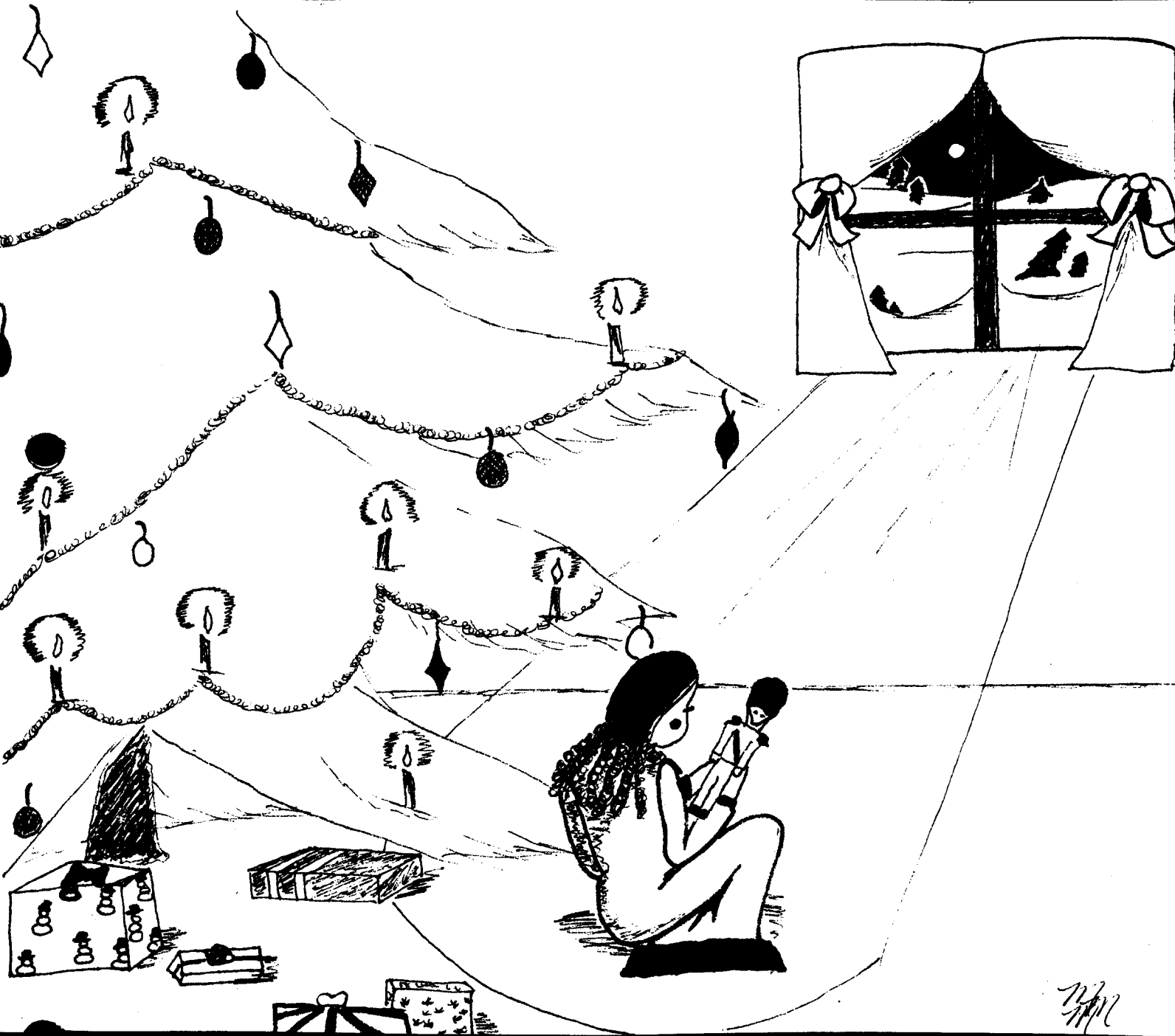

**FROM YOUR PRESIDENT**

The B.C.A. has been reviewing alternative strategies for continuing the BANAR as a quality publication that reflects the character of our community. Our Readership Survey showed that the BANAR is a very popular publication, and that residents supported current, and even moderately higher levels of expenditure for it's production. We have two key concerns: One, under current arrangements, it is necessary for the Editor to dedicate 40 to 50 hours per issue. This level of time commitment is clearly above that which can be provided by a volunteer on an on-going basis. Two, despite general community support for increasing the level of expenditure to produce the BANAR, it is our view that the continuance of the Per Capita Grant for R.A. activities is by no means certain, and that the B.C.A. should therefore take every reasonable step possible to constrain budgetary expenditures. We increase short term expenditures at the risk of slowly depleting our hard-earned capital reserves without producing anything of substantial merit.

