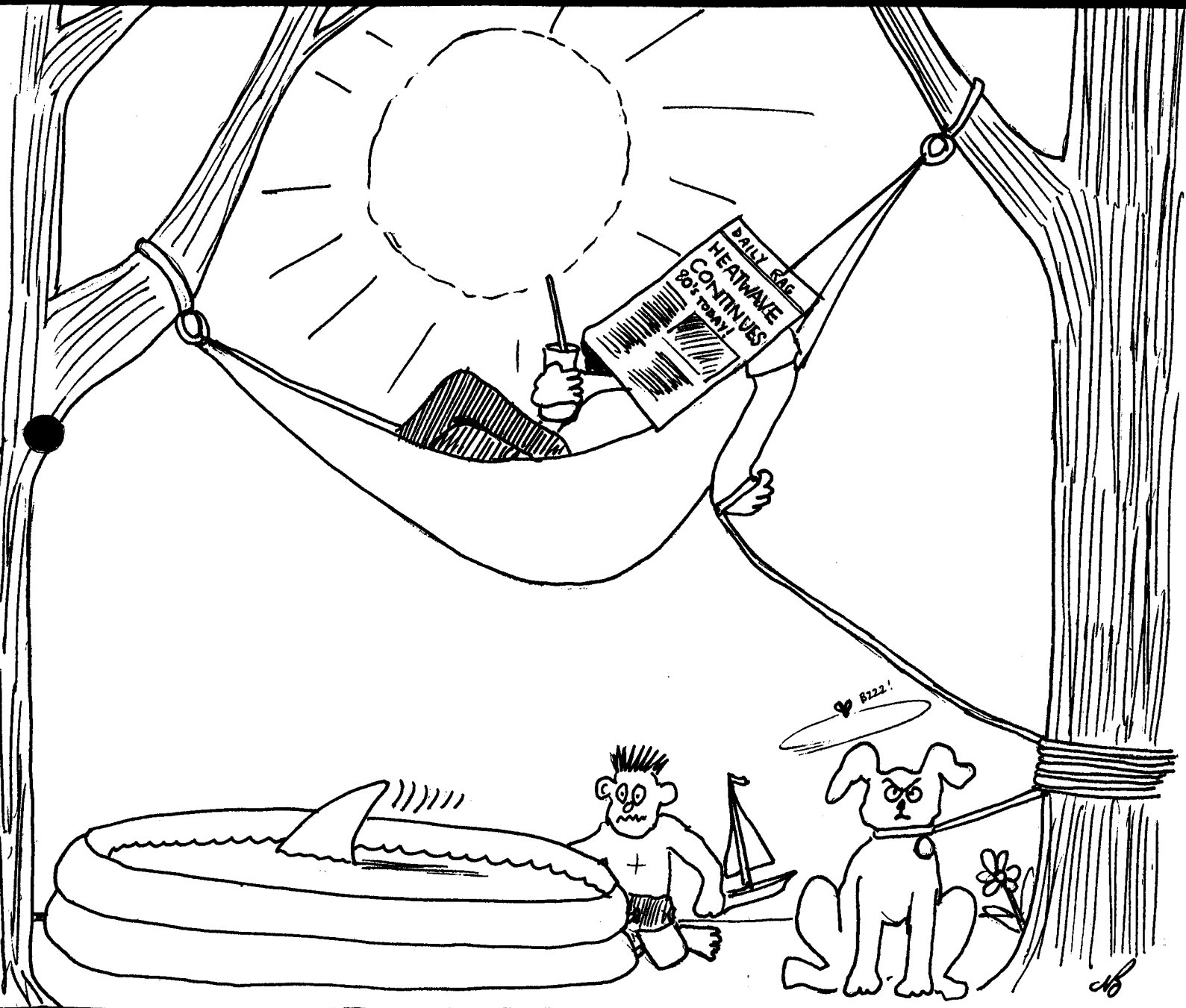

A SUMMARY OF THE
MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING
BLACKBURN COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION
HELD ON APRIL 15, 1987
GLEN OGILVIE PUBLIC SCHOOL

PRESENT: Robert Madill, Ken Greenlaw, Mike Irvin, Gloria-Dawn Warkinten-Coulter, Bob Jamieson, Hedy Burton, Sheila Monroe.

