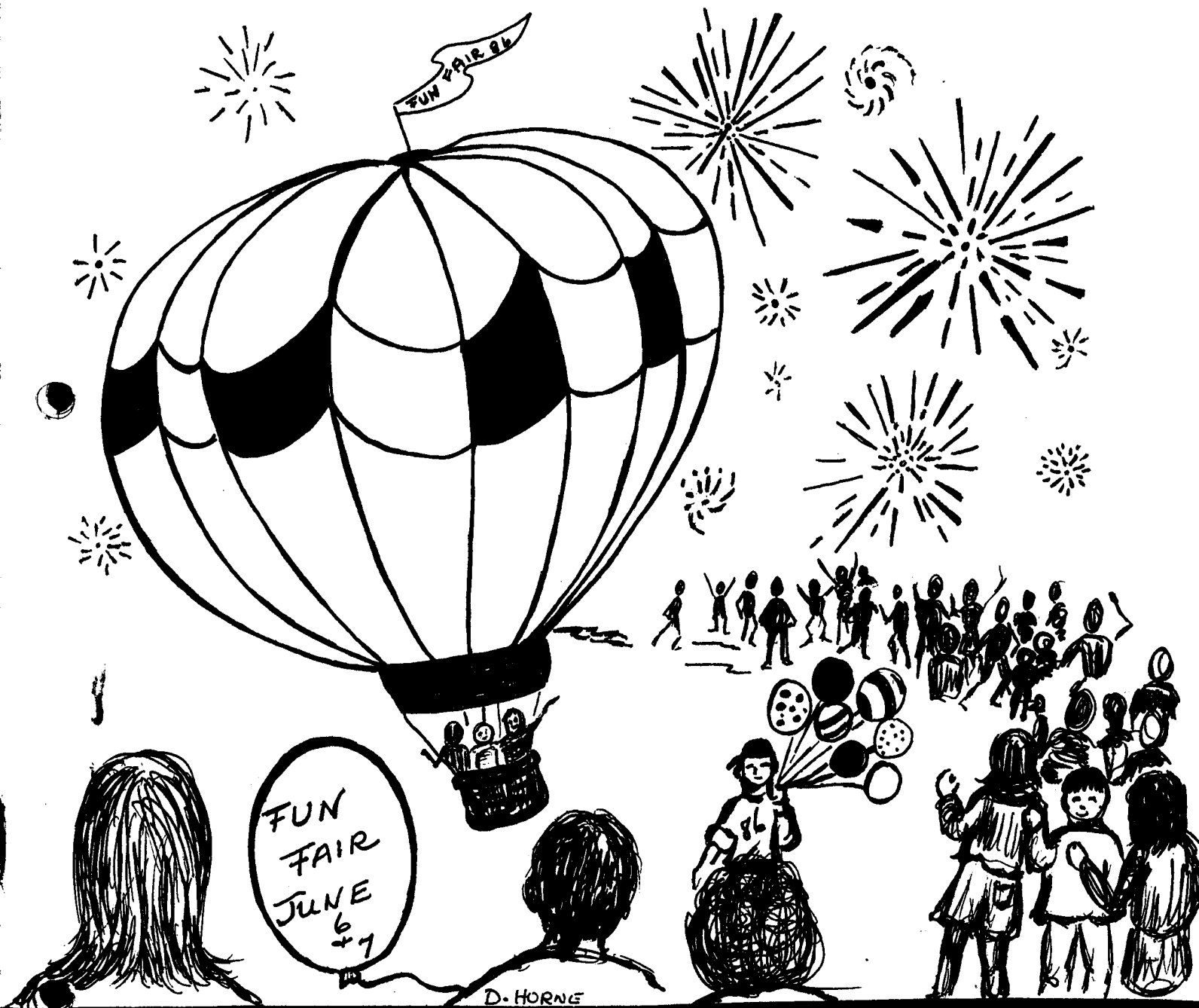

FROM THE B.C.A. PRESIDENT

Transportation continues to be a priority issue with the B.C.A. Executive. Regional Government is in the process of updating the 1974 Regional Plan, and of even more immediate interest, I understand that Gloucester is presently negotiating a bypass route with the NCC. We are seeking detailed information and will keep you informed.

Public meetings over the past ten years have established the community/B.C.A. position on several transportation issues. We recognize and support the need for improvements for East-West traffic, and are desirous of upgrades to Innes Road rather than a widening of Innes to four lanes, and support the far bypass along the Renaud Road corridor. That is our current position as it has been stated for the record by the B.C.A. Executive on several public occasions. There may be sound reasons for changing our position given additional or new information, and an opportunity for discussion and dialogue. We would welcome an opportunity for effective participation with Gloucester, the NCC and the Region in the selection of routing, construction and funding of transportation priorities.

The Region has identified a set of preferred sites for various waste disposal alternatives. This includes site number 22, near the Francon operations. Ed Campbell has been following this issue (among others) very carefully. Further information is contained in Ed's report, please read it. Our thanks to Ed Campbell who has been actively working to keep us well informed on issues as they develop.

The February issue of the BANAR contained our 1986 budget. The budgeted expenditures for publishing the BANAR was \$30,595. This figure by itself is cause for concern, as it represents almost 12% of our total budgeted expenditures. The BANAR Editor, is responsible to the Executive for the expenditure of these funds, the publication of nine issues per year. This represents a very significant responsibility and a major workload for the Editor, an unpaid volunteer (as are all Directors). The B.C.A. Executive is concerned with the magnitude of the funds being allocated to the BANAR, and the workload involved in producing what appears to be a publication that continues to grow in quality and in length. We are therefore in the process of soliciting community opinion to determine the readership of the BANAR and its importance to Blackburn residents. We are spending a lot of money and our Editor and supporting staff are putting in an extraordinary number of hours for each issue. The information we collect will provide an objective basis for management decisions that must be taken to constrain the expenditures of time and money being made to publish the BANAR, both of which are in relatively short supply.