In evolving a policy for the BANAR, our key objectives are to achieve a major reduction of the Editor's time, ensure cost constraint, and, to retain the essential character of the BANAR intact.

During our last meeting, the B.C.A. Directors established the following publishing policy for the BANAR:

- The responsibilities of Publicity Director and Editor will no longer be held by a single individual. The Publicity Director is a volunteer acting as B.C.A. Director responsible for that portion of the B.C.A. budget concerned with the operation of the BANAR and other publicity related activities. The Editor is a volunteer responsible for publishing the BANAR, and is not a Director of the B.C.A.
- The overall character of the BANAR will be retained, although the number of pages will be limited from 28 to 32 for each of eight issues, and from 36 to 40 for the May issue that features Fun Fair.
- A budget of \$250 per issue has been allocated to the Editor for hiring typing, layout and related production services. The Editor will thereby acquire firm control of the timeliness and quality of support services, and will be able to concentrate on material preparation, advertising and proof-reading.
- Advertisements will be accepted only on a "camera-ready" basis. The Editor will no longer be responsible for designing and preparing advertisements. The primary purpose of the BANAR is to inform the community, as opposed to earning a profit from advertising revenues.

We anticipate that the foregoing measures will reduce the Editor's time commitment to approximately 20 hours per issue. This is in keeping with other B.C.A. volunteer roles.

The present Editor, Kathleen Loughlin, is relinquishing her position and this will be the last issue she will publish. Kathleen has made a significant contribution to our community through her commitment to the BANAR as a quality publication. Many thanks, Kathleen, we appreciate the dedicated time and energy that you have invested on behalf of Blackburn Hamlet.

The B.C.A. is seeking volunteers to fill two positions: Publicity Director and BANAR Editor. We have restructured these positions to provide an interesting and readily manageable opportunity to be involved in a popular community publication. If you are interested in either position, please call Bob Madill, Pat Vasudev, Marg Maddock or Ken Greenlaw. We need your help if the BANAR is to continue.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Bob Madill at 7:30 P.M. in the library of Glen Ogilvie Public School.

ADOPTION OF THE MINUTES

It was moved by Bob Madill, and seconded by Bill Horne that the minutes of the September 23, 1986 meeting be adopted as distributed. Motion carried.

DIRECTORS' REPORTS

Ken Greenlaw: The Fun Fair committee has returned \$14,500.00 of the \$15,000.00 1986 advance.

MOTION: Ken moved that the \$500.00 difference be retained by Fun Fair for their 1987 float. Bill Horne seconded the motion. Motion carried.

MOTION: It was moved by Ken that the budget committee be set up at this time. Consisting of Ken Greenlaw, Marg Maddock, Bob Madill, Pat Vasudev, and Mike Irvine. Seconded by Bob Madill, the motion carried.

Gloria-Dawn: The P.T.A. may be contacting us in the near future for further support in rectifying the present school board trustee distribution.

Marg Maddock: Marg introduced Donna Bond, Co-ordinator of Neighbourhood Watch in the Hamlet. Donna gave us an update on her committees' work, as well as statistics. Participants in the programme have increased to 889 to date. There were 70 break-ins in January - September 1985, with only 50 break-ins (or attempts) in the same time period for this year. Robert thanked Donna on behalf of the B.C.A. and her Committee for the many hours of work volunteered.

Kathleen Loughlin: Dale Frost of B.H.A. will co-ordinate all of the teams who will be delivering the Banar this year.

Bill Horne: Has assumed Membership Director. He is looking for suggestions and volunteers.

Bob Jamieson: Hopes to engage counsel in the next week to seek ways and means of how to proceed with the Waste Plan Site protest.

A two hour discussion followed, on the Report on the Banar, presented by the committee of Ken Greenlaw, Kathleen Loughlin and Mike Irvine. A B.C.A. publication policy was evolved, which Bob would describe in detail in the President's Report in the Banar.

NEXT MEETING: To be held on Wednesday, November 19, 1986.

There being no other business the meeting was adjourned by the President at 10:30 P.M.

Ladies & Gentlemen,

At a recent meeting of the BHRCB it was reported to us that we, that is, you the citizens as well as us the members, have suffered about \$5,000.00 worth of damage to the Pool building and its equipment.