SPECIAL GUESTS: Blackburn 'B' Scout Troup with Ray Raoux leader of Gold Patrol.

The meeting was called to order by the President Robert Madill at 7:45 p.m. in the library of Glen Ogilvie Public School.

Ken Greenlaw introduced Ray Raoux and Scouts. The Troup attended the BCA meeting to present plans for improving or helping the community. The boys, aged thirteen to fifteen, are working on their Chief Scout Award.

Jason Fisher and Ian Mace presented a poster of a garbage can that could be placed at twelve of the busiest OC Transpo stops in the Hamlet.

Darrin and Steven Raoux suggested a recycling depot. They had a diagram of the building to hold the material and the site location as well as a suggested publicity campaign.

Jason Henderson and Geoff Kneen proposed a skate board park between Rondell and Orient Park. An area 60' x 90' would be fenced and paved. Insurance rates had been looked into as well as safety rules and paving costs.

Alex Burton proposed paving the Hornet's Nest parking lot, for safety reasons and for increased capacity. Approximate costs were given.

The Scouts plans were detailed and they gave well researched answers to the questions asked by the executive.

ADOPTION OF THE MINUTES

MOTION: It was moved by Robert Madill that the minutes of March 11, 1987 be adopted as amended. Seconded by Bob Jamieson the motion carried.

DIRECTORS REPORTS

Robert Madill: Robert reported that Beverly Brett has just published the first edition of the new BANAR.

Pat Vasudev: Pat submitted a written report on the Volunteers Dance. He is ill and cannot continue as chairman of the dance, although he has completed most of the paper work. Sheila Munroe offered to carry on where Pat left off.

Bob Jamieson: Gloucester Planning Department said that the rezoning issue of the Caisse/WINKS is presently on the shelf. Incinerator delays have been due to land fill site - geology reports. Regional Council may approve a site by late summer.

Ken Greenlaw: Ken presented the Auditors' report and financial statements as of December 31, 1986. There is a \$7600.00 surplus for 1986. Ken has found a new volunteer treasurer, Warren Hamstead.

MOTION: It was moved by Sheila Munroe that Robert Madill and Ken Greenlaw be authorized to sign the 1986 statement on behalf of the BCA. Seconded by Hedy Burton, the motion carried.

Gloucester Handicapped Association (Adults) with eighteen participants, have requested \$800.00 from the BCA.

MOTION: Ken Greenlaw moved that the BCA contribute \$300.00 to the Gloucester Handicapped Association. Robert Madill seconded the motion and the motion carried.

The Greenbelt Riding Association with three participants has requested funds as well.

MOTION: Ken moved that the BCA contribute \$200.00 for the Greenbelt Riding Association. Seconded by Mike Irvin the motion carried.

Gloucester Diving Club with eight participants from the Hamlet requested funds.

MOTION: Ken Greenlaw moved that the diving club be given \$200.00. Seconded by Gloria-Dawn Warkinten-Coulter, the motion carried.

The Chansonier Choir, who normally request funds, have received a large donation from the City of Gloucester and will not apply for funds from the BCA this year.

Hedy Burton: The Provincial grant for the Day Camp has been applied for, and the hiring is well under way for the staff.

Mike Irvin: A very successful tennis registration was held last Saturday. Badminton group has requested the possible use of Louis Riel School for next season.

A discussion followed on the Boy Scout presentations. Ken Greenlaw will draft a letter to the troupe with our suggestions and recommendations.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

AUDITORS' REPORT

The Members
Blackburn Community Association

We have examined the balance sheet of the Blackburn Community Association as at December 31, 1986 and the statement of revenue and expense and surplus for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests and other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, except as explained in the following paragraph.

In common with many non-profit organizations, the Association reports amounts for membership fees, committee activities and tennis fund revenue amounting to \$190,887 which are not susceptible of complete verification by audit procedures. Accordingly, we were unable to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenue, deferred revenue, excess of revenue over expense for the year and surplus.

In our opinion, except for the effect of any adjustments which might have been required had we been able to satisfy ourselves with respect to the receipts referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Association as at December 31, 1986 and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, except for the recording of fixed assets and supplies inventory as described in note 1 to the financial statements, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.