BCA DIRECTORS MEETING

SUMMARY OF THE MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING, BLACKBURN COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION, HELD ON APRIL 16, 1986, AT GLEN OGILVIE SCHOOL

PRESENT: Pat Vasudev, Kathleen Loughlin, Pat Flinn, Mary Edwards, Ken Greenlaw, Marg Maddock, Jim Brockwell, Hedy Burton, Robert Madill, Sheila Munroe.

The meeting was called to order by the 1st Vice President, Pat Vasudev, in the library of Glen Ogilvie School, at 7:40 p.m. The President, Robert Madill, chaired the meeting at 8:00 p.m.

MOTION: It was moved by Pat Flinn, seconded by Marg Maddock that the minutes be approved as distributed. Motion carried.

ACTION BY: Secretary to let all executive know that there is new stationery available.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Robert Madill: Gloucester Public Works is actively campaigning the NCC for the alternate by-pass route known as Route 'C' of the five possible routes. Further information will be forthcoming.

Pat Vasudev: Brought us up to date on the Leisure Service Planning Committee's Report. Ron Root and Robert Bisson will be contacted about a tentative meeting on May 22. Bill Horne asked for property lines to be defined for the fire works display, in connection with the property lines of Gloucester and those of N.C.C. Mantha Insurance carries the City of Gloucester Insurance and we should look into the possibilities of Mantha for our bonding.

Marg Maddock: Nothing to report.

Ken Greenlaw: Ron Root called about repairs to the Tennis Court. Ken will look into it.

Mary Edwards: We have about 45 new memberships for the B.C.A., received during baseball and tennis registrations, which Mary attended.

Patrick Flinn: It was agreed that a letter will be sent to the Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton adding our comments to their Official Plan.

Jim Brockwell: Has talked to all sports group representatives and the lists of equipment, and where it is stored, has been sent to the City.

Hedy Burton: There are seven positions open for the Day Camp this year and she has received twenty-five applications. The interviews will be held next week.

Jane O'Reilly: The Volunteers Dance was a great success. Special Projects for this year has been brought in under budget. Well done, Jane.

Kathleen Loughlin: Payment of retail sales tax and federal tax for the printing of the BANAR was discussed. Kathleen submitted a written report on the publication of the BANAR. This will be reproduced and distributed to all the members of the executive by the secretary. Kathleen, Pat Flinn and Robert Madill will design a questionnaire to be published in the BANAR, and/or carried out by a marketing company, on the requirements of the community and the community's need for a community newspaper.

OTHER BUSINESS:

MOTION: Pat Vasudev moved that up to \$150.00 be spent on distributing an announcement of the Leisure Service Planning Committee meeting. Seconded by Pat Flinn. Motion carried.

Pat Flinn suggested that the Civic Affairs portfolio and the Transportation portfolio be divided since these will be the burning issues in the future.

NEXT MEETING: MAY 21, 1986 for the Executive Meeting; 8:00 p.m. for the General Meeting (Elections).

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

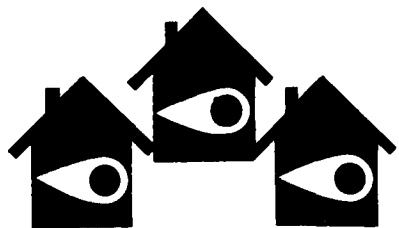

YOUR ALDERMAN'S REPORT

Waste Management

With the coming of the warmer weather, I had hoped to comment on more pleasant subjects like the upcoming fair and our new City Hall. However, I want to raise your awareness on the plans for waste management and disposal which could have an impact on our community. You may have seen the advertisement in the LEADER. In the Ottawa-Carleton Region we have a need to lay out a plan for the control of our waste, our garbage. To this end the Region has been studying the problem and identifying systems and sites. The systems involve variations on energy from waste plants (EFW) to produce steam or electricity using single sites or multiple sites. Coupled with these concepts are transfer station sites which provide for sortations to remove recyclable materials. A transfer station site could exist independently. The traditional landfill method of waste disposal is also part of the review. The Region has not determined what method of waste management it prefers, although it has identified sites in four categories: landfill, transfer stations, EFW (electrical only), and EFW (steam and electric). Site 22 is in the preferred site category for transfer stations and EFW (electrical). Site 22 is in the area bordered by Francon on the south, Bearbrook on the west, and St. Joseph Blvd. on the north.

Both uses would involve heavy truck traffic but the energy from waste plants would have a 200 foot smoke-stack. Prevailing winds are from the west so that most of the gases would go towards Orleans, thus more than Blackburn would be affected. The sewage treatment plant off Shefford Road has provided considerable bad odours and that plant is to be expanded.

Ottawa does not seem to want any sites within its boundaries. As a city, I do not believe that we want or need another waste disposal site in our midst. There is a site (No. 19) at the intersection of Walkley and the Queensway which may be more suitable, if the eastern area is to house the facility.

While I recognize that we must have a place to put our garbage, I do not believe that the Bearbrook site is the one. There are to be public meetings from May through to the middle of June which will be advertised. Try to attend one of them. DO NOT BE COMPLACENT.