The list includes the following items:-

Seat of life guard chair	- broken
Fencing around pool	- cut
15 filters in pool filter	- destroyed by broken glass ingested by the pumps
Roof chimneys	- torn off completely
Brand new Eye Wash safety device	- destroyed
Re-painting	- due to defacement
Other odds and ends	

We were able, with splendid co-operation from the Gloucester Police department and City Staff, to apprehend five youths. The three younger ones were returned to their parents supervision. The other two are old enough to face charges for the vandalism. At this time the outcome is not known.

As you will gather, we are extremely annoyed that youngsters of this community should have such disregard for the community's facilities that they would thoughtlessly destroy property which belongs to all of us. They risked having the Hamlet lose the use of Pool since we already operate the pool at a deficit each year. In the event that we were unable to repair equipment such as the filter, it would mean the closure of the pool to prevent health risk.

Many children are able to learn to swim, a skill for a life time, and also to become proficient in life saving skills. To lose these opportunities would be a grave loss indeed.

We trust we have made our feelings clear to all. May we further advise that it will be our intention to bring the full weight of the law to bear on anyone who is found to have vandalized public property.

Statements submitted by mail and written statements submitted by residents at the Annual General Meeting shall have the same force and effect upon any decision taken by the Board concerning proposals and all written statements shall form part of the documentation submitted by the Board to Council.

All statements of opposition or support must be received at the above noted address no later than December 16, 1986.

The BHRCB will also receive community ideas for projects to be undertaken in 1988, thus if there are projects that you wish to see undertaken in your area, this meeting constitutes an active means by which you may be heard. You may also mail in your ideas, before March 16, 1987 at the above noted address.

3. The object of the Annual General Meeting is to ensure that residents and Council are kept fully informed of the activities of the Board and as well, to determine the extent of the support of opposition to the proposals put forward by the Board.
4. During the past year (1986), this Board has held meetings at which it:
  - a) Saw to the upkeep and maintenance of all existing park facilities which are the responsibility of the Board within the confines of Blackburn Hamlet;
  - b) Entered into an agreement with the Blackburn Community Association Tennis Committee for the operation of the tennis courts;
  - c) With the assistance of the City Recreation Department, established rates and policy with regard to the Bearbrook Swimming Pool and saw to the operation of that swimming pool during the 1986 season;
  - d) Dealt with the concerns of the residents with respect to the parks and structures under the control of the Board;
  - e) Conducted studies in conjunction with City Staff, of requirements that exist for maintenance and capital projects of Parks and Recreation Facilities within Blackburn Hamlet;
  - f) Reviewed a comprehensive report by the City Staff which provided cost estimates for projects to be completed in 1987 and after;
  - g) Received revenue and incurred the expenses as hereinafter set out in the financial statements;

5. Proposals for 1987

The Board has approved Capital Expenditures in the amount of \$37,627 for 1987 which will result in the enhancement of our neighbourhood parks, upgrading of Bearbrook Park and the Pool building and completion and upgrading of the pathway system within the Hamlet.

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## YOUR ALDERMAN'S REPORT

### Waste Management - Bearbrook Site

A great deal of effort has been put forward by the Blackburn Community Association and the community in making its views known to the Region. It is important that each member of the community do so. Every voice counts. Gloucester Council has expressed its opposition, as has the National Capital Commission. Please do likewise.

### Leisure Services Report

A committee was established to review the delivery of leisure services in Gloucester. It was looking at recreation and the aspects of leisure services to determine whether Gloucester was proceeding in the right direction, and was attempting to chart a course for the City.

While I fully subscribe to a review, it seems that the Committee proceeded on the assumption that the system is wrong and it should be changed. The changes suggested are far reaching.

Gloucester has developed a broadly based recreation system with the volunteer as the cornerstone. The result of this has been heavy participation and an identification with the activities by the Gloucester communities.

The Committee recommends a central committee which would take on many of the activities of the recreation associations. No public funds would flow to the RAs. The local community centre boards would disappear and the central committee would assume their duties.

There have been some misconceptions over what Council has done or proposes to do in this area. While we have made some changes in areas such as planning, we have not done anything which impacts on the role of the volunteer in the community.

My view is that we should not remove the controls which the communities enjoy in shaping their recreational needs. There may be problems in some areas but it would be wrong to diminish the role of such an effective organization as the Blackburn Community Association. If some community centre boards need not function and the communities are satisfied, that is one thing, but the choice and the involvement should be available.