Fixed assets and supplies inventory

Fixed assets and supplies inventory are expensed in the year of acquisition.

2. Fun Fair

In 1984, it was decided that annual profits generated by the Fun Fair be distributed to the participating volunteer groups. Accordingly, the Association has received no proceeds from the Fun Fair during the current year.

During 1986, an amount of \$500 was charged against the Fun Fair surplus. This amount represents an outstanding float held by the Fun Fair.

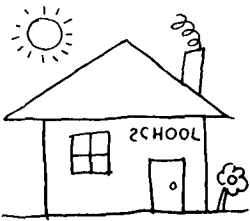

YOUR ALDERMAN'S REPORT

User Fees in Recreation

One of the more difficult issues, and also controversial, has been the question of user fees. Most people will agree that the users of recreational facilities should bear a large proportion of the operational costs. Those of you involved in winter indoor sports know how expensive it is for an hour of ice in our arenas. Of course, it is expensive to operate arenas and we cannot expect the rate-payers as a whole to bear the cost without the user's participation.

A recent attempt to levy charges on the users of City sports fields did not get off the ground and was rejected by Council. At the same time the cost of the maintenance and operation of sports fields is significant and will become more so as the fields become of better quality and as they increase in number. The issue will face us again.

The Gloucester Recreation Centre Board is spending time on the issue hoping to deliver a policy which is more definitive, addressing such issues as equity in fees and flexibility. We need rules but we sometimes become prisoners of them. However, I am optimistic that something will come of it which will be rational.

The By-Pass

There have been concerns expressed to me that we will get a four-laned Innes and not a By-Pass. Let me assure you that the By-Pass is very active and is in the engineering and design stage. It is a long process.


There are suggestions that there is no planning and that we should be looking for more imaginative, grander solutions. The region has been planning as we have in Gloucester. The report by Delcan in 1985 clearly identified the By-Pass as part of the solution, recommending a further connection to Walkley to form an arterial to the South. This is part of our plan and our action.

Some say we should have "hung tough". We have been doing that for years. Sir John A. MacDonald was called "old tomorrow" because he adopted the stance that inaction was often a cure. However, this is 1987 not 1887. Besides, Sir John A. sometimes made a hash of it!

City Hall

On a happier note, I expect the official opening of the new City Hall early in June. The area around it is blossoming and will be vastly different a year from now.

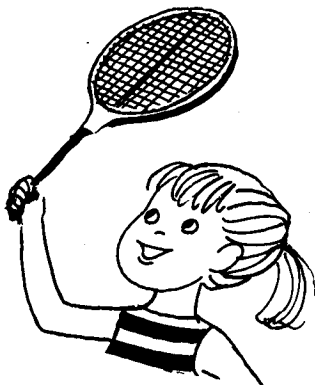

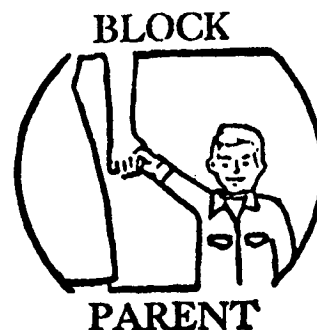
At the 12 and 13 year old level, player support is important and the parents of our Pee Wee A players consistently provided a valuable cheering section for all games - league and exhibition.

EXCUSES FOR NOT BECOMING A BLOCK PARENT

1. I WORK ALL DAY - Even if you can help for a few hours each week you would be of value. Evening and weekend hours are just as important as regular school hours for providing a safe home for a child in distress.
2. I'LL ALWAYS HELP, SIGN OR NOT - Let the little ones know it. Most children are taught to be wary of strangers, but that a block parent has been checked out by the Police.
3. I DON'T WANT TO OPEN MY DOOR TO STRANGERS - Naturally, if a hurt or frightened child seeks the assistance of a BLOCK PARENT, sanctuary would be offered. However, it is not necessary to allow strangers into your home. All that is required is for the parents or proper authorities be contacted.
4. I AM NOT A PARENT - No one should stop caring about the safety of children or other adults. Retired people and single people may certainly be BLOCK PARENTS.
5. I DON'T WANT PEOPLE TO KNOW WHEN I AM AWAY FROM HOME - The BLOCK PARENT sign is to be removed from the window at any time you are indisposed (ill, have company, etc.). Absence of the BLOCK PARENT sign from the window does not necessarily mean the house is unattended.
6. IS IT REALLY NECESSARY? - Today's society is so mobile our children often do not know families even a few houses away. Also, there are many working mothers and without BLOCK PARENT homes a frightened child could go to several homes before finding someone to help him.