In any event, may I wish you all a happy holiday season and best wishes for 1987.

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## From the Editor's Desk

First of all, let me say that I am not giving up the job of Editor of the BANAR willingly - I love doing the BANAR and I have enjoyed meeting all the new people I came into contact with and hopefully, have made a few friends along the way. However, my views on volunteering have changed over the past year and a half, and mainly because of my job as Editor of the BANAR. This has been the most difficult volunteer position I have ever had, and in my opinion, should not be a VOLUNTEER position. The role of the volunteer has changed drastically over the last decade and one need only witness the number of agencies looking for volunteer to fully realize the scarcity. At last count there were 36 agencies looking for volunteers and listed in the Citizen. Not only are people experiencing stress trying to hold onto their paid positions in the workforce, but in most homes today both husband and wife work outside the home on a full-time basis; two salaries are an economic necessity, not a luxury. The luxury is when the wife is able to stay home and take care of the children on a full-time basis! So, inevitably, time becomes more precious and extra time for volunteering is slowly becoming a thing of the past. The concept of volunteering used to be that the so-called privileged people of this world gave some of their time and effort to help the less-privileged people; this distinction is hard to define today in Canada where the middle class are hardly considered privileged anymore. So to be a volunteer in the true sense of the word no longer really exists.

To give you my interpretation of the events leading up to the present situation with regards to the BANAR:

1. In March, 1986, before I agreed to another year as Editor of the BANAR, I gave the BCA Executive Committee, a report on the BANAR stating that I didn't think the Editor should be a volunteer position, and asking that the situation be reviewed.
2. Subsequently, a committee was formed with myself, Pat Vasudev and Pat Flinn, and it was decided to conduct a survey of the residents of the Hamlet. BioLink Management Consultants surveyed 100 homes in the Hamlet and the results were published in part in the Summer, 1986 issue: 74% agreed with the present level of printing expenditures and 62.5% supported continuance of the BANAR if volunteers were no longer available.
3. No further action was taken and in September, 1986, at the first BCA Executive Meeting after the summer break, I again voiced my concerns. A sub-committee was formed with myself, Ken Greenlaw and Mike Irvin as members. Our report was given to the BCA Executive Committee with the final recommendation being that the Editor of the BANAR be given a stipend of \$500 per issue and that the position be advertised in the December /January issue of the BANAR.
4. At the October meeting of the BCA the recommendation was turned down, and the publishing policy outlined in the President's Report in this issue, was established. I did not take part in this policy decision and left the meeting when it became obvious that there was a conflict of interest. My only recommendation was that the Director of Publicity position and the Editor position be split. Prior to this October meeting, a notice for a volunteer for Editor had already been published in the November, 1986 BANAR.

So, after two reports, two sub-committees and one survey, a final decision was reached and I didn't happen to agree with it. After 16 years of having the BANAR in the Hamlet I don't see it as being a short-term expenditure, but as an issue that needed to be dealt with. I am not looking for sympathy because I know that I did a damned good job! All I am saying is that I am not willing to do so much work on a volunteer basis any longer. It is not my intention to denigrate the efforts of all those volunteers in the Hamlet who do such necessary and admirable work - their reasons for volunteering are their own. For me, volunteering has become a luxury I can no longer afford, similar to the luxury of being a full-time homemaker - both jobs are simply victims of change.

Heracitus, an Ionian Greek who lived in the 6th century B.C., said that change is the ultimate nature of reality. Nothing is permanent; flux alone is real. His famous epigram: "No one can step into the same river twice" rings just as true today as it did then - I simply happen to agree with him!

Re: Report from the Mayor's Desk - November 1986 BANAR.

The first paragraph of the above-noted report, indicating the RMOc Transportation Department as the source of the Mayor's information on the restricted lanes on Innes and Industrial Roads, left me with the mistaken impression that these restricted lanes were installed with the "blessing" of the traffic safety experts at the RMOc Transportation Department. This is not true.

The Transportation Department did NOT recommend "Bus Only" lanes on Innes/Industrial Roads early this year. Regional Council, of which Mayor Allen is a member, approved them anyway. The Transportation Dept. did NOT recommend that the "relaxation" of the "Bus Only" lanes be to include vehicles with THREE or more persons. Regional council approved this change anyway.