All of us have a duty to assure the safety of our children. The BLOCK PARENT program is designed to provide such security not only for children in distress, but as an effective crime prevention program. Concerned citizens assist greatly to make BLACKBURN HAMLET a safe and healthy community in which we live.

Thank you to all residents currently participating as BLOCK PARENTS.

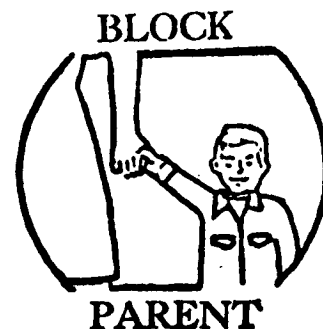

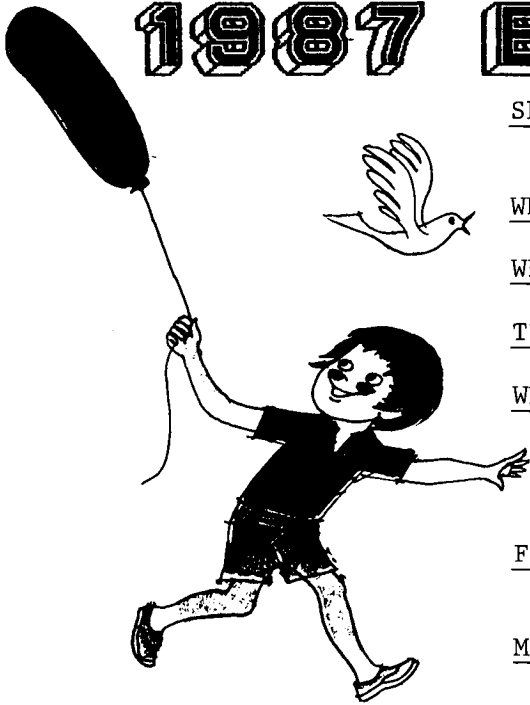

GO WEST FOR SUMMER '87

"West, you say. Isn't that where Vancouver and Expo 86 is?"

"Yes, but that was last summer and this year the crowds have gone home and left this small part of the world in quiet splendor."

For those of us living in the Ottawa Valley, it is difficult to imagine some of the splendors of Canada's west coast. First of all, there is the influence of the Pacific Ocean. It moderates the temperature and the humidity. Somehow it's believed that if a place is near the ocean the humidity is high. However, in Vancouver this is not true - at least not when compared with the humidity we experience here in Ottawa. Stepping off the plane at Vancouver International Airport, one breathes a wonderful smell - fresh, light air with a tang of salt. Secondly one is naturally impressed by the mountains. If one has arrived by air from the east, flying over the Rocky Mountains is an awesome (in the true sense of the word) sight. While, in Vancouver, just look to the north and one sees the majestic mountains. Coming by train through the Rockies to the west coast is a similar experience. As it is said, "Getting there is half the fun!" But when your destination is Vancouver it is only a beginning.

Yes, Expo 86 is over but the British Columbian pavilions are still operating and the Canada Pavilion with its five sail-like superstructure is well worth a visit. This metropolitan city has many other sights and experiences for the visitors. Other points of interest are Stanley Park, scenic English Bay, Granville Island Public Market, Robson Square and historic Gastown. The Grouse Mountain Superskyride gives one a breathtaking view from 4000 feet above. Fantasy Gardens in nearby Richmond is a visual delight - a product of B.C.'s premier, Bill van der Zalm. A daytrip of note is a cruise under Lion's Gate Bridge along breathtaking Howe Sound to Squamish. Return by steam train for an historical and spectacular ride along the coastal mountains back to Vancouver. Most visitors also take a daytrip to the provincial capital, Victoria - "a little bit of Olde England". A visit to the provincial parliament buildings, Empress Hotel and shops carrying British goods is a day enjoyably spent. The world famous Butchard's Gardens is 17 kilometers away with many tour buses including double deckers leaving from downtown Victoria. The journey, itself, from Vancouver to Victoria by ferry is 2½ hours of unsurpassed scenery - through the Gulf Islands.