What the traffic safety experts at the RMOc Transportation Dept. DID recommend was the restriction of the curb lane of INNES/INDUSTRIAL to buses and vehicles with TWO or more person, indicating that this would

or more persons, indicating that this would create a proper lane balance which would safely accommodate both cars and OC TRANSPORT buses. It would appear that Regional council was not interested in safely accommodating both cars and buses when they could accommodate buses only.

It is noteworthy that the Transportation Department's recommendation (buses and vehicles with TWO or more persons) is what was presented in advance to the public at the public meetings, only to have council change it at the last minute. So much for public input. Adding insult to injury, Transpo then tells motorists to "Jump the Jam!" after doing their part to create the jam!

The later "relaxation" of the "Bus Only" restriction to include vehicles with three or more persons was, in my opinion, an insult to the motoring public's intelligence. Council knew in advance that only two percent of vehicles carried three or more persons. Therefore, this "relaxation" was effectively another way of saying "Buses Only" at that time.

On voicing my feelings to Mayor Allen this summer, I was informed that I was one of very few people who felt this way. If this is so, why was it necessary to maintain extra enforcement until now - four months after the normal one week extra enforcement period? Why also was it necessary to repeatedly and quickly raise the fine for bus lane violations? This sure doesn't indicate the high public acceptance of which I was advised!

I'm getting the impression that if I'm not willing to take the bus, I can take my concerns elsewhere. Perhaps that is where I should also take my vote next election.

I am impressed by the Mayor's Report on commercial/industrial development, as it appears to show a concern for the entire development picture, not just one discreet element. I sincerely hope that the Mayor's remaining time in office allow him to develop a similar concern for the entire traffic picture, not just the transit element.

Let's hope the next surprise move is not to make these restricted lanes a permanent arrangement.

Young men, posing as residents of OUR HOUSE, an Ottawa recovery home for addicted young men and women, have been asking for money from residents of Blackburn Hamlet.

OUR HOUSE Executive Director, Norman Sharkey, told the BANAR that no fund-raising drive in the area was authorized. He said that he knew of no residents or former residents who were engaged in such activities: "Any such activity is certainly not approved," he said. "I hope that anyone who is approached by these young men will call me at 233-1780."

OUR HOUSE has been in operation for almost 10 years. It is located on James Street and treats up to 14 young persons at a time in a family-oriented residential setting. It

is the City's only residential home for young addicts.

It is funded partly by the Ministry of Community and Social Services which pays for board and lodging. The remaining 40 percent of operating costs are paid for by fund-raising efforts by residents and friends.

OUR HOUSE counselling tries to help the young residents to cope with their feelings of inadequacy, shyness and self-centredness. The residents, who come from a variety of family backgrounds, have a six-month residency.

Executive Director Sharkey is a former alcoholic.

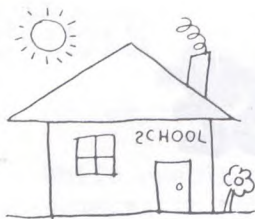

We are extremely concerned about the precarious future of the BANAR. We feel it is very important to the community at large that this publication remain in circulation. Obviously, it will not publish itself. It needs an Editor.

Anyone who reads the BANAR will realize that volunteers are hard to come by - the BANAR has been continuously advertising for a new EDITOR and other support staff. It is a position of great responsibility and commitment that not many are willing to make on a volunteer basis. All the volunteers must meet deadlines while maintaining as high a quality as possible. Each volunteers' contribution is vital. However, it is the Editor who must take responsibility for work done by the volunteers, even doing their jobs herself if they are unavailable.

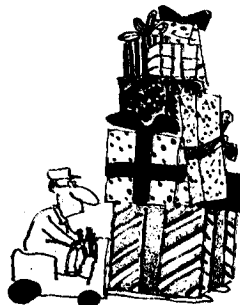
The BANAR (and, therefore, you, the community of Blackburn Hamlet) will be the worse for the loss of a good Editor.

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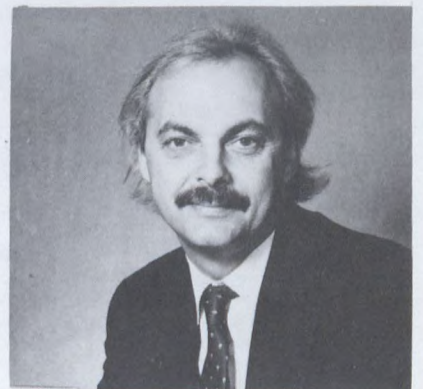