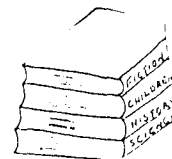
This summer there are several good packages to the west offered. VIA, Canada's passenger rail service, has a fifteen night unescorted tour from Montreal or Toronto to Vancouver called Transcontinental Splendors beginning at \$2025 per person double occupancy for standard accomodation. Treasure Tours/CP Holidays offers a ten day escorted tour to the Canadian Rockies and through to Vancouver and Victoria. The price based on twin sharing including return transportation to Vancouver for ten days and nine nights are from \$1279. Funway Tours Inc. have created a two week completely escorted tour to B.C. that includes a coach tour the complete length of Vancouver Island and a cruise up the inside passage from Port Hardy to Prince Rupert. The two week holiday includes return airfare to Vancouver, all hotel accomodations, Fun Party Cruise and in Vancouver a salmon BBQ steak dinner and coach tour for \$1498 per person based on two sharing a room. Airfare only to Vancouver from Ottawa is \$429 return from June 27 to September 26 via Pacific Western Airlines. Other tours are available including a Yukon Wilderness Adventure and a one week Canadian Rockies and Edmonton Mall Adventure. Yes, this summer may indeed be the year to "Go West".

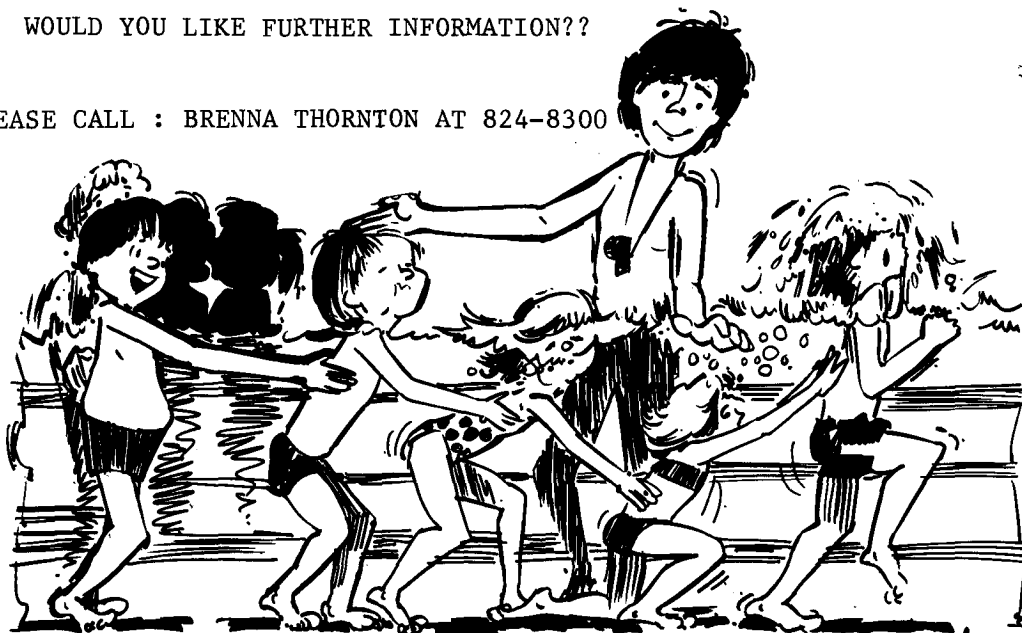

Young people interested in joining should check the BANAR next October for the registration date. The Club will also be looking for volunteer help for the next season.

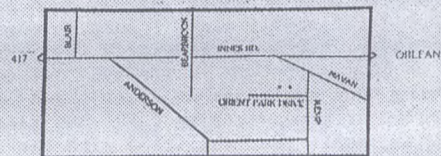

Thank you and see you at FunFair '88.

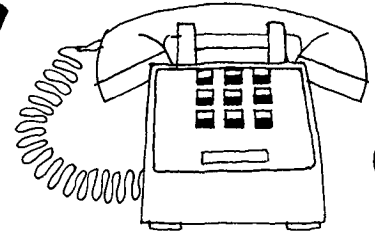
